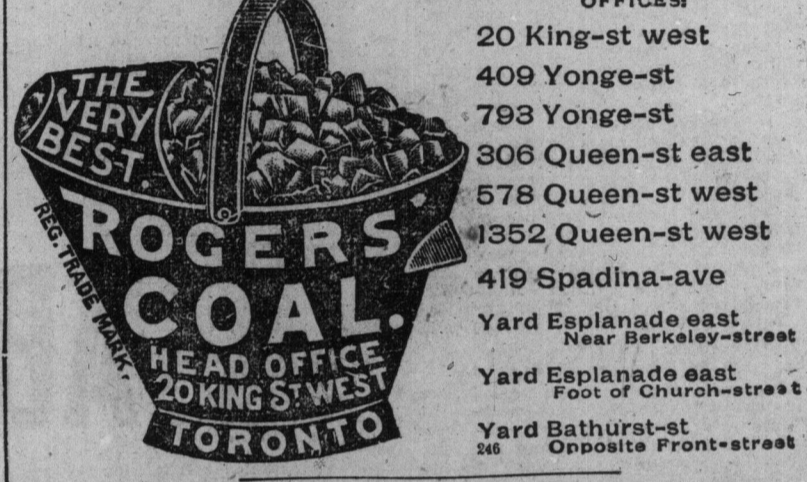

Robert Turner of Brantford Writes a Last Farewell and Drinks Carbohc Acid.

His son got up at 7 o'clock in the morning and on going down stairs to the dining room saw a pass book on the table which was not there the previous night. In the passbook was written the following:

"Brantford, Oct. 19, 1894, 3 o'clock in the morning. This is my last voyage on earth. I have been tried and put in prison for five weeks. God forgive my poor wife and all the curses of my put spouse. Miss D. and Mrs. W. God protect my little girl Nina, God bless my son Tom, H. A. Turner." The boy went immediately to his father's room and found him in bed dead. A bottle which had contained carbolic acid was found on the table. No cause can be found for the rash act. His wife is in the hospital suffering from inflammation.

A CRUEL SIGNER—'ALMIGHTY GOD'

Presided By a Crank to a New York Fairing Teller, Who Refused Payment.

New York, Oct. 19.—A crank entered the Clinton Place Bank in Astor place at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon and demanded \$1,000 from Paying Teller Hind. About three days ago the bank officials received from a man a postal note calling for \$1,000. The police were notified, and a detective was sent to watch the bank.

This afternoon a fairly dressed man entered the bank, and put down a check on the window of Paying Teller Hind. The cheque was signed "Almighty God." 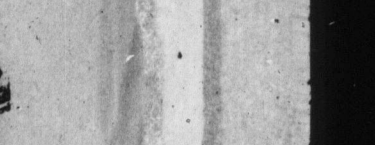

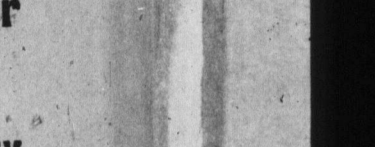
