

Prussia Cannot Stand the Strain.

by Mr. Lloyd George, acting Premier, that Britain would not think of entering into any peace negotiations except in common with our Allies, according to the agreement made, and the publication of Japan's intention to abide by that agreement, give assurance the Entente Allies will not sheath the sword until the Liberty of the World is assured, and Prussia ture of civilization for generations to come. She cannot continue the struggle for another twelve months without sapping her strength to the point of exhaus-tion. Great Britain and her allies can stand the strain, Germany and her allies cannot. Therein lies our assurance of Victory and Freedom.
