

THIRTEENTH YEAR.

DI DID HE KILL WIFE AND BABE?

FRANK WILSON ON TRIAL FOR AN ACCIDENT

The Crown Allege That He Deliberately Drowned His Wife in Order to Enjoy the Favors of a Symp With Whom He Was Smitten—A Boat Ride and How It Terminated.

At the York Assize Court yesterday Frank Wilson was placed on trial on a charge of having murdered his wife and child near Keswick.

Wilson is a young man of rather pleasing appearance. He is 27 years of age, but being clean shaven presents a much more youthful personality.

He was neatly attired in a diagonal suit of clothes and wore a small black hat. His hair was dressed pompadour fashion, his complexion clear and healthy.

Almost an hour was taken up in empaneling a jury. The crown asked six to stand aside and the same number were challenged by the defense.

Crown Prosecutor Clute rapidly gave a short resume of the case. He stated that the prisoner had been married about three years, that he formerly ran a hotel, but lately had been living with his father at the old homestead, near the village of Keswick, about 50 miles north of Toronto.

There had been differences existing between the young couple, and at times the wife had been ill. The prisoner had been in the habit of visiting her at her father's house, and it was there that the tragedy occurred.

Long prior to the accident the prisoner had been utterly regardless of his duties as a husband. His relations with other women were notorious, and latterly he had been paying most passionate and marked attention to Miss Keenan, a rural belle, taking her for drives and walks and making no effort to hide the impression she had made upon his mind.

The young lady, it is stated, was a friend of the young lady's, sent her an anonymous letter, putting the facts of the case plainly before her and enlarging upon the danger she ran in being so intimate with a married man. Miss Keenan thought the case over and decided to give Wilson up, writing him to that effect.

The love-kill again, however, did not view the matter in that light, but, notwithstanding the warning, he continued to visit Keenan, by dint of his importunities, overcame her scruples of conscience and persuaded her to go driving again.

The last week again, Wilson, his wife and little dead and dumb daughter started on Sunday, Aug. 14, to spend a portion of the day with relatives of their father, the Crowns, living a short distance up the river.

On the return trip the trio landed at a point of land, and the prisoner, who was at the wheel, was seen to be in a peculiarly excited state.

At about dusk John Sedore, being at a barn about 45 rods distant from the scene of the tragedy, thought he saw a boat with a woman and child in it, and he called out to them.

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WELL KNOWN IN TORONTO.

A NEW YORK SUICIDE WHO WAS FORMERLY INSPECTOR OF THE CANADIAN UNDERWRITERS' ASSOCIATION.

Mr. John Byrnes, who committed suicide by shooting himself in his boarding house in New York, Wednesday, was well known in Toronto insurance circles, and his confederates held him in high esteem.

Mr. Byrnes, who was formerly Inspector of the Canadian Underwriters' Association, spoke kindly and feelingly of the unfortunate man.

"During the time he was with the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association as Inspector of western risks, he gave perfect satisfaction," he said, "and when he left it was voluntary and to accept the inspection of the Mercantile Insurance Company of Waterloo.

In fact, it was I who recommended him for the position, feeling that it would be better for his position.

"When was that?" queried the Toronto insurance man.

"In December, 1886, and he left for Boston with the intention of going into speculation there. He was in Toronto for a few days, and I saw him at the office of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association.

"I never saw him since," he said, "and I do not know where he is now. He was a very capable man, and I am sorry to hear of his death."

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THE EVICTION COMMISSION.

A BALANCED REPRESENTATION OF LANDLORDS AND TENANTS.

Home Secretary Aquith Not in Favor of Releasing the Dynamiters, but it is Believed that Mr. Forster's Bill will Prevail—The Home Rule Bill to be Considered Oct. 27.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Mr. Morley's eviction commission will have a balanced representation of landlords and tenants, two delegates for each interest, with four Irish heads by a judge.

Home Secretary Aquith is visiting Dublin in order to discuss with reference to political prisoners. The Government is reluctant to treat the dynamiters in prison, but Mr. Morley wants to detain them, while Mr. Gladstone will release them. Probably Mr. Gladstone will dominate Irish affairs, will prevail.

Mr. Gladstone will take up his residence in Downing-street on Oct. 27. The cabinet will actively resume its functions. The completed draft of the Home Rule bill will be considered at a cabinet council on the 27th inst. Mr. Gladstone insists that every detail shall be discussed by his colleagues before the measure is introduced in Parliament.

Mr. Erdman brought an action for damages for injuries received by him by a fall from a sidewalk, but before the action came to trial he died. Before his death he was examined, and it is this examination which is to be given in evidence. Mr. Erdman was alone at the time of the accident, which makes his examination of great importance.

E. H. Cliff of the Village of Dunochurch, Parry Sound District, has commenced an action against William Robertson, Gordon McKay & Co. and Henry Barber & Co., claiming \$10,000 damages caused by and incidental to an alleged wrongful assignment and improper sale of the estate of Robertson & Cliff, merchants, late of Dunochurch.

Messrs. Neville, McWhinney & Ridley, acting for F. W. Coats, the lessee of the King-street Mart, have issued a writ against William Dickson and Charles J. Townsend to recover possession of "The Mart," 97 King-street east, and for the use and occupation of the same premises and for an injunction or a receiver or both, as the case may require, for an account and for damages. Some years ago Mr. Coats sold out his lease to J. J. Oliver, on condition that he should keep up certain payments, and in default the plaintiff was to be as liberty to repossess himself of the business and premises. Oliver assigned to the present defendants, and payments, it is alleged, having fallen behind, Mr. Coats wants possession.

The chancery sittings came to a close yesterday afternoon. The Court of Appeal will resume business on Monday.

A \$100,000 Plan. Another scheme for the purification of Ashbridge's Bay is outlined in a letter received yesterday by the Mayor from Contractor Randolph Macdonald. The proposed improvement consists of a channel extending through Ashbridge's Bay from Toronto Bay to the lake. The Don cutting would be extended to the main channel. Mr. Macdonald thinks this plan, if adopted, would thoroughly purify the bay. The cost would be in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

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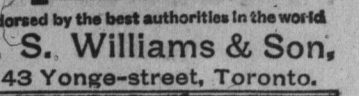
