President Wilson a Field Marshal.

By the vote of the Brazilian Champer of Deputies, President Wilson have een created a Field Marshal of the Brazilian army, sharing the distinct tion with King George, Albert of Belium, Marshal Foch and with Epitacio essoa, the Chief Magistrate of the Republic of Brazil.

Old World monarchs have in the ast been accustomed to bestow upon one another honorary rank in theirrespective armies, from colonelcies of regiments up to the baton of field marshal, and King George has even accorded that distinction in the British army to the French Marshal Foch

But no republic has ever bestowed any such military honor upon a foreign ruler, and assuredly no President of the United States has ever received the rank of field marshall from any foreign Power.

It is possible that some of the personal and political adversaries of Woodrow Wilson will raise the ques-Constitution and laws of the United States, any official of the Government can lawfully accept honors and distinctions from foreign governments. But since permission has been granted to officers of the United-

States army and navy to accept medals and orders of knighthood from Great Britain, from King Albert of Belgium and from King Victor Emmanuel of Italy there seems to be no reason why President Wilson, who by" virtue of his office is Commander-in-Chief of the army and navy of the United States, should not accept the baton of a field marshal from Brazil, was one of the allies in the great which the United States also

SUGAR REGULATIONS RESPONSI-

During the past few days a cit concern which manufactures cand and other articles in which sugar i largely used, was forced to pay o a large number of hands as, havin been working with a full staff throughout the year, the company now has sufficient stock stored supply its customers up to the end March. \ By that time in all probab ity the sugar import regulations wi be removed, and if the company kep on manufacturing throughout th winter it would find itself with large surplus stock of high cos goods, and to compete with the imported article would have to sell at a very heavy loss. For protection sake the concern has been obliged to suspend business until its present stock is disposed of and by that time sugar should be considerably less than half its present price. In the meantime the factory's employees have to pay the piper for the mistakes of the Food Control Board.







It is encouraging to find that our articles the past two weeks meet with general public approval, and all thinking people seem to realize the possible benefits of our Campaign in favor of buying home-made goods; thereby helping our own peo-ple and keeping the money in the country to be circulated amongst the shopkeepers and tradesmen generally. It is also gratifying to find that the

daily papers are backing up our

work and endorsing the opinions that we have been publishing on this subject. The important point now, is to keep up the fight and not relax. In the past, efforts in this direction have been well begun, but have been for the most part desultory and spasmodic. The enthusiasm so well inculcated had good results while the publicity was on, but when the papers gradually dropped the prope ganda, the public soon forgot and relasped back again into indifference to the great necessity of buying home made goods whenever procurable. When the exhibition of 'local-made articles was held here a few years ago, excellent results followed for a year or so, and the home-made products had such a run that the manufacturers began to believe the change was lasting and had come to stay This, however, was not the case, and the fault is to be laid at the door o the manufacturers themselves. The publishing of a newspaper

business proposition, just the same s the making of boots, shoes, cloth ing, or any other commodity. The difference being the commodity that the newspaper has to sell, is space in its columns, and it is the revenue derived from selling this space that furnishes the necessary income to keep the paper running. Considerable space has been devoted free the past few weeks to advertise the homemade product. This was done in the interests of the vast majority of industrial workers who derive their living from the local factories; but it is as reasonable to expect papers to continue their free advertising, as it would be to expect the Boot and Shoe Factory, or the Clothing Factory, or any of the factories to give away their articles free of charge.

After all is said and done, the shareholders in the local industries are the ultimate gainers in the long run. Increased sales mean to then increased dividends, and, whilst the papers are perfectly willing to run a campaign for the benefit of the employees and the public at large, we hink that the manufacturers should be prepared to bear their share of the expenses and should back up the efforts already made by a continuance of the campaign in the Newfoundland papers.-Trade Review.


