HAS SERVED ITS DAY

THE ACADIAN is gratified to note from the published report of the declaration day proceedings at Truro that Mr. Frank Stanfield, one of the successful candidates, is responsible for the statement that the Legislative Council must be abolished. Coming from a man who ranks so high in the confidence of his party, and who is recognized as likely to be a leader in the adjustment of the policy of the new government, the pronouncement cannot be regarded as other than authoritive.

Mr. Stanfield is a business man, and he and his party have promised a business administration. He recognizes the fact that in order to provide this one of the initial proceedings must be to lop off needless expenditures especially in the matter of governmental charges. The salary of the premier, he says, should be decreased and the members' indemnity subjected to at least a ten per cent. reduction. Such observations are certainly hopeful, as indicating the intention of the incoming administration to redeem the promises of economy in the carrying on of public affairs.

That the first step should be the elimination of the second cham-Inat the first step should be the elimination of the second chamber in our legislative institutions is appropriate. Its usefulness has long been seriously questioned and for a good many years measures relative to its abolition were supposed to have been in progress. The "reform" which was instituted during the last session of the legislature in no way satisfied the demand made by thinking citizens for the effacement of this relic of by-gone days. The Legislative Council may very likely have had a place in the economies of the long ago—but not now.

That difficulties stand in the way of those who seek to make an end of this obsolete chamber there can be no question, but where there is a will there must be a way. We may have drifted far from the principles of responsible government during recent years but it must not be forgotten that in a democratic country like this the people have a right, to rule.

Very large increase of motor traffic to Nova Scotia from other Canadian Provinces and the United States is reported by the official in charge of the Nova Scotia Bureau re-established this year on the border between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. This Bureau was established at that strategic point by the Highway Board last year, and proved so satisfactory in distributing information about the Province to in-coming motorists, and also in keeping account of the number of cars which come into into Nova Scotia, that the Board re-established it this year. It was opened about three weeks ago with Stanley Lowe, of Arsherst, in charge. All Boards of Trade in the Province are advised that any information sent to Mr. Lowe for distribution to the visiting motorists will be given out.

The number of motor cars from Canadian Provinces other than New Brunswick, and from the United States which entered Nova Scotia in the first two weeks the Bureau was open is 241. They were from seventeen different States and three Provinces, and fifty more than for the same period last year, when there had entered 191 Canadian and foreign motor cars. There were 1500 New Brunswick cars crossed the border to Nova Scotia in that time, but they are not counted as specially tourists, owing to the regular daily traffic between the two provinces.

The number to enter this year was comprised of 104 Massachusetts cars; 29 from Maine and 25 from New York and fourteen other States made up the remainder. In view of the season all throughout eastern America being late, and the really fine weather only now beginning, these figures are taken as a forecast of a very heavy travel for this season.

It is nine years ago that fire destroyed the building, and while the new one has been completed nearly four years, the tower was completed only this week.





RULES FOR HAND CRANKING SHOULD BE KNOWN BY ALL

Now that most automobiles have self-starters it is seldom that the hand crank has to be used. But it is advisable to keep the crank handy and to know how to use it if occasion should demand it. Cranking the car is a dangerous operation if not done properly and serious accidents have occurred through lack of precaution or knowledge in this regard.

In order to secure immunity from personal minury, be sure that gears are in neutral, that the emergency brake is set, that the spark lever is in its fully retarded position and that the band throttle is open only just enough to keep the engine turning after it first fires.

Engage the crank so that its handle points down and to the left and always turn the engine over by an upward pull, never by a downward push. A sharp upward jerk is safest and most effective. Prime the cylinders with gasoline if there is any handy means for so doing and set the dash adjustment for a rich starting mixture. Crank the engine

WASHING TABLE LINENS

Real linen is expensive, and for this reason if for no other the greatest care should be taken in its laundering. After soaking it should be well shaken out and put, a few pieces at a time, into warm soapsuds. Soap should then be applied to all soiled places and the cloths washed clean, with care not to rub too much, as that injures the fabric. Change the suds as often as it becomes dirty. Put the clean things into the boiler in tepid suds, bring to a boil, and boil a few minutes without stopping. The clothes will not look so white if the boiling stops before you are ready to take them out. With a clean, smooth wooden stick lift them out into a tub of clear, tepid water, wash the soap out, and wring them. Rinse in clear tepid water, fold smoothly, and wring. Shake out and hang by spreading a hem over the line three or four inches in from the edge to avoid too much strain on the corners. How To Write Want Advertisements

What to say---and how to say it---facts that influence the results you are after.

Results from classified advertisements depend largely upon how the advertisements are written. The following are suggestions that might prove helpful in properly writing a classified advertisement:

Don't try to save space by abbreviating or leaving out words. Use plain English and enough of it to tell all about the proposition.

Point out in your proposition the things in which you think the prospect would be most readily interested.

Select the strongest selling point; this may be the price, the opportunity to make or save money, the exclusiveness of the proposition or location, the size, the terms or any one of a hundred things.

Emphasize this point or points to arrest the reader's eye as he glances through the classified columns; this can be accomplished by placing the most important features at the head of the advertisement or by the use of large

Inasmuch as the amount of money involved is a vital

A man does not want to waste time looking up a pro-A man coes not want to waste time tooking up a proposition when he does not know whether it is within the range of his pocketbook. He answers those advertisements he knows come within the price he has in mind. Many people will not answer an advertisement that omits the price, feeling that the advertiser intentionally did not mention the price because it is too high mention the price because it is too high.

The number of replies lost because the price is too low or too high is more than made up by the response gained from those to whom the price is right and who probably would not have replied at all if the price had been omitted.

Make your classified advertisement specific. If it is sold on terms, point out the specific terms, not just "easy terms", but "\$10 down and \$5 a month".

Always bear in mind that what is "easy", "desir-able", "convenient", "good", "beautiful", "wonderful", "close", "cheap", for one person may not be for another.

The pulling power of the classified advertising lies in the directness with which important details are specified.

It is always well to impel action at the end of an advertisement. Often a person will have a real want and

need for the thing advertised, but the wording of the advertisement somehow lacks the power of suggestion to

To overcome this it is advisable to use a phrase that helps the reader to respond at once. "First caller gets this." "This will not last long at the price," "This is a special offer, see Mr. Smith before noon," "Telephone us and we well call for you in our car," and other such phrases often stimulate immediate action.

Another element that invites immediate response is to make it easy for the person answering the classified ad-vertisement to find you.

A telephone number is usually very easily called and many people dislike to call personally unless they can determine further details by telephone conversation be-

On the other hand, street addresses should be given wherever possible.

Some people have no telephone, others dislike using it and therefore prefer calling in person.

Not only make it easy for the reader to answer your advertisement but always be on hand to answer calls when they come.

This seems like rather foolish advice, yet experience in classified advertising proves that many people expect a classified advertisement to bring returns when they are not even present to receive the answers or will depend on a person to receive the answers who knows little or nothing about what is advertised.

Repetition has a certain strength. Classified Ads that readers pass by the first week receive interested attention and response the next.

One of the peculiarities in classified advertising is the fact that an advertisement may run several weeks and not bring a single result, yet the following week, possibly when least expected, answers will come from every quarter. For this reason, experienced advertisers order their advertisements to run a number of weeks.




