gineer of the Lac La Belle, who was in one of the boats which has arrived here gives the following account of the disas-ter: They left Milwaukee at nine o'clock last night, about midnight the steam sprung a leak and made water rapidly; spring a leak and made water rapidly; there were about twenty-five passengers on board, including seven ladies and children; crew worked hard all night, and threw considerable cargo overboard, but finding the steamer about to sink they prepared to take to life boats, of which there were five; the men were, without anything to eat, and suffered from cold; when the last boat left the steamer I saw five men left on her when she went down; I saw four of them in the water, one clinging to a piece of timber; I think they must have been lost, as we could give no assistance withcut danger of swamping our boat; two out of five of the boats Arifted towards Kenosha.

The St. John (N. B.) Daily News speaks of a very malignant disease, which appears to be baffling the skill of physicians. It is very prevalent at present in Cambridge, Queen's county. It says:—A young man named McKelvie died of diptheris in this city some time during the early summer, and his body was taken to his home in Queen's county for burial. Against the advice of the physician and friends the family insisted on opening the coffin to see the corpse before burial, knowing full well that the disease of which he died was said to be infectious. A little later several members of the same family took the disease and died in a very few days, despite all that physicians could do for them. Now intelligence reaches us that the disease has spread to other families; that Mr. William Briggs, of the same place, has buried his whole family of four children within a very short time, and the disease is still spreading. About 12 years ago the game locality was visited by a disease very like the present, which carried off vast numbers of young and middle-aged of the parish, m some cases several members of the same family having been buried in one grave. It is to be hoped that the cliesae may be stayed, and that the calamity of 1860 may not be about to re-visit that people.

In the health returns of the Registrar-General the most notable feature is the low rate of mortality of London, which receded one week to 17 per 1,000. The zymotic diseases caused 188 deaths, including 21 from typhold fever, 31 from whooping cough, and 12 from scarlet fever. According to this return, London was much more healthier than any other large town in the Empire.

The extraordinary growth of London may be appreciated to some extent when it is known that within the last twenty-three years 250,000 new houses have been built in that city. Within the same time the beats of the police have extended by 1,000 miles. It now requires 8,000 police to patrol and protect the vast mass of people, whose numbers are equal to very nearly the whole population of Scotland.
