Editorial Notes.

The Canadian cadets visiting the Motherland have evidently been showing their English rivals something in the shooting line. In the aggregate of the three team matches they emerged first with a wide margin of 34 points above the thirty or so other teams shooting. This is regarded as the big plum of the series and the members of the winning team will be presented with gold medals. They have also reflected credit upon themselves and their country.

Citizens will do well to get the fly trap into commission again. Last year the campaign waged against the house-fly in Wolfville was most successful and as a result the fly is not much in evidence so far this season. Success in this matter, however, can only be achieved by eternal vigilance, and unless the fight against the house fly is maintained it will be long before they are as numerous as ever. The trap used last summer was simple but effective. If it is continued Wolfville will soon be a 'flyless' town.

Within a few weeks every employee of the Alberta Division of the Canadian Pacific Railway, of which Calgary is the headquarters, will be vaccinated against typhoid fever. Enough of the vaccine to treat twenty thousand men has already arrived in Calgary and every C. P. R. man on the division will be made immune from the disease, which has caused such ravages in other years. The company have made a new regulation compelling all its employees to submit to the operation and every one from the general superintendent down to the lowest construction laborer will be inoculated within the next month.

In George Wyndham, Great Britain has lost one of the most gracious personalities in her public life. It is not only the fact that he was a peer and Shakespeare's sonnets interested him more than legislation, there is yet to his credit the Irish Land Act of 1903, the famous statute which practically ended generations of agrarian strife. His resignation from the Chief Secretaryship of Ireland in 1905, because the more bitter Unionists thought he was flirting with Home Rule, was one of the most sensational political events of the time. He never recovered the prestige which he then lost, but the House of Commons always listened eagerly to his tactlessly phrased speeches.

The annual Missionary Summer Conference under the direction of the Missionary Education Movement, in which all Denominational Mission Boards unite, is to be held this year in Wolfville, from July 22nd to 29th, and a very interesting and profitable occasion is anticipated. It is expected that over a hundred delegates will be in attendance and the Seminary building will be opened for their entertainment. Last year this conference was held in Sackville. Among the speakers and leaders representing the different denominations will be the following: Mr. Harry Wade Hicks, New York, General Secretary, Missionary Education Movement; Rev. Prof. J. W. Falconer, Halifax; Rev. G. A. Lawson, Moncton; Rev. W. H. Barracough, St. John; Rev. M. E. Fletcher, St. John; as well as missionaries from India, China and Japan.

Thousands Greet Mr. Borden at Halifax.

The most outstanding demonstration in honor of any Canadian statesman so far as Halifax is concerned was tendered by the citizens last Saturday evening to Rt. Hon. E. L. Borden and Hon. Frank Cochrane. Fifteen thousand people greeted the Prime Minister and the Minister of Railways on their arrival at the railway station and witnessed their progress to the city hall where a civic reception was held. An immense throng heard brief speeches on City Hall Square from the Premier and the Minister of Railways, following a reception during which, for half an hour, a steady stream of citizens had shaken hands with the Prime Minister.

A feature of the demonstration was the turning out of the Halifax fire department which headed the great procession with a large portion of the apparatus, the men being in uniform. The engines and hose wagons were decorated with Union Jacks. Scores of automobiles were in line and three bands of music were included.

A New Professor.

The following from the Norwich, Conn., Bulletin, refers to the new professor of chemistry at Acadia University:

Joseph Alfred Ambler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester G. Ambler, of Norwich, has been appointed professor of chemistry at Acadia University, Wolfville, Nova Scotia. Mr. Ambler was graduated from Norwich Free Academy in 1907 as first English scholar and valedictorian, winning the Sayles prize in physics in his senior year and the Newton Perkins medal in geometry during the lower middle year. He was graduated from Yale scientific department, S.I.C.F., in 1910. At the end of his junior year he won the Rogers scholarship in chemistry and in his senior year divided the Belnap prize in geological studies. He was graduated in 1910 with general two year honors and in his senior year was taken into the honorary society of Sigma Xi.

Mr. Ambler returned to Yale as laboratory assistant, taking up research work in organic chemistry under Prof. T. B. Johnson, continuing for three years. He has published three papers on research work; his thesis will be published later. He returns to New Haven Saturday to receive the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Yale University.

Acadia University, to which he goes as head of the department of chemistry, was founded in 1838 by the Nova Scotia Baptist Educational Society and in 1853 was transferred to the Educational Society of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces. It has fine college buildings, including College Hall, Carnegie Science Hall, Rhodes Hall, Chipman Hall, gymnasium, observatory, library, et al. The faculty numbers about 25, the president being Rev. George B. Cotten, D. D., Ph. D. It is an interesting fact that one member of the faculty is Francis R. Haley, M. A., professor of physics, for several years teacher of mathematics in Norwich Free Academy and who married Miss Wilcox, of Norwich. The college year begins Oct. 1st. Mr. Ambler's fine appointment is the reward of thorough, conscientious work, careful research and sound scholarship and he will have the felicitations of friends and classmates here and at Yale on his distinguished success.

June Snow Storm.

Speaking of the weather—and who is not interested in that subject?—this month is the anniversary of the great snow storm of 1862—the year that had no summer. Canada, the Maritime Provinces, Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts and parts of New York, Pennsylvania and Connecticut were covered by a mantle of snow several inches deep. In parts of Canada and Vermont the snow fell to a depth of nearly a foot. Nor was that June 4th blizzard the last of that memorable year. On the 17th another snow storm came, and it is reported that several people were nearly frozen to death.

July brought little relief from the cold. On the 4th of July ice a quarter of an inch thick formed in New England, Canada, and some sections of New York and Pennsylvania. August was even worse. In many places that month ice reached a thickness of half an inch. The first two weeks of September brought something resembling summer weather, but it did not last long. The last two weeks of September and nearly all of October were wintry and cold, but the year was brought to a close by remarkably mild December weather. That the earth or the sun were cooling off were the favorite explanations to account for that summerless year. This theory was all the more firmly held because the phenomenon seemed to be general, and extended to Europe as well as America. Snow fell near London, August, and in France all the crops, except potatoes, were destroyed by the cold. In America the crops were all very scant, and a famine was escaped by only a narrow margin.

Interested Visitors.

On Saturday last a party of railway and steamboat men from Boston, with lady friends, were the guests of the Dominion Atlantic Railway for a trip through the 'Land of Evangeline.' A special train conveyed the party from Yarmouth at 9:30 a.m., stopping at Digby and other points of interest. The party reached Grand Pré at about 3 o'clock and were met by Mayor Chambers of Wolfville, Mr. J. F. Herbin, manager of Memorial Park, and the editor of THE ACADIAN. A number of fair young 'Evangelines' also welcomed the visitors and served them with delicious fresh butter-milk which was much appreciated. The company visited the various points of interest and expressed themselves as delighted with their visit. The weather was ideal. After spending some time in enjoying the beautiful scenery spread out before them the visitors returned their train and proceeded to Halifax, where they spent Sunday.

Obituary.

CHARLES LONGDEN.

Charles Longden, age 62, died at his home at 53 High street, Florence, last night. He had been in failing health for the past five years, but was not taken seriously ill until about six weeks ago. Mr. Longden was born in Sheffield, England, and came to this country about 34 years ago. He was first employed in the cutlery at Bay State and then worked on the street cars during the early days of the road when horses were used as motive power. For the past fifteen years he was employed at the Norwood Engine Company's plant. He was a charter member of Hampshire lodge, A. O. U. W., and was its recorder for the past 25 years. He was also a member of Enterprise lodge, D. of H., the Methodist church, the special board of that organization and the Men's club. Mr. Longden was married twice. His first wife was Theresa (Tilly) Longden, who died in England on Feb. 13th, 1879, and there were two children by the union. They are Charles W., of England, and Miss Pannie, of Manson. The second marriage was to Annie E. Fuller, on February 20, 1889. He is survived by his widow and two sons, Ralph L. and Wilbur L. The funeral will be held from the late home on High street on Saturday afternoon at 2:30. Rev. J. P. West and Rev. John Sutherland, of Chicopee Falls, will officiate. Burial will be in Park street cemetery.

Technical Training in the Schools.

Educationalists throughout the Dominion will be interested in the report of the commission appointed by the Dominion government to enquire into the question of technical education for the public schools. The full report, a summary of which has been issued, will prove a valuable guide to those particularly interested in the primary grades. The commissioners, after exhaustive investigation, report very strongly in favor of technical training in the public schools with the idea of fitting those pupils who will not go on to the professions, to the fullest extent for whatever vocation they may be best adapted. Another important feature of such training will be found in testing the child as to the most suitable pursuit to be followed upon leaving school. It is satisfactory to note that the government proposes to make a substantial allowance for the furtherance of technical training in the country's schools. Much has already been done for this form of education by school boards in various cities, towards establishing this branch of practical education. Much credit is due to these bodies for the good start that has been made.

Ploughing by Electricity.

In Germany, where considerable attention is given electrical devices on the farm, the evolution of an electric plow is reported to be meeting with some success. Louis J. Magee, an American who has long followed this line of development in Germany, gives a full account of experimental work there. The German plough is constructed somewhat along the same general lines as the Italian, both being modeled after the English Fowler steam plow.
The German type calls for a 30 to 35 horse power motor. With the improved machine, (furrows 1500 feet long and 14 inches deep, have been made. Working a three share plow, about 9 acres of land can be gone over thoroughly in a day. The cost of electricity ranged from 60 to 90 cents per acre. The estimated output for equipment of the German plow is about \$5,000.

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Girls and School.

A bulletin entitled 'Why Girls Leave School,' issued from the United States Bureau of Education as the result of careful investigation, denies that the majority are taken from their classes to earn money for their parents. From one-half to three fourths of the girls at work in the factories of a Massachusetts town could have desired further schooling if they had desired or if their parents had insisted upon it. When interviewed they gave various reasons for refusing to study longer. Some said they did not like school; others could not get along with the teacher and were not promoted, while many simply "wanted to go to work."
The bulletin concludes: "Conditions such as were found emphasize the imperative need for special training of a practical sort for girls between the ages of thirteen and fifteen. Not getting the kind of training they might have liked and would have profited by, they blindly joined the army of shifting, inefficient, discontented factory girls to another, and because of their lack of training, rarely rise above the class of 'low-paid, unskilled workers.' Similar conditions exist in Canada. Technical and industrial education will do something to improve them, but many of us wish that the world could revert to a state of society under which fathers and husbands could support their woman kind without any assistance from female and child labor."

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KAISER'S WAR CHEST CAREFULLY GUARDED

Many Millions of Dollars Locked up in Treasure—Carefully Counted Yearly
We hear much of the perfection of the German military organization especially of its preparedness for war, but little of what is perhaps its most extraordinary feature—namely, the Kaiser's War Chest. The Kaiser's war chest is kept in the Julius Tower at Spandau. This fund is reserved from the French indemnity payment, and has so been increased that it now amounts to something over a hundred and twenty millions of dollars.
The Kaiser's war fund is reported to be kept in iron chests, is carefully guarded by the names and addresses of commanders of army corps and divisions of the Reich. These packages would be immediately despatched to the commanders named in the event of war. Special sums have been set aside for contingencies on the frontier in the vicinity of the outbreak of hostilities. There are also set aside special sums to be used for special purposes, such as the secret service. It is said that for the most part this treasure consists of ten and twenty mark pieces, and that there are, however, quantities of coins of all the great powers, principally France, Great Britain and Russia.
At stated times during the year all this treasure is opened, weighed and counted by army officers specially detailed for the purpose from all parts of Germany. It is a feature of the count that prior thereto these officers must give their word of honor that they do not know one another. Furthermore, although the war funds are in charge of a special officer at the tower, he is not always advised of the proceedings beforehand. In such event, it is only when the Kaiser's special deputies have finished their task that this officer is called to check the accounts.
The defence of the tower is entrusted to the Fourth Grenadier Regiment and a battery of the Third Grenadiers. There is also stationed within the citadel the Third Train Battalion, which is ever ready to counter the war measures to the various destinations assigned it.
At irregular hours of the night the tower is searched for thieves. During this search the sentinels hold their arms ready to shoot any suspected person entering the tower, or the secret crypt by means of tunnels. GLOVE STRETCHER

Turn Lever and Forms Expand and Stretch Gloves on Them
A new type of glove stretcher has been patented by a Canadian woman. A base has two globe forms rising from it. In the attitude of a person approached by a highwayman. These forms consist of separate parts that are movable away from each other and are stationary in each case and its companion is movable. The thumbs are also made on the same principle. The movement of the forms is controlled by a lever which is operated by the wheel in front. To stretch a pair of gloves, draw them over the forms snugly. Then turn the lever and the movable sections of each section, the double thumbs, performing the same movement. As will be readily understood, this expands and stretches the gloves gradually and without straining the stitching if done properly.

ELIXIR OF YOUTH

German Doctor Claims That Radium is a Cure for Old Age
The claim that radium can restore the hardened arteries of middle-aged people to a healthy condition, and so prolong life, was made by Dr. Seebach, a man of Berlin, who lectured in London before the Röntgen Society. If this theory is correct, it will be possible for a few pounds to buy a radium apparatus which will manufacture the elixir of youthfulness. This apparatus consists of an earthenware receptacle, containing a minute amount of radium, which is placed at the bottom of a glass bottle. The bottle is filled with water, and in the course of time the water becomes charged with radium emanations. The radium remains "active" for hundreds of years, so that one has only to renew the water in order to get any number of doses.
Dr. Seebach has discovered a form of gold which he calls "English gold," and which is due to the consumption of strong tea. Weak tea, as consumed on the Continent, does not produce this kind of gold, and not vice versa, as is ordinary gold.
