—Hamilton, Ont., fruit dealers, advertise watermelons at one cent per pound. The idea of selling by weight is good and will doubtless soon be generally adopted.

—Arrangements have been completed by the Grand Trunk Railway Company for a coal handling plant at Portland, Me., on similar lines to the one operated by the Dominion Coal Company in this city, at Point St. Charles. The plant will have latest approved appliances, and will handle from 3,000 to 4,000 tons of coal a day. Work will, it is understood, begin within the next thirty days. The cost will be about 60,000.

—Mail advices from Chicago state that reports were current in marine circles that the four steamers ordered from the American Shipbuilding Company for the North-Western Transportation Company, headed by Charles Counselman, the grain shipper, are intended for the nucleus of a grain line between Chicago and Liverpool. Mr. Counselman is in New York and no one in his office would discuss the matter. Officials of the shipbuilding company decline to state for what trade the boats are intended, regarding the matter as a business confidence, which they are not at liberty to disclose. The boats are of the type best suited to the navigation of the St. Lawrence system of Canadian canals, and their machinery will be designed for salt water service. The boats are to be equipped with three gangways, on each side, and will have steel main decks. This brings them into the package-freight class, and it is believed that they will bring back general cargo from Liverpool when returning to Chicago for more grain. In the winter the boats can be used in the coasting trade.

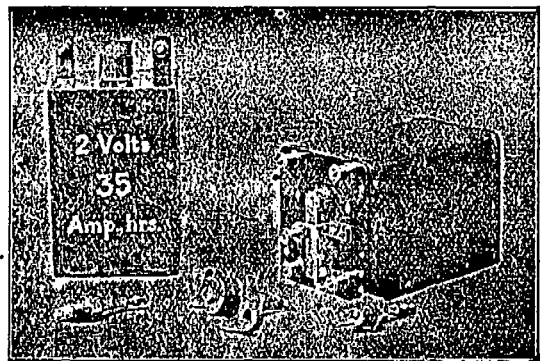

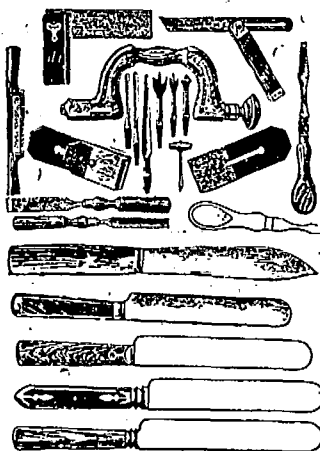

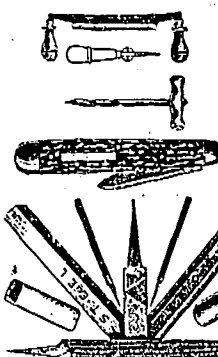

—The Cataract Power Company, Hamilton, Ont., finds itself without sufficient power to sway the minds of its workmen, fifty of whom were discharged this week owing to their demands for a readjustment of the wage scale.

—The side shows at the Paris Exhibition have been such failures that it is estimated there will be a loss to the promoters of several millions of dollars. Their shares have dropped from 50 to 75 per cent. Fears are expressed that the fire offices will be called on to make good some of the losses.

—The available list of creditors in the case of Mr. John Robertson (Austin & Robertson), Montreal, referred to in last week's issue, shows liabilities for over \$60,000. The amount of the claims of three creditors, viz.: the Old National Bank and the Michigan Trust Company, both of Grand Rapids, Mich., and the Hanover National Bank, of New York, are withheld, Mr. Robertson stating that he does not know the exact amount, and reserves to himself the right to give them later. Among other creditors are: Merchants Bank of Canada, indirect, \$30,000; Bank of Ottawa, secured, \$500; Pirie, Wyatt & Co., London, \$587; John Moneriff, Perth, Scotland, \$1,263; Toronto Paper Company, Cornwall, Ont., \$4,600; Royal Paper Mills Company, East Angus, Que., \$6,381; Munderloh & Co., \$1,310; Union Bank, \$5,000; American Writing Paper Company, Holyoke, Mass., \$1,200; Black & Clawson, Hamilton, \$6,000; Dodds Manufacturing Company, Chicago, \$1,200; Pittsburg Bridge Company, \$1,000. Apart from the stock in trade at 9 De Bresoles street, Mr. Robertson has a claim against the Childs-dale Paper Mill of Michigan, the amount of which is not given.

—Montreal is experiencing the usual quota of summer discomforts through the street improvements or repairs which generally begin with the advent of the extreme heat and wind up as the sun grows cool. There may be far-seeing wisdom in the fact that men working in subterranean channels are aloof from the effects of the heat, but there should be some consideration for the hurried man of business, over-head, who may not consider the occasion exactly suitable for vaulting or hurrying around kopjes in his efforts to avoid being run over at unprotected crossings.

—A friendly law suit to establish whether or not a will was made by the late Samuel Alcorn, Toronto, who died some months ago, leaving an estate of \$300,000, has been begun by a writ entered by one of the heirs, Mr. John K. Macdonald.

—A London, Ont., letter states that the affairs of the insolvent millinery firm of G. S. McGillivray & Co., are to be wound up without delay. Messrs. Geo. C. Gibbons, N. S. Williams and C. H. Ivey, London, and Messrs. Wright and H. S. Smith, Toronto, are the inspectors. Assets \$129,000 and liabilities \$128,000. The real estate is valued at \$82,000, with an encumbrance of \$34,000. The stock in warehouse is valued at \$10,000.

—Late advices from Winnipeg state that the employment bureau is kept busy sending out laborers to help in the grain fields of the province and territories. The harvest is ready and the reapers in many places are few. It is difficult to secure enough men. This is attributed to the small number of laborers who came from the East this year, and the fact of the crops turning out better than expected. Many Doukhobors and Galicians are being sent to various localities as quickly as they can be secured. The wages are not quite so high as last year, but there is no excuse for any man wanting work. General manager Thompson, of the Ogilvie Milling Co., states that wheat yields throughout the province continue to show a steady improvement on earlier predictions and the samples coming in are showing up very satisfactory on the whole. The estimates made about a week ago of twenty million bushels crop for Manitoba and the Territories is fully justified. Oats are also turning out well and will give a fair crop. The light frosts and cool weather will improve the wheat. The possibility of injury through frost is now remote.

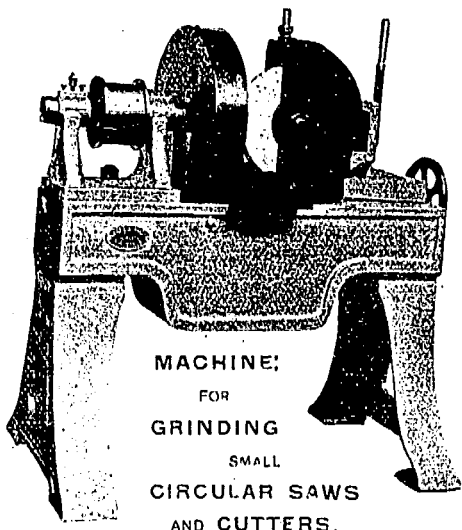
—Coal dealers in Philadelphia, U.S., which is a great centre in the American coal trade, says a letter from that city, are making active preparations to meet the great foreign trade which is expected from the European markets this fall and winter. Several agents have gone to Europe to study the conditions there and to prepare the markets for the American product. Many vessels have been chartered to carry coal to Holland, German and French ports. The opening of the European market to American coal is due to the unsatisfactory conditions existing in the English mines. In former years English mines have supplied most coal burned in Europe. But during the last year production of English mines has fallen off to such an extent that they are entirely unable to meet the European demand. Strikes and other labor troubles have decreased the output of the English mines, and have increased greatly the cost of production. The South African war also has hindered the output, many of the miners having joined the army. Prices have gone up accordingly. Before the South African war began coal was delivered at Cardiff for \$3.50 a ton. At present it is selling for \$7.50 a ton. This is so high that American dealers can meet the extremely high shipping rates on ocean vessels and yet make a competitive price. The difficulty in getting transport vessels is the main one at the present time. The strong condition of all markets has given sailing men plenty of work for their vessels. Few sailing ships are being built at the present time. If much coal is shipped to Europe the shippers must make use of steamboats, in which the freight rates are likely to be higher.

—It is stated at Kingston that the Calabogie Mining Company has received a contract to supply 10,000 tons of ore to the Midland Furnace Company. The ore will be shipped by the K. & P. to Kingston, and then by G. T. R. to Midland.

—The tobacco crop in the vicinity of Janesville in Southern Wisconsin suffered loss to the extent of \$500,000 by a recent hailstorm.

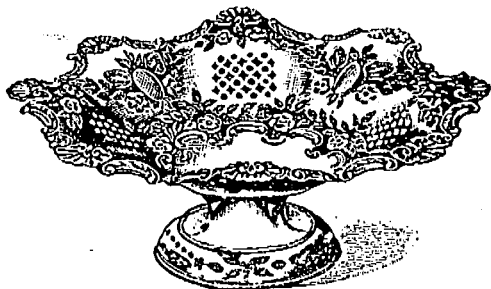

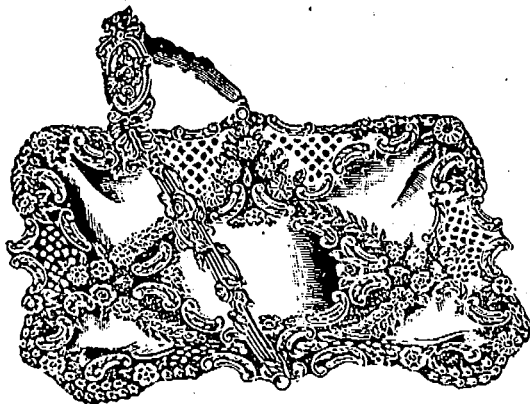

The plan as taken up a year ago was confined to manufacturers in Hamilton, Ont., but at present it is proposed to cover a wider field. Among the concerns which it is intended to absorb are Copp Bros., Hamilton; the McClary Manufacturing Company, London; the Moffatt Stove Company, Weston; Burrow, Stewart & Milne, Hamilton; Tilden & Ware, Hamilton, and J. Hardy, of Toronto. It is not intended to have the consolidation go into effect before January 1, 1901.

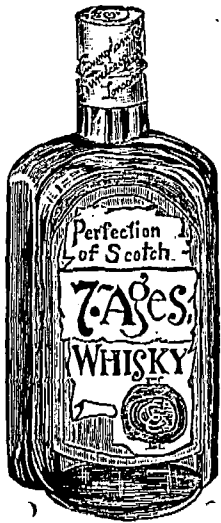

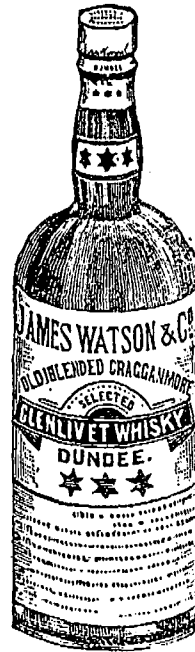

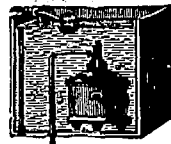

—Gold continues to come down the line from the mysterious North. A Seattle, Wash., dispatch states that the steamship Ohio has arrived from Nome with 332 passengers and treasure estimated at \$2,000,000. About one-third of the gold came from Nome. The Klondike contributed the rest. The steamer South Portland, has also arrived with \$40,000 gold from Nome and 113 steerage passengers.

—That the Island of Cape Breton will soon have another railroad is confirmed by the solicitor for the Cape Breton Extension Company, who has returned from Nova Scotia. The present intention of the company, of which Mr. Robert Campbell, of New York, is president, is to build a railroad, equip it in a first-class manner and operate it as a purely commercial enterprise. Work on the first section will begin at Point Tupper on east side of the Strait of Canso, to be extended thirty miles beyond to St. Peter's, in Richmond County. This section has been subsidized by the Federal Government at the rate of \$3,200 a mile, and the Nova Scotia executives have, it is understood, promised a like sum. Contracts with the Governments will be signed within 30 days.

—The Dominion Government has established the new customs outpost of Aurora and Newmarket, Ont., for the convenience of the people of those towns and of the surrounding country. These two places have recently become practically one for the purpose of intercommunication by the extension of the Metropolitan Electric Railway to Newmarket, cars passing between the two places hourly. Heretofore all imported goods for this district had to be passed through the customs house at Toronto, the delay at times occasioning much inconvenience and loss, and the new arrangement is expected to prove of a very great advantage to the community in question.

—The steamship Rathlin Head, which sailed from this port for Belfast on the 29th inst., had on board the following cargo: 136,000 bushels rye, 24,000 bushels corn, 8,000 bushels oats, 2,600 sacks flour, 100 tons bran, 50 tons paper, one car hardwood, 15 standards planks, 160 standards deals, 15 standards shooks, one buggy, five tons provisions, 700 bundles staves, 3,100 boxes cheese, one car machinery, etc. She completes cargo at Quebec on the way down.

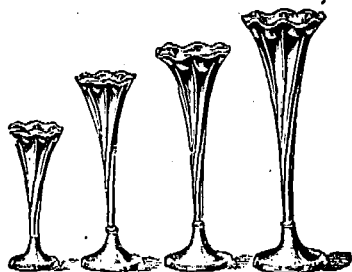

There is a growing market for apples abroad, and it is said that Great-Britain, France and Germany are prepared to take much of the surplus.

—The responsibilities of travel are not altogether borne by accident and other insurance companies. A Duluth, Minn., dispatch states that proceedings in Admiralty to libel the steamer Britannic belonging to the Northern Navigation Company of Ontario, for \$20,000 have been commenced in the United States Court by Mrs. Elizabeth S. Vananda, of Parry Sound, Ontario. In her complaint Mrs. Vananda charges the master of the Britannic with not properly caring for her husband while he was a passenger on the vessel, the consequences of this neglect, she alleges, being that he caught cold and died.

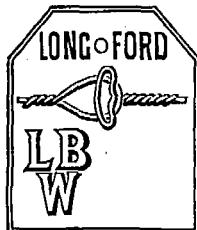

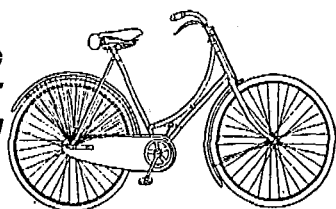
EXPORT OFFICE, 61 St. Mary Axe, London, E.C., Eng.

—All of the new railway lines under construction throughout Manitoba by the C.P.R., says a Winnipeg letter, will be operated this season. Steelrails are now being laid on the Dymont spur to connect with the Keewatin works. The Government engineer has been over the new Pipestone extension, and the line is almost ready for operation. The line runs into the Territories and will reach Aricola when completed through the Moose Mountain district. It is now as far as Manor, fifty miles out from Antler, the portion constructed this season being thirty-six miles. The McGregor branch will also be in operation this fall. The Tac du Bonnet line is completed and will be operated shortly.

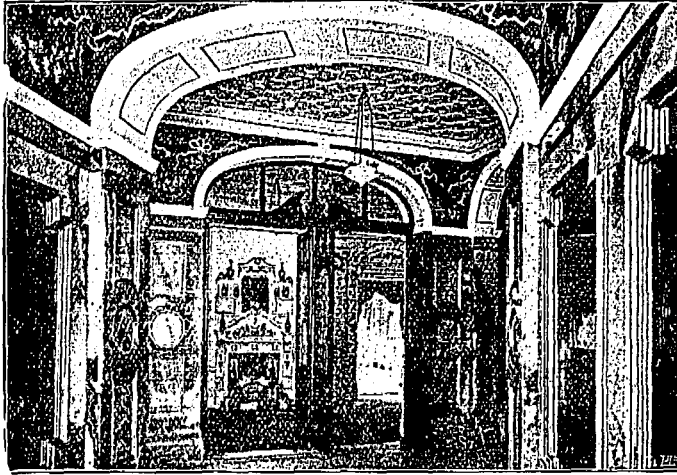

Bone Goods with Sea Side Views.

—Citizens of Cornwall, Ont., have been enjoying unusually low-priced bread this week, owing to a war among the bakers of that town.

—It is reported in Toronto that a majority of the stock of the Ontario, Hudson Bay & Western Railway has been sold to American capitalists representing the Clergue Syndicate, for something less than \$100,000. The deal, if completed, would give the Clergue Syndicate all the rights to build a road from Sault Ste. Marie to Hudson's Bay, they now having a charter to build the Algoma Central Railway from the Sault to a point on the C.P.R. practically in connection with the Ontario, Hudson Bay & Western.

—Beyond the shaded veil of politics which has obscured, so far, much of what might otherwise be unbiased news of Canada's exhibit at Paris, it is pleasing to read the following given by a prominent Toronto merchant who has returned from the great exhibition: "What impressed me greatly was the display of food products from Canada, which is well calculated to give foreigners and intending emigrants a splendid idea of the resources of this country. Such things as cereals, cheese, apples, and many kinds of fruits were to be seen in abundance, and the cold storage enables them to be kept in the best of conditions. It is a practical object-lesson to strangers, showing what we can produce here. The manufactures of Canada are also well represented; in fact, the whole thing is a credit to Canada. There is no doubt at all in my mind but that it will be most helpful to the Dominion.

—Traders of the present day can recall the time when a shortage of coal or beef in Russia, China or South Africa mattered little in so far as their immediate interests were concerned. But the world has been making rapid changes of late, and now a light supply of food products in any quarter of the globe or an impending war are liable to directly influence prices and supplies in any other portion of the world reached by a railroad or boat. The Russian Government have, it is alleged, been seeking arrangements with the Dominion Coal Company for the purchase of one million tons of coal. A Chicago dispatch states that Armour & Co., packers, of that city, have received an order from the Russian Government for six million pounds of beef on the hoof to feed the soldiers of the Czar in China, which is the largest order of the kind in the history of the Chicago meat trade. Options are said to have been taken upon every valuable ship in the carrying trade on the Pacific. It will take 5,000 fatted cattle to fill the order. The cattle will be sent from San Francisco via Hawaii and Japan.

—A Quebec dispatch announces that the cruiser *Gladiator* has captured a contraband schooner carrying illicit liquor from Miquelon to Cape Cheticamp, Cape Breton. Several hundred dollars' worth of liquors and other merchandise on board were seized.

GROCERY ITEMS.

A London, Eng., private circular of 17th inst., treating of dairy products as supplied from colonial markets, gives the following figures, showing amounts of butter received from Canada for the past six seasons: 1894-95, 17,979 cwts.; 95-96, 31,067 cwts.; 96-97, 66,810 cwts.; 97-98, 85,050 cwts.; 98-99, 121,989 cwts.; 99-'00, 146,444 cwts. Referring to these figures, it says: "It will be noticed that Canada which belongs to quite another group of British Colonies, and is situated in an altogether different part of the world to Australasia, is very satisfactorily increasing its export of Colonial butter to the United Kingdom. Like New Zealand, Canada exhibits season by season a steady increase without that periodical retrogression which unfortunately has been one of the characteristics of the dairy industry in every colony in Australia. The total import from Canada during the Australasian season (not for the year) was 7,332 tons, which was an increase over the previous season of only 723 tons. It is, however, scarcely fair to compare the growth of Canadian imports merely for the period of eight months which constitute the Australasian season. If we take the Canadian imports for the year ended 30th June and compare them from year to year the total and the growth are both much more favourable to Canada. For instance, during the year ended 30th, June, 1900, the total import from Canada was 11,932 tons, and the increase over the previous year 3,781 tons. Cheese.—No such general increase is to be reported in the import of cheese as in butter. Cheese is year by year becoming less an article of consumption, owing, undoubtedly, to the growing prosperity of the working classes, who formerly relied upon this commodity in their dietary, but are now able to purchase more butcher's meat instead. During the decade the import of cheese has grown by only 24,500 tons, while that of butter has increased by 71,000 tons. The Home supply has decreased by 17,000 tons. Distinguishing the sources of supply of cheese, it is seen that the import of Colonial cheese has increased since 1891 by 31,500 tons, while that from foreign countries has diminished to the extent of 6,900 tons. The actual imports of both kinds in 1891 were—Colonial, 43,228 tons (of which 41,375 came from Canada), and foreign 60,816 tons. In 1900 the figures are—Colonial, 74,702 tons (70,549 being Canadian), and foreign, 53,903. In Colonial imported cheese it is thus seen that Canada virtually has the field to itself, for the only other Colonial cheese which finds its way here is New Zealand, but the amount of this kind is comparatively insignificant, being only 4,000 tons out of a total import of 123,600 tons. Australia has during several seasons since 1891 sent small quantities, but they are not worth quoting. The Canadian import shows a steady increase from 1891 to 1898, but since then it has declined by nearly 5,000 tons, apparently because the Canadian dairymen have turned their attention more particularly to the export of butter, which has increased in the period by 6,000 tons. Although the import of New Zealand cheese is comparatively small it shows on the whole a steady increase, the total for the five years ending 1895 being 10,980 tons, while for the last five years it is 14,089 tons. From foreign countries the decline in the import of cheese is mainly from the United States, which sent 10,000 tons less in 1900 than in 1891. France also is losing its cheese trade in British markets, and is being supplanted by Belgium. In 1891 France supplied over 3,000 tons, this year the import was below 2,000 tons. Belgium in 1891 supplied less than 1,000 tons, but now contributes 2,500 tons.

Following is an estimate of Canadian shipments of cheese to Great Britain during the past ten fiscal years, to 30th June: 1891, 41,375 tons; 1892, 44,371; 1893, 53,643; 1894, 55,119; 1895, 56,749; 1896, 59,423; 1897, 63,738; 1898, 75,214; 1899, 72,278; 1900, 70,549.

—There is too much truth in the story told of a boy who when asked what he was learning at school, answered, Astronomy, Geology, Algebra, Latin, French, etc., etc. His questioner said, "Do you learn writing and reading?" to which the boy responded, "Writing and Reading, what are they?" There is a vast amount of attention being given to putting ornamental caps on educational pillars, the bases of which are very rude, uncut ashlar blocks.

THE EXHIBITIONS.

The opening of the Toronto exhibition this week marks the advent of a day of rest and recreation for the most assiduous toilers in the land, the agricultural community. Holidays are written and talked of for dwellers in the cities and towns long before the real summer heat has arrived, and preparations for a sojourn in the country are being made almost with the advent of the summer leaves, but for the dweller in the country the real and only holiday comes with the opening of the big exhibitions.

The annual fall fairs do much good. They are the only real agency whereby all classes become mingled together for a week during the entire year. Each learn something from the other and the best of both is the result to be expected. All through the early part of the season the industrious tiller of the soil is eagerly watching his best fields and flocks, prospecting on something in his line being fit for the show. If, when the fair opens, he notices that his yield has been surpassed, he endeavors to find by what means it has been accomplished, and this is adding knowledge of the kind which is productive of wide future benefit. Comparisons of the best which each province produces is brought to the notice of all who visit the exhibition and for this reason, if for no other, the annual shows are a necessity, and prove of vast benefit. The rapid strides being made by Canadian products in Great Britain are worthy of much praise because these products have competition of the keenest kind. Exhibitions, and exchanging of views there by makers and producers of material, are of great importance in aiding this achievement, and Canada must not let any chance escape whereby further knowledge of perfectness in production may be achieved.

The great exhibition opened at Toronto this week under brighter auspices than ever, and notwithstanding the fact that implement manufacturers are not represented, the exhibits in general will far surpass those of former years. Modern skill and enterprise have added much in the way of attractions beyond the products of the soil and the factory, for which the management is deserving of all praise. Toronto is most favorably situated for a large annual show, and that she is taking advantage of her position will be at once seen by every visitor to that city while the exhibition is open.

THE WATER SUPPLY OF THE CITY.

Every now and again we have would-be-thought doctrinaire experts denouncing the water supply of the city of Montreal. Absurd as this is it has again been resumed in certain quarters. Those who have had an experience in a considerable portion of four continents of the globe have no hesitation in saying that the drinking water supplied in this city is equal in quality to the average of the supply in other cities. When filtered it cannot be surpassed.

What can be the object of these periodical attacks upon our water supply? We are told that it is impure because organic and vegetable matters are injected into it in its course through the rivers through which it passes. Again, and again, it has been suggested that the water supply of a large city like Montreal should be taken from the small

lakes that abound in the Laurentian Mountains to the north of the city and brought in by gravitation. As a purely theoretical question this may, to some persons, sound very well, but it will not stand the test of practical scrutiny. Although the water in these small lakes in the north is abundant, it is fully as much impregnated with vegetable matter as is the water of the Ottawa and the St. Lawrence, from which our present supply is obtained. The cost of bringing the water by gravitation from these sources would, with the necessary reservoirs, be very large, and the serious danger of interruptions in the service from having to cross so many important impediments would be a constant menace to a permanent supply.

The old idea of bringing the pure St. Lawrence water down from Lake St. Francis by gravitation has been again revived. This is an unlikely way of meeting the

question of a larger supply for the future of this growing city. In the first place, the head would not be sufficiently high to supply the higher portions of the city by gravitation and an expensive system of pumping by steam power would have to be resorted to, as at present.

It is to be presumed that no one who has studied the subject will contend that our present system of water supply is perfect, or that it will be sufficient for the requirements of the city in the near future, when its steady and rapid growth is considered. The provision required for the future is a simple one, and was pointed out by Mr. Louis Lesage some years ago when superintendent of the water works, and his recommendation was repeatedly urged in his annual reports up to the time of his death in 1899. Mr. Lesage was connected with the water works from its inception in the early fifties when it was constructed under the supervision of Mr. T. C. Keefer, C.E. It was, we believe, on Mr. Keefer's recommendation, that Mr. Lesage was appointed Superintendent of the Water Works, and he proved himself to be worthy of the recommendation and choice. Probably the city never had a more intelligent and faithful officer. Many of our readers will recollect after the first few years' experience of the aqueduct there was a regular blockade at the head from the anchor or frazil ice, from which arose a water famine. Through the perseverance of Mr. Lesage the entrance to the aqueduct was carried up about half a mile to a point that kept out the ice. The aqueduct was made wider and the additional width was continued a considerable distance through the rock cutting with the intention of having the additional width continued to the wheelhouse. Since that change was made there has been no trouble from ice blockades. The remedy was effectual.

In his report to the Council, Mr. Lesage urged the

continuation of the widening to the wheel house on the grounds of economy, utility and the surest means of a supply for the future requirements of the city. His report on this subject is of the greatest value and interest at the present juncture of our city water supply, which, at no distant day, will have to be dealt with. Mr. Lesage showed conclusively in the most intelligent form that if the widened aqueduct, the most expensive part of which work had already been done, were continued to the wheel house there would be an abundance of water, not only for the water supply for the city, but also an abundance of water power for pumping it up to the reservoirs and so being able to dispense with the costly steam engines and outlay for fuel. Further than that, there would be ample water power available for supplying an electric system for lighting the streets of the city at a comparatively small cost.

In order to increase the head of water at the wheel house to accomplish these results, Mr. Lesage recommended the deepening of the tail race from the wheel house to the river, which could easily be done at a small expense. His plan was received with much favour at the time, and there was every likelihood of its being carried into effect. Before that could be done, however, a number of enterprising individuals became interested in electrical companies and very naturally upon the electric light feature of Mr. Lesage's plan. Sufficient influence was brought to bear upon the Aldermen of that day to prevent any action being taken upon it at the time, and shortly afterwards a contract for lighting the public streets was given to a private company, at a high figure. That contract, with some slight modifications, was renewed later for a period of ten years, and has yet some two or three years to run. Under that contract the city has been paying all these years over \$140,000 per annum for electric street lighting alone. That large sum would more than pay the interest of the capital required to carry out the plans outlined by Mr. Lesage, and cover the cost of lighting the streets. Under Mr. Lesage's plan the expense of maintaining the vast steam engines for pumping power now chiefly used and the cost of fuel would also be saved, and, at the same time, the water supply would be ample for the future and the annual saving in expenses would enable a material reduction to be made in the present high water rates charged in this city.

There is nothing in the way to prevent that reasonable common sense plan from being adopted. The conditions are practically the same to-day as they were when first proposed by Mr. Lesage. In view of the fact that the street lighting contract will soon expire it is clearly the duty of the water department and the City Council to examine into this important matter, and not be led away from it by impracticable theories nor the blandishments of interested parties who may be inclined to favour the continuance of the present conditions and system of lighting and water supply.

Most of the present Aldermen were elected last February as representatives of reform and progress. With, perhaps, two or three disappointments, they are living up to that ideal and are gradually clearing the civic atmosphere. The matter we have now been discussing is one worthy of serious attention from the responsible authorities, as it is one of the most important questions likely to come before them in the near future.

ROYAL COMMISSION ON ASSESSMENTS.

The Ontario Government has appointed a Royal Commission to deal with all questions of assessment and municipal taxation; the Commissioners are: Justice MacLennan, of the Court of Appeal; Justice MacMahon, of the Queen's Bench Division of the High Court; K. McKay, of St. Thomas, secretary of the Municipal Association; D. R. Wilkie, General Manager of the Imperial Bank; T. H. MacPherson, M.P., Hamilton, of the firm of MacPherson & Glassco, wholesale grocers; Abraham Pratt, Assessment Commissioner, Ottawa; Major Butler, Napanee, C.E., a member of the E. W. Rathbun Company. Mr. Justice MacLennan will probably be chairman, and Mr. C. R. W. Biggar, Q.C., secretary.

For a length of time there has been general dissatisfaction throughout Ontario regarding municipal assessments and taxation. Although the taxing powers of municipalities are stated explicitly and restricted by the Municipal Act, the terms are so general and so elastic as to give opportunity for very wide diversities in the practice of different corporate bodies.

As a rule, the ratepayers object far more strongly to low assessments and high rates of taxation than to high assessments and low rates of taxation. Yet the practical effect may be identically the same. A property assessed at \$1,000 at a rate of 20 mills will pay no more taxes than if it were assessed at \$2,000 and the rate were 10 mills. But the rate of 20 mills on \$1,000 would excite great and noisy opposition when a 10 mills rate on \$2,000 might pass with a suppressed growl. The main reason for this inconsistency is, that a degree of pride is felt in having one's property officially valued at a high figure. In case a loan is needed for which a property is offered as security, it is helpful in getting a liberal advance to have it assessed high. Should it be offered for sale the assessment, if very low, is hurtful, while a high assessment valuation helps in securing a good price.

The municipality in need of funds finds it useful to have the assessment valuations placed high, as the total assessment is supposed to be an indicator of the financial stability of a municipality. How entirely misleading is such evidence we need hardly point out. It is surely manifest, that the borrower's valuation of his security is not reliable.

Such variations in local systems of assessment as now exist, might, with advantage, be reduced to a minimum by some uniform rule being established by law. From our own observation, we are convinced that the assessment rolls ought to be given more publicity. The difficulties in the way we are familiar with, as we are with the inequities, we might have said, "iniquities," which are practised and concealed in the assessment rolls. The Reeve of one municipality in Ontario, who had acquired almost autocratic power by his superior talent, greater energy, wider local influence, had for years had portion of his property entirely omitted from assessment, and the rest of it valued by a much lower standard than that of his neighbours. The Ontario Act relating to bonusing factories can be easily avoided, practically, if the authorities so wish.

The law needs a radical change in regard to the steps required to be taken to secure an enquiry into any complaint of alleged wrong, or grievance, made by a ratepayer. The present arrangement seems to have been established to bluff off such complaints by rendering it most difficult to have them presented "according to law."

Another point needing enquiry, and something more, is, as to the issuance of debentures by municipalities; the registration of them in the books; the custody of them before being sold, or after being re-purchased, in a word, as to the whole system of managing municipal debentures. In large cities or towns where the aldermen, or councillors, and the permanent officials are business or professional men of standing and experience, the debentures and other evidences of debt and all entries relating thereto are usually kept in commendable order. But, in smaller places, we fear there is a considerable prevalence of irregularities, arising from the incapacity, inexperience and inexpertness as accountants of the authorities and the paid officials.

The taxing of corporations by the Ontario Government under the Hardy Bill of 1899, deprived some municipalities of a revenue from this source which they could ill spare. The practical effect of the Provincial Government seizing upon this source of revenue was to increase the taxes imposed upon private ratepayers. They, in fact, paid to the municipality the amount of taxes which the companies in their locality paid to the Ontario Government, which taxes, formerly, were paid, by them wholly or in part to the municipality. Any restriction whatever upon the taxing power of a municipality because the Provincial Government reserves authority to tax certain classes of ratepayers, is a gross wrong to the general body of municipal ratepayers. Such a system throws the entire burden of the municipal government upon a section only of property owners and income earners, leaving others, who enjoy equal municipal privileges, free of their share of the necessary cost of civic services.

We anticipate a very useful, needful work being done by the Ontario Municipal Commission. We should have liked to have seen Judge McDougall, of Toronto, one of this body, as his experience has been unique in extent, and his clearheadedness and probity are beyond dispute. Justices MacLennan and MacMahon, however, are equally above showing political partisanship. Mr. D. R. Wilkie, General Manager of the Imperial Bank, may be confidently relied upon to keep the Royal Commission down to and strictly within business and relevant lines of enquiry. Indeed, there is no reason in their character or record, to doubt that each Commissioner will do his duty faithfully in the public interest.

A DAIRY PRODUCTS CHART.

We have to thank Messrs. W. Weddel & Co., the well known dairy products merchants of London, England, for a chart showing the movements of that trade for seasons 1895 to 1900, with wholesale prices of Danish butter, and Canadian cheddar cheese for years 1892 to 1900, and the weekly imports into England of cheese and butter for each month from June, 1899, to June, 1900. The chart is exceedingly well executed. Its preparation must have cost the compiler a considerable amount of time, and evidences much skill in handling statistics. The section showing by coloured columns the respective weekly imports of colonial and foreign cheese into England, from 8th July, 1899 to 30th June last, gives the imports of colonial cheese in last week of June as 3,300 tons, which is the highest for the year. From July to end of October, 1899, the weekly imports ranged from 2,000 to 3,000 tons. In November there was a heavy decline, and through the winter and spring the figures run quite low, while those of

foreign imports of cheese rise as colonial ones fall off. The colonial imports, however, far exceed the foreign. In regard to butter the colonial figures are also small compared to the foreign. The highest point registered was in the week at end of last January, when the imports were 1,650 tons. The extreme in foreign imports was in April when in the last week 3,300 tons were imported. The average weekly imports of foreign butter was 2,500 tons, while of colonial the average about one-fifth of that figure. The chart gives the home production and imports of cheese and butter for a series of years as follows:

It is manifest from above returns that Canada has a wide market yet open for its dairy products. In cheese it is steadily creeping ahead more and more in advance of foreign goods, but in butter, though a great advance was made in 1900, the increase being 70 per cent., Canada is still away behind. The old country markets are worth every possible effort to secure.

GRAND TRUNK HALF-YEARLY ACCOUNTS.

The preliminary statement of the Grand Trunk Railway accounts for half-year ending 30th June last, is one the shareholders will receive with special satisfaction. It is also a source of gratification to all Canadians for this great road to be doing well. It had a long term of depression, a few years ago, when its affairs seemed to be drifting towards some catastrophe, they were so hopeless, and the reputation of the line was so discredited. Since Mr. Hays took the helm, aided materially as he was by the ability, the financial experience and encouraging help of the President, Sir Rivers Wilson, the clouds over the Grand Trunk Railway have been gradually lifting and dispersing. The service, which some years ago was a scandal to Canada, is now a source of pride, it compares favourably with that of any railway in the world. Our readers remember well when a trip on the G.T.R. was a danger to the osseous system, as dislocations were imminent from the shaking and jolting of the cars. As to when a train would arrive that was in the dim and misty future, impenetrable by human sight. Punctuality was so rare as to be an event for general comment. The whole staff seemed demoralized, they were "grumpy," discourteous, indifferent to the needs and comforts of passengers. The last few years has seen an entire revolution in all these features. Grand Trunk trains keep time like a good clock; the road bed is firm; the cars comfortable, indeed luxurious in ease, and the civility of the officials all through the service is generally recognized and highly appreciated. The financial reward to the shareholders of these vital improvements has not been as great as it might well have been without any injury to the public purse. There has been an improvement, however, and we trust it is the beginning of a more profitable era. The preliminary report is reported in a condensed form as below. The extra receipts over in-

creased expenses in working the line in the past half-year have enabled the directors of the Grand Trunk Railway to announce a dividend distribution in excess of 1899. The payment of the full dividend of 2 per cent. on the guaranteed stock being recommended for the last half-year, with a distribution of 1½ per cent. on the first preference. This makes the dividend on first preference stock 3 per cent. per annum, which has not been realized for a very considerable period. The payment on the 1st preference stock for the first half of 1899 was 1 per cent. Subjoined is the official notification received from the secretary:

This surplus of £152,000, added to the balance of £3,900 from December, 1899, makes a total amount of £155,900 available for dividend, which will admit of the payment of the full dividend for the half-year on the 4 per cent. guaranteed stock, and a dividend of 1½ per cent. on the first preference stock, leaving a balance of about £200 to be carried forward."

THE PARTING GIFT NUISANCE.

Good customs lose all their virtue when run into extremes. It has probably from early times been customary to give a parting present to those who are leaving friends with whom they have been long associated. Some jewel, or other memorial, or token, presented to one with whom we are parting, "it may be for years, it may be for ever," will serve to keep us in kindly remembrance, though the affection is not very deep, which requires such a reminder to keep it alive. Many a ring given as a perpetual memento, has been given away again far less excusably than the one presented by Bassanio to Portia in disguise. A present given by one who, after the service of years, is leaving to enter into other engagements, is, to the recipient, a much-prized testimonial to his faithfulness and value. Such parting gifts are honourable equally "to him that gives and him that takes"; to the giver as evidence of his generous appreciation of services; to the taker as proof of eminent worth.

In recent years this laudable custom has gone on developing one phase after another until at last it has become a positive and serious nuisance, as well as an oppression and injury to those who are its unwilling victims. The chief seat of this modern evil is the banks, though it is found in other classes of offices. In banks there is a continual migration going on of clerks from one office to another, owing to promotions, casualties, or business requirements. The Canadian bank clerk nowadays is

quite a nomad, he is so often moved about. As soon as it is known in a bank that so and so is about to leave for another city or town, or that he is about to transfer his services to some other bank, or to enter another calling, a movement is started to raise money amongst the staff as a parting gift to the one who is leaving. This present usually bears more proportion to the recipient's financial power to buy it for himself than to the convenience or capacity of the donors to subscribe its cost.

Except in a few rare cases the sentiment supposed to be expressed by these parting presents is a mere hypocrisy. Officials who have been almost entire strangers to many of the staff, as their respective spheres of duty did not overlap, or touch, when called to other positions are given a present and illuminated address by those who have been their fellow-clerks, but to whom they were practically unknown. In more than one case an official who was known to very few of his colleagues and by all of them was extremely disliked, was given a handsome parting present, not a single cent of the cost of which was given with good will. The donors' only pleasure in their gift was the satisfaction at its being a parting one, as the recipient's removal was a very agreeable change. The address presented in such cases would be declined if the real sentiments of the staff in whose name it is given were known. But young men go on subscribing for and to these parting gifts and testimonials under pressure of a custom which would be more honoured in the breach than the observance. To many officers the contributions which are practically demanded from them for presents is very burdensome. Of course, a young clerk can say No! when asked for a subscription, and a young banker cannot too soon learn to use this saving monosyllable. But, it is not fair, it is oppressive, to collect subscriptions throughout a whole staff of clerks, for a purpose with which they may not sympathise. The parting gift custom calls for repression, it has developed into a nuisance.

FAULTS OF STREET CAR OFFICIALS.

Having in general terms praised the staff of the local street car company for their courtesy and other commendable qualities, we can point out their faults without being regarded as censorious or unfair. Some of the conductors and drivers on the electric cars seem to us to need instruction in their duties, and a drilling under some experienced office. There are quite a number of new conductors, fresh hands, whose freshness is as the first foliage of summer. One fault common to them is the notion that it is somewhat impertinent of a passenger to require a car to stop dead before he will alight or go aboard. There are conductors who persistently drag their car along when they see passengers waiting to get off, or on, instead of bringing the car to a stoppage. This perverse habit is highly reprehensible, as it is most disagreeable to get down from or to mount a moving car. It is also dangerous. There are several points on the street car routes where this trailing along is done habitually, and where conductors although they have seen from a distance, passengers to be waiting, will not stop the car dead, but only diminish its speed sufficiently to allow a person who is somewhat of an athlete to get on the car safely. We have again and again seen passengers pitched head foremost from the platform into the car and only saved from injury by the seated passengers guarding

the new comer from tumbling headlong. —One conductor who was rebuked for refusing to bring his car to a stand in order for a passenger to alight safely, answered very curtly, that it was his business to run the car and not the passenger's. The trailing trick should be stopped peremptorily, it has no excuse and is likely some day to bring a reasonable suit for damages upon the company. Another failing of well-nigh every conductor is to keep his eye directed only at one point or in one direction, which is the one at right angles to the open platform. That is, he looks only at points from which passengers are likely to come straight to the platform steps. But, constantly there are passengers approaching from the opposite side. It is a daily experience to see persons who have reached within the width of a car, who have only to turn around its end in order to be at the open platform, left behind because the conductor stands rigidly looking in the opposite direction, as if he were a statue that could not be moved. This often gives great annoyance to passengers and we have known it cause much inconvenience. On a winter's day it is a serious discomfort to be compelled to wait for the next car after having been close enough to touch one which had a conductor of the look-only-in-one-direction class. It is yet unsettled whether cars ought to stop on the near or far side of a crossing. We have been left by a car because we were standing waiting on the near side, and we have been left also, because, at the same crossing, we were waiting on the far side. Some conductors prefer one spot, others the other place, and between them passengers are puzzled and annoyed by the uncertainty. The company should make a rule and see it enforced so that passengers would learn where the cars can be relied upon to stop. One conductor was recently killed by falling from the foot-board. The wonder is that such accidents are rare, for the younger conductors seem to imagine they are performing a clever trick when they are taking serious risks in passing to and fro on the narrow foot-boards. Another fault of most conductors is to busy themselves taking tickets at

points where their attention is needed to the passengers leaving and arriving. We have a place in mind where this is often done, at a spot where there is a long run ahead which affords ample time for collecting tickets. But, no, the conductors lose sight of the passengers approaching or desiring to alight, in their quite needless haste to collect tickets. As we have said, the younger hands need instructing in their duties and putting under the discipline of the older conductors and drivers, a number of whom, who are well known to car habitues, are worthy of much respect and praise for the careful and intelligent manner in which their duties are discharged.

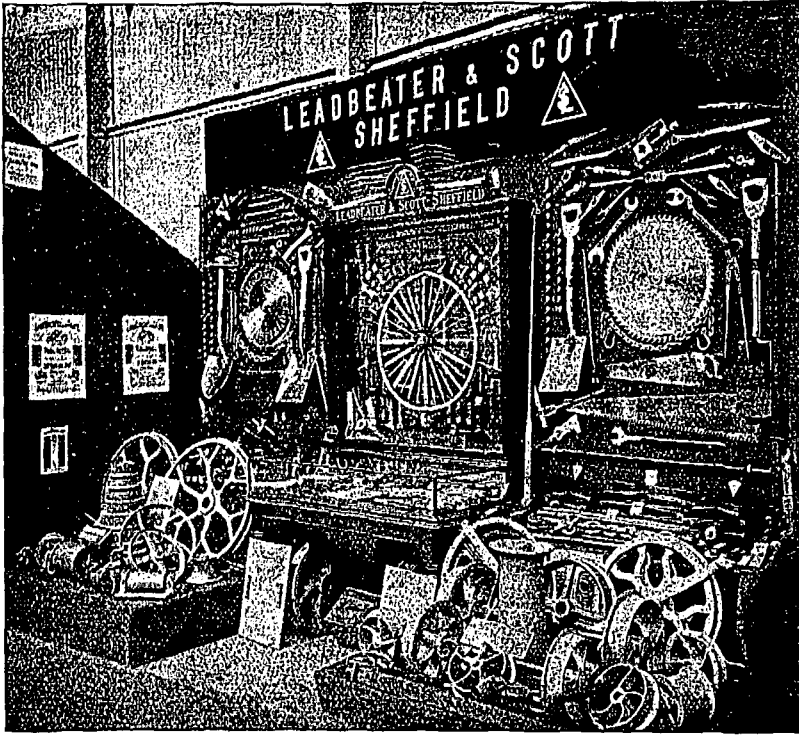
CENTRAL CANADA CHAMBER OF MINES.

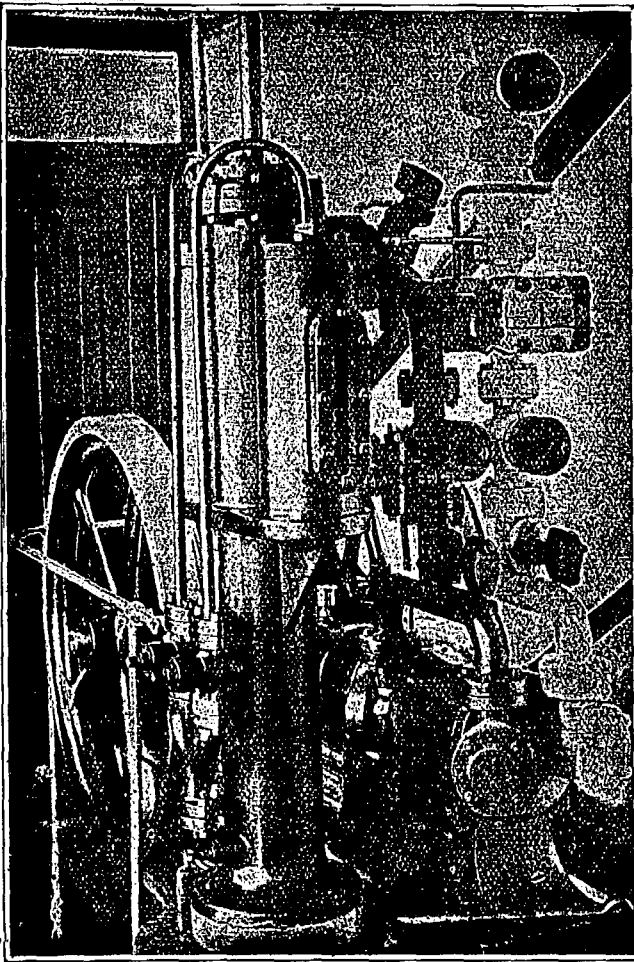

TITLED DOCTORS.

Lord Lister, the eminent English surgeon, whose discovery of antiseptic treatment has done so much to reduce the death rate in war, was recently given a banquet by his French confreres. He is the only medical man in England, by the way, whose merits have been recognized by a peerage. Medicine was long looked upon in that country as a rather low profession, and surgery was ranked still lower socially and professionally.

So says our well informed contemporary, *The Republican*. The contrast drawn between the honour paid Dr. Lister and the alleged dishonour under which the profession of medicine inferentially labours in England, is an illustration of the ease with which an assertion may be made to convey an utterly false impression, and yet be very difficult to correct. It would have been better to have named when the period was in which "medicine was looked upon in England as a rather low profession, and surgery ranked still lower socially and professionally." The paragraph conveys the idea that this was up to Lord Lister's time, and that his being honoured with a title was a new departure. This is wholly erroneous, as is the distinction made between "medicine" and "surgery." Long before Dr. Lister's day there were English "medicine men," honoured with a title which, even to-day, some would not exchange for a peerage. Dr. Simpson, of Edinburgh, for instance, was made a Baronet in 1866, and he was distinguished in "surgery" like Dr. Lister. In England the medical faculty has long been divided into "physicians" and "surgeons," the distinction being something like that between barristers and solicitors. As to medical men being regarded as in a "low profession," it is a very ambiguous and misleading assertion. There are hundreds of distinguished families in England, who are proud to trace their descent up to or from a medical prac-

itioner. The two Hunters, John and William, both "medicine men," in the last century, had their fill of honours from the Court, and society. The former was honoured by his remains being laid in Westminster Abbey. Doctors have not been made peers because they were too poor to keep up the dignity, and their social honour and professional rank were too high and too well established to be enhanced even by a peerage. In no other land are the members of the medical profession so highly respected socially, nor their professional skill so richly rewarded by honours and emoluments as they are in Great Britain. One of the vulgar errors common to our friends in the United States is that, the aristocratic system of England, its conferment of titles as marks of high social honour, causes a certain degree of social obscurity and dishonour to rest upon all outside the titled enclosure, however distinguished they may be in merits. This is a nonsensical view. Eminence in any honourable calling, especially so in law, medicine, art, science, literature, confers high social distinction in England, and gives the possessor of any distinguished gifts in those spheres, all the social privileges a high-minded man cares to possess, and all the social pleasures he is capable of enjoying. The four men, who, beyond question, are to-day the foremost in their several professions, and the most distinguished socially, are, Dr. Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury, head of the Church; Lord Roberts, head of the Army; the Lord High Chancellor, head of the Bar, and Lord Lister, head of Medicine. Each one of those "aristocrats" won his honours off his own bat. Not one of them had birth, or capital, or court favour, or lofty connections to give him advancement. Had those men been in the United States they would have earned some degree of distinction, but they probably would have been unknown to the world, for the ultra-democracy of America is a terrible handicap

on talent. Society there is like a great bog in which all flounder alike on a dead level, and wherein no leverage is found for great spirits to rise out of the mass. It is in a Republic where "patient merit" has to bear the spurns "of the unworthy," for therein every noodle regards himself the equal of every other man, and every mediocrity hates to see any one elevated in public honour.

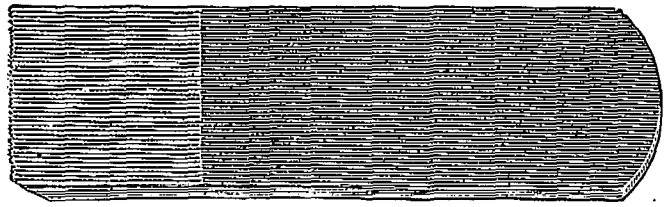
THE BRITISH AND THE BOERS.

An English contemporary expresses deep regret to see so many English journals repeating the clamorous cry for greater severity against the Boers. The Boers have to be subdued, there is no doubt of that, and any military measures necessary to compel them to submission have our full concurrence, more especially as it has become evident that the defeated side has no prospects whatever. Since the surrender of Cronje and the capture of Bloemfontein, the Boer resistance, however creditable to their courage and perseverance, has been discreditable to their common sense. They cannot win, and, in continuing a hopeless fight, the leaders are throwing away the lives of their comrades and the future resources of their country. The British are not going to enslave them or impoverish them, and there is no such difference between British and Dutch in race, religion, or customs that the two peoples should be unable to live together in peace and amity. We see no reason in anything which has occurred for vindictiveness, or for departing from that steady policy of lenity towards political opponents which has enabled us to assimilate so many partly disaffected colonists. If the Boers will continue fighting we must continue to kill them, and it is folly to expect we can leave them their horses or any means which can increase the quickness of

movement, which is their greatest military advantage. But to declare them guilty of treason because they are maintaining a hopeless cause seems to us both oppressive and unwise. It is oppressive because they are not traitors, but open enemies, towards whom we have observed the laws of war, and who, allowing for the fact that some of them have learned their skill while fighting a savage foe, have on the whole waged war on us fairly, with great courage, and a commendable degree of humanity. They have committed no massacres, and have not treated prisoners worse than they are usually treated in European warfare. The experience of all history shows that to conduct war under legal forms exasperates a population more than military violence, the reason being that such conduct really involves a claim to fight the enemy without the enemy striking back. If you shoot them in battle they can shoot you, but if you try them and hang them, they have no adequate means of inflicting reprisals. They are not treated as enemies, but as inferiors, who have risen upon their masters. That is not unfair in a settled society, because to disturb a settled society is a very grave offence, but in a society which is not settled, but actually in a condition of civil war, it is an injustice.

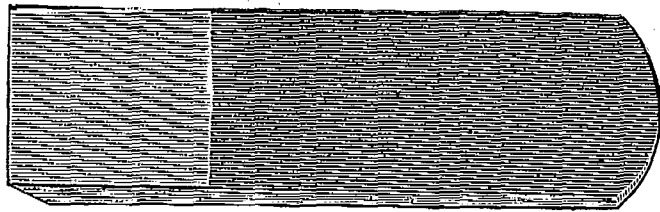
But it is said the Boers, though defeated, will not stay defeated, but are always rising, sometimes after they have taken an oath not to rise again. That is always the characteristic of serious civil war. The defeated always rise again if they see a chance. When England was fighting the Americans in the War of Independence, the New England freeholders who submitted while the soldiers were around them, constantly, the moment they quitted the district, flocked to the Colonial Levies, and fired away behind hedges, as if they had never pretended to be submissive. As the Americans triumphed, that is now considered by them very meritorious, but at the time it

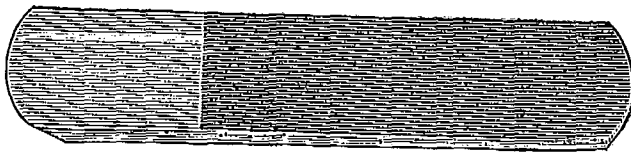
No. 383. Common Tooth Plane Iron.

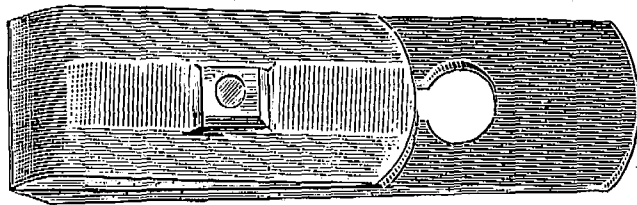


No. 380. Common Plane Iron, Square Nose.

struck Lord Cornwallis's officers as very "slim" indeed. We are not arguing, be it understood, that such conduct should never be punished. If men abuse the white flag let them be shot, as for any other kind of murder. If a commando takes the oath and breaks it, let its men next time they are captured, be sent away to Ceylon or St. Helena, and be refused, as untrustworthy persons, the privilege of exchange. We do not even object to the confiscation of their property, or the infliction of such fines as would be almost an equivalent. In war things must be regulated on a field of battle. All we contend is, that the punishments should be inflicted only on the guilty, and that there should be no attempt to treat enemies, as if, because they were enemies, they were also traitors. Our business is not to call names, or issue savage threats which we shall be ashamed to execute, but to keep on beating armed Boers until, in very despair, they accept the position of beaten men. One great reason for our bitterness is that we are not doing that work very well. Owing partly to a bad system of remounts, partly to want of habitude, and partly to a curious deficiency of military genius, we seem unable to render our brigades as mobile as the enemies' commandos, and have as much difficulty in catching them as hounds have in overtaking an experienced dog-fox. That is our misfortune, and one which in money and life is costing us very dear, but it is not a good reason for calling the foxes traitors, and setting up wire fences that the dogs may catch them more easily. Let us go on perseveringly, even doggedly, as soldiers and not as lawyers, improve our mobility with every week's experience, pick our generals, as the Boers do,

among those who succeed, and when the collapse comes, as it must come, punish every fresh disturbance of order without reference to anything which occurred during the war. It was Napoleon's reasonable lenity, not the Terrorists' limitless "energy," which means cruelty, that rebounded Brittany to the general body of France. The Republic has no more faithful soldiers than the Bretons, yet they hated Republicans as the Boers even now do not hate us. The views of the London Economist, as usual, are characterized by sound judgment.

AN ENGLISH VERDICT ON MR. HUNTINGDON.

The London Economist, in noticing the death of Mr. Huntingdon, the late railway magnate, says: "It would be sheer affectation to adhere to the proverb, 'De mortuis nil nisi bonum—of the dead speak only good—and to ignore the fact that large numbers of investors upon both sides of the Atlantic have been heavy losers by Mr. Huntingdon's railway enterprises." The Economist points out how shady were his arrangements with several lines, especially with "that notorious Yankee water-logged concern the Chesapeake & Ohio," with which Mr. Huntingdon was associated. The best that the leading financial journal of the world can say of him was, that, "his conduct had a nearer approximation to rectitude than that of many of his buccaneering contemporaries." A man's conduct must be indeed base when it is only "a nearer approximation to rectitude" than that of a buccaneer! The Economist dismisses him with the hope that Mr. Huntingdon "was the last link of the chain between the era of corruption and the era of right principles."

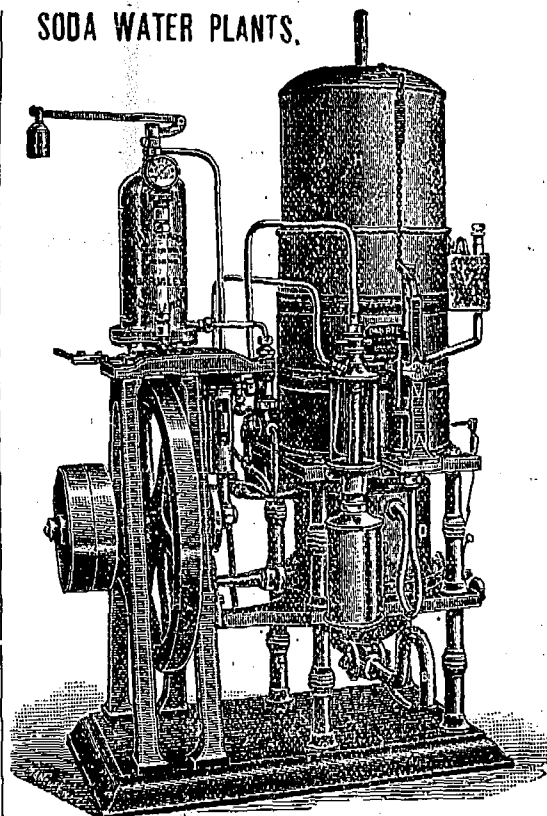

MONTREAL STREET CARS—HEAR BOTH SIDES.

Editor Journal of Commerce:

Sir,—Your article of last week on additional street railway facilities has attracted the attention of a number of our citizens who are interested in seeing a more efficient and up-to-date street car service established in Montreal, and that private corporations have due regard for and endeavour at least to comply with all reasonable demands made upon them by the public in so far as giving a reasonable return to the citizens for the valuable privileges enjoyed by them. It is also held by numbers of influential citizens that there is no legitimate reason why the Montreal Terminal Railway Company's line between Hochelaga Ward and Bout de l'Île should not be extended into the city, and that, further, there is no legitimate reason why people located along the proposed extension should have any special advantage over the taxpayers in all other parts of the city. It is in order to meet this latter objection that it is regarded as only just to all our citizens that the Terminal Railway system should be extended into every ward, as this would afford equal privileges to all.

Increased arrangements for furnishing the citizens of Montreal with cheap, rapid and easy means of reaching one of our most beautiful suburbs, should commend themselves to every thoughtful person as being desirable in the public interest. The one point, however, upon which there can be no disagreement, which is that any privileges granted the Terminal Company should be safeguarded in most stringent terms, so as to prevent fusion or amalgamation with the present company, and thereby maintain a genuine competitive system which, I submit, would be most desir-

able. If there were competition the cars would be greatly improved. They would be made easy of access by one step, instead of having to be climbed into by stairs as at present, the flat wheels which cause so much noise and jolting would be removed, the cars would be heated by electricity, not by clumsy and dirty stoves, the service in other particulars would be made more modern, up-to-date and agreeable to passengers. I admit the very great improvement made in recent years, but any one who has seen the electric car service in other cities knows that the Montreal Street Railway is away behind the times and will be until it is aroused by competition, which, I am certain would in the long run, be of benefit to it financially.

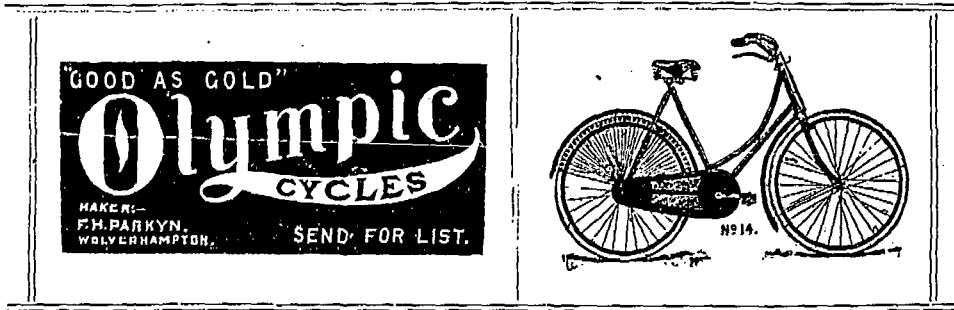

TENDENCY OF LAKE TRAFFIC.

The naturally favored conditions given the North route regarding transportation to the Atlantic seaboard and to the head of ocean-navigation is at length beginning to bear the right sort of fruit. A Cleveland writer states that in all probability the lakes will furnish a large fleet of new vessels for the coasting trade this winter and next summer. Conditions which are daily developing make this apparent. The discussion of the possibilities in this line was made patent by the recent order of Eastern capitalists to the American Shipbuilding Company for a fleet of four full canal-sized steamers which are to be built in Chicago or at the docks along Lake Michigan. The first boat designed for this trade was built last year, since which time quite a fleet of these boats has been launched. The first vessel of this size was built for Lake Erie owners, after which a Canadian company came to the front and started to building eight of the steamers. The original idea was to build boats that would

pass through the Welland Canal so that they could load grain at the head of the lakes and carry it straight through to Montreal, where it could be transferred to the ocean-going craft for transportation to England. Then the scope of the idea spread and the owners provided that in case the lake freights were not to their liking these boats could be sent on to the coast to do trading there, this scheme being developed by the Atlantic Transportation Company, which bought up a large number of the old lake schooners for that business. In accordance with this new intention the boats which were being built were fitted with salt water condensers and were made applicable either to lake or to ocean sailing. The boats which were designed for that trade have not indulged in it this year for two reasons. The first is that the contract rates were so inviting that their owners covered their capacity with contract stuff and held them here to carry it, and then the Montreal elevator has not been built, making it impossible to ship grain there. The freight prospects for next year are not so alluring as they have been this season, and the possibilities are that these boats will desert the purely lake trade and extend their trips from the head of lakes on to Montreal at least, and, it may be, down the seacoast. The owners of these craft have not fully decided that this business will be engaged in next year, especially the Hawgoods of this city, but unless conditions change materially before next year's contracts are made it is more than likely that a part of the lake fleet will be turned into that channel. The fleet mentioned is being continually enlarged. This is about the only kind of small tonnage that is now in demand, but this business is affording a new field for the moderate sized boats that are strongly built, and many of them may be turned into it. This trade is developing rather an elaborate system of doing business. Elevators are to be erected at Port Dalhousie and others at Montreal. The idea of the Canadian people interested in this movement is to start an opposition shipping port to New York, doing away, as they say, with the

need of one transfer of the grain, which will lower the rates to England, and, therefore, give Montreal a natural advantage.

—A new post office will be built in the adjoining suburb of Hochelaga. The Government recently granted \$10,000 for its erection.

—Considerable damage is being done the apple crop in Dundas county, Ont., by a worm which appears to knowingly look for the finest fruit.

—The man with incendiary tendencies appears to having considerable success in Brockville, Ont. Such forms of mental disorder frequently allow the possessor to make considerable headway before being run down.

—Among the companies recently incorporated under the Ontario statutes are the Clarendon Mining Company of Ontario, Limited, capital \$1,250,000. Head office, Windsor.—The Lakesfield Portland Cement Company, Limited, capital, \$500,000. Headquarters, Owen Sound.

—Our correspondent at Bedford, Que., writes under date 28th instant: Montreal buyers bought to-day 450 boxes creamery butter at 21¼c to 21½c; 50 packages dairy, 18c to 19c. 50 boxes cheese at 10¼c. Eggs, in limited numbers, sold at 12c. 2 car loads hogs were shipped at 5¼c lb.

—The international bridge, under construction for the Grand Trunk Railway Company, between Fort Erie, Ont., and Black Rock, is being rushed ahead. The total weight of the new structure will be in the neighborhood of 9,000,000 pounds, which is nearly 5,500,000 heavier than the old bridge.

—Charles Desjardins, contractor, Montreal, has assigned with liabilities of about \$55,000. The greater number of creditors are said to be secured by mortgage. They are:—Trust and Loan Company, \$27,540; Sun Life Insurance Company, \$5,500; L. Villeneuve, \$2,000; Dame C. Hamilton, \$2,-

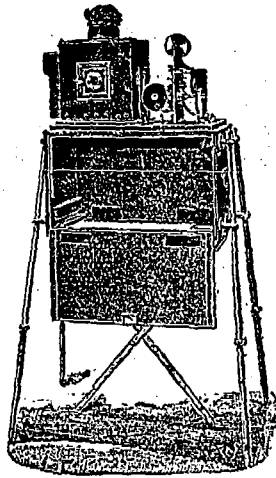

—This second batch of extreme heat following six weeks of incessant rain, is causing the man who had always been referring to the steady climate of Eastern Canada, to wonder on what grounds he based his argument. The present year, so far, will be remembered as composed of extremes following each other too rapidly for the average citizen to comfortably connect with. As it takes all sorts of people to make a world it now appears to take all sorts of weather to make a summer.

—Cheap letter postage is gradually encircling the globe. The Post Office Department, at Ottawa, has received notification from Washington that the United States authorities are recognizing the Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, Hawaii, Guam, and the United States islands of the Samoan group as coming within their domestic territory and subject to their postal rates and regulations. This will mean that the postal rate between Canada and these two places will be two cents instead of five.

—A winding-up order has been granted in the case of the Croil - McCullough Dairy Co., Ltd., Montreal. The order was applied for by Mr. John H. Croil. The National Trust Company are the provisional liquidators. A meeting of the parties interested, shareholders and creditors, is called for September 12 to appoint a final liquidator. In his petition Mr. Croil states that he is a shareholder in the company to the extent of \$25,000, and that it is in the interest of both shareholders and creditors to wind up. The application was not opposed.

—It is rumored in railway circles that the Great Northern Railroad Company, of which Mr. James J. Hill is president, has secured control of the Kootenay Railway and Navigation Company's property, and will operate the same in connection with its own main line system. The Kootenay line extends for twenty-six miles towards Bonne's Ferry, on the main line of the Great-Northern, where it connects with a line of freight steamers. It is further stated the line will be extended east from Lake Kootenay toward Fort

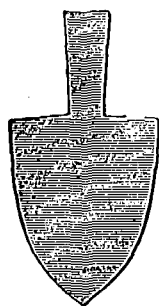

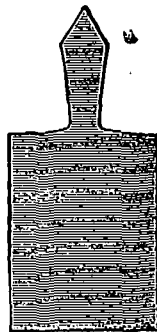
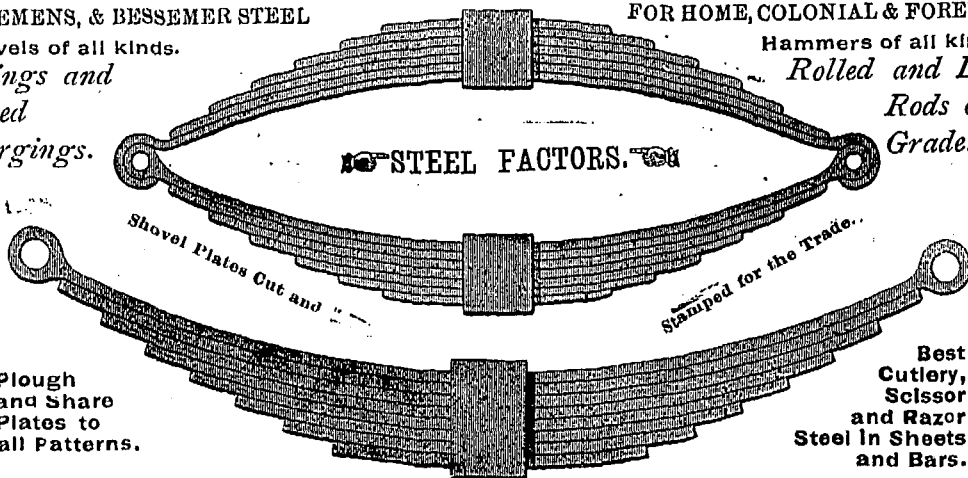

—Mr. J. C. Dana has contributed an article to The Republican on the books people read in the States. He gives data collected from 26 public libraries, respecting the books most in demand. We note that the American reader avoids reading works on South Africa except the one which, in our judgment, was written by a very ill-informed author whose anti-British prejudices color and obscure all his judgments. There are over a score of works bearing on the South African question, some written long before the war by travelers manifestly without bias, but the reading Yankee seems to have no use for any literature except such books as were compiled to pander to his prejudices.

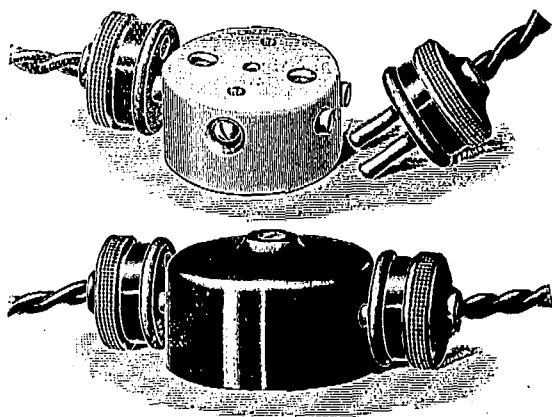
—The Superior Court, on the petition of Mr. R. D. McGibbon, Q.C., has granted a winding-up order to put the Mont-

real Cold Storage & Freezing Co. into liquidation. Mr. A. W. Stevenson was appointed provisional liquidator, to act until one is appointed by the shareholders at a meeting called for 12th September. An application was made for a similar order by the Bank of Nova Scotia, which is a creditor for \$2,500. The Court held that two orders could not be granted of like import. The original directors were:—Messrs. James E. Mullins, president; Patrick Mullin, vice-president; Thomas J. Chisholm, managing director, and D. G. McGillis, secretary. Some year ago Messrs. Chisholm, J. Ward and McGillis established the company, and Messrs. James and Patrick Mullin took stock in the buildings. Mr. Chisholm and the others furnished the cold storage. All or most of the leading produce men became interested in the project. The company has never paid a dividend. The present board has tried to carry on the business and clear off the indebtedness, but without success. The total indebtedness will amount to near \$300,000, the largest creditor being the Merchants Bank of Halifax. This bank regards its claim as fully protected. It holds £30,000 in the paper of the most substantial dairy goods merchants of England, which notes are as good as the wheat, being drawn against bills of lading. The bank has ample security for the balance of its claim. Until a detailed statement is laid before the shareholders on 12th September the exact condition of the company cannot be stated. It is, however, hoped that an arrangement will be made for the business to be kept going.

—Some parts of Ontario are experiencing a shortage in working horses, owing to recent heavy purchases on war account. In the last eight months over \$120,000 has been invested by the British and Canadian Governments in horses purchased in and about Ottawa. The capital is recognized as a depot for the business, and large shipments have been made regularly. Many of the horses intended for service in South Africa, and in the regular service, have been purchased in the country about Ottawa. Some as far west as Peterborough and others east as far as Kemptville. Toronto and Hamilton supplied a few, while an average price of \$100 was paid.

FINANCIAL.

Montreal, Thursday, Aug. 30, 1900.

The influx of gold into the Bank of England, since the war loan was floated, was sufficient to relieve the tension and to weaken the market. The reserve is still very low for this season of the year being 12 points lower than the average of the last three years at the same date. It is manifest that even a moderate strain would cause considerable uneasiness, and it will probably be the policy of the bank to put the stopper on the wheel in good time. The South African situation is becoming more hopeful but it will probably be months before there is any permanent peace established. The four commanders are evidently bent on pursuing guerilla tactics, which will not be stopped until Kruger, De Wet and Botha are en route to Ceylon. Meanwhile expenses are going on and suspense is maintained. As to China the position is not clear; nor is it likely to be for a length of time. The money market will soon ignore both seats of conflict, and attend only to affairs nearer home. The Fall demand for funds all over the continent can hardly fail to stiffen rates, though any marked advance is unlikely under present conditions. The going into liquidation of the Cold Storage Co., is much to be regretted, and has caused some surprise as the exports of dairy products have been heavy. The principal creditor, the Merchants Bank of Halifax, is well secured for all its claim. Latest reports from Manitoba and N. W. Territories are quite hopeful for a crop, estimated to be about 20 millions of bushels. The business on 'Change has been principally marking time, transactions being few and trifling. Pacific ran down to 88%. Richelieu sold at 104 to 104½; Electric, 199. Dullness is prevailing everywhere in stock exchange circles. Consols are advancing and will probably go over par this Fall. Yesterday's reports from Paris quote three per cent. rentes 100 francs 77 centimes for the account. Exchange on London, 25 francs 17½ centimes for cheques. Spanish fours closed at 75. In London gold premiums were quoted as follows: Buenos Ayres, 315.40; Madrid, 29; Lisbon, 37; Rome, 106.60. At Berlin exchange on London 20 marks 48— pfennigs for

cheques. Discount rates, short bills, 2½; three months' bills, 3½ per cent. Local money rates remain as last week.

ment with but few changes in prices. Leather and hides are moving better. Groceries are in good request at unchanged prices. Linseed oils and turpentine are both lower. As harvesting progresses heavier yields are shown all through the Dominion, this being more apparent in Manitoba, where it was most needed.

BUTTER.—The market is top heavy, and for the last day or two has been ruling very dull, foreign orders seeming to be entirely cancelled for the moment. Dealers claim prices are too high for export. Still we hear of business being done and exports show no decrease. To-day there is no difficulty in buying at $\frac{1}{2}$ c lower prices than ruled earlier in the week. Finest fresh creamery is dealt in at 21c to 21 $\frac{1}{2}$ c, although several sales are being made at quotations fully $\frac{1}{2}$ c above. Best held creamery is worth 20c to 20 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. Dairy meets with good sale; choice being worth 17c to 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ c and No. 2, 15c to 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ c.

CEMENTS, ETC.—Dealing is confined to small lots. For these current quotations are maintained. Numerous orders of this nature, however, keep cutting in to stocks, which are not accumulating. Arrivals for week ending 29th inst. were: 3,520 barrels English cement; 8,880 brls. Belgian and German cement, and 54,750 fire bricks.

CHEESE.—The market is quiet and business passing is very light. Finest colored is quoted at 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ c to 11c, do. white, 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ c to 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. No improvement is looked for until cold weather sets in. At Ormstown, Que., on the

29th, 1,374 cheese were offered, 640 sold at 10 7-16c, 21c was refused for box butter. At Woodstock, Ont., on 29th, 3,677 boxes cheese were offered, 790 sold at 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. Same figure was bid or remainder and held for consideration. At Picton, on 29th, 1,020 boxes, all colored, offered. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ c bid. No sales. At Russell, Ont., same date, 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ c was bid and some sales made.

Dry Goods.—The centre of attraction at present is in fall millinery, some importing houses holding their openings this week. Our next week's issue will treat at length of the new ideas and materials which will compose them. New fall hats will be much lower in make than—before, the high trimming which elevated the hat far above the head having disappeared in favor of the more cunning under trimmings. Suitry shades will be conspicuous, white leathers and breasts will adorn much of the hat, together with new satings in velvet. Toronto houses have done a large trade this week, while the Montreal firm whose opening is now in progress reports a percentage of trade much beyond former seasons. Dry goods houses have benefited by the influx of visitors.

Eggs.—The market is showing a wider range as to values, in keeping with the irregular condition of supplies. New laid are firm and continue high in price with sales for export and local account at 13c to 15c. Selected brings 16c to 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. Held stock which runs stale in quality, is difficult to move, quotations being 12c to 13c. No. 2 are dull at 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ c to 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ c.

FLOUR AND FEED.—A better demand has been experienced in the flour market the more active demand of a week ago being more than fully sustained, some call for export account has assisted the turn over. While the Manitoba crop, now being harvested, shows somewhat better than earlier predictions, no change has taken place in prices of grain or flour. The grain at all points throughout the Dominion shows up better in quality and this feature taken with the better yield as threshing proceeds, gives a more hopeful appearance to the far West, while adding much to the pockets of the farmers generally. Other grains are turning out well also. Feed is in very active demand, and as a result prices hold firm at former figures. Quotations are: Flour, winter wheat patents, \$3.90 to \$4.25; straight rollers, \$3.85 to \$3.90; in bags, \$1.80 to \$1.85; Manitoba patents, \$4.50; strong bakers, \$4.20; bran, bulk, \$15; shorts, \$17; mouille, \$19 to \$22 ton; oatmeal, \$3.30 to \$3.35; and \$1.60 to \$1.65 per bag; baled hay, No. 1, \$9.50 to \$10; No. 2, \$8.25 to \$9; clover and mixed, \$7.50 to \$8, in carlots on track. Best timothy hay, in bulk, is held at \$8.75 to \$9 per load, averaging 1,500 lbs.

GREEN FRUITS.—A good trade is being done and prices are fairly well sustained, except on apples and grapes which are lower. The exceedingly heavy apple crop makes it natural that the early fruit now arriving for immediate consumption should be as low as it is plentiful. Prospects favor a heavy export apple trade in which the figures will exceed the largest hitherto shown. In 1898 the shipments from Montreal were 393,000 barrels. In '99 the shipments were 286,000 brls. Much will depend this season on the condition of the initial shipments at point of destination. Sad memories are attached to the experiences of a year ago, which seriously injured the export trade for the early part of the season. Freight rates are 2s 6d to Liverpool and 3s to London and Glasgow. It is hoped packers will carefully avoid the possibility of imperfection in their work which in the past has been detrimental to the sale of Canadian fruit. U.S. shippers and packers are using extra precautions in this regard, besides adopting the new idea of wrapping individually, which will undoubtedly take hold fast, once it is recognized abroad. Quotations are: — Oranges, ovals, half boxes, \$2.75 to \$3; Sorrentos, \$3.50 to \$4; do. Jamaicas, \$7.50 brl.; lemons, 300s, \$5.50 to \$6; ban-

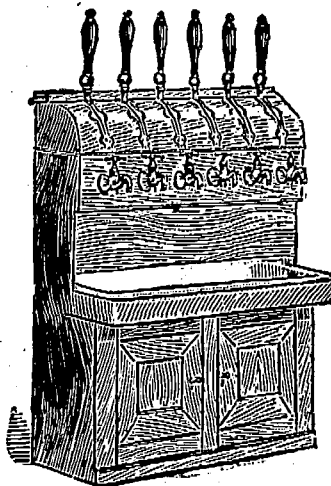

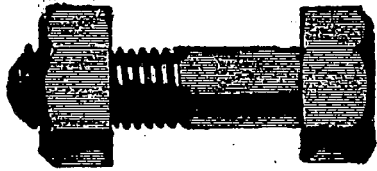

sumption of sugar, and the supply at all interior points is said to be very light owing to the fear that a sudden drop might catch any loaded. U. S. refiners are discussing the probability of much dearer sugar within 30 days on account of the scarcity of raw sugar, which it seems now, will tax the refiners' energies to obtain in sufficient quantities to supply the demand. Latest London cables report a firm and decidedly higher market for beet sugar, prices for August delivery were 4 1/4 d up, to 12s 4 1/2 d, and for September delivery, 1 1/2 d up, to 11s 3 3/4 d; cane was barely steady and 1 1/2 d lower for Java, at 13s 4 1/2 d. Rice is steady. Cable advices report the Nanjing, China, crop a failure, and foreign markets very firm. Teas are moving slowly. No further excitable news from the

East has arrived to disturb the trade and values are steady, with Japans firm at the recent advance. The heavy shortage on salmon is fully assured. A prominent dealer, at the Coast, speaking of the situation, said: "Now that the different sockeye salmon packers are away short in their season's packs, buyers in all the important markets, who earlier had supposed their wants for the season had been taken care of, are looking around for stock to replace the deficiency in their supposed purchases. As practically all packs outside Alaska are short, buyers are looking to Alaska for supplies, and this has caused a very heavy demand for red Alaska. This is noticeably evident from the English market, where the reports of heavy shortages on Puget Sound, Columbia

River, and Frazer River have caused holders to advance prices there on spot red Alaska to a point equal to \$1.15 f.o.b. San Francisco. The supply set aside by the Alaska Packers' Association for domestic consumption is as near as can be figured about 60 per cent. of the amount set aside last year. In view of the larger consumption expected from the Government sources and the heavier requirements abroad it is reasonable to expect that prices will be much higher before the new year opens. At the present rate of selling it is expected that the association will be withdrawn from the market in a short time. Buyers may make up their minds that the supply of red fish is going to be very short. The entire pack of future red in Alaska is practically placed,

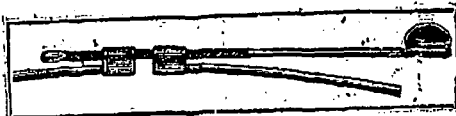
and in a very few days there will be nothing to offer. A similar condition of things was never known to exist before in the history of the salmon business. It is safe to presume the price of red Alaska will be \$1.25 before spring. It is also, safe to say that with only about 50 per cent. of the regular supply of red available at popular prices it is natural to expect that prices will advance to a point that will materially check consumption." Late cables from Greece report some holders asking 34s 6d for new crop currants, grade not stated; 35s 6d for Amalins and 36s for better grades.

HARDWARE & METALS. — Montreal wholesale houses report business good, both for shell and heavy material, a satisfactory trade being shown as the season advances. The only change in list hardware prices during the week has been in black iron pipe, which is slightly lower in most sizes, yet scarce enough to cause attention. Latest cables from London report another decline of £2 sterling in pig tin, the market, however, closing steady. Copper is dull with little doing. Pig lead is inactive, dealers looking to lower prices and holding off meantime. Latest London quotations were £17 12s 6d for soft Spanish. It is reported at Chicago that a \$60,000,000 zinc combine has been organized. It is stated that the Rogers Locomotive works at Paterson, N.J., will go into voluntary liquidation. There is a decided improvement noticeable in the iron trade in the U.S. A New York report states that inquiries for pig iron have increased very materially during the past weeks, and actual business has also improved considerably. Two leading firms state that their sales were fully four times as large as those of two weeks ago. Other dealers also reported a better demand, and it is stated by practically all dealers that furnaces are holding very stiffly to current prices. A great many orders at prices accepted a few weeks ago have been turned down by furnaces during the past week. It is stated that the old price of \$35 per ton on steel rails is being well maintained on what business is now being taken. A reduction in the prices is naturally expected for the new season, but at the moment there is no definite basis for predicting how much the price will be lowered.

LEATHER AND SHOES. — A steady movement is reported by dealers here, confined, however, to immediate wants; the cutters of leather appearing to have worked at last into the idea adhered to by dealers in so many lines of recent years, taking a little at a time and often. Prices are maintained on a somewhat better basis, as dry hides have been getting gradually firmer for some weeks. Latest reports from the States tell of tanners buying freely at current prices where available, but holders being inclined to view the situation with an eye to higher values, and accordingly they show indifference in trading. Some Quebec leather dealers report trade in that city as not so good. Shoe manufacturers here appear well satisfied with the orders received, which some claim are much in excess of last year's business notwithstanding the withdrawals on Manitoba account, some of which have lately been restored. It is rumored in Quebec that thirty-eight thousand pairs of moccasins have been purchased there within the last few days for the use of the British army in China.

PAINTS, OILS & GLASS. — Linseed oils have declined, raw is now quoted at 79c to 80c, and boiled at 82c to 83c per gallon as to quantity. Turpentine is

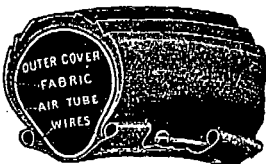

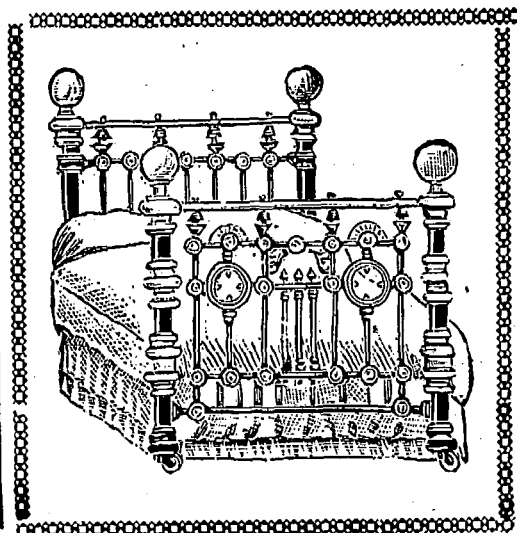

POTATOES.—Arrivals, are plentiful but holders are firmer and do not care to go lower than first quotations in disposing of stock. 40c to 45c per bag of 90 lbs. are the prices being obtained.

PROVISIONS.—The market holds steady under a fair movement. No changes are apparent in prices. Liverpool markets showed no change. Pork closed at 72s 6d; prime western lard at 35s, long cut light bacon, at 41s 6d; long cut heavy at 41s; short cut heavy at 39s 6d; Australian tallow at 26s 3d; and American tallow at 25s. Local quotations are:—Heavy Canadian short cut mess pork, \$18.50; short back, \$17.50; selected heavy short cut mess pork, boneless, special quality, \$19.50; and heavy mess pork, long cut, \$17.50; pure Canadian lard, 8½c to 10c per lb.; and compound refined lard, 7½c to 8½c per lb. Lams, 10½c to 14c and bacon, 11c to 13c per lb.

WOOL.—The local situation is not materially altered. Sales are being made but with little of the freedom which calls for satisfaction. Prices are steady at the recent low figures reported. A late London dispatch says: The wool trade during the week was inactive but firm. The arrivals to the 25th inst. for the next series of wool auction sales numbered 220,045 bales, of which 30,000 were forwarded direct. The imports for the week are as follows: New South Wales, 2,010 bales; Melbourne, 100; South Australia, 494; New Zealand, 1,454; Bussorah, 1,897; and elsewhere, 438 bales. The situation at Boston shows sales being made only to manufacturers who are in actual need of wool. Many dealers are of the opinion that no change will occur to put life in the market until after the general election. Territory wools are generally slow, but prices are maintained. Good lines of fine medium and fine, with staple, are sold for 50c on the scoured basis, while strictly staple scoured calls for 52c to 53c. Fleece wools are quiet with prices nominal.

TORONTO WHOLESALE TRADE.

Toronto, Aug. 30, 900.

Business shows some improvement this week, especially the store trade. The Exhibition is drawing many visitors from outside points, and country merchants are taking advantage of this and visiting the wholesale houses in person. The millinery houses are doing a large trade; their stocks are varied and most attractive. Groceries are quiet with prices generally steady. There is a fair business in leather and drugs at generally unchanged prices. Hardware and metals in moderate demand, with prices as a rule steady. Money unchanged; prime discounts 6 to 6½ per cent. And call loans 5 to 5½ per cent. Stocks quiet, with values generally steady. Assurance issues firmer. Latest sales: Bank of Commerce 149, Dominion Bank 229, Western Assurance 124½, C.P.R. 89, Ontario Bank 126, Imperial Bank 218, Cable 166½, Manitoba Loan 44, Richelieu 104½, Luxfer Prisms 105.

Butter, &c.—There is a good demand for choice qualities, which are scarce and firm. The best dairy tub sells at 19c to 21c, and medium at 15c to 17c. Creamery is firmer at 22c to 23c for the best rolls and at 20c to 21c for tub. Eggs dull at 12½c to 13c per dozen in case lots, and at 15c to 16c in small lots. Cheese unchanged at 11c to 11½c in a jobbing way.

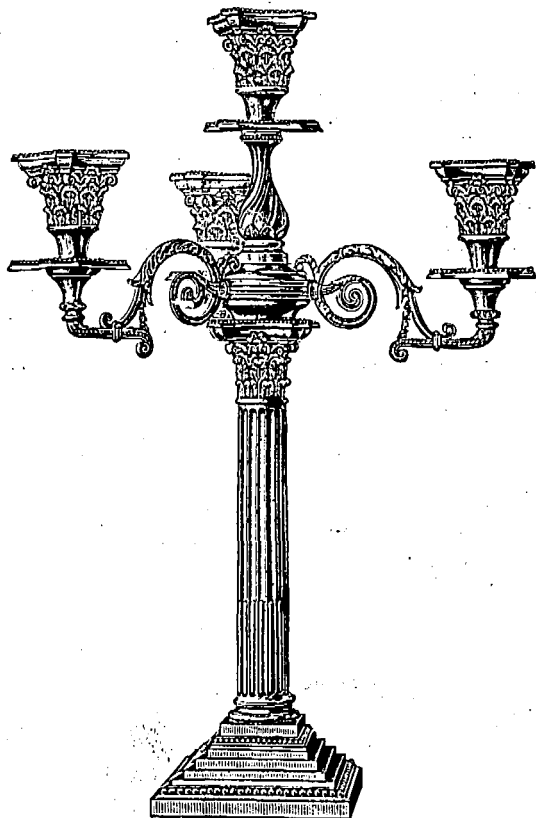

Hides and Skins.—The hide market is steady. Cured sell at 8c for cows and at 8½c for steers. Green, 7½c for No. 1 and at 6½c for No. 2. Calfskins, unchanged at 8c for No. 1 and at 7c for No. 2. Lambskins, 55c.

Live Stock.—The cattle market is a shade weaker. Exporters in moderate demand, with sales at 4½c to 5c per lb., the latter for choice. Choice butchers' cattle sell at 4½c to 4¼c per lb., and medium, 3½c to 3¼c. Stockers, dull at 2½c to 3¼c. Sheep, 3c to 3½c per lb. for choice ewes. Lambs, 4½c to 4¼c per lb., and spring lambs, \$2.75 to \$4 each. Hogs, lower, the best bacon lots bringing 6c per lb., light and heavy fats, 5½c per lb.

Provisions.—There is a good demand for cured meats, which rule firm. Mess pork, \$16.50 to \$17, and short cut at \$18 to \$18.50. Bacon, firm, at 8½c for car lots of long clear and at 8¼c to 9c for small lots. Rolls, 10c to 10½c. Hams, smoked, 12c to 13½c. Lard is higher at 8½c to 9¼c, according to package. Dried apples, 5½c to 6c. Potatoes, new, 30c to 35c per bushel. Hops are dull, at 13c to 14c. Beans, \$1.10 to \$1.20, for common and \$1.70 to \$1.75 for hand-picked.

Wool.—There is very little doing in fleece which is quoted at 16½c to 17½c. Unwashed, 10c to 10½c. Pulled wools in fair demand at 18c to 19c for supers, and at 20c to 21c for extras.
