To destroy or seize the enemy's property unless such destruction or seizure be imperatively demanded by the necessities of war To attack or bombard towns, vil-

lages, habitations or buildings which are not defended.

To pillage a town or place even when taken by assault.

To punish a spy, without trial even if taken in the act: and a spy who, after rejoining the army to which he belongs, is subsequently captured by the enemy must be treated as a prisoner of war and incurs no responsibility for his previous acts or espionage.

To compel the population of occupied territory to take part in military operations against its own coun-

To bring pressure upon the population of occupied territory to take the oath to the hostile power.

To confiscate private property. All of these specific prohibitions are based on the declaration that 'the right of beliigerents to adopt means of injuring the enemy is not unlmited." Special provisions are made to compel the humane treatment of prisoners. It is also provided that advance warning must be givin, wherever possible, to the peaceful inhabitants of a town before bombardment is begun. In seizure and bombardment it is also commanded that all necessary steps should be taken to spare as far as possible edifices devoted to religion, art, science and charity, hospitals and places where the sick and wounded are collected, provided they are not used at the same time for military purposes." It is further stipulated that "family honors and rights, individual lives and private property as well as religious convictions and liberty, must




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


