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# Labour Party's Tenure of Office Not Expected to Last

## Situation in South Africa Full of Grave Possibilities—Communication in New York State Held up by Snow Fall—Norway to Restore Local Option System—Mussolini Has Overwhelming Majority.

### CAPE TOWN, S.A., April 8.

It is officially stated that dissolution of the South African Parliament will apply only to the Legislative Assembly, the Senate carrying on, as it is empowered to do, under the constitution. This gives rise to a curious situation as Premier Smuts has the majority in the Senate.

### LONDON, April 8.

The impending dissolution of the South African Parliament is regarded here as holding possibilities of great importance not only for the Union of South Africa, but the whole British Empire. The political campaign against the Premier has been for a long time gaining force, while the strength of the Nationalists and Laborites have been steadily growing. General Smuts at this moment is in the familiar position of a prophet, less honored in his own country than elsewhere, although this is not to say that he lacks a following in the Dominion.

### OSLO, April 8.

Repeal of the prohibition of spirits in Norway is forehadowed by a bill which the Government is introducing in Parliament. The measure calls for state monopoly and reinstatement of the old system of local option.

### MALONE, New York, April 8.

More than a foot of snow has fallen in this section of northern New York during last night and to-day the roads are almost impassable. Most trains have been seriously delayed and there appeared to be little hope for relief to-day.

### PARIS, April 8.

Brigadier-General Dawes and his staff repairers seem to have attained the objects at which they aimed, declared La Matin, in presenting a summary of the Committee's forthcoming report which is accepted here as authoritative. They believed, this newspaper adds, without "passing beyond the limits set for them—that is without raising the problem of the occupation of the Ruhr, or trying to fix definitely the amount of Germany's debt, since the Dawes report gives the exact details on the amount of yearly payments which may be exacted from the Reich, it in no way fixed the number of their annuities as regards that part which depends on the Budget surplus of the Reich."

### LONDON, April 8.

The British world flight pilots, with the Stuart MacLaren piloting them, were expected to be able to reach Corfu on Saturday or Sunday, after a week's delay there following the compulsory landing at Corfu, but the message in the engine is more serious than at first thought. It was found that a new engine was indispensable while this is being dispatched from England the delay of nine or ten days will be necessary.

### WASHINGTON, April 8.

The mixed claims commission has decided that Germany is not obliged to compensate for ships operated by the United States at the time of their destruction during the war for purposes directly in furtherance of military operations against Germany. Thirteen cases submitted as a test are decided by the Committee.

### LONDON, April 8.

The Government's defeat yesterday in connection with the Evictions Bill intensified speculation as to the probable length of life of the present Ministry. With the Budget only a night away, it is undeniable that Mr. Asquith nor Mr. Baldwin are anxious to take the reins, but the Budget is out of the way, Donald, it is predicted, will not suffer many defeats like that of yesterday, on a matter like housing, which is the forefront of the Labor program.

### GENEVA, April 8.

Texts of accords, signed by Italy, Jugoslavia in January, have jointly registered by the League of Nations. They show in the opinion of League officials that they can be classed under the heading of Regional Guarantees, and Defensive Alliances, provided for by the Pact of Mutual Guarantees, established by the last League assembly.

### LONDON, April 8.

Forty Liberals voted with the Labor Ministry in the Division yesterday on the Evictions Bill, and forty-two abstained from voting, including Mr. Asquith, Lloyd George, Sir John Simon and practically the whole Liberal front bench.

### TORONTO, April 8.

The Telegram says to-day that a report is current that a five dollar cut in newspaper is pending in Canada, presumably in the United States also. It is understood that a definite announcement will be made within the next few weeks and the cut will be in effect by June 1st at the latest.


### WASHINGTON, April 8.

A world record sugar crop is forecast in reports received by the Department of Agriculture, indicating the production of 21,600,000 short tons this year, as compared with 20,000,000 short tons in 1913-14. This year's forecast indicates cane production of 71 per cent. and sugar beet 29 per cent., whereas in 1913-14 nearly 90 per cent. of the total supply was beet sugar, of which more than 90 per cent. was of European origin.

### ROME, April 8.

In the new Italian Chamber, chosen in Sunday's election, Fascists will have 260 members and Democrats, Liberals, Catholics and other Deputies included in the Fascist list 115 members, thus giving a majority of 375 seats out of a total of 535, according to the Giornale D'Italia.






**Ancient Craft Found on Pacific Coast**

The framework and planking of a craft which has withstood the stress of years and which is believed to have been used centuries ago by Chinese or Spanish explorers or pirates, have been uncovered many feet beneath the earth's surface at Los Angeles harbor in excavations for an oil storage tank.

The boat, less than 40 feet in length, with high sides, is built of a heavy, thick wood. Some of the timbers are half-rotted, as is the case in many old Oriental vessels. Metal

used to fasten pieces of the craft together had rusted away. The construction of the ship indicated that it was not built by Indians.

More than a century ago, channels of the harbor are said to have extended much farther inland than today, and mariners say they believe the vessel entered, became fast in a mud bank and abandoned by the crew.

**To Raise Kaiser's Scuttled Fleet**

**BIG SALVAGING OPERATION TO RECOVER SHIP'S METAL.**

One of the greatest salvage operations in history will be undertaken at Scapa Flow soon, according to reports from London. The British Admiralty has concluded a contract with Cox & Danks, iron and steel merchants of London, who are also engineers and shipbreakers at Kent, for the raising of most of the German warships scuttled at Scapa Flow on June 21, 1918.

Preparations for the work are under way. According to a British authority, the raising of the warships is an unparalleled feat in marine engineering. There is no precedent for operations on such a scale as this. All the salvage plant will be entirely new, and orders have been placed for special appliances and tackle. At present the expedition is being fitted out at the salvage firm's Queensborough depot.

Competition for the contract has been keen among English firms, and it is rumored that an American syndicate was one of the applicants. As yet no information of the terms of agreement between the admiralty and the winning firm has been made public, but some idea of the cost of such an operation may be gained from the statement made by the English press that one house offered £1000 for the right to own or sell all the sunken ships, and would have agreed to pay the admiralty £1,500 a year for the use of four lifting barges, £1500 for each of the 22 destroyers, £750 for the battle cruisers Seydlitz, £500 for the Hindenburg and £250 for the remaining ships in deep water.

At the time of the sinking of the fleet it was reckoned that its aggregate weight was 500,000 tons and its total value, £60,000,000. American salvors ask of what value the ships will be, and whether the sales price will cover the cost of operation which, in their opinion, would amount to £3,500,000. At the present price of \$40 a ton for scrap steel, the return on the entire fleet would not amount to \$2,000,000.

Question arises as to who will get the steel when it is salvaged. Germany, her resources shut off since the war, has been the largest buyer of scrap steel in the British market. The formulas for alloy steels used in German warships are known only to their makers, which renders the scrapped material of little value to others. This gives strength to the persistent rumor that the Germans will be the buyers of the salvaged metals.

It will be recalled that the German fleet interned at Scapa Flow surrendered to the grand fleet under Sir David Beatty on Nov. 21, 1918, at the Firth of Forth. It totalled some 74 ships—nine battleships, five battle cruisers, seven light cruisers and many destroyers.

The warships were sunk by the order of Rear Admiral von Reuter, in pursuance of commands issued early in the war that no German man-of-war should be surrendered. The Bader and three light destroyers were saved, while some twenty destroyers were beached.

Among the ships that may again see the light of day after their long submersion in 20 fathoms of water, are the battleships Friedrich der Grosse, König Albert, Kaiser, Kronprinz Wilhelm, Kaiserin, Bayern, Markgraf, Prinzregent Luitpold, Grosser Kurfürst, König and Baden; the battle cruisers Seydlitz, Derfflinger, Von der Tann, Moltke and Hindenburg and the light cruisers Karlsruhe, Frankfurt, Emden, Nürnberg, Brummer, Köln, Bremse and Dresden.

Another accessory to the bathing costume is the square of silk knotted over the shoulders.

**Another Murder Trial in Far North**

**Edmonton—(Can. Press)—Another trial of Arctic Coast natives will take place in the far North this coming summer, and, as previously, Judge Dubuc will make the long trip via the river steamer to carry justice to the white man to the Eskimo peoples.**

The native in this instance—last year—is accused of murder and he has been in the hands of mounted police for more than a year. He was taken by boat last season from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police post on Coronation Gulf to Herschel Island to be tried. But owing to the little vessel being held up in the ice, the trial was reached too late for the trial of the prisoners, by the time Alkomik and Talamagama had been sentenced to death and Judge Dubuc had left for the "outside." Since that time the Eskimo has been held by the guardians of the North at Herschel Island, awaiting justice.

It is understood that the trial this year will take place at Aklavik (at the mouth of the McKenzie River) instead of at Herschel Island. This arrangement is made necessary due to the uncertainty of travel in the Arctic Ocean, but with the prisoner at Aklavik, the judicial party will be carried right to the scene of the crime by the river steamer, and it will lose far less time than if it were necessary to proceed to Herschel Island.

As in the former case the trial this year will be along the identical lines of British justice and fair play, which means the same whether in the Arctic or the tropics. Judge Dubuc will be provided with an escort of mounted police from Edmonton. The accused native will be defended by a prominent lawyer and the same privileges will be available for the prisoner as if he were facing the judge and jury at Edmonton.

**The Confederation Table**

Regina, Sask.—(Can. Press)—In the library at the parliament buildings in Regina, rests the original Confederation table, the cherished possession of the people of Saskatchewan.

Around this ancient piece the Fathers of Confederation set in solemn convocation in the various sessions leading to the drafting of the British North American Act. No wonder it is conceded to be the greatest treasure in Canada in the realm of furniture. To view the table many people have travelled miles.

It is only within the last two months that the final verification of this table has been established beyond the shadow of doubt. But everything is in order and the succession of verification documents placed in the archives of the Government. In securing all the mass of information, the late S. Spencer Page spent years of his life. The confirmation work was carried to a successful conclusion by W. H. Munro, the present assistant librarian, who has been an employee of the government since 1906.

It may not be generally known that the original furniture for the first House of Assembly for the Government of the Northwest Territories supplied by the Federal Government from Ottawa. Governor Dewdney selected what was required, and in so doing was aided by the Confederation Table. Its historic value was not at that time realized and the offer was accepted with no general show of rejoicing.

Anyway the table arrived in due course and went to Battleford, the seat of the first government. Later it was moved to the old government buildings on Dewdney Avenue and again at the adjournment session of 1908 to the new post office building in Regina, where the House met for part of a session on the top floor. The table was too long to be taken into the building and William Lythe, still a resident of Regina, was instructed to cut it down. Mr. Lythe did just what he was instructed to do and he cut off an even six feet.

It was that very shortening of the famous old table that led to complications and disputes. It caused its authenticity to be questioned and there was considerable trouble—years of it—to lift the cloud of doubt. But never in all the time there was any question as to the origin of the table did any individual, organization or government claim to have a Confederation table. And even after the table had been finally established as genuine, almost endless stories were circulated as to what had become of the piece removed by William Lythe. People told of seeing souvenir tables at various places, made from the wood of the original. Each story had to be run down, as each lent some foundation that the entire table had been made into souvenirs. Most of the reported souvenir stories proved false and finally was established that the part removed from the original was used in repair work of various kinds and so lost sight of. All that is now on record.



**Social Workers' Conference**

TORONTO, Ont.—(By Canadian Press)—The tentative programme for the meeting of the National Toronto Social Work is now ready. The bulletin containing the subjects upon which the delegates will concentrate during the week of June 25 to July 2. As this is the fifty-first Annual Meeting it will mark the second half of a century of Conference work and hope is expressed that this may be a period of even greater service than that of the past, valuable as was the membership and the moral cause of human helpfulness.  
Grace Abbott, President of the Conference and a woman of national reputation in social service and Sir George Foster, one of the foremost orators of Canada, will be principal speakers at the opening. General sessions will be held daily with the exception of Friday, June 28. The bulk of the work however will be devoted to special sessions, of which there are no fewer than 49, their scope being almost every phase of social work.  
General sessions will deal with the International Movement among Social Workers; the Correlation of Public and Private Social Agencies; comparison of the rural problem; international co-operation for Social Work; Negro Migration and its registration as it bears upon the problem of assimilation and Progress. Among subjects that will be under discussion at sectional meetings will be a Revaluation of Child Care; Rural Social Work in relation to Child Welfare; Prevention of the causes of Delinquency in young children; police and function; the policewoman; different phases of Case Work; Health for School Children; Prevention of Periodic Health examinations; Advancing Standards through Legislation; Difficulties in the work of Public Welfare Departments; step in the development of Hospitals; Financing Social Work; and many other angles of the social service functions.  
Attending the Conference—of between 3,500 and 4,000 are expected—are reminded by the official bulletin that when American delegates cross the invisible line separates (or joins) the United States and Canada, they will observe little outward change. They hear spoken the same familiar language, will find in the main the fundamental attitude towards the facts of life, and will feel that whether they are in a civilization culture similar to those they understand under the "Stars and Stripes," that when delegates assemble consideration of the human condition which concern the Conference will be quickly evident that in the social condition had endeavor to the closest kinship between two peoples.  
The advantages of the huge number of kindred groups hold meetings immediately prior during the week of the National Conference. Some of these will be the Red Cross; the Household Economic Group; the National Association of Travellers' Aid Societies; the American Association of Hospital workers; American Association of Social Service Exchanges; National Association of Day Nurseries and the American Association for Organizing Social Work.
