



HOW TO GET MARRIED.

It is well known that at the southern extremity of Patagonia the guanacos have a dying place - a spot to which all the individuals inhabiting the surrounding plains repair at the approach of death to deposit their bones. Darwin and Fitzrov first recorded this

strange instinct in their personal narratives, and their observations have since been fully conformed by others. The best known of the dying or burial places is on the banks of the Santa Cruz and Gallegos rivers, where the river valleys are covered with dense primeval thickets of bushes and trees of stunted growth. There the ground is covered with bones of countless dead generations.
