## LORD BEAVERBROOK BADLY MANAGED

Woodsteck, N. B. Oct. 6—At five o'clock this morning the trap was sprung that sent Benny Swim into teterfity for the murder of Olive Swim at Benton last March. Besides the four doctors and law officers very few were present. The hangman bungled the job and it was nineteen minutes before condemned man was pronounced dead. Carrying out the provisions of the law an inquest was held and the body given over to relatives and at once taken to his father's home in Rockland where the funeral will be held tomorrow. The condemned man slept at intervals during the night and while in a very weak state was able to ascend the gallows with little assistance. He prayed continuously and was praying when the trap was sprung. In conversation with Rev. H. V. Bragdon he admitted that he feigned insanity at the suggestion of two prisoners who were in the jail at the time and who also advised

Since his arrest the condemned man has not made any statement concerning the crime for which he was convicted. To Rev. H. V. Bragdon he has made the following confession over his own signature. When I arrived at the house at Benton Ridge Trenholm came to the door and began to abuse me and jumped on me, in the scuffle the revolver fell from my raincoat pocket and Trenholm picked it up. I took it from him. Trenholm then went into the house and returned with a piece of paper with an address to be shipped to him at Benton Ridge He then asked for the revolver and said he would fix me. I said no." He stepped up to me' and caught me by the shirt collar and started to rack me in the woodshed and I shot her in the back first. Doyle, who is the official executioner of the province of Quebec, was secured on the recommendation of Sheriff Lemieux of Montreal. That no hitch would occur another man was also engaged and brought here.

Doyle gave the gallows a thorough test on Tuesday and pronounced everything working satisfactorily. When the trap was sprung all was in order. In four minutes Doyle cut Swim down and he was pronounced to the public. Signs of life and Swim, totally unconscious, was taken up and the executation completed. He was taken down in nineteen minutes, when of course life had vanished. The whole trouble can be attributed to Doyle who cut the man down too scon. It was here that the wisdom of bringing the second man was manifest as he did the work in the way it should have been done that poor Bennie Swim was absolutely unconscious during the whole proceedings.





## U.S. RAILROADS **UNABLE TO HANDLE GRAIN EXPORTS**

New York, Oct 4-The Wall, Street Journal publishes a special despatch from Buffalo reporting that diversion of export grain through Canada is being forced by inability of railroads to handle this year's crop by the normal route through the Great Lakes to Buffalo and then to seaboard by barge or rail. About seven hundred cars a day are normally used in this movement at this season. In the week beginning September 25, the railroads were able to place only 150 to 200 cars at the elevators each day with the result that elevators here are about filled. The lake fleet is being delayed in unloading but elevators have been able to handle between 1,000,000 and 1,500,000 bushels a day.


