Here is an explanation of the whole enigma, taken bodily from the law which makes the ratio provision: 'That the proportional value of gold to silver in all coins which shall by law be current as money in the United States shall be as 16 to 1.

* * That is to say, every sixteen-pound weight of pure silver shall be of equal value in all payments with one-pound weight of pure gold."—St. Louis Republic.


