She claims to have run away from her husband for various reasons and stated she had taken the freight train as her first chance. When discovered by Officer Wedge at 1.30 Sunday morning, she was sitting coolly on the Hotel American steps. Not being able to give an account of herself she was taken in charge by the officer.

Her age was given as 23 years, the last five of which she stated she had lived in wedded bliss with her husband. During that time the joys of matrimony seemed to have dimmed and the decision was made to leave her husband, whom she stated was an employee of the pulp mill. She also stated that she left her home in Scotland to come to Canada, some eleven or twelve years ago. A lying and larking charge will be laid against her.

26th Batt. Sailing For Home

Simultaneously with the arrival in Canada of the siege batteries comes the announcement that the 26th New Brunswick Battalion, the infantry unit which has been the chief representative of the province in the trenches, will sail from England today, May 10.

Plans will be commenced at once for a welcome on an adequate scale when they reach St. John. So far no word has been received as to details of their sailing arrangements and it is not known whether they will come direct to St. John or whether their steamer will dock in Halifax.

In honor of their arrival a dinner will be tendered to the returning officers of the battalion by the officers of the unit who already have returned.

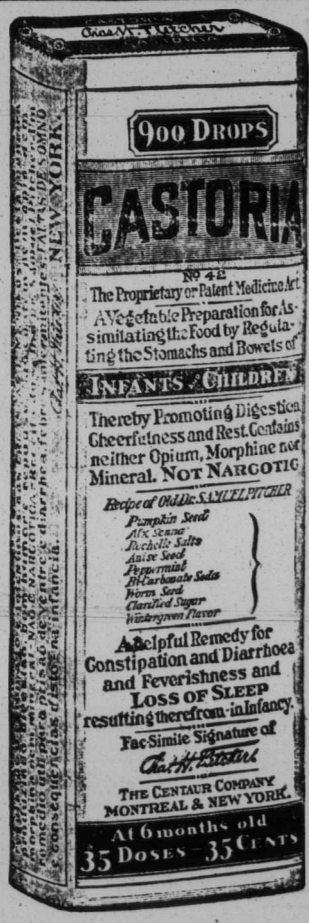

WASTE OF TIME

Paris, April 22 (Delayed)—In connection with the question of permitting the German delegates to the Peace Conference to discuss the treaty, it has been figured out that if the treaty were read to the Germans it would require at least one minute for each of the 1,000 articles the document contains, taking up two days of eight hours each. It is computed also that if each article were discussed and an hour allowed for every one the discussion would occupy four months of continued sessions of eight hours per day. These calculations are advanced as a conclusive argument against permitting the German delegates to discuss the document.

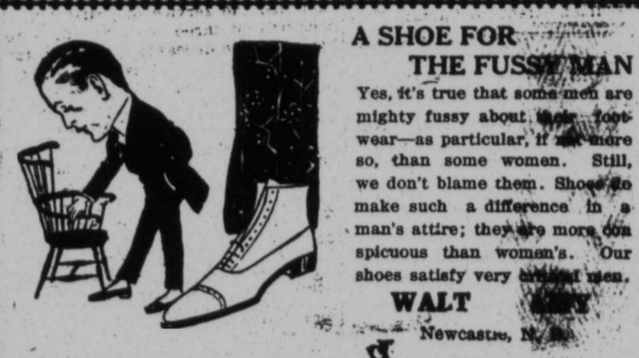

Premier Orlando's Reply to Wilson

Paris, April 24—(By the Associated Press)—Following is the text of Premier Orlando's statement:

"Yesterday, while the Italian delegation was discussing counter-propositions which had been received from the British Prime Minister, and which had for their aim the conciliation of contradictory tendencies which were manifested concerning Italian territorial aspirations, the Paris newspapers published a message from the President of the United States in which he expressed his own thought on one of the gravest problems which has been submitted to the Conference.

"The practice of addressing nations directly constitutes, surely, an innovation in international relations. I do not wish to complain, but I wish to record it as a precedent, so that at my own time I may follow, inasmuch as this new custom, doubtless constitutes the granting to nations of larger participations in international questions, and, personally, I have always been of the opinion that such participation was the harbinger of a new order of things.

"Nevertheless, if these appeals are to be considered as addressed to nations, outside of the governments, I which represent them (I might say even against the governments), I should feel deep regret in recalling that this process, heretofore applied to my governments, is today applied, for the first time, to a government which has been and intends to remain a loyal ally of the great American republic, namely, the Italian Government."

Premier Orlando says that he might complain that such a message, addressed to the Italian nation, had been published at the very moment when the Allied and Associated powers were negotiating with the Italian Government, the help of which has

been sought and appreciated in numerous serious questions, heretofore discussed, in intimate and complete solidarity.

"Above all," he continued, "I should have the right to complain if the declarations of the Presidential message have the purpose to oppose that which the Italian people have attained, and its democracies and liberal regime. To oppose the Italian people and Government would be to admit that this great free nation would submit to the yoke of a will other than its own, and I should be forced to protest strongly against suppositions, unjustly offensive to my country."

Referring to President Wilson's statement, Premier Orlando says it entirely purports to demonstrate that the Italian claims, beyond certain limits laid down in his message, violate the principles upon which must be founded the new regime of right, justice and liberty among peoples, and adds that he never denied these principles, and that even President Wilson would do him the justice to say that in the long conversations they had had together.

He (Orlando) had never relied upon the formal authority of a treaty, by which he knew President Wilson was not bound, but merely relied on reason and justice, upon which Italy's claims are based.

"I consider, as unjustified, the application that, in his statement, President Wilson makes of his principles toward the Italian claims."

Premier Orlando continues: "It is impossible for me, in a document of this nature, to repeat in detail the arguments which have been reproduced in Italy's behalf. I might simply say that no one will receive, without reserve, the affirmation that the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian empire should imply the reduction of



Italian aspirations."

Citing the President's argument that the concession granted brings Italy to its natural defences, the Alps, Signor Orlando says:

"This recognition of great importance provided the stern flank of this wall does not remain open, and that the right of Italy should be interpreted to include the line of Mont Nevoso, which separates the waters running toward the Black Sea and the Mediterranean. He recalls that the Latins from earliest dawn of Italy history designated this mountain the Italian limit."

"Without this protection," says the Premier, "a dangerous breach is left in this admirable barrier of the Alps, rupturing the unquestionable political, economic and historical unity of the Isthrian peninsula. I contend, furthermore, that he who is entitled to the honor of proclaiming to the world the right of free determination of peoples should recognize this right for Fiume, an ancient Italian city which proclaimed its Italian nature before the Italian ships arrived—an admirable example of national conscience perpetuated throughout centuries.

"To deny this right, only because of the small number concerned, would mean the admission that the criterion of justice towards peoples varies according to that territorial extent. He concludes his statement as follows:

"The presidential message ends with a warm declaration of America's friendship for Italy. I reply in the name of the Italian people, and proudly claim the right and honor to do this, as one, in the most tragic hour of this war, proclaimed the cry of resistance at all costs. This cry was heard and replied to with courage and abnegation, of which there are few more striking examples in the world's history.

"Italy's, thanks to the most heroic sacrifices and purest blood of her children, was able to ascend from the abyss of misfortunes to the radiant crest of her most glorious victory.

"In the name, therefore, of Italy, I express with all my power the sentiment of admiration and profound sympathy which the Italian people profess toward the American people."

Blockade If Germany Refuses To Sign

Paris, May 6—(By the A. P.)—The following official communication was issued this evening:

"The supreme Economic Council held its sixteenth meeting May 5th at 10 a. m. under the chairmanship of Lord Robert Cecil at the Ministry of Commerce.

"Proposed blockade measures to be adopted in the event of Germany's refusal to sign the peace treaty.

"The Council considered plans which had been formulated to bring about the complete economic isolation of Germany in the event that the German delegates should refuse to sign the preliminaries of peace. The blockade section was directed to draw up and submit for the approval of the Council of Foreign Ministers a plan of blockade measures to be immediately put into effect should the associated governments desire to have recourse to economic coercion.

"Removal of financial restrictions of trade with Germany.

"Upon recommendation of the final section, the Council decided to make the following relaxations of financial restrictions of trade with Germany pending the signing of the peace treaty:

"First—The financial list to be suspended (if this has not been done already), and announcement to be made that neutrals entirely free to extend credits of any kind to Germany or to its nationals.

"Second—That the German-owned cash, balances and bills already in neutral countries are freely available in payment for imports.

"Third—That the proceeds of exports from Germany may be freely available in payment for all kinds of permitted imports.

"Fourth—That the finance section shall have discretion to grant licenses for the export of gold and securities from Germany in payment for imports, on application from the German authorities.

"Fifth—That the above be communicated to the Financial Commission at Villette and to the committee of neutral financiers, and that their suggestions be invited as to what further relaxations are desired by them.

"Control of traffic on the Danube." The council considered again the question of the control of navigation on the Danube and it was decided that this control should be placed entirely under one authority. A sub-committee was appointed to arrange the details with a view to expediting the re-opening of commercial and relief traffic on the Danube.

Kaiser Cant Escape Trial

London, April 29—The Evening Standard claims that it has the highest authority for asserting that William Hohenzollern will be prosecuted and tried as originator of the war, but as one of the instigators of crimes as provided in the report of the Commission on War responsibility.

Sir Edward Kemp Returning Home

SIR E. KEMP IS RETURNING Ottawa, April 29—The Journal today says: "Sir Edward Kemp, who according to cable despatches, has left England for Canada and will be in Ottawa within ten days, will not, it is understood, return overseas. The reason advanced for this is that his work in London, where he has been Overseas Minister of Militia, is completed.

There are rumors that Sir Edward's return will shortly be followed by his retirement from the ministry, but this lacks confirmation.

There is reason for believing, however, that when Sir Robert Borden returns from Paris there will be a general reorganization of the cabinet and that Sir Edward, who has had four years of strenuous work, may be one of those affected by the changes.

German Prisoners To Be Liberated

Paris, April 28.—The Council of five at its meeting Saturday, La Liberté says, agreed that the German war prisoners shall be liberated after the signing of the peace treaty. The prisoners will be released gradually, as Germany contributes to the work of reconstruction exacted by the treaty and in proportion to this contribution.

The newspaper says that details concerning the future status of the Kiel Canal have not yet been settled, but that an agreement has been reached on the principle of internationalization.

ANTHRACNOSE

A disease called Anthracnose is responsible for serious damage to bean crops, more especially in the Eastern provinces. The stems, leaves

and pods, are subject to attack causing reduced yields and inferior quality of seed. A badly infected crop will show bare stocks or small, stunted plants. Beans grown on low, wet land are very subject to injury. So destructive has this disease become that the Experimental Farm officials have prepared a pamphlet describing the disease and explaining the means to combat it. It is designated Pamphlet No. 25 of the Experimental Farm and available from the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. This pamphlet states that disease free seed can be most easily obtained by gathering sound pods from a standing crop of fairly healthy seed. These pods should be immersed in a solution of mormalin one pint to 30 gallons of water or solutions of proper sulphate or corrosive sublimate in the proportions of 1 pound to 80 gallons of water of the former or 1 ounce to 8 gallons of the latter. Other control methods are clearly described in this pamphlet.

Detailed Draft Of Peace Terms

(Canadian Press)
Ottawa, April 25.—It was learned tonight that the Dominion Government expects to receive the detailed draft of the peace terms. If the draft is received here, as anticipated it will be released for publication at Ottawa the same time as at Washington. Just when that will be it is of course impossible to say at present.

THE LATEST DEATH TEST

A remarkable new method of testing absolutely whether a dead person is really dead and thus avoiding the possibility of premature burial, just announced by Dr. Icard of Marseilles, has been received with great interest by his colleagues in Paris.

Dr. Icard's system depends on the question whether the blood is still in circulation or not, and consists of a small subcutaneous injection of a small quantity of fluorescein, which is quite harmless, but one of the most violent coloring matters known.

If there be the slightest motion of the blood the fluorescein, carried around the body, stains it a vivid golden yellow, while the eyes become a deep emerald green. If on the other hand there is no movement of the blood, the coloring matter is not dispersed and produces no effect. Half an hour is stated to be enough to make this test.

The laity, while duly impressed by this neat method, are asking whether persons who are alive and undergo the diylal process and who later recover will lose the golden yellow tint and the green eyes, which as Dr. Icard describes them, are transferred into superb emeralds, set like jewels in their sockets.

It may be added, however, that fluorescein is one of the most transitory dyes known.

APPLE BUD-MOTHS AND THEIR CONTROL IN NOVA SCOTIA

The apple is attacked by a number of different insects. In Nova Scotia the caterpillars of the Bud-moths are probably the cause of more loss than all the other insects combined. The Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has just issued Bulletin No. 16 entitled "The Apple Bud-moths and their Control in Nova Scotia," by G. E. Sanders and A. G. Duxton. This bulletin of 24 pages gives an account of the life-histories of the four destructive bud-moths which occur in the province. The chapter on the control of these insects discusses results obtained from spraying experiments, following which definite control measures are recommended. Useful information is also included on parasitic insects and other natural enemies. Fourteen illustrations appear in the bulletin. These show injured blossoms and fruit, various stages of the insect, etc. This publication will be much value to apple growers in eastern Canada. It can be obtained free of charge on application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. A technical edition of the bulletin giving scientific descriptions, etc., has also been published. This will be of special interest to economic workers. Enquiries regarding insects in general should be addressed to "The Dominion Entomologist, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ont."

THE LAUGHING PLANT.

There is a curious plant that grows in Arabia and is known as the "laughing plant."

This name comes from the fact that anyone who eats its seeds cannot control his laughter. The natives of the district where the plant grows dry the seeds, and reduce them to powder. A small dose of this powder makes those who eat it act in a very strange manner. The soberest person will dance, shout and laugh like a madman, and rush about, cutting the most ridiculous capers for an hour.

At the end of this time the reaction comes. The dancer is exhausted, and a deep sleep comes upon him. After a nap of several hours he awakens, with no recollection of the antics he has performed.

NOW FISH IN INLAND WATERS

German Submarines Have Driven Hardy Dutch Sailors From Their Occupation in the North Sea.

In this day of the lurking submarine the waters of the North sea are a marked danger zone for the fisherman of the Netherlands, and consequently the rivers and inner seas of Holland are thronged with brown-sailed fishing smacks, all eagerly pursuing the elusive herring, salmon, pike and carp. Until the boat's tanks or barrels are filled the determined fisherman sticks at his job. If a good haul is soon made he may steer the craft up some canal to an inland town to market his catch. He gets out the sign, "Fish for Sale," and fastens it to the mast, draws the boat up to the canal's edge, and is soon besieged by housewives anxious to inspect his wares. The fish, as if conscious of their pending fate, swim uneasily about in the tank, while thrifty Dutch matrons follow certain ones excitedly with a forefinger, and the seller endeavors to locate the desired fish in the swarming tub.

On a summer evening when a fleet of the good ships has made port after a hard day's work, a fishing village is one of the most picturesque sights in Holland. Sails patched or torn and flapping rise and fall in the harbor with the motion of the waves. The prawning Dutch fisherman, revved up by supper and the evening pipe, is cutting fish and exchanging stories with neighbors on the dock, while his wife sits before her cottage mending nets, or perhaps adorning a town hall with a red patch.

There is little rest for these hard-working fishermen and their wives. Fish have long been to Holland what rice is to China or the potato to America. With its food supply ebbing dangerously low, Holland looks more than ever to her fisher folk to feed the people.

NEWSBOYS ON BATTLE FRONT

Belgian and French Youngsters Take Great Risks While Distributing Papers to the Soldiers.

During the first days of the war British soldiers going up to Mons from Boulogne were hailed by an ancient French dame with her only British phrase, "Da-ely Ma-t-l." She did her best. Since those far-off days "Da-ely Ma-t-l" has been called by the little Belgian and French boys and girls all along the line from Dunkirk to Belgium. Many a risk has been run to buy and sell the news of yesterday. One great load of copies of the London Daily Mail arrived at a distributing center by train just as the advancing wave of Germans threatened to pour over the line.

Promptly on the occasion the parcels were seized by the soldiers and thrown into the gap. Surely no newspaper parcels ever had a stranger fate than to be used, fresh from the press and unread, as sandbags for trenches and a shelter against a whirling scurry of machine-gun bullets. Back in Paris an anxious publisher and thoughtful cashier wondered in what category of "unsold copies" the wagon load should be put.

Three times the Daily Mail has heard through advanced line distributing agents of paper sellers shot by snipers' bullets while making their way along the trenches.

Two Brave Seamen Commended.

Two men of the United States navy have recently been commended for risking their lives to save shipmates. Turner S. Lux, boatswain's mate, national naval volunteers, saved a painter who fell overboard from the United States Steamer Houston. A life belt had been thrown to the man, but he failed to grasp it and was going down for the second time when Lux came to his rescue. Lux gave as his nearest kin G. H. Lux, 1827 Valencia street, Birmingham, Ala. A similar service was performed by Chief Boatswain John M. Penix, whose mother, Mrs. Mary Stout, lives in Kingston, Ala.

First Drink Merely a Sample.

It was a hot day, and two sailors had just been released from a long spell of duty on a mine-sweeper. They made a bee-line for the first public-house they saw, and one of them ordered two quarts of ale. The men emptied their mugs in one draught while the barmaid looked on in undisguised admiration.

The man who had paid stood for a second or two wiping his lips meditatively, and then turned to his comrade with a grin.

"Tain't so bad, Bill, is it?" he remarked. "Shall we 'ave some?"—London Tit-Bits.

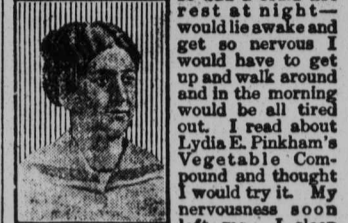
