Industrial Training.

There is a growing dissatisfaction with present school methods and school subjects. Good, bad or indifferent as the school may be in the present lines, efficient or inefficient as the school teacher may be, there is a growing feeling that present-day education does not fill the bill in making for good and serviceable citizens.

The object of the League is to urge upon the Government to supplement our present system of elementary education by providing by legislation a complete system of industrial, professional and commercial training.

The Guildhall Conference declared that it viewed with grave concern the large number of children annually leaving school without practical training for definite vocations, and resolves that a national system of industrial, professional, and commercial training should be established, to which the children shall pass as a matter of course (unless the parents are prepared to undertake their future training) and without interval, for a definite period, to be thoroughly trained for entry to the particular calling for which they are best fitted, such training to be under fully qualified instructors.

The proposed National Industrial Education League will be composed of 2,500 organized bodies of work-people engaged in trade union, cooperative and educational work, and as far as can be at present ascertained, they represent over three million of workers, comprising 365 trades and professions in 421 cities and towns.

Many of the largest employers of labour connected with the shipping, shipbuilding, engineering and other national industries have signified their

cordial approval, which has also been accorded by fourteen Chambers of Commerce, including those of London, Edinburgh, Manchester, and Newcastle-on-Tyne.

Bible Class Meeting.

There was an unusually large attendance at the Cathedral Men's Bible Class yesterday. Rev. J. Bell introduced Hon. John Harvey and referred to the good work he had done in connection with the A. P. C. Hon. Mr. Harvey then rose and after paying a complimentary reference to the singing, went on to speak of the Health of the Colony and the ravages that were being caused by consumption.

The disease was the cause of half the deaths in the Colony and about three persons died of it every day. Since 1901 about 8,000 persons died of it. He strongly condemned the habit of spitting and recommended more attention to cleanliness and pure air and clean surroundings in the schools and homes.

Mr. Bell in thanking Mr. Harvey quoted from the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Birmingham to show that it was the duty of the clergymen to see that the families in their parishes live in healthy surroundings, and that they were filling a part of their mission when they made enquiries to the causes of disease with a view to preventing them.

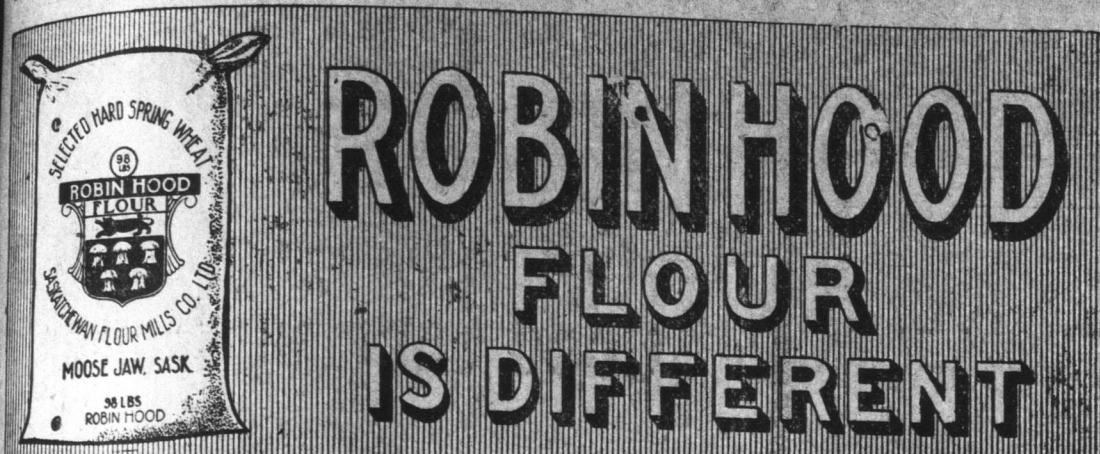

Man of Mystery.

**Eccentric Squire's Double Life---Pioneer
 and Inventor--- He Revelled in Dust
 and Dined at Two O'clock in the
 Morning.**

Mr. George Edward Dering, F.R.S., who died recently at his magnificent mansion, "Lockley," in the Herts village of Welwyn, was a wealthy and amazing old gentleman.
 At the time of his death he was in his eightieth year, a venerable figure with a long white beard, and to all the countryside he was known as a lonely bachelor of very eccentric ways. Since May 1907 he had lived regularly at Lockley, but before that he came there only for a few days in each year.
 Nobody suspected the real explanation of his mysterious absence. To the astonishment of all the visitors it has now been discovered that Mr. Dering was married, and formerly lived with his wife in another large house at Brighton. There he passed always under the name of Dr. Dale. His wife died in 1894.
 It is a historic name, for Mr. Dering was able to trace his descent in unbroken line to Saxon times. The family had long been in possession of Lockley. There Mr. Dering was born. There his father died in 1859, and there also his mother passed away a few years later.
 Left to himself Mr. Dering began

to develop eccentric ways. For one thing, he took a great fancy to tight-rope walking, and one of his closest friends was the famous Blondin. Through the estate—which is over a thousand acres in extent and thickly wooded—flows a narrow stream, called the Mimram. It passes within a few yards of the mansion. The tight rope used by Mr. Dering and Blondin was fixed over this stream, and was about 100 yards in length.
 "I often saw Blondin wheeling Mr. Dering in a barrow on this tight rope, and also carrying him on his back," said my informant. "Mr. Dering—dressed, of course in tight—was also very proficient on the rope."
 To-day I saw the long balancing poles—now resting under the eaves of an outhouse at the back of the mansion—which the couple actually used.
Pioneer and Inventor.
 But, as the distinction of F. R. S. fully testifies, tight-rope walking was only a small part of Mr. Dering's life. He was, in fact, an inventor of great attainments. Probably his genius for discovery explained his eccentricity. Mr. Dering was one of the pioneers of telegraphy. It is recorded that in the early days he conducted extensive experiments between Welwyn and Hatfield, which are five miles apart, and he is credited with some important discoveries in connection with insulators.
 Railways also occupied his attention, and here again he did notable work. Behind his mansion he erected a large foundry, where he employed some thirty men. He was specially interested in steel rails, and is said to have been the discoverer of an appliance which is in use to-day.
 But there came a time when he might justly be considered more as a theorist than a practical man of science. He discharged the thirty men, and they walked out of the foundry leaving their implements on the benches as though they were soon to return. To-day the place is almost as it was when they left it; the tools are still on the benches, but, in common with the rest of the establishment, the building shows signs of dilapidation.
 About thirty years have passed since Mr. Dering first forsook Lockley. Nobody knew where he had made his new home; nobody cared to inquire. But he still maintained in the mansion the same staff of servants as before. There was a butler, a footman, a coachman—with Mid-Victorian carriages, but no horses to look after—a parlourmaid, a housemaid, a laundrymaid and a hall-boy.
 Except for a few days before Christmas they never saw their master. But, regularly as the Yuletide season drew near, he re-appeared at Lockley. He did not come for the purpose of enjoyment. He came merely to pay the wages of his staff and settle the annual accounts. Busy all the time, he would stay until Christmas morning; then away he would go, nobody knew whither.
 Frequently letters came for him, but there was nobody to open them. The servants could not forward them because they did not know their master's address. So the correspondence would gradually accumulate until by the time the old gentleman came again stacks of letters would be awaiting him.
 Naturally the fine old mansion deteriorated by his constant neglect of it. The small staff employed could not keep such a vast estate in good repair, and it is by no means certain that Mr. Dering would have appreciated their efforts, even if it had been possible.
His Return to Lockley.
 When in 1907 he took up his residence again at Lockley, he certainly did not encourage the activities of his servants. He lived almost entirely in one room—his bedroom—and he would never allow it to be cleaned. Dust settled on everything, but he seemed only to revel in it.
 By his orders at least one room in the house had not been interfered with for very many years. That was the apartment in which his mother died. It was his desire that it should be left in exactly the same state as when she passed away, and consequently the door was kept locked.
 Not the least remarkable of Mr. Dering's whims was his fancy for late dinners. His favorite time was two o'clock in the morning, when, of course, the household staff wanted to

be in bed. But even though he had his dinner in the early morning, he always insisted on having his breakfast punctually at seven o'clock.

With such a short rest one can quite understand that he did not like to have it broken. Consequently he would never allow any animals in his room. His most elaborate plan, however, to avoid noise was to divert the main road which ran close to his home by constructing a new one a little further away at a cost of £20,000.
 How well he kept the secret of his marriage may be gathered from the fact that even a housemaid who had been in the service of the family for sixty years was unaware of it. Mr. Dering passed away rather suddenly without making any statement. It was only when his private documents came to be examined that the story of his double life was revealed.—London Chronicle.

A Barnes man, but lately married went out to post a letter, and as the lamps had not been lit in the suburban road in which he dwelt, he could only dimly see his way. A short distance up the road he met, as he thought, his wife, who had been out to tea; and as he went past he just whispered:—"All right, my dear; I shall be with you in a minute."
 Immediately after he had said these words he saw the lady turn a startled look upon him, and then hurry away; and the horrible idea occurred to him, that it was not his wife after all, and that in the darkness he had made a mistake. He decided to say nothing about the matter, and quickly disappeared.
 When he returned home he found his wife waiting for him, and she at once greeted him with the words:—"Oh, George, I have had such a frightful experience! I was just coming down the road when a man tried to stop me, and said, 'All right, dear; I shall be with you in a minute.' I ran home, found you were out, and I've been so much alarmed."
 George was just about to explain, when an idea came to him.
 "What sort of a man was it?" he asked.

Lecture by Dr. Whalen

The Passion Play at Ober-Ammergau was the subject of a lecture delivered at Bay Roberts on Wednesday night by the Rev. Dr. Whalen, Parish Priest of the District.
 The lecturer, who was greeted with a capacity house, spoke from an intimate and comprehensive knowledge of the subject gained at the very scene of Ober-Ammergau itself, which he had visited in September with thousands of other people from all parts of the world. The lecture was divided into four parts, the intervening spaces being appropriately filled with sacred solos, choruses and duets by the pupils of the Superior School, trained for the purpose by the lady Principal, Miss Kitty Flynn. The musical programme was ambitious to a degree, containing such choruses as the "Marvellous Works" and the "Hallelujah Chorus," the rendition of which by the children (assisted in the bass and tenor by some ladies and gentlemen of Bay Roberts), was a most delightful surprise. The accompanist was Miss Madeline Cody, of the Hr. Grace Cathedral choir.
 The lecturer by way of introduction to the main part of his subject gave an interesting account of his trip from London to Munich, and thence by a train journey of four hours to Ober-Ammergau. The village nestles at the foot of a mountain and contains about 400 families, whose pretty cottages are clustered around the theatre—that central point of interest so inseparably associated with the name and fame of Ober-Ammergau. The villagers are virtuous, simple folk, engaged for the most part in farming and wood-carving. The only ambition of their lives is to continue in their generation, every 10 years, the vivid and faithful portrayal of the tragic drama of the Saviour's Passion and Death.
 The Passion Play was first acted in 1634 in fulfillment of a vow made by the villagers, and continued every 10 years down to 1830, when it was reconstructed and improved by the then Parish Priest, Alois Dalsenberger, so as to connect by tableau and choral aid the types, figures and prophecies of the Old Testament, incident by incident, with the Passion of our Lord. During the season of the Passion Play every house in Ober-Ammergau is converted into a miniature hotel for the accommodation of the stream of humanity coming in from all parts of the world. Last year the number were 300,000, two-thirds of which were Americans.
 In dealing with the actual scenes of the Passion Play, as stage after stage they passed before his eyes in all their tragical reality, the lecturer depicted the impossibility of words to do justice to the subject.
 "Language fails to convey more than a mere shadowy outline, either of the grim reality of the drama or of the intense emotion with which it gripped the hearts of the 4,000 spectators who witnessed it."
 The lecturer then gave a vivid description of the Play, and carried his audience along with him, silent and deeply attentive through every phase of the wonderful drama. For the time being they were indeed translated, in so far as it is possible to do it by clever word painting, to Ober-Ammergau itself, and were kept there during the eight hours that elapsed from the rise of the curtain for the hosannas of Palm Sunday to the closing tableau of our Lord's glorious ascension into Heaven, and the thrilling and triumphant strains of the hallelujah chorus.
 The four particular points emphasized by the lecturer as making, in his estimation, the deepest and most intense impression of the audience at Ober-Ammergau were: The parting of Christ from his Mother; their next meeting on the road to Calvary; the despair, soliloquy and tragic death of Judas; the crucifixion.
 In these, as in fact all the scenes, the acting of the simple peasant performers was so perfect as to make the audience forget the dramatic illusion and to consider themselves really and truly in the presence of the harrowing scenes of the grim and dreadful tragedy of 2,000 years ago.
 To say that the lecture was a complete success is to give a tame criticism of a rare literary treat. Those who wish to enjoy it once more will do well to attend its repetition at North River on Monday night.

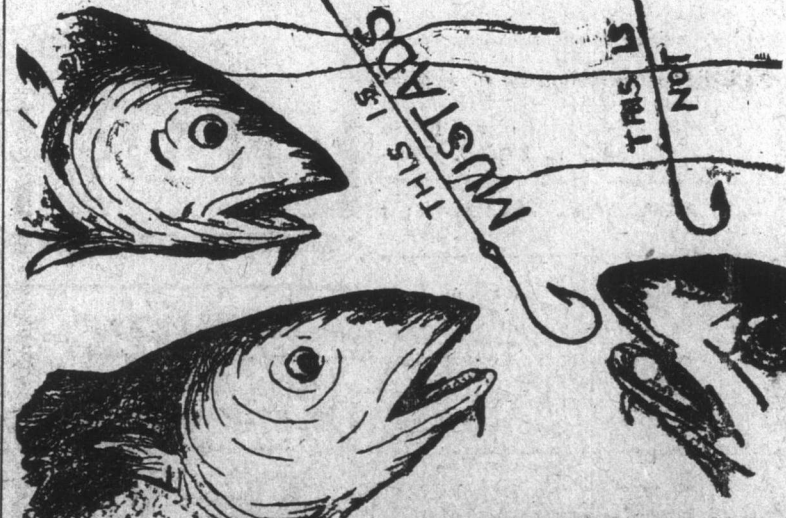
