DEATH

Pat Panefote

British Ambassador Dies After a Long and Successful Public Career.

As a Diplomat and Lawyer He Performed Very Distinguished Services.

Much Sympathy Expressed at Washington Where He Was Very Popular.

From Our Own Correspondent. Washington, May 24.—Lord Panefote, the British ambassador, died at 2 o'clock this morning.

Lord Panefote was born at Munich September 13, 1858, of British parents, and educated at Paris, Geneva, and Harrow school.

He became British minister to Washington in 1882, and acted as chief justice in 1884 and again in 1872. He was knighted in 1874, appointed chief justice of the Leeward Islands in 1875, and in 1874 was legal assistant under secretary of state for the colonies.

He succeeded the late Lord Pauncefote as permanent under secretary of state for foreign affairs. In 1885 he received the Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

He was the author of the arbitration treaty negotiated with the United States, the former of the great work accomplished at the Hague, and it may be said that it embodied some of the most important principles of international law.

TERRIBLE PROSPECTS AT COAL CREEK MINES

Fears That Over a Hundred Men Are Killed.

Rescue Parties Working--Some Bodies Recovered.

Poor Telegraph Communication--Details Are Meagre.

As was the case during the Victoria's last celebration, that which marked the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, the crowds who thronged the streets yesterday morning learned from the bulletin boards that still another terrible mining disaster had occurred in the province. This time it is the mines of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co., situated on Coal creek, some five miles back of Fernie, that have suffered. An explosion occurred at 7 o'clock on Thursday night, in what is known as No. 2 mine, which is connected with No. 3, both being ventilated by the same fan and as far as could be ascertained over a hundred men have lost their lives.

Archibald Dick, government inspector of mines, who is stationed at Fernie, in a despatch to the Minister of Mines, states that there were 153 men in the mine at the time of the explosion, and that 24 have been accounted for, and five bodies have been taken from the mine. Other reports place the loss of life at 125 and 150. The first news of the accident received in Victoria came in private despatches. Mr. William Fernie, one of the original owners of the property, received a wire from E. Wrigglesworth, of Fernie, which told of the accident, and said that 125 men had been killed or were entombed, which is the same thing as there is no possibility of those entombed escaping. It is possible that the figures given by A. Dick are correct.

While in the last published report of the Minister of Mines, the mines of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. were severely criticized, the company have according to reports received since then made great improvements. In fact, reports received early in the present month from Mr. Dick of visits paid to Nos. 2 and 3 mines on April 23, 24 and 25, are very satisfactory ones, the mines being reported to be free of gas and well ventilated from the same fan, and an explosion in one would affect the other. It was from these two mines and No. 1, situated on the other side of Coal creek, that most of the coal was taken. They are long tunnels, No. 2 being over two miles long, with workings extending down the side, and go right into the mountain of coal from the banks of the creek. Besides these mines the company have workings at Michel on Morrisey creek.

There being no correspondents at Fernie, and but a single wire, much difficulty was experienced in getting any information yesterday, the operator having all he could do to handle the private messages. The Colonist, however, despatched a correspondent to the scene, and he should have the full details for Sunday's paper.

The Crow's Nest coal measures were discovered by William Fernie, of this city. In 1887 he formed a syndicate consisting of Col. E. J. Wilford, and J. C. D. Fernie, E. Bray, V. H. H. and F. W. Rembert, J. E. Humphrey and F. W. Alder to develop the mines and the next year headed the exploration party. They located the best properties, and obtained a charter to explore the same, and then they were granted a lease for 20,000 acres of land. They also purchased 11,000 acres from the government. The Crow's Nest branch of the C. P. R. was built under the charter, and in holding the old ground in value, making rich men of all who had held on to their interest. Preceding to the mine, the Crow's Nest branch of the C. P. R. was constructed and the mines were developed, and the veins built to supply the smelters of Kootenay. Now a line is being built to connect the mine and the smelters, and when this is completed the company will have an unlimited market for the output of the mine.

THE ACCIDENT. First Intimation Was a Tremendous Rush of Smoke and Fire.

Fernie, May 23--(Special)--One of the worst coal mining disasters in the history of British Columbia occurred at the Coal Creek mines at 7 o'clock last night, when from 125 to 150 men were almost instant death in minutes. The explosion occurred in the depth of No. 2, and not a man of over 100 employed in that mine escaped to tell the tale. From No. 3 workings, which are connected with No. 2, about 21 men escaped.

London, May 23.—The Associated Press has every reason to believe that peace in South Africa is practically secured. How soon it will be announced depends apparently more upon the convenience of the British government.

Information as to what transpired at today's meeting of the cabinet is closely guarded, but it is likely that the Boer leaders in explanation to their forces.

Both these surmises probably contain an element of truth, but neither can in any way afford the widespread belief in the best informed quarters, that the end of the war has come. The most pessimistic forecast heard tonight only admits that a few isolated bands of irreconcilables may be left in the field.

A member of the House of Commons, who is in close touch with the government, said to a representative of the Associated Press today that he believed everything was settled and the British terms would be found unexpectedly liberal.

The British public is still quite ignorant of the course of events in South Africa, and there are no signs of interest tonight on the London streets, although on all sides the question asked is "Is it peace?"

On the other hand the Stock Exchange throughout the day was a seething mass of brokers, who eagerly bought South African shares, and the closing of the Exchange nearly a thousand brokers crowded throughout the day.

The appearance of Mr. Brodrick, the secretary of state for the colonies, at the dinner service tonight, was watched eagerly in the hope of gaining an inkling of the government's private feelings on the strength of the peace outlook.

Mr. Brodrick then proceeded to reiterate the official declaration of the government not to be drawn into any compromise which would jeopardize their peace in South Africa.
