

It was largely due to his ef-forts, as well as to those of General Louis Botha, that South African fed-eration was achieved. He is of Hugue-not-Boer descent, and was born at the Cape in 1842. At the age of twenty-three he was called to the Bar, and he became Attorney-General of the colony in 1874. He held the post con-linuously until his recent elevation to the bench as Chief Justice of the new federation. He has twice visited Can-ada. In 1894 he took part in the first Intercolonial Conference, which was held in Toronto, as representative of Cape Colony. In 1908 he was present at the Quebec Tercentenary Celebra-tion as representative of South Africa.

Quite recently there was some vot-ing in Saskatoon. Thirteen bylaws made a big program and large ex-citement. With twelve of the bylaws made a big program and large ex-citement.
