The Elections in Nova Scotia Reformers Triumphant.

News has arrived of all the elec tions in Nova Scotia except four, and the result shows quite a large gain on the Reform side. The Govern-ment will have a handsome majority from that Province. Messrs. Jone and Power have a very large majority in Halifax city and county; a most welcome, though not unexpected, result—Mr. Jones, especially, being a representative man, thoroughly in accord with the leaders of the Reform party in the west. Their majority will probably be 1,800. Digby gives 400 majority for Mr. Cakes, the Reform candidate, over Mr. Savary, Opposition. Partial reports from Pictou indicate the return of Messrs. Carmichael and Dawson, Reformers. Mr. James Macdonald, Dr. Tupper's chief follower, ran for that county. Yarmouth has elected Mr. Killam, Reformer, the old member, by a majority of between three and four hundred. His opponent was a Re-former also. Mr. Ray (Government) has been re-elected for Annapolis. Cumberland has elected Dr. Tupper (Opposition) by a small majority. Mr. McKay, Reformer, is believed to be elected for Colchester. Mr. Goudge (Ministerialist) 13 re elected in Hants. In Kings, Mr. Borden (Government) has beaten Chipman,

At the opening of the House Mr. O'Donohoe, the newly elected member for Ottawa, took his seat.

On a motion for a return of all persons appointed to situations by the Ontario Government since Jan. 1, 1873, the formal motion of Mr. Rykert was finally put and carried.

Mr. Bethune's Bill respecting the law of landlord and tenant passed through Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Clarke, (Wellington), in moving the second reading of the Bill to require owners of threshing and other mechines to guard against accident, rem tried that, with the incréase of machinery, accidents had also increased until threshing machine accidents had been me almost as frequent as railway accidents. He found that there had been no legislation in England similar to that which he proposed, but in the States of Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota, similar measures had been in force for some years, and had been most successful in reducing the number of accidents. He proposed to compet the covering of the joints of the machines under a penalty not less than \$2 or faore than \$20. He also proposed that half the penalty should go to the informer and half to the school section in which the accident took place. He desired, if the Bill were read a second time, to have it referred to a committee, with a view to embody in it certain practical suggestions which he had received from gentlemen on both sides of the House.
