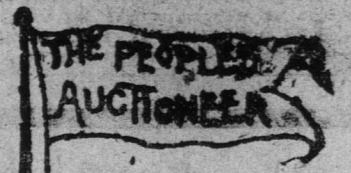



Remarkable Escape from Starvation. off Cape Horn

Extract of letter from DAVID JAMES (Master) of the late barque "Cochrane," of Glasgow.

"Having lost our ship on Staten Island, on the 5th of July, and having saved neither effects nor provisions, we were then compelled to travel down the island for ten days, subsisting on nothing but shell-fish and seaweed. On the 19th of July we came across another shipwrecked party of seventeen, the surviving part of the crew of the British ship "Dunbarton," of Glasgow, fourteen having perished through exposure. Now, the ship was lost on the 22nd of June, and a lot of the cargo, consisting of EPPS'S COCOA, was washed ashore out of the wreck. There was nothing saved except the cocoa, and we, numbering twenty-five men, were left alive until up to the 29th of August, when we were rescued by the steamer "Mercurio" of Buenos Aires.

When we consider how amid adverse circumstances they managed so well we cannot help admiring the spirit of the little band. It must be discouraging to them sometimes that others will not join them and so help to bear their share of the needful work. Still we believe, however, that others will co-operate with them soon and so put the Church in such a flourishing condition as it should be. These intentions now are to procure a bell for their Church and we hope success will go with them. A bell is badly needed as many people cannot see the flag. Go ahead, ladies, your work is of the right kind and therefore long success must follow.

Although Long Pond is near St. John's we think that it has been grossly neglected; far more than any other outpost in this country. With a few hundred dollars an entrance could be made through the bar so that people could come into the Pond with their boats, hence save an enormous amount of labour for the working man. They mainly depend on the sea for their manure to work their land and many other things. The hardship they have endured in doing this is appalling; many times they have been in great danger of being washed off the beach, or their boats being dashed to pieces with the force of the waves while landing on the outside of the bar. Sir E. P. Morris in the last elections promised to attend to this important matter as soon as the dredge was back. The people would be grateful to him even now at the eleventh hour if he would kindly keep his promise.

the part in which he lives is no more fashionable than our own neighborhood.



Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram.
RICHMOND, Va., March 31.
Floyd Allen and son, the only two of the Hillville gunmen to pay the death penalty for the Carroll Court Room murders were electrocuted yesterday, within ten minutes of each other.

BELGRADE, March 31.
The demobilization of the Serbian Army began to-day. Third class reservists are being rapidly discharged from active service. Other classes will follow shortly.

LONDON, March 31.
The Duke and Duchess of Connaught, and Princess Patricia, reached Euston station shortly before 3 o'clock yesterday. They were welcomed by King George and Queen Mary who motored from Windsor.

NEW YORK, March 31.
Coincident with Logan's death, it became known that he had sustained a serious attack before his departure

for Europe, but had so rallied that it was not considered a forerunner of a fatal illness.

HALIFAX, March 31.
From Saturday morning until this afternoon 5,000 passengers landed here from Europe. At present there are 6,000 on steamers bound here who will land during the next few days.

ROME, March 31.
J. Pierpont Morgan, the New York financier, died this morning. At 11:30 his condition became worse. He had not been able to assimilate nourishment administered earlier in the morning. His pulse became more rapid and the temperature rose. These symptoms his attendants said indicated some affection which had not been detected by his physicians, or had been kept secret.

LONDON, March 31.
A despatch to the Daily Chronicle describing the fight at Bi Yuk says, the Bulgarians hurled 20,000 men against the Turkish advance position during the darkness and carried it with a bayonet charge, the Turks re-

tiring on the main position. At daylight the Turks bombarded and recaptured the position, preventing the Bulgarians from entrenching. Subsequently the Turks delivered a counter attack, 6,000 infantry storming the position with bayonets. After toiling up the muddy slopes the Turks flung themselves on the Bulgarians and a desperate bayonet battle followed. The Bulgarians were driven from their position down the slope on the opposite side. A Bulgarian attack on the west wing near Tchaltaja was also repulsed.

LONDON, March 31.
The suffragettes created a scene today at the proceedings of the Parliamentary Committee enquiring into the Wireless Contracts, when Lloyd George took the stand to undergo further examination. The Chancellor used the word "principle" when a male suitor immediately rose and shouted, "I object to that man using the word 'principle.' He is a traitor. He has betrayed women." He was promptly ejected, when another interposed. Lloyd George had remarked that he was not a speculator, and had never bought to sell again, when the interrupter cried out, "You sold women alright." Evidently there were many sympathizers in the audience, for shouts of "Hear, Hear" were heard. The interrupters were promptly thrown out.

Answer to 'What Next'

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—As Executive members of the St. John's Agricultural Society, we take exception to a statement made by "What Next" in your paper of the 25th inst., in which he says this Society's business, in its present co-operation sale of hay, etc., helping our members over great difficulty this winter, caused by the great demand for hay and the scarcity of same, is financed by the Government. He says, "Sir E. H. Morris collects our taxes, hands back our money to the Agricultural Society and then sends out travellers or drummers to sell this stuff in competition with regular dealers who provided the funds to pay for the stock." We wish to say that this is incorrect, and it is as malicious as it is false. Neither the Government nor Sir E. P. Morris, or anyone else outside of our own individual members and applicants have contributed one cent towards this co-operation sale of hay, etc., or even gone security for it, or sent out any agent in connection with it. It has been financed entirely by our members' co-operation deposits of cash in advance at the Bank of Montreal, to the credit of a special sales account, self-supporting, and it has nothing whatever to do with the regular savings account and Government Grant of the St. John's Agricultural Society, which grant is spent entirely in purchasing improved machinery, promoting live stock, small quantities of improved seeds, fertilizers and literature, and in distributing same, free to members; in holding Executive committee, and public quarterly meetings, at stated periods on Saturdays and evenings, at which addresses are given and much valuable information imparted and work done to benefit the whole community. The sale business is a co-operation entirely separate and distinct from this in its finances, aims and objects, but under the same Executive that is quite capable of managing its own business, and we are happy to say it is a great success, full of possibilities for the benefit of the people, and we are determined to continue it. Morris Finance

A Delusion and a Snare.
Those who have followed the frenzied finance of the Government in connection with railway construction will not be surprised at the frenzied finance of the last Budget of the Morris Administration.

In regard to the former it will be remembered that Sir Edward Morris in introducing the Railway Resolutions in the House of Assembly in 1910 gave the country to understand that when the branch railways then projected were completed the total annual charge which they would entail would be \$140,000, or in other words that his Railway Loan of 1910 would pay for the completion of the five branches, viz. those to Bonavista, to Grate's Cove, to Trepassey, to Fortune Bay and to Donne Bay.

Everybody knows now that the original financing of the railway branches was unsound, for the Premier had to go to London in 1912 and raise a second loan under far more onerous conditions, and it is evident to all who examine the situation thoroughly that a third loan will be necessary to pay the contractors for the obligations entered into by the Morris Government under the Railway Extension Act of 1910.

Now let us turn to the present Budget proposals and in doing so bear in mind what we set forth yesterday from the Finance Minister's Budget Speech last year. The feature of the Budget proposal is the placing of tea, sugar and barrelled pork and beef on the Free List. This is, of course, in accordance with the Manifesto pledge of Sir Edward Morris, which has been deferred for four years. In reference to this same undertaking the Minister of Finance last year argued that it would put an end to progress

and lead to stagnation and declined to be responsible for the policy.

This year he has swallowed last year's resolutions and not only assumes responsibility but attempts to justify it financially. Nay more, he talks airily of remitting \$400,000 in taxes and estimates the surplus \$250,000 for 1914.

This means that Mr. Cashin estimates that the Surplus for June 30th, 1914 would amount to nearly \$600,000 had the duties remitted been kept on.

Now let us see what justification there is for this rosy view. According to his showing the surplus for 1909-10 was \$120,000; for 1910-11 \$173,000; for 1911-12 \$212,000.

As these duties are estimated to yield roughly \$400,000 a year, it will be seen that had the Government taken off the duties, according to promise, when they came in, there would have been a small surplus the first year, a large deficit the second year, another larger deficit the third year, and even according to the optimistic estimate for June 30th of this year a big deficit for this year. What justification is there then for his estimated surplus of \$250,000 for 1913-14 with the duties off? Why has the Minister of Finance assumed responsibility for a course which he declared last year would have the inevitable consequence of stopping the march of progress and lead to stagnation? Why has he consented to this reduction, at one step, after declaring last year that the reduction, whenever made, should be gradual, in order not to dislocate our economic and industrial machinery?

Why has he swallowed his own words and convictions? Of old, Mr. Cashin boasted of independence. Has Sir Edward Morris been too much for him? Or has the unpopularity of his party been too much for his resolute-ness of last year? Are the fishermen right in looking upon the reductions as Election Bait? Mr. Cashin should have remembered that they look upon the bait as stale, and they declare it will not catch their votes. They remember it is election year; the prospects of a surplus for 1914 are too deceptive. They well remember that the Government had to take indemnity for \$225,000 a few days ago, for expending that much more than Mr. Cashin in 1912 said they were going to spend. If the Morris Government over-expended so much last year what are they likely to over-expend before the election of next fall, and how will that leave the estimated surplus for 1914 which Mr. Cashin held up yesterday, which is clearly a delusion and a snare.

The Price of Fat.

Where was Sir Edward Morris, Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir:—The sealing crew of the Stephano who were looking for a raise of 25c. per cwt. on their fat would like to know where Sir Edward Morris was, and the Hon John C. Crosbie and the other honorables were yesterday morning? Does Sir Edward remember the Seals meeting in the British Hall five years ago—the spring of 1908—Didn't he tell the Seals present at that meeting how he went down to the merchants on Water St. and got them to raise the price of fat from \$4.25 to \$4.50; and that the advance on that occasion was but an instalment; he would not be satisfied until the price was put up to \$5.00 or \$5.50. What have you done since Sir Edward towards helping the men who go to the seal fishery? A few cents more per cwt for fat is a big thing to the man whose share of the voyage is

but one seal out of three. This little dividend, be it ever so small, will help to pay their share of interest on the mortgage to build branch railways which will never pay for the axle grease. There was a report current amongst the sealers yesterday morning that Captain Kean had said out to the icefields it was his intention to look for \$5.00 a cwt for his share of the fat. If this rumor be correct, then the men would certainly be justified in their effort to get more money also. The following extracts taken from Chase's Sealing Report Book will give the men interested some facts upon which to form their own opinions as to whether or not \$4.50 is a reasonable price for this year:—

If as the Daily News states this morning the men are sorry for having signed for \$4.50 a cwt, now is the time for the 'big chief to prove his pull with the merchants and get a rise in the price of fat. It is only a few days since he stated from his place in the House of Assembly that "Water St." was ready to run up their flag for the People's Party. Come then, Sir Edward here is a chance for you to "Make Good" or bed.

Frenzied Finance.

As the end draws near the gang who have been bleeding the Colony to the tune of thousands yearly are becoming frantic, and in the columns of the Herald, particularly, daily exhibit their frothings. "Morris is making good," "Let Morris finish his work," and others parrot cries are the watchwords with which it is hoped to fool the people again.

Making good indeed! Well are the public aware how Morris is making good in pouring six million dollars and more to come into the pockets of his friends, the Reids, and thousands into his own! "Let him finish his work" and the solvency of the Colony at the same time! Is that what McGraith is shouting for? Recent events point unmistakably to such as the only issue.

How can the revenue of the Colony stand the unexampled career of extravagance of the present Tory combination, of which Crosbie's \$2,200 spar and Morris's Bell Island 900 fees are examples? How can it stand the rapidly increasing permanent charges for interest on railway debt, so much larger than the Premier's deceitful estimate of the cost of the branch lines and reduction of taxation at the same time, and provide relief grants, not to mention 19th-century, old age pensions and increase in the civil list.

Let the thoughtful trader, shopkeeper, mechanic dwell on these facts and he will soon be convinced that only one course is possible, the ship of state has sails set and trimmed for the rocks of financial ruin. Even a co-sparing Administration would find it difficult to carry out this programme. How much more difficult will it be for such a notoriously extravagant and wasteful Government as that of Sir Edward Morris.

To show this extravagance in a few instances it may not be out of place to enumerate a few of the plums dropped in the mouths of the highly placed ones during the past few years. Recall to mind the large sums paid to Morris's Shouter-in-Chief (P. T. McGrath, the man who formerly could not find epithets strong enough and vulgar enough in the English language to vilify the man he now slanders with praise) directly and indirectly from the public funds, and the reader will easily understand why he keeps shouting for Morris. Within the past four years, outside of the immense amounts paid the "Chronicle," he received a big plum of \$2,500 for negotiating the royalty agreement with the Bell Island ore companies, an agreement which was obvious to the latter were only too eager to make to avoid greater taxation.

He gets \$300 annually for compiling the outport despatch, which is

positively indecent in its offensive partizanship; odd sums of \$200 and \$300 fill the public accounts, some of which it has been stated were given him for writing out speeches for some of the numbskulls placed at the heads of Departments, by Morris, and likely there are others smothered up in the public accounts. Besides he had his father, W. S. McGrath, pitched into the Customs on Bell Island, and his brother Tom, given a job worth \$1,500 in the Shipping Office.

As manager of the "Chronicle," of which he is said to be the principal shareholder, and in which Crosbie, Cashin and Watson are also large shareholders, he did so well out of Government printing that the shareholders boasted of getting 15 per cent. dividends and they were able at the end of 1912, after not four years of public patronage, to pay \$30,000 for the "Evening Herald." This is not bad for a small coterie to make in a few years over one venture. Still they have not the decency to keep quiet on the contrary, they pretend to be the only patriots, they are "making good," they want to "finish their work," and poor old Terra Nova at the same time.

With Crosbie's spar and his coasters' contracts; McGrath's Bell Island plums; Watson's and Cashin's fat official salaries; West India (and London) picnics; and the "Chronicle" dividends from Government printing is it any wonder that they should grow frantic as they see all their opportunities for grabs in the chest slipping away?

Making good! Oh, yes! Morison McGrath, Watson and Cashin have made good—for themselves. Good use of their positions in and near the Government to get rewards for their patriotism. But we have yet to learn if much good has come to the common people, who have had no big fee showered on them, no fat contracts; who have plied up no fortunes; who have taken no immense grabs of the public domain; have been given no picnics in fast Atlantic liners, all expenses paid, and a handsome sum of one or two or maybe four or five thousand dollars given to them on their return; no arbitration fees; no jobs created; no salaries raised. Their duty has been to sit by and earn money to pay the taxes for their rulers to waste and squander.

At the last moment, Morris comes with a reduction of taxation. Ever this was managed so clumsily as to work positive robbery to hundreds of small shopkeepers in the town and thousands scattered around the coast. Every one of these individuals, who can least afford it, have been robbed of sums varying from \$10 to \$100. When the great injustice being worked was pressed on the Government by some of their own strongest supporters, they take steps to relieve the larger holders of tea and sugar but the small trader with his broke package of tea or sugar has to pay to add a little popularity to Morris and his Government. If Morris wanted to gain popularity by a spectacular

restitution of duties, before it was sanctioned by the Legislature, or even before the Budget was brought in, why should these small shopkeepers be made to pay for it? But what cared Morris if he sacrificed a few of these people. Bennett fairly gloried in the fact that people could go down town next day and get sugar at 3 cents less per pound and tea at one-third the cost. He must have known the injustice this would work on all those who held stocks of tea, sugar, pork and beef, and if he didn't know he is not fit to occupy the position of representative of the capital of the Island. Doubtless the voters will remember these facts for Messrs. Morris and Bennett when they go canvassing in the Fall. They will also remember that if Morris had given the country an honest, clean and economical Government, taxes on these articles would or should have been remitted three years ago. He does it now because he cannot help it, because it has been wrung from him and he has been shamed into it by the repeated demands of the Opposition in the House, in the press, and throughout the country, and in the hope that this deathbed repentance will divert people's minds from the most scandalous and corrupt Government any country was ever cursed with, hardly excepting the corrupt Turkish regime now being demolished by the guns of the Balkan Allies.

Port au Port Railway

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I don't know nothing about politics, speeches or House of Assembly business, but I can read, and I suppose what we find in the newspapers is true, and I see in one of them where Mr. Downey presented our railway petition in the House and made a speech about it, and I see in the same paper how the Premier made another speech and said a lot of nice things about the West Coast and praised the people a whole lot but spoiled the job when he said that our railway would no doubt be built when the others were finished. Now, that is not what we want at all. When Mr. Downey came here four years ago to look for votes he promised us we were going to have a railroad here, and that it was going to be built at the same time as the other railroads. He did not say just them words but he used a big long word and I asked a man who was in the hall what it meant and he said it meant "at the same time." Very well, then. Our men got up a petition for the railroad and the next year they got up another and sent it on to Mr. Downey and he sent back word that the Premier said in the House the next railway scheme would take in Port au Port. Now, then, my man says there was no talk about the railway to Fortune Bay or Bay de Verde then and now we hear how those two railways are to be made and ours got to wait. If that is so, then Mr. Downey will have to do a lot of explaining about this. Everybody here is talking about this, and if I can get time I will send you some more news before planting time.

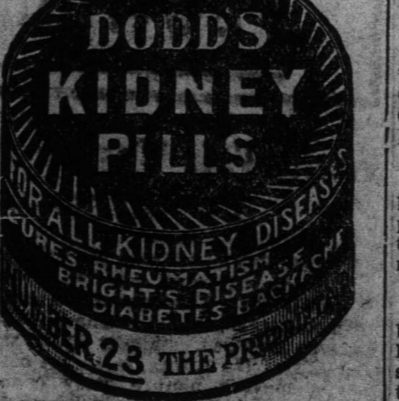

"Get Busy And Collect It."

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—I have read the letter on Municipal arrears which appeared in your paper on Friday, and consider the suggestion made by your correspondent, Mr. Fitzpatrick, that a list of those who owe large amounts should be published, well worthy of the consideration of the Council.

How the arrears rap up to such a big amount as \$92,000 passes the comprehension of the ordinary man in the community; but it is no use wasting more time gabbling about that. What is needed now is the adoption and putting into effect the best plan to collect the arrears. Most people have a decided objection to having publicity given to their bad paying propensities. They prefer hanging on to the gloss of upper tedium by having their dishonesty kept in the dark; but if the Council acted on Mr. Fitzpatrick's suggestion and decided to let the list of those who owe amounts and are able to pay them but won't, be published, I firmly believe that half the amount that is owed would come in in a very short time. But if the collections are permitted to go on, as Mr. Fitzpatrick says, in a slipshod manner, we will not only fail to collect from the "hard cases," but we will hold out temptations for honest taxpayers to join the grand army of stabbers.

Some people argue that the Councilors cannot be too hard in a small community like ours; but surely these people would not try to run their own business on sympathy. If the Council have reached the stage where they are afraid to offend, then the sooner they retire from public office the better, for men of that stamp should not look for such honours as election to a Municipal Board that is short of money. We make a lot of fuss over a matter of this kind for a

day or two and then let it drop again, but I hope that the same thing will not happen in the present case. We know there are business men who owe amounts running from one hundred to eight hundred dollars. Most of this is collectable, and now the citizens have their eyes levelled on the Council, keenly watching their movements. We do not want the honest man who is in arrears and unable to pay, driven to death, but we do want those who have money and property to pay that which they owe.

If all cannot be collected, then let arrangements be made for payments to be forthcoming at stated periods, and these arrangements should be carried out to the letter. We want new life in the Council, a general stirring up; there is too much of the come day go day about it now, and that will have to be changed. There is no excuse for the Council. They have all the machinery at their finger tips to carry out the collections, and if they do not intend to go to work in earnest in a business-like way, then they should resign and give others a chance to take the reins of Civic Government who won't be afraid to do their duty in a fearless and straightforward manner. Leniency cannot be expected to finance the Council; the city requires the money badly to place it in a healthy condition. The money is outstanding on the Council's books, and what is more reasonable than to demand that the Council get busy and collect it.

HOUSE of ASSEMBLY

BUDGET SPEECH DELIVERED.

The House met at 3 p.m. yesterday, with a very sparse attendance of the public, considering that the Budget Speech was to be heard.

Petitions were presented by Hon. S. D. Blendford, by Mr. Downey, Mr. Bennett (for the Speaker), Mr. Parsons, Hon. Mr. Emerson and others, for several matters required by their constituents in different parts.

Mr. Kent presented a petition from the residents of Torbay, for a road which is badly wanted at that place and which he strongly recommended to the notice of the Government. Mr. Earle presented one from the residents of Change Islands, asking for a light house and public wharf at Fox Head Cove. Mr. Earle pointed out the great need there was for these public necessities in this place, showed to what inconvenience the people were put without them, and hoped the Government would be able to see its way clear to grant the prayer of the petitioners.

Mr. Clapp presented a petition from the people of Bale Verte, praying that that place be made a port of call. He strongly urged on the Government the importance of the local fishing companies, praying for incorporation. A message from the Legislative Council intimated that the Railway and Marine Bills had been passed, the latter with a slight amendment. In answer to Mr. Clapp's question the Colonial Secretary informed him that the Fogota was paid \$400 for services rendered in December, 1911, when she released seven schooners frozen in Alexander Bay; \$1,500 was paid the Stella Maris this year to date on account of the northern winter service. The Premier, in reply to Mr. Kent, who asked if anything had been done to improve the telephone system of St. John's, and the establishment of the system throughout the island, said that the matter is being considered by the Government. The Government Engineer studied the numerous telephone systems in the United States, but no agreement had been made nor no correspondence or reports made that he could table. The correspondence between the Engineer and Government was of a confidential character.

Mr. Clift asked the Premier if it was the intention of the Government to take action this session on his petition for separate representation by one member for Grand Falls, Millertown, Badger and neighborhood, to be known as the "District of the Interior." The Premier said the matter had been considered, but up to the present nothing had been done. Mr. Cashin then delivered the Budget Speech, after which some matters on the Order Paper were deferred. Mr. Squire moved for the reading of the Medical Act, which provides for a five years course instead of four to qualify a medical practitioner.

The Bill giving the City Council power to tax shooting galleries, etc., was also read a second time, after which the House adjourned.

portance of their petition deserved. Mr. Roberts heartily supported the prayer of those several petitions, and hoped the Government would give them the attention they so well deserved. He, like Mr. Clift, was very pronounced in the danger of allowing indiscriminate cutting of timber over the three mile limit, and hoped the Government would put a prompt stop to it.

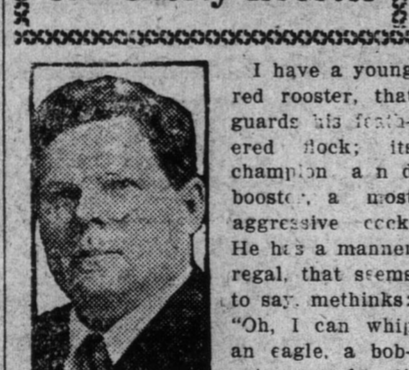
