Post Office notice—Registration of Letters.

On and after the 1st April next, Letters may be registered in Newfoundland by the payment by a fee of 6d. currency on Local Letters, and 6d. sterling on Letters for the United Kingdom and for British Colonies, not passing through the United Kingdom, a further fee will be charged on letters forwarded through the United Kingdom.

The safe delivery of those Letters, will not be guaranteed by the Post Office; yet their inland transmission will be comparatively secure, from the means that will be adopted to trace them to their destination.

The postage on Registered letters must be paid in advance.

Full information respecting the Registration of Letters may be obtained on application at the General Post Office, or Post Offices in the external district.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Board on the 4th inst.

Resolved.—That the Board of Works will not be accountable for any expenditure on Roads or public Buildings, or any institution over which it has no control, except such expenditure shall be ordered by the Board,—such order to be verified by the written order of the Chairman and secretary for such expenditure.

Resolved.—That no surveyor or Inspector of Roads, or servant of the Board, shall give or have authority to give any order for supplies, or work of any description, without first obtaining the written order of the Chairman and secretary.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE BOARD OF WORKS hereby give notice that the temporary Light exhibited on Green Island, at the entrance of Catalina Harbor, Trinity Bay, since the 1st March last, was on the 13th instant, removed, and replaced by one of a more brilliant character and extensive range. This is a FIXED WHITE LIGHT burns at an elevation of 92 feet above high water, exhibited every night from sunset to sunrise, and in favourable weather will be seen from E. N. E. seaward, to W. 12 miles. Vessels bound Northward by keeping this Light open with the North-head of Catalina until Bonavista Light opens with Cape Le Jean, will give the Flowers Rocks an ample berth—or when coming from the Northward and bound for Catalina by giving the N. heads a moderate berth, you will clear the B. randles Rocks by steering for Green Island Light.

Green Island is situated in lat. 48. 30 N. long. 53.03 east.

INDIA.

The following message has been received at the East India House:

East India House, Tuesday, Sept. 28, 3 P. M.
The supplement to Mr. Secretary Monstone's message, dated August 26th, 1858.

Oude.—On the 26th, Sir Hope Grant sent a force across the Gomtee at Sultanpore, and occupied three villages in his front.

BANARES DIVISION.—Captain Macmullen, with his Sikhs, fell in with the rebels at a village near Retin Ghazze, Poken district, on the 23rd August, drove them out, killing and wounding sixty.

ALLAHABAD DIVISION.—Captain Dennetroy, with detachments of regulars, and a party of military police, came up with Wunjab Sing, of Reeva, at Berroh, on the 25th August, and killed about 200 of his men.

CENTRAL INDIA.

The Gwalior Rebels, after their defeat on the 14th of August, fled in a southeasterly direction, giving out that it was their intention to enter the Bombay Presidency, via Mundisore. However, on finding this line of retreat was menaced by the force from Nemuch, under Colonel Franks, they turned North, Bheelware, and on the 28th August they reached Jobra Patnee, which they surrounded. After some days' fighting with the Rana's troops, they obtained possession of the town, which they have plundered. The Rana fled and is now in Colonel Lockhart's camp at Soornee. Soornee is fifty five miles from Oojein. Colonel, under Colonel Hope Grant, left Indore on the 3d instant, to support the one which had been despatched under the command of Colonel Lockhart, of her Majesty's 92d Highlanders. The rebels are in full possession of Patteen, erecting defences, and throwing up breastwork on the roads of approach.

Adil Mohamid has moved from Jerogue, and taken possession of Poorassa. The movement threatens Bhalasa and towards Guzerat.

A small force from Ahambad attacked and dispersed a body of Mumbrames and Bheels at Mundetee on the 22nd of August. The rest of the Bombay presidency is quiet.

P. S.—The following message, dated Kurachee, Sept. 4th, has just been received.

Major Hamilton writes from Mortas that at noon on the 31st ult., the 69th and 62d Native Infantry and the Native Artillery, all disarmed, broke out, and tried to seize the guns and arms of the Fusiliers. They were repulsed, great numbers slain, and the rest driven from the cantonment into jungles towards the river. Our loss was four men of the Royal Artillery, and I regret to say Captain Mules, of the Fusiliers. Major Hamilton heard of the intended outbreak in time to warn the military authorities.

He had, with the police battalion, already arrested 90 of the fugitives.

THE CONCEPTION-BAY MAN

In all mixed societies there are certain Local prejudices existing, which are not only pardonable but in some cases even praiseworthy, and altho it may be observed of this District that they operate with less intensity here than elsewhere, still that they do prevail to a very great extent even here cannot be denied; however a new phase of Politics having taken place in our orbit, and one which is calculated to baffle the calculation of those who have hitherto been ruled by the trite and ordinary influence of old religious prejudices, it becomes the duty of those accustomed to think deeply upon such subjects, to urge their particular views temperately but firmly, so that by a careful selection or combination of opinions the most rational, Electors may be enabled to arrive at a correct conclusion. Whilst we therefore invite free discussion upon this subject we do not feel at liberty to shrink from the truly responsible duty attached to our position, and in the performance of that duty shall faithfully attend to the dictates of truth, justice, and patriotism.

The present Government is admitted on all hands to be disproportionately expensive in its establishment, unjust in its distribution of patronage, dishonest in its appropriations of the public money, feeble and inefficient in its legislative capacity, un-english in its predilection for foreign interests, and above all unconstitutional in its sustentation by a majority of placemen and persons supported by Government subsidies. This corrupt Government can only be checked or affected by the people thro those representatives by whom it is supported, one of those representatives is now soliciting re-election in this district, he durst not solicit upon principle, but must rely upon social partiality, blind prejudice,

or the pecuniary interests of his supporters, the latter promoted by his artfully directing portions of the public money into their pockets. This gentleman is opposed by a candidate who pledges himself to the correction of some of the evils enumerated, particularly the monster evil of corruption in our House of Representatives. Now we attach so much importance to reform in this particular, that to obtain it we would waive for the present all objection on the score of a Protestant district being represented by Roman Catholics, and reduce the whole to the simple question,—may Captain Hayse be depended on to redeem his pledge? This question shall be considered in our next.

(To the Editor of the Conception-Bay Man)

SIR,— Being brought up a Fisherman, and knowing little about politics, will you please inform me what loss our government will sustain in case John Hayward, Esq., shall not be returned. Some folk tell me, Mr. Editor, our Protestant gentry will not allow two Catholics to represent their district, even for one session. Now Sir it is well known that if a Protestant had started to oppose Mr. Hayward, professing the same political principles as Hayse, no Catholic would think of opposing him, but not one would move in the matter; and as we are determined only to support men, who are opposed to Placemen sitting in the assembly, we must support the man who was the first to declare publicly, he would oppose it.

According to Capt. Hayse's letter, "the only point upon which The Government or their servants can say his are Tory principles, are his opposition to placemen, his opposition to our fishery rights being given up to the French, and his opposition to taxing the Labrador without representation."—in all else Hayse professes to be a true liberal. Now Sir how can such an opinion upon these plain points turn a liberal into a Tory? Those who say so are deceiving the people. But the Government or their supporters say, we cannot have a better man for them, than John Hayward, and in my opinion they are right, for every John in the House is always at the elbow of every one in power.

Should Hayse be chosen to pick this bone of contention, I say Mr. Editor, and will maintain it, that the Country in general will derive a benefit; if you Sir ask me how, I think I can prove it.—In the first place Hayse will soon be joined by other liberals and force the Government to do what is right, and if they do not so, the cry of Liberal against Tory will no longer screen them, in the second place the ministry having to stand or fall by their conduct, will be more saving of the public money, and expend it more fairly upon the Outports as well as St. Johns, and in the third place, members will not support any or every thing proposed by the ministry, bad good or indifferent, when they have nothing to lose by opposing it.

But, say others, who will fill the office of solicitor general if Hayward is casted? Now Sir Hayse is big, and perhaps honest enough for the office, but he is no Lawyer, besides if he was, he could not take office, whilst representing us.

But would Mr. Kayward really lose his berth if he lost the Election? I think not, if he falls in the ministerial cause.—When Mr. Emmerston lost his Election, he was appointed to a seat in the Council, and confirmed in the very situation Mr. Hayward now fills, then bad as the ministry are, they would not be more ungrateful to him than they were to Emmerston. No Sir there is no fear but that Mr. Hayward will be well provided for; and I hope Electors will do their duty to their Country, notwithstanding the generally opposing elements which now seem to be united for the purpose of depriving them of the privilege of voting as they please.

A FRIEND TO CIVIL & RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

WE copy the following letter, deeming it right that our Labrador men should understand what has been done by Governor Darling, and supported by our Ministry, prejudicial to Newfoundland fishery rights.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE PUBLIC LEDGER.

Sir,—It is an old saying that calms produce stagnant water, the latter generates pestilential atmosphere and its consequent disease, that a little wholesome ripple is therefore good to freshen and purify the air,—so is it in politics and in society generally.

The family compact has, of late, become so arrogant and so confident in its power that I should not be surprised, as its insanity matures, if it were to attempt in its ardent desire to advocate French rights, to introduce a Bill to gag the Press, as done in France.

Your renewed observations with regard to the diabolical sequestration of the inalienable rights of the people of Newfoundland to the French by their Fisheries, and also of the soil on part of the Island, attempted by the present Government, in agreeing to that infamous despatch of Governor Darling, No. 66, has hit the right mark; your lance has pierced deep, the criminal writhes under it, he dreads the consequence if repeated, and hence he sends forth, in the

Newfoundlander of to-day, what he deems a "smasher." He threatens those like yourself who write—he snubs those who would speak, by reminding them of their inconsistency, their folly and weakness in signing Governor Darlings's Address—he adopts the old adage "The world is governed by humbug and he tries it on."

Now—seriously, what is the question at issue between the people and the Government—and by the Government I wish it to be understood that I mean that domineering confederacy, the family compact? It is thus:—

The Government, through the medium of its despatch, No. 66, transmitted by Governor Darling to England, proclaims to the Colonial Secretary that the French possess an exclusive right to that part of the coast commonly called the French Shore, and the French now are asserting that right to ruin of the colonists residing there. The inhabitants of Newfoundland declare and maintain that the French possess no such right, but that they have by Treaty a right in common with the French to the fisheries, and a special right to the shore.

Now, what those most deeply interested in the question desire to know is, whether the local Government purpose still to abet the principals contained in Governor Darlings's despatch, No. 66, and thereby concede to this their view of the case; or, whether it be their intention to maintain the rights of the Colony, which rather than forfeit or have improperly wrested from them, the people at all hazards will as one man act together in sustaining.

On behalf of the fishermen of the Colony, and on behalf of all who have an interest in it, I call on the organ of the Government (the Newfoundland) to answer unequivocally these questions; let us understand distinctly what their intentions are.

CORONERS INQUEST

Verdict *Died a natural death.*

The Coroner was informed, by letter from Mr. Goss, Spaniards Bay, that a child of John Chipman had accidentally caught fire and was so burned that it died two hours afterwards.—The parties were referred to Charles Cozens, Esq., in whose District the accident happened.

AUSTRIA.—A conspiracy was discovered some time since at Lemberg, the capital of Austrian Galicia. It originated in one of the schools there, most of the conspirators being from twelve to fifteen years of age. Eleven of them having been tried and sentenced, one to death and the others to various terms of imprisonment. On passing sentence the Judges themselves recommended them to mercy, on account of their extreme youth. The investigation is said to have put the Government on the track of a more formidable conspiracy, with ramifications in Russian Poland, with a view to a general rising of all the Slavonic populations of Austria to form a Republic, which would comprise 9,000,000 of inhabitants.

RUSSIA.—The successful submersion of the electric wire across the Atlantic has induced the Russian Government to take steps to lay a telegraph across the Strates of Bhering. A company has, it is said, been formed, but the monopoly will be in the hands of the authorities. The idea was, it seems, originated by the well known French savant, M. Babnet, and the venerable Humboldt has pronounced the scheme practicable. To make it of any use it would, however, be necessary to lay the wire from Moscow, across the steps of Russia and the Siberian

deserts. For the sake of civilisation let us hope this gigantic scheme will be realised.

UNITED STATES.

A DREADFUL OUTRAGE.—A terrible and most shameful outrage was committed on Staten Island a few days since. The New York Quarantine Station is located at this place, and has been for about a century. This is said to be the most suitable place for this station in the vicinity of New York. Certain persons who have purchased lands in the immediate vicinity, finding their real estate rising fast in value, began to complain that the Station was a nuisance and asked for its removal.—Already their land has advanced from \$35 to from \$3,000 to \$10,000 per acre. Could the station be removed which no doubt is a nuisance, their lands would advance far more rapidly in value. Not being successful in their petitions for the removal of the Station, they became exasperated and set fire to the Quarantine buildings, and laid them in ashes. These buildings were occupied with the sick and the dying, and the scene which followed during their burning, beggars all description. The patients—many of whom were sick with the small pox and the yellow fever—were treated in a most barbarous manner.

This is the most uncalled for outrage on life and property ever committed in a civilized community.—The speculators purchased their land, knowing the nuisance was there, and at the time, it is presumed, had no idea that be removed. Finding its removal would bring to them millions of dollars, and prompted purely by the love of gain, they were led to perpetrate a deed that would disgrace the most barbarous tribe of any heathen country. The buildings are to be rebuilt and measures taken to bring the rioters to justice.

THE GREATEST RAILWAY YET.—The grand est interoceanic railway scheme yet conceived has been submitted to the Colonial Minister. It is the plan of a line from Halifax to Vancouver's Island. The importance of this connecting the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans is enforced by a newspaper correspondent, and his figures are calculated to arrest attention. It is the least argument in favour of this gigantic proposal that the line will entirely pass through British colonies and possessions. The advantages of the railway would be felt in both hemispheres of the world; and all Europe, with a considerable portion of America would gain by it. This line of communication would considerably shorten the distance between England and Vancouver's Island, China, and Australia. A calculation shows that the route proposed is much shorter and quicker than the shortest hitherto considered practicable—that via Panama. The distance to be traversed by the Inter-Oceanic Railway would be 2,300 miles. Such a line of communication, if now available would save passengers to Fraser River 22 days; but it must be borne in mind that at present the new colony can only be reached via San Francisco. But the writer proves that under any circumstances, the route he proposes to British Columbia, China, and Australia, is better than that by Panama. The former route would be calculated, be quicker by ten days than the latter.

(From the Ledger, of the 5th inst.)

Perhaps the resources of this Colony will have become more thoroughly known through the Agency of the Mining Association, than by any other means which has as yet, or may be for some time to come put in requisition it is certain that information of a very valuable character is being picked up occasionally by the Manager of that body, in those exploring to us periodically undertaken by him. We have seen a map of the Island, of his construction, taken in some instances from former surveys, but which has been improved by the addition of geological distinctions in their several localities. This map, however, will have to undergo other alterations in consequence of the recent exploration of the Manager, reaching to a very wide extent of the country, giving him a more correct knowledge of the interior, of its wood and water facilities and of other matters well worth knowing. Erroneous plottings of various important water-courses which existed in the old maps will be corrected, and geological districts hitherto unexplored will afford their quota to the completion of the work. Mr. GIBBORNE has been engaged this season in a heavy and toilsome survey, through the Exploits and Notre Dame Bays, as well as those of Bonavista, Fortune and Placentia, and several mineral samples have been procured. During the expedition Mr. GIBBORNE has learnt more of the interior of this country than perhaps any other man, and a history of his excursion could not be otherwise than interesting. Accompanied by a single Indian he left Bonavista Bay, and taking a Southwest course pierced as far as to within sight of Despair Bay, whence he proceeded northwardly to Gander Bay. Much of this journey was performed in small boats, with paddles, whilst the outside coasting work was done in the yacht *Starlight*. It is not too much to expect that the Government will avail

themselves of the valuable information which, doubtless, Mr. G. can impart, and we think his maps, with all the improvements they contain, well worthy their support.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND MINING ASSOCIATION.

We notice the arrival on Friday last, of Mr. Gisborne's exploring yacht *Starlight*, after a long and we trust successful cruise.

Placentia, Fortune, Bonavista, Exploits and Notre Dame Bays, have been examined this season, and many specimens of galena and copper procured therefrom.

The analyses of the several samples are now being made by Mr. Henry Gisborne, and so soon as they are completed, and the reports submitted to the Directors in England, future operations will be decided upon.

The explorations were made from whale-boats which returned to the schooner at night when convenient, but at times were from two to six days absent. Many hundred miles of coast, inlets and streams have been thus examined.

During the expedition, Mr. Gisborne, accompanied by the one Indian, made an excursion into the very heart of the Island, entering from Bonavista Bay in a south-westerly direction until within sight of the high lands of Bay Despair, and returning north to Gander Bay. A considerable portion of the journey was performed in a light boat with paddles, similar to a canoe. The men who assisted in carrying the boat and provisions from the *Starlight*, for the first 12 miles inland from Bonavista Bay, tell the same old tale of Mr. Gisborne's capabilities as an explorer.

One grand result of this arduous expedition is the ascertained fact, that we have large forests of Pine and other valuable timber, in sufficient quantity to last this Colony, and to find winter employment for many of our unemployed population, for years to come.

Mr. G. has mapped down the timber districts, and also many of the available courses for bringing it out of the interior.

Our Government, we consider, are in duty bound to avail themselves of such valuable knowledge, if it can be procured, as we doubt not, it may be for a reasonable consideration; and we, with every individual with whom we have conversed on the subject, rely upon our Executive securing for the Colony Mr. Gisborne's comprehensive and beautiful map of the Island, together with his notes on our mineral indications and timber lands.—*Post of Tuesday.*

To the EIndependent lectors of the District of Harbor Grace.

GENTLEMEN,—Called upon by an influential portion of the community whose good opinion I gratefully appreciate, and to whose judgement I feel bound to defer; I cannot hesitate to offer myself as a Candidate for your suffrages, to represent this important District, in place of the Gentleman who has lately accepted the office of Her Majesty's Solicitor General of Newfoundland.

The first principle of Responsible Government, I apprehend to be—Government by the People—when their representatives become placemen it is evident they must waver between their duty to their constituents, and their own personal interests, which may be more readily advanced by a blind subserviency to party or sycophancy to the ruling power, than by a faithful maintenance of the rights and privileges of those whose confidence they forfeit, thus bringing the Liberal or responsible principle, which they pretend to advocate, into general disrepute.

It shall be my earnest endeavour, if returned as your Representative, to oppose and discountenance by all means, such a foul perversion of the spirit of the Constitution, and to this end I promise not to accept of office myself and to discourage to best of my ability, the continuance of a practice which has brought so much odium upon the liberal cause.

A Native of the Country, it is scarcely needful for me to express my ardent desire to participate in the Legislation, which, morally, socially, and politically, should elevate my Countrymen, and contribute generally to the comfort, happiness, and prosperity of the people; and as a Sealer and a Mariner, I cannot act otherwise than sustain the particular interests of those with whom I have long been associated, the Sealers and Fisherman of my native land.

Agriculture and its great auxiliary, Good Roads, should certainly engage the earnest attention of the Legislature, and I shall neither be dilatory nor parsimonious in supporting the necessary appropriations for those most essential, objects.

No Country can rise in the scale of civilisation or even long remain free, unless a comprehensive and liberal system of Education be generally adopted. Education therefore, shall be deemed one of the primary objects of my earnest attention.

The erection of Light Houses along our northern line of coast is a subject of vital importance to my fellow Mariners, and one in which the Inhabitants of this Bay are deeply in-

terested. My best exertions shall be made to induce the Government to contribute liberally for this laudable, humane, and life preserving object.

Outport interests generally shall be faithfully advanced by me, but the requirements of the district I aspire to represent shall, if successful be the particular objects of my strenuous and uncompromising advocacy.

Reduction of taxation can only take place after the reduction of extravagant public expenditure. It shall be my constant endeavour if returned, to prevail upon the Government so to effect the latter that the former may be reasonably expected.

I shall avail myself of an early opportunity to express my sentiments freely upon French claims and Labrador taxation.
