Liverpool & London & Globe Insurance Company.—This was er action brought by Mr. J. P. Coulson, of Owen Sound to recover \$2,500, the amount of a policy of insurance on a building in Oil Springs, destroyed by fire on the 24th of July last. The defence set up was that proper notice of claim had not been given, and that the building was burnt through the precurement of the plaintiff. One Fenton is at present explating in the Penitentiary the crime of having set fire to the building, and he being produced as a witness swore that his incendiary labour had been purchased by Ellas Smith, who paid him therefor \$50, and it was Coulson's will that the hotel should be destroyed. Smith was previously tried for inducing Fenton to burn the house and was acquitted. He also gave evidence, and swore that Coulson never asked him to employ any person to set fire to the house, and never gave him money to fee an incendiary. The jury returned a verdict for plaintiff of \$2,500 with interest.

The QUEEN ex. John McMaster—The prisoner was put upon his trial charged with the murder of John Moore, in the township of Normanby, on the 23rd of January last. Moore's wife was at the prisoner's house sick, and the former coming late at night to the door, drunk and outrageous, the latter shot him in the thigh, a few inches below the groin, from which wound he soon after died. The verdict was manslaughter, and the prisinement two years' imprisonment in Penitentiary.

The Queen vs. Samuel A. Jones.—

The facts were these: The brother of the deceased came from North Dumfries to Derby in the fall of 1864; settled on a lot belonging to Dr Manley; deceased came up and settled with his brother on lot 14. He came up 'n 1865 and remained there till his death. Ford and his brother built a house on their lot, and had just finished removing their furniture to it. Deceased was driving a yoke of occupwith a wagon, and had taken the last load of furniture to the house, and had then driven past the house to a sandpit for a load. While in the wagon going there, about 11 o'clock in the morning, he was shot from behind and died afterwards of the wound. He made an affidavit just before his death, but as the murderer was disguised by an olicloth over his face, he was unable to identify him. He did not even suspect any one. There was a difficulty between deceased and prisoner about some girls, and a threatening letter had been sent to the former some time previously in, it is supposed, the handwriting of the latter, and anonymous letters to the fathers of two young girls with whom Ford boasted of being on terms of criminal intimey.
