A sad fatality occurred on the G. T. R. track about three-quarters of a mile west of Watford early Saturday morning when Robert Grayton Campbell, the 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Campbell, of Brooke, was instantly killed by a fast passenger train. The deceased was a student at the Watford High School, and left his boarding house here about five o'clock to walk to Kingscourt where he expected to take the 6.23 train for Alvinston to spend Thanksgiving at his home near there. Soon after seven o'clock the G.T.R. section men found his body, badly mangled, lying between the east and westbound tracks. Dr. R. G. Kelly, coroner, viewed the remains and decided to hold an inquest. It is supposed that Campbell while proceed-ing west noticed an eastbound freight approaching and that he stepped out of the way on to the north track, durectly in the path of regular passenger express, No. 7, which is due at Watford at 4.49, but on that morning was over 30 minutes is supposed that Campbell did not notice the westbound train and that it struck him, causing instant death, part of his skull being carried away and many bones broken.
