


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

NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying Missionaries to strug-

gling Congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid Congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. A Fund to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.

6. To provide Bibles, Prayer Books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed.

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Churchwardens, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several Missions and Congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the Missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the Congregations served by the Missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust, (e) the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund.

Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Church Society was held in the Cathedral Church Hall, Quebec, on Wednesday, the seventh day of February, at two P.M.

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After Prayers, the minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board, and Clergy Trust Committee, were read, adopted and ordered to be printed. The Report of the S. Francis District Association was also read, received and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report of the Church Society.

Statements of the accounts of the Church Society, Diocesan Board, Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund, and Local Endowment Funds, were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

One Life Member (the Earl of Aberdeen) and eleven Ordinary Members were then elected.

45 VICT., CHAP. 89.

An Act to authorize the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, to consolidate certain Endowment Funds.

[Assented to 27th May, 1882.]

Preamble.

Whereas the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec has, by its petition, represented that it is in charge of certain endowment funds for the support of various Parishes and Missions within the Diocese of Quebec, and has prayed that the said Church Society should be authorized so to distribute any losses which may occur, through failure in investments, as to make them fall proportionately over the whole of such endowments held by the Society; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petitioners; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

Consolidation of endow-ment funds of society for certain purposes.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec is authorized, so far, to consolidate the said endowment funds, so placed and hereafter to be placed in the hands of the said society, under deeds of trust for investment, as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur through failure in investments proportionately over the whole.

Consolidation limited. 2. The said consolidation of the said intrusted endowment funds shall extend, only so far as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur, through failure in investments proportionately over the whole, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Note.—The following parishes or missions have agreed to the by-law on the consolidation of endowments, viz:—Barford and Hereford, Cape Cove and Percé, Cookshire, Dudswell, Gaspé Basin, Ireland and South Inverness, Levis, Malhaie, Inverness, Rivière-du-Loup, Bourg Louis, Kingsey, Magog and Georgeville, Stanstead, Durham, Leeds, Brompton and Windson, Sandy Beach, Hatley, Coaticook, Melbourne and Richmond, Frampton East and West, Compton, St. Sylvester, Portneuf, Three Rivers.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1893.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 7th, 1894.)

In our last report to the Church Society we mentioned the removal by death of our late revered Bishop and the consecration of his successor; we also dwelt upon that great fact in our Diocesan history, the jubilee of our Church

Society.

We are now glad and thankful to be able to report a year of certain and healthy growth; for our Bishop, in his account of his first year's work, tells us that during the twelve months ending the 18th of September last, he had confirmed one thousand and thirty-five persons; and although the English population of the Diocese of Quebec has, during the last ten years, greatly diminished in numbers, and in Quebec itself there has been a loss by death and removal of one thousand one hundred and lifty-nine church people, yet, owing to the energy and self-denying work of the Clergy of our Diocese, our Church of England population, if we leave out of account the city and county of Quebec, has during the ten years actually increased, and from the reports of the country Clergy we acknowledge with much thankfulness a steady advance of Church life all through the Diocese; and, notwithstanding the past year has been one of unusual commercial depression, yet the financial condition of the Society has not really suffered in consequence, although the following statement, comparing last year with the previous one, shows an apparent decrease of nearly fifty-five dollars.

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But this decrease is only apparent, for since the accounts have been closed, an offertory and several subscriptions, amounting to two hundred and forty-four dollars and six cents belonging to last year's account, but which reached the Treasurer's hands too late to be incorporated in the year's accounts, have been received, which shews a real increase of one hundred and eighty-nine dollars and thirty-five cents instead of a decrease.

Of course, too, we miss the proceeds of Mrs. Williams' Christmas Tree, which generally ranged between one hun-

dred and fifty and two hundred dollars.

We observe with much satisfaction, an increase in the returns from the three Deaneries of St. Francis, Megantic and Gaspé, as compared with the previous year.

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages; in the support of Schools; in the promotion of Local Endowments; in the Education of the children of the Clergy; and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

During the past year, the following grants have been paid from this fund, showing the amount of good that has been accomplished through its means, and the great claim it has upon the support and sympathy of every member of of the Church in this Diocese:—

\$400 outfits for four Clergymen, entering for the first

time upon their country Missions.

\$100 towards a new Church at Hopetown, in the Parish of New Carlisle.

\$100 towards a new Church at L'Avenir, in the Parish of Durham.

\$50 towards a new Church, at Beattie's Settlement, in the Mission of Leeds.

\$100 towards a Parsonage at Fitch Bay. \$100 towards a Parsonage at Melbourne.

\$150 for the augmentation of the Drummondville Endowment Fund.

\$150 for the purposes of Education.

\$166.15 towards the Fund for the Education of the Children of the Clergy.

\$52 for free grants from the Depository.

And \$100 has been promised towards a new Church at North Hatley, which will be paid as soon as the conditions of the Society are fulfilled.

MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries, in connection with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts: Assessments from the Rural Congregations; A grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, and the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund, administered by the Diocesan Board.)

We are very sorry to note in this fund a decrease of \$29.66. This small decrease would be a matter of little importance; but the total raised last year was \$162.44 less than the amount raised in the preceding year, so that these two facts taken together ought to urge upon every well-wisher of the Diocese increased interest and liberality, and ought to lead to a more vigorous maintenance of this most important fund for the time to come.

For full and interesting information concerning the successful and self-denying labours of the Missionary Clergy of this Diocese, we refer our members to the reports of the country Clergy, the report of the Diocesan Board, and the report from the St. Francis District Association of the

Church Society.

PENSION FUND.

(For the support of aged and infirm Clergymen.)

Six Clergymen have during the past year received their well-earned annuities from this fund, amounting in the aggregate to \$2,510. By the death of the Rev. E. C. Parkin a pension of \$600 will revert to this fund

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Annuities to the amount of \$3,087.50 have, during the past year, been paid to nine Widows and six Children of Clergymen who, during their life time, were connected with this Diocese.

By the coming of age of one of the six children mention-

ed above an annuity of \$50 will lapse.

EDUCATION FUND.

Your Board begs to acknowledge with many thanks the annual grant of eighty pounds sterling from the Colonial and Continental Church and School Society, for the cause of Education in this Diocese.

From the returns made by the Teachers and the letters we have received from the several Clergymen, in whose Missions these schools are situated, it can be easily seen that the aid from this fund is much appreciated, and that through its means a great and permanent good is being done to the cause of the Church in this Diocese; indeed in many instances, but for the help this fund affords, the schools could not be carried on.

FUND FOR THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY.

During the past year, Grants amounting to \$740 have been paid towards the education of eight children of Clergymen in the Diocese, and of this amount we are indebted to the friend of the Diocese, Robert Hamilton, Esq., for the sum of \$370.

We are glad to note an increase of \$74.71 towards this fund, but still we are bound to add that it does not receive the support from the country parishes which its importance deserves, \$18.60 being all that was subscribed last year for this particular object outside Quebec.

PATRON OF THE SOCIETY.

We have much pleasure in reporting that His Excellency the Governor General of the Dominion of Canada, the Right Honorable the Earl of Aberdeen, has consented to become the Patron of the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and has qualified himself to become a Life Member of the same.

BISHOP WILLIAMS' MEMORIAL FUND.

The appeal on behalf of this fund has met with a success at once remarkable and gratifying, considering the comparative poverty of the Diocese.

The Treasurer of the Church Society acknowledges to have received on its behalf thirty-four thousand dollars, whilst six thousand in addition are promised within the next eighteen months.

Designed as a memorial to the late revered prelate, and wishing as a part of its centenary thank offering to Almighty God to relinquish the large subsidy now received from the S. P. G. for the support of her Missionary Clergy, that the money thus liberated might be free to be devoted to other parts of the Master's vineyard, the Diocese had the noblest instincts of her children to appeal to, and the response already met with, speaks volumes for the large heartedness and high religious principles of the Churchmen of Quebec Diocese.

It must, however, still be borne in mind, that it will require the interest of at least sixty thousand dollars to take the place of the S. P. G. grant now being given up. We hope, therefore, that the fund will continue to be augmented until this figure at least is reached.

CHURCH HELPERS' ASSOCIATION.

Our best and most hearty thanks are again due to our friends of the Church Helpers' Association for their kind and successful efforts on behalf of the Church Society.

LIFE MEMBERS.

We should like to see a few more names added to our list of Life Members, for although we have every year to record the loss by death of several old friends of the Diocese, the number added during the last ten years has only been eight.

When it is considered that the qualification of Life Membership is only a donation of \$50 in one sum, there ought surely to be many friends, who would be glad to subscribe

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OBITUARY.

Death, we are sorry to say, has been active among us

during the past year.

In the month of October last, we had to deplore the loss of one who for many years was the valued Honorary Treasurer of the Church Society, the late Commissary-General, Matthew Bell Irvine, C. B., C. M. G. Faithful in the discharge of everything he took in hand, devoted to the interests of his church, kind and sympathising with all with whom he came in contact, he was beloved and respected by all who knew him, and we may safely say that the name of Matthew Bell Irvine will never cease to be gratefully remembered by his many friends, not only in Quebec, but, scattered all over the world.

Then, on the twenty-first day of December last, there passed away to his rest one of the oldest Clergymen of this

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last, there en of this Diocese, the Reverend Edward Cullen Parkin, who died at his son's residence at Waterville, in the county of Compton, aged 76 years. The son of a Quebec Missionary, Mr. Parkin was ordained in the year 1844, by Bishop G. J. Mountain, and from then till 1890, was actively employed in his Master's service in this Diocese, more especially in the Mission of Valcartier and Cookshire. In the year 1890, enfeebled by age and ill-health, he retired from active labour and enjoyed his well-earned annuity from the Pension Fund of this Diocese. A good churchman and a faithful and true friend. Mr. Parkin's removal will be severely felt by all who had the privilege of knowing him.

Then in the death of Mrs. Nicolls, a member of the Church Society for over forty years, a link has been broken in the chain which connects us with the earliest history of the Church Society, and with some of those who were most instrumental in building it up, for she was not only the daughter of the late revered Bishop Mountain, in whose Episcopate this Society was founded, and to whom its interests were always a chief care, but she was also the wife of the late Dr. Nicolls, Principal of Bishop's College, whose zealous labors in the Eastern Townships on behalf of the Society are still fresh in the minds of many; and, too, she was sister of the late Revd. Armine W. Mountain, and it was with her kind consent that, in the year 1877, he founded the Mountain Endowment Fund, for the support of one or more Archdeaconries in the Diocese of Quebec, or in the event of the division of the Diocese, with the consent of the Bishop of Quebec, towards the Endowment of such new Bishopric.

In so far as human judgment may be expressed, Mrs. Nicolls, in a quiet, unostentatious way, lived the life of the Christian lady, faithful in the relations of daughter, wife and mother, because true to her obligations as a member of Christ's Church. She has passed away to her rest, honored in the affections of those who best knew her, and respected by all.

We deeply regret also, to report the deaths of Mrs. G. Okill Stuart, W. Ashe, Esq., and John Lovell, Esq., of Montreal, all Life-Members, and of T. H. Jones, Esq., for many years a useful member of the Central Board, and at the time of his decease one of the Auditors of the Church Society.

THE QUEBEC DIOCESAN GAZETTE.

Though not distinctly bearing on the work of the Church Society yet, as connected with the interests of the Diocese at large, we feel that we must say a word of welcome to the publication called *The Quebec Diocesan Gazette*, which has just appeared in our midst, and which proposes to give month by month, not only accounts of the Bishop's movements, but also sketches of all that is interesting in every part of the Diocese, so that all may know what is going on around them, and thus each Parish or Mission may have a fellow feeling in the needs and necessities, the progress and process of all other Parishes.

And we would suggest to the Clergy of the Diocese, the desirability of making this little publication a success, by sending to the Editor, the Rev. R. C. Parrock, any information of Church work going on in their parishes, that may be of interest or encouragement to the Diocese at large, and also the names of as many of their parishioners as they can persuade to subscribe to the same, the low price of 25 cents a year, bringing it within the reach of every church family

in the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF MISSIONS

TO THE

Diocesan Church Society for the year 1893.

The following is the abstract of the revenue account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1893:—

The chief points worthy of note in the above statement in connection with the future responsibilities of the Board are: (1) The increased amount paid on account of stipends, being \$1507 more than in 1892; (2) the large amount received from assessments; (3) the conditions attached to the S. P. G. Grant and the probable position of the Clergy Trust Fund; and (4) the reduction of the income from the Mission Fund of the Church Society.

The increase in stipends is due, partly to the uninterrupted occupancy of all the Missions, partly to the addition in some cases in the rate of payment from longer service, and partly to the reorganization of the Parish of Bury and the Missionary District of Scotstown and Lake Megantic, by which two other Missions have been placed on the Board's list.

In referring to the second point, your Board can only regard as a subject of congratulation the fact that the congregations have been upon the whole so faithful to their obligations. The fact that a large amount of arrears due at the close of 1892 and paid during 1893 is included in the

item of assessments received, whilst the arrears for 1893 are comparatively small, accounts for the excess in assessments received over the actual amounts agreed for.

The bearing which the conditions attached to the S. P. G. grant, and which the probable amount of support to be derived from the Clergy Trust Fund have upon the future Missionary work of the Diocese, is a subject of the highest importance. The S. P. G. having accepted the scheme of reduction laid before the Church Society at its last annual meeting the income of the Diocesan Board from this source will be, in 1894 and 1895, \$1,000 less than in 1893; in 1896 and 1897 a further reduction of \$1,000 will take place; in 1898 and 1899 the grant will amount to only about \$1,500, and the last year of the century will find us dependent entirely upon our own resources. Whilst your Board sees no reason to regret the part it took in proposing this scheme of reduction, which the sense of justice, the financial condition of the Diocese, and confidence in the good-will of Churchmen belonging to it fully justified, it is well to remind ourselves that our present position demands additional effort, now and in the future, if the progress which has hitherto, by God's blessing, characterised the Missionary work of the Diocese, is to be continued. The surplus revenue of the Clergy Trust Fund is, next to the assessments, the largest source of assured income; but, it will be observed that the full proportion of this surplus to which your Board is entitled by the By-Law has been received during the year, and that still the expenditure could not have been met without further reducing the small balance in hand at the close of 1892. A motion is to be considered by your Society at the present meeting to place a larger proportion of the surplus revenue of this Fund at the disposal of the Diocesan Board; but in view of the fact that the securities of this Fund, representing a considerable amount, have already matured, and more will mature from time to time, necessiting reinvestments at a lower rate of interest, it is not probable that much increase to the income of the Board will be derived from this source in the future.

There is special reason then to draw attention to the fourth point enumerated above, viz.: the reduction in income from the Mission Fund. The reduction, it is true, is small, but it has been pointed out by your Board, in successive Reports, that, as it is the only source of income capable of any degree

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of expansion, the advancement of the Church's work in the Diocese is really dependent upon a generous support of this Fund. It is with regret, therefore, that when a liberal increase of subscriptions is so much needed it is necessary to record even a slight falling off. Your Board would again earnestly endeayour to impress upon members of the Church, in city and country, its own deep conviction that in supporting the Mission Fund of the Church Society, and in that way only, will they best further the work of our Diocesan Missions.

It is most gratifying on the other hand to observe the great success which has attended the work of raising the Bishop Williams' Memorial Mission Fund. The interest of this Fund, which is to form part of the resources of the Diocesan Board, will help in some measure to supply the place

of the S. P. G. grant.

Most of the agreements with the various congregations throughout the Diocese, expiring on 31st Dec., 1893, your Board has been engaged for some time in negotiations with the view of securing a general increase. These negotiations were carried on in the first instance by the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, who has held conferences with the people on the subject in the Gaspé, Megantic, St. Francis and North Shore Districts, followed subsequently by correspondence with the Clergy and wardens. The complete result cannot vet be given, as in some cases the negotiations have not been concluded; but your Board is in a position to state that for the most part the Missions have cheerfully acceded to the proposal made to them. The total increase will not be very large, but it is by no means disappointing, considering the loss through death and removals the Church population has sustained in many Missions. In fixing the amount of assessment to be required from any particular congregation, your Board endeavours to aim at the principle of asking for a contribution proportionate to the means of the people, and when it is clear that this principle is in danger of violation it becomes a duty to consider whether the interests of the Church will not be better served by withdrawing in part. or even altogether, the aid afforded.

Missions which, after fair trial, present no indications of growth ought not to remain under the impression that they have a vested right to permanent support. It is with due regard to this view that your Board, instead of establishing

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ations of that they vith due iblishing the Congregations of Scotstown, Canterbury, St. Thomas, Bury and Lake Megantic, as a new Mission, has specially designated them a Missionary District, the Clergyman being appointed to its charge for the limited period of three years. At the close of that period it will be the duty of the Diocesan Board to consider whether the progress achieved and the prospects for the future will justify the adoption of this Missionary District as a permanent Mission.

With the consent of all parties concerned, the new District, with the Clergyman resident at Scotstown, was made to include two Congregations in the Parish of Bury and the adoption of the latter as a Mission of the Board.

The District of which Hereford is the centre, and to which —equally with Scotstown and Lake Megantic—the Archdeacon has given much labour and devoted care, is in charge of a Clergyman, but is not connected with your Board which has not yet been able to see its way to the establishment of a new Mission in that direction. The Board makes a grant of \$100 for Missionary work in Hereford and the Bishop makes himself responsible for the Missionary's stipend.

It is with satisfaction that your Board expresses its conviction of the value of the work which is being done by the Clergy serving the various Missions and Parishes on its list; and it is only just to the Church-Wardens to say that it is owing in great measure to the faithful discharge of their important duties that the relations of the Diocesan Board with the various Congregations they represent are on so satisfactory a footing. The reports of the Clergy bear ample testimony to the valuable aid rendered by these officers of the Church in all matters relating to the well being of the temporalities, and at the same time afford evidence of increasing appreciation of the means of grace, and the general progress which has taken place.

Apart from the four self-supporting Parishes connected with the Board there are thirty-three Missions on its list at present, all of which have had the ministrations of the Church supplied to them without interruption during the year.

All which is respectfully submitted.

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, ident. Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society for the year 1893.

It is plain from the Reports of the various Parishes and Missions of the District that a good and growing work is being done for the Church in this part of the Diocese of

Quebec.

It is no slight evidence of the hold the Church has upon the people of these Townships, that in a year of financial depression, such as the past year has been, the income of the Church in the District, as so far reported—(two Parishes have sent in no reports)—should have reached the large sum of \$28,070.14, being \$2,260.76 more than was reported last year; and that, of this amount, no less a sum than \$4,048.90 should have been devoted to objects outside the Parishes and Missions in which it was raised, being \$946.88 more than was so devoted last year.

Nor can we fail to mark as a hopeful sign, our people's growing appreciation of the Church's Services, especially of the greatest of all Services, the Holy Communion. In many reports we read of increased attendance at the Sacrament of the Altar. In not a few Parishes there is now a weekly celebration, and a regular observance of the Holy Days and Saints' Days of the Church. In more than one or two of our Churches Daily Prayer is said, either throughout or during a part of the year. And in many quarters gratitude is expressed for the increased brightness and heartiness of wor-

ship.

The improvement in Church music, too, due chiefly to the efforts of Mr. Arthur Dorey, the able Organist and Choirmaster of St. Peter's, Sherbrooke, and referred to in almost every report, is worthy of note. At the instance, and largely at the expense of His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, Mr. Dorey has visited the different Parishes, from time to time, and with his own rare skill has drilled the different Choirs into greater efficiency in rendering the Services of the Church and the Praises of Almighty God. "The Choir has benefitted by the training of Mr. Dorey." "A very perceptible improvement in the Choir through the instruction of Mr. Dorey." "Bishop Dunn's musical blessing

through Mr. Dorey." Such are a few of the many references

made in the reports to this good work.

The gradual but real development of interest, among the laity, in the work of the Church is also a sign of life and progress. Almost every report refers with gratitude to work done by the people in advancing the interests of the Church. There are now few Parishes which have not a Guild and a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Young Men's Associations are increasing in number. It is no longer a well nigh impossible thing to induce a layman to take duty as a Reader; nor is there the prejudice on the part of the people against lay-reading which used to exist. Not only have the members of the Lennoxville Brotherhood of Readers taken duty, most acceptably, in various parts of the District during the year, in some cases for lengthened periods of time, but laymen from the purely secular walks of life have done good and acceptable work as Lay Readers in various Parishes and Missions, reading the lessons for the overtaxed Clergy and taking the Service alone when the Clergy could not act.

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Another proof of the Church's vitality and progressiveness, and one that is very full of promise for the future, is her increasing interest in the Church's training of the young. It is happily coming more and more to be realized that the hope of the Church lies on the young, and that the Church's future depends on her present discharge of her duty to her children. Every where efforts are being made to increase the efficiency of the Sunday-School. Catechising is now being practised in many of our Parishes. Parents are being reminded of their duty. Societies like the Ministering League are being used to reach and hold the children. Many of our Clergy visit and teach in the public day Schools. Bible classes are springing up on every hand to supplement earlier training. Historical lectures are given And more pains are being taken than ever before to give proper instruction to Candidates for Confirmation.

And no doubt, as a natural result of the progressive spirit to which all this points, we hear the cry in many quarters for more Clergy to take up the expanding work. In Stanstead, Waterville, Danville, Eaton, Hereford, openings of great promise are reported. If the work is to go on, there must be more men in the field. The Church extension work of a few years ago, which under God's blessing resulted in the establishment of several new Missions—all of which are doing well,—needs itself to be extended.

This is surely the best evidence of the reality of the Church's work. And it is not merely a matter of thankfulness; it is a great responsibility. It is our bounden duty to weigh well the question how to meet the demands thus made upon us. And we need not doubt that God will show us how if we watch and pray and really seek to know.

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It is of course true that there are the usual discouragements. The work of the Church is often a hard battle against indifference and prejudice. Among other hindrances the lack of true Church principles; complications resulting from mixed marriages; scanty and sometimes unpromising material to work upon; and the grievous evils which grow out of the divisions of Christianity; are all referred to, directly or indirectly, in the various reports of the year. And then there are the discouragements arising from the isolation of the Clergy; and the Clergy's sense of inability to accomplish the tasks assigned them. Several Clergymen speak despondently of the "vast field they had to cover." One says: "I must repeat my regret that I cannot visit the families in my outlying districts as I ought to do." Another laments that he "can devote but little time to the instruction of children, some of whom are sadly in need of it." And many regret their inability to give Services as often as they would and as often as they think they ought to do if their work is to tell.

But over against these discouragements we find also many special causes of thankfulness. It is hopeful for example to read of 49 Baptisms in one country Parish (Waterville); and of a total of 377 all told. It is hopeful to read of 68 marriages. There are a few places where the Church population is actually diminishing. The property of the Church is increasing in many quarters. New Churches are reported in Lake Megantic, North Hatley, " L'Avenir." Legacies are spoken of at Waterville and other places. Bishop's College Chapel has been successfully restored, and needs only stalls and second flooring to make it practically complete. A beautiful and sweet toned Organ has been erected in it at a cost of \$1,700. Several Memorial Stained Windows have been promised for it, as a part of a plan of historical windows suggested by the Bishop. Compton College has a new Skating Rink. In many Parishes Churches have been improved and beautified by the devoted labours of Church-women. For example, in Lennoxville a new and beautiful Altar has been presented by the Guild, to St. George's Church, with a purple Altar Cover and Desk Hanging. A purple Altar Cover Desk Hanging and Stole have been presented by St. Peter's Guild, Sherbrooke, to their Parish Church. Bells have been purchased for Way's Mills, Fitch Bay, Lake Megantic and East Sherbrooke.

It is further a matter of special thankfulness that our Educational Institutions at Lennoxville and Compton continue to receive a fair amount of support and to do an excellent work. The Bishop Williams' Memorial Mission Fund, too, which has grown beyond the most sanguine expectations of its promoters, has been nobly supported in the District, although there are yet a few Parishes to be heard from, and many individual Church people who have not subscribed to it.

It is moreover specially encouraging to note the recovery of ground, formerly occupied by the Church, but given up, now after many years' trial of dissent, gladly welcoming our return. The following words are from the Report of the Parish of Eaton: "The original Parish of Eaton consisted of the Churches of Cookshire and Eaton Corner, but when the Church at Eaton Corner was burned, the Service there was given up, and now, about seventy years after, the Church Service is resumed. The Bishop's visit to Eaton Corner, on 19th November, was the first visit of a Bishop since Bishop Stewart." This recovered outpost, without solicitation, pledges itself to pay a considerable sum towards the support of the Church.

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And finally it is special cause for thankfulness that we have in the District a body of Clergy whose heart is in their work and who are devoting their best energies to reaching and holding their people; the reports give abundant proof of this, particularly in the matter of parochial visiting, one recording no less than one thousand five hundred and sixty-eight visits in eleven months; that we have an Archdeacon of untiring zeal and devotion, whose influence has been felt throughout the length and breadth of the District; and that we have a Bishop always ready to come to our aid, and whose visits the Clergy describe as delightful, refreshing and strengthening!

With so many blessings to cheer us, we surely have no cause to be discouraged in our work of extending the Church,

which we believe to be a Branch of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church founded by Our Blessed Lord Himself.

ACTON.

The Rev. Louis C. Wurtele reports:-

Although this Mission is in the midst of an intensely French and Roman Catholic population, it still holds its own. It is true every now and again it has to bear the removal of some of its English families to another part of the

country.

This year, Dr. Owen C. Brown decided to leave and take his residence in Detroit, Michigan. He had been practising in this locality since 1874. In him the Mission had a man of character well versed on all subjects, standing high also in the esteem of every one. From 1875 to the present time, that is for a little over eighteen years, he had been the Clergyman's Warden, and from 1884 our delegate to the Synod. His departure was quite a blow to the whole community, both English and French. When such a loss comes upon a Country Mission, it is well to remember that God takes care of His own and not to be too much discouraged. Before leaving, Mrs. Brown kindly presented the Church with a set of new curtains, which greatly improved its appearance.

In the first week in September, the Venerable Archdeacon Roe visited the Mission in re the assessments to Diocesan Board for the next three years. He is always a welcome visitor. The next day being the first Sunday of the month, he spent it in the Mission and was Celebrant at the administration of the Holy Communion.

On June the 23rd, the Acton Congregation was favoured with the pastoral visit of our Bishop, and four candidates received the Holy Rite of Confirmation.

As His Lordship passes this way in making his visits to Drummondville, this Mission is doubly favoured. The Grand Trunk Railway trains do not make connection with

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those of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and he is (willingly, I trust) constrained to spend several hours in Acton.

So, on Thanksgiving Day, we were gratified in having him as Celebrant at the Holy Communion, and preacher.

This time His Lordship came upon us unawares, but we all greatly prize his visits, as his presence shines like a sun-

beam in the Parsonage as well as in the Church.

With respect to the Church Services in this Mission, Matins and Evensong are held every Sunday in St. Mark's Church, Town of Acton. In Danby, at 3 P.M., either Evensong or Litany Service alternately, except on the last Sunday of the month, on which day the afternoon Service is in West Wickham.

Once a fortnight, a Service, entirely in French, is held on a Wednesday evening, at the house of one of those reclaim-

ed from Roman Catholicism.

I am happy to state that the congregations have improved in making the responses. This makes the Services more hearty, and betokens greater interest in spiritual things, and gratefully I give thanks to Almighty God for His mercy in leading on the members of my flock gradually in the way of salvation.

ASCOT CORNER AND WESTBURY.

The Rev. H. E. Wright reports:-

When I look back to the time that I made my last report and compare my plans and hopes of that time with their present fulfilment, I must confess that there is a very marked difference between them, and not on the side to afford encouragement. Still some small advance has been made, and I hope some good done. The Services have been continued regularly, one at Ascot Corner, and two at East Angus each Sunday. Holy Communion has been celebrated three times a month, but I hope before I make my next report, I may be able to say that I have it every Sunday at least. Besides these Services we have a Sunday School regularly at Angus. Mrs. Wright, Mrs. Charnock and Mr. A. A. Evens have been of great assistance to me as teachers.

In addition to this I have lately organized two Bible Classes, one for young women under Mrs. Woodrow, a good

capable teacher, the other for young men, of which I have charge. Our beginning is encouraging.

I have also held regular fornightly Services at the Lothrop School-House, and weekly Wednesday Evening Services at the Westbury Church.

Cottage Services have been held occasionally in Stoke. These are attended by all, and the effect has been very encouraging.

The chief event of the year was the visit of the Bishop in the month of June, when four candidates were presented for Confirmation. The number is small, but in no way represents the labour involved. In every case the candidate was prepared at home. If any have ever prepared candidates in that way they will understand what it means. Another reason for the smallness of the number is that there are no children of the Church of the right age. Now, nearly every candidate must be won over to the Church.

I was absent at Grosse Isle during the month of August, and Mr. Avery, of Bishop's College, conducted the Services of the Church very acceptably, and the people will always be pleased to see him again.

I have visited the schools as often as possible, but not as often as I should like.

East Angus—During the past Summer I have had Matins regularly in the village Church, and, though not many are able to attend, there were always a few.

A well has been sunk on the Parsonage grounds at a cost of \$90. This will be a great convenience; as hitherto water for all purposes had to be carried from a great distance.

Ascot Corner.—The attendance at the Services of the Church here is better and the number of those who are regular Communicants is more than doubled.

A horse-shed has been built here lately, and I was greatly encouraged by the ready response given when I called upon them for work—some men coming three and four days in succession, who yet live so near the Church that they will never use it for their own horses.

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BARFORD.

The Rev. G. H. A. Murray reports:-

The Church work of this Mission presents nothing of more than usual interest to record. As in past years, so during the current year, Sunday and week-day Services and parochial visiting have been regularly kept up. True, in the discharge of these duties one meets with discouragement; yet, considering the difficulties which the Church has to overcome in these parts, there is also much reason to be thankful for the past, and to feel encouraged as to the future. In one way, at least, if in no other (but I trust in other ways as well), I can report progress, i.e., with regard to finances. This is manifested by the hearty manner in which the people took hold of the Bishop Williams' Memorial Mission Fund. The total amount subscribed is two hundred and seventeen dollars, out of which one hundred and eleven dollars have been paid. Only one or two individuals really refused to contribute. In addition to this the several Congregations have increased their respective assessment twenty-nine per cent, on the average. The total amount contributed for extra parochial objects, apart from the B. W. M. M. F., though not quite so large as last year, yet, everything considered, is satisfactory.

A visit from the Bishop of the Diocese, on the 21st and 22nd of January, was hailed with delight by all. Having spent three days at Hereford and Hall's Stream, in strengthening the Church by visiting, preaching, baptizing and confirming, His Lordship came to Perryboro' and held a Confirmation Service, followed by a celebration of the Holy Communion. Three candidates were confirmed and, with twenty-eight others, received the Holy Communion. Next day two adults were Baptized, six candidates were Confirmed, and upwards of thirty partook of the Lord's Supper at Dixville. On the same day a Confirmation was held at Stanhope, where five were presented to receive the Apostolic rite.

A few words now as to what has been done at each of the stations.

St, Cuthbert's, Discribe.—Sunday-School is held here at 9.30, and Service at 10.30 A.M., every Sunday and on the Great Festivals throughout the year. I was obliged to discontinue the Evening Service on Sundays in part, in

order to keep Stanhope open every Sunday, and Averill fortnightly, as long as I had charge of it. At the Wednesday evening Services I have been giving instruction in Church history. The Services, on the whole, have not been so well attended this year as usual; but I think the decrease in numbers can be traced to removals and sickness. There are very few young people in this village who belong to the Church, consequently the attendance at Sunday-School is small; then there is a lack of interest in the Church's Services and work on the part of those who do profess to belong to us. We have to mourn the loss of Alice Johnson, in her lifetime one of our most faithful Sunday-School scholars, who entered into the rest of Paradise, October 6th.

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St. Lawrence's, Burford.—One side of the roof of the Church has been re-shingled this year, the other side having been done last year, and the plastering of the ceiling has been repaired. Dr. Ward bore all the expenses connected with this work.

St. Paul's, Stanhope.—This congregation has its ups and downs; still there are not wanting signs of advance. These are attested by an increase in the average attendance at the Services, more hearty responses, and a larger number of communicants. I would that it were possible to give this congregation Morning Service more frequently. During part of the year, when I was able to procure the services of a student, Morning and Evening Services were held; but since I have given up Averill, I have been obliged to abandon the regular fortnightly Morning Service.

In the meantime, rather than have the Church closed on the alternate Sundays, I have held a Service at 7.30 P.M. after my return from Perryboro'; it is not possible, however, to do this when the roads are bad. What seems to me to be absolutely necessary to the well-being of this congregation is more Sunday Services, and a good Sunday School or Children's Service. Owing to the distance I have to cover and the number of Services, I can devote but little time on Sundays to the instruction of the children, some of whom are sadly in need of it.

This congregation has to thank Mrs. Stetson for two banners, which she presented to the Church, and Mrs. Glenday, an old parishioner, for two beautiful book marks. The Church here has been much improved by recent

The building has been raised and a foundation of granite, eighteen inches in height, put under it; a cellar has been dug and a furnace put in; the approaches have been graded, and a drain dug. As the water will no longer have a chance to settle around the foundation, it is hoped that there will be no further danger of the frosts disturbing The whole cost amounted to about \$170, of which amount the Ladies' Guild raised \$47 and the congregation about \$75. I have to thank Hon. E. J. Price, Robt. Hamilton, Esq., and the Church Helpers' Association for liberal subscriptions, which will more than cover the balance. The extra strain brought to bear on the people to meet this demand, as well as the amount raised for the B. W. M. M. F., together with the effect of the financial depression in the mill employees, who comprise a good part of the congregation, has come in the way of the Church Society collections here.

Church of the Advent, Perryboro'.—Fortnightly Sunday Services have been kept up during the past year, with occasional celebrations of the Holy Communion, at 7.30 or 8 A.M. The congregation is steady; the number of communicants is about three quarters of the whole. The Guild continues to do a good work. I constantly regret my inability to give this deserving congregation a weekly Sunday Service.

The thanks of this congregation are due to Mr. William Melrose, of Hartford, Connecticut, a former resident of this place, for two beautiful quadruple plated silver alms dishes.

I must not close this report without referring to the good results accruing from Mr. Dorey's visits. Already there is a marked improvement in the singing and responding. The Church in the Eastern Townships is very much indebted to the Bishop for his kindness in sending Mr. Dorey to such congregations as need his assistance.

I take this opportunity of thanking each one of the following Clergymen for delivering a sermon or address to one or other of the congregations in this Mission during the year: The Venerable Archdeacon Roe, the Reverends Principal Adams, Canon Foster, A. Stevens, E. A. W. King, W. P. Forsythe, Chas. H. Brooks and N. P. Yates.

BARNSTON.

The Rev. C. H. Brooks reports:-

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Way's Mills—Average attendance: morning, forty-eight; evening, seventeen.

Barnston.—Attendance, from eight to thirty-five.

During Lent weekly Services were held in each place, and during Holy Week a daily evening Service in the Parsonage. Other special Services have been held on Epiphany, Ascension, Confirmation and Thanksgiving Day.

I have just received for the Way's Mills Church a much needed co-labourer, a bell, 460 lbs. weight, costing \$117.20, Meneely make, and of rich, sweet tone. It is a pleasure to step out on an evening, however dark, and ring it away at slumbering conscience, before beginning our public worship. Our parishioners have just added greatly to our personal comfort by building in the cellar of the Parsonage both a furnace and a cistern, costing together about \$95. Last February Mr. P. H. Jones, of Barnston Landing, placed in the Church, at a cost of \$100, a very beautiful East Window, a memorial to his wife, who was truly, as the inscription testifies, a faithful and devout member of this Church. A sister of her and another young mother, were Confirmed October 2nd; fifty-five people and three neighbouring Clergymen were present, a good number for us on a Monday The Friday before, St. Michael's and All Angels' Day, I was admitted in St. Peter's Church, Sherbrooke, to the order of Priesthood, the consummation of long and yet often faintly cherished hopes, fifteen Clergymen were present to testify their fraternal interest. In both congregations between pastor and people, and between people and people there exist only good-will and kindly feeling. At Barnston some old sources of reproach and consequent weakness are in God's good Providence being removed, with, it is true, present uneasiness and loss, but with the prospect of permanent improvement, then there shall appear the peaceable fruits of righteousness; "No chastening is for the present I have made during the year three hundred and thirty parochial visits, besides many brief calls; have addressed fourteen Missionary meetings, from Drummondville to Island Pond, Vermont; have visited six of our schools, &c. It is far less than needed to be done, but the physical hindrances this first year have been many, not least among these a large, weedy and disorderly garden; how could I leave behind me this startling reproach, to run from farm to farm to put in order their homes and hearts? The garden is now laid out and is clean, is planted with fruit trees and shrubs, has an evergreen hedge to shield it from West winds, &c., to the great admiration and astonishment of the community; may it be but prophetic of like things to be done in the larger garden.

Our thanks are due and are heartily given to the Quebec Ladies for a second time, or rather a third time, helping in—now with \$25 towards one bell, and some months since, with two large reflected lanterns; one for the porch of each

Church.

We sometimes feel inclined like the rustic to sit down by the stream of sectarian meetings till it shall flow by and let us go on our way in peace,—but it comes, and comes, often with noisy, swollen volume; when shall this community find a stable foundation for its feet, and rest to its soul? Could the hatefulness and the banefulness of the dissidence of dissent be more apparent anywhere than here?

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE, P. Q.

The Rev. Dr. Adams reports :—

Last year it was reported that the Chapel had not been brought into regular use, though a special Service was held on October 4th, 1892, at which the Bishop officiated. It was found then that the Chapel could not be used throughout the winter without further work, and immediately after this day further work was undertaken, the plastering was done and the roof completed. In the Lent Term of 1893 we were able to begin the regular use of the Chapel.

No special effort to obtain funds on any large scale has been made, chiefly for the reason that the Bishop Williams' Memorial Fund has been attracting the attention of the supporters of the College, and owing to the liberal response of friends to the appeal for the rebuilding of the School, several hundred dollars have been recently subscribed to the erection of a corridor or cloister to connect the College and School. This and every contribution to the growth and extension and improvement of our College pro-

perty is really, as every other improvement we can compass, a gain to the Church, just as much as much desired improvements in Church edifices and in Parsonages. The more we look in our Church educational establishments as Church necessities the better. Still, though no considerable effort has been made, there is some progress to be reported.

A remarkably handsome organ of very sweet tone has been placed in the Chapel at a cost of \$1700. The insurance money with its interest has enabled us to meet this charge with the exception of a deficiency of a few dollars, which was covered by the proceeds of two organ recitals, given by Mr. Arthur Dorey, and for which we render him

hearty thanks.

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A complete scheme of stained glass windows have been brought before the Chapel Building Committee through the kindness of the Bishop. The Committee are still considering this scheme, which illustrates Old Testament history and the history of the Church, as well as gives very full suggestive and chronological treatment to the New Testament period. At least four windows have already been promised, one by the Bishop, one by the Parish of Lennoxville, one by Dr. Mountain, and one by R. W. Heneker, Esq., D.C.L., our Chancellor. It is hoped that before long some sustained effort may be made to complete the internal restoration of the Chapel, as stalls and a second flooring are absolutely required, meanwhile chairs are used.

Of the twenty-nine students now in the College, five have rooms in the Divinity House. The work of those who form the College Brotherhood will be reported on in detail by the Warden (the Professor of Pastoral Theology). Of our present students nineteen are candidates for Holy Orders. During the present year three of our graduates have been ordained Deacons, viz: Mr. I. N. Kerr, B.A., (who had spent a year as lay reader in Labrador, to which arduous mission he has since returned.) Mr. E. K. Wilson, B.A., (Here-

ford.) Mr. N. M. Bayne, B.A. (Peninsula.)

The Rev H. A. Brooke, B.A., (Scotstown) has been advanced to the Priesthood in Quebec, Rev. W. T. Lipton, B.A., in Ontario, the Rev. C. H. Brooks, M.A., (a former pupil of the School) now at Barnston, has also been advanced to the Priesthood.

We are most anxious that the boys of the School should in large numbers enter the College, and above all dedicate themselves to the work of the Sacred Ministry. On June 15th a Confirmation was held, at which one Student and seventeen of the Boys were presented for the Holy Rite. The Service was most impressive and the Bishop's addresses were listened to with much interest. Some of the candidates were prepared by Professor Allnatt, the majority by myself. In this matter, as well as on the occasional taking of the Boys' Sunday School, I have to express my grateful sense of Dr. Allnatt's assistance. I have also to thank Professor Wilkinson, who has taken the Sunday School for me on more than one occasion.

The School is divided into three Classes, (1) Communicants; (2) a Class preparing for Confirmation during the

whole session; (3) a Class of Juniors.

The first class are frequently reminded of their spiritual privileges. In this, as well as in the Minor Class, a series of lessons on Scripture Characters has been commenced

during the present term.

The Bishop preached before the University on Convocation Day (June 29th). We have also to record three visits from the Bishop, in which he has given us lectures on practical subjects. These lectures have been attended by some of the neighbouring Clergy as well as by the Students, and have been found most enjoyable and useful.

The usual services and meetings of the Missonary Union

have been held once a term.

Preachers:—Lent—The Rev. E. A. W. King, M A., (Water-ville). Trinity—Rev. W. T. Forsythe (Stanstead). Michaelmas—Rev. W. Windsor, of St. Johns, P. Q., (Diocese of Montreal).

Students' Papers:—Mr. N. M. Bayne, B.A., on St. Columba; Mr. D. W. Sutherland, B.A., on Rev. H. Martyn; Mr. Moore, B.A., on Bishop Selwyn.

We have to record special addresses by Canon Bullock

and a Missionary Lecture from Bishop Sillitoe.

The Services in the Chapel are :-

Every Sunday, Holy Communion; first Sunday of month, at 9.45 A.M.; every other Sunday, at 7.50 A.M.

Morning Prayer with Litany-Second and fourth Sun-

days.

Morning Prayer with Ante Communion—First, third and fourth Sundays. Litany on these Sundays, at 5.15 P.M.

Evensong at 7.00 P.M.

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Holy Days—Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.15

Every week-day—Morning Prayer at 8.45 A.M. and Evening Prayer at 5.30 P.M.

Boys' Sunday School—9.00 A.M., 12.00 and 12.20 P.M. Bible Class for Students preparing for Orders—4.30 P.M., taken by Professor Allnatt and Professor Wilkinson. Litany every Wednesday and Friday, at 12.45 P.M.

Mission work—The Principal, from October, 1892, to June, 1893, became responsible for an afternoon Service at Sandhill once a fortnight, thus causing Sandhill to have a Service every Sunday. In this work the Principal was assisted by all the Professors and by Mr. A. D. Nicolls, a

licensed Lay Reader.

Mr. Nicolls has also not unfrequently taken the Morning Service at Milby. The Principal and Professor Wilkinson take a celebration of Holy Communion at Milby every The Principal hopes that gradually a number of Services in places within a few miles of Lennoxville may be undertaken by members of the College at no distant date.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE BROTHERHOOD OF READERS.

At the present date the following are the members of the College Brotherhood of Readers:—

Messrs. Sutherland, B.A., Moore, B.A., Bishop, B.A., Barton, Avery, Almond and Dowdell.

The Rev. E. K. Wilson, B.A., and the Rev. N. M. Bayne, B.A., have been ordained since the presentation of the last Report, and are now in charge of Hereford and Peninsula.

The work of the present members during the past year has been as follows:—

Mr. D. W. Sutherland, B.A.—Two Sundays in January, at St. Sylvester. Three Sundays during April and May, at Danville. Services at Dudswell on June 4th, and at Richmond June 25th. Was in charge of St. Sylvester the whole of July, and in charge of Cookshire in August, at Drummondville 15th September. Took Services on the five Sundays of October at Windsor Mills, during the absence of the Incumbent.

Mr. A. H. Moore, B.A.—At Stanstead, with the Rev. W. T. Forsythe, from December, 1892, to May, 1893, and on Took charge of Durham for July, and of Acton for August and September.

Since the beginning of October Mr. Moore and Mr. Bishop have been assisting the Incumbent of Stanstead on

Sundays.

Mr. C. E. Bishop, B.A.—At Hereford from December, 1892, to Easter, 1893. From Easter to end of June, occa-

sional work at Megantic, Stanstead and Dixville.

From the first Sunday in July to the end of Sepember, at Stanstead and Beebe Plain, under the Rector of Stanstead. From beginning of October, sharing the Stanstead work with Mr. Moore.

Mr. W. Barton.—December, 1892, to June, 1893, occasional work at Milby and Megantic; July and August in charge of Megantic; also three Sundays at Scotstown: one at Stan-

stead, two at Hereford.

Mr. E. C. Avery.—November and December, 1892, at February, March, April, May, at Milby (excepting 7th and 14th May, at Newport, Vt.) In charge of ('oaticooke for July. In charge of East Angus for August. Third September, Services at Black Lake, Maple Grove and Lower Ireland. Since the 24th September, Services and Sunday School at Milby.

Mr. J. Almond and Mr. J. Dowdell were admitted members of the Brotherhood of Readers by His Lordship the

Bishop, on the 9th December, 1892.

From December, 1892. to 8th August, 1893, Mr. Almond assisted the Reverend T. Blaylock at Danville.

In December, 1892, Mr. Dowdell was once at Dixville. During the Christmas Vacation (1892-93) he worked under the Reverend G. H. A. Murray, M.A., for whom he also did occasional work up to the end of June. During July, worked under the Reverend J. Hepburn, at Melbourne and Richmond. In August and September was again under the Reverend G. H. A. Murray, at Dixville.

During the past year the Warden has done work at Milby, Sandhill, Ascot Corner, Richmond, Lisgar, Rockland Quarries, Sherbrooke, Brompton, Stanstead, Beebe Plain, Compton

and Megantic.

In conclusion, the Warden would like, for himself and on behalf of the Readers, to thank the Clergy and Laity of those places which they have visited for their unvarying kindness and courtesy, and he feels that there is good cause to be grateful when at the close of a year he is able to say that in spite of the necessary imperfection of Lay Ministration in the Churches, the Readers have been everywhere received and their words heard.

BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:

In my last report, I spoke of our anticipation of a visit from our Bishop. This was realized. He came here on Saturday, the 7th of January last, and remained with us until Monday afternoon. Sunday was of course taken up with the Services. In reference to these his Lordship was pleased to add, to a record I made of them: "I gladly add that I greatly enjoyed the earnest hearty Services."

During Monday his Lordship went round and visited as many of my people as possible in their own houses. This

pleased them much and won their hearts.

His Lordship came to us again on the 17th of May, that being the same day of the same month on which our late Bishop had been with us two years ago. This time he came for Confirmation, and thirty-six of my people received the Sacred Rite at his hands. When called upon to stand up in their places in the congregation, so many standing up in such a small Church made a spectacle most impressive, when it was considered that they were standing to confess Christ before men, and to claim the right to be acknowledged as His Soldiers and Servants.

During the past year we have re-shingled and painted once the roof of the Church. In this we have been greatly helped by assistance received from the Ladies of the Church Helpers' Association. They first sent us a cheque for \$20 and afterwards another for \$10. Part of this latter is still on hand to be expended in giving the Church roof another coat of paint in the Spring. Our warmest thanks

are due to these kind Ladies.

The Church Society has also renewed, though slightly diminished, the grants to our three Schools. I believe expression will be given to the gratitude of the people for

this. It would be sad to contemplate what the condition of the Children of this place would have been without the Schools which have, for so many years, been so largely maintained by the Society's grants. Many have done well in life through the education which was at least begun in these Schools.

Our branches of the Woman's Auxiliary still work on, and I trust will grow stronger, and be able to do more.

BURY.

The Rev. H. S. Fuller reports:—

The record of the 'year past is one of quiet uneventful work, and one would hope of progress also in spite of very serious drawbacks of one and another kind, such as sickness of long continuance in our family, which, perforce make no inconsiderable demands upon both time and strength, the more serious from the fact that in a large and scattered Parish such as this has been in time past, so much depends upon the Clergyman in charge, being in a position to move freely back and forth among his widely separated Parishioners.

Our Church property here is gradually coming into good shape, but while there is ever much to do—and that done, still something yet remaining untouched—sparse means to meet the many requirements of needed improvements and repairs, cause that we make but slow headway, the one comforting thought being that, if slow, movement in these matters has at least been steady and maintained. While now that the Mission of Bury is more circumscribed in extent, one may hope that concentration of time and attention upon work within our more narrow bounds will produce more tangible results.

At Christmas we had our usual Sunday School Festival, and a joyous multitude assembled in the Town Hall to celebrate the event, the whole affair passing off—thanks to the many good people who had been forward to help in the matter of furnishing entertainment, and provided materials for the feast—to the entire satisfaction of both young and old.

On March 9th, our Bishop paid his first visit to Robinson, a visit fully appreciated by all who were brought into con-

tact with him. One might say every heart went out to his Lordship, whose kindness and cordial geniality, were long remembered and commented upon; all being of one mind, that a kind Providence had sent us just the Bishop our needs required.

Coming to Bury at noon, the Bishop very kindly consented to drive with me to Bown's School House (St. Thomas), in order to meet with some young young people who had

been prepared for Confirmation.

On the next morning the Bishop administered Communion to a bedridden Parishioner, and then went with me to look up a few of our people in the village. In the afternoon, the Village School was visited by his Lordship, after which another visit or two were paid to Parishioners, and also to St. John's Church.

In the evening, Confirmation was administered to eight persons in St. Paul's Church, a very large congregation being present. At the close of the Service, we adjourned to the Town Hall, where an informal Basket Social was held with a view to giving our people an opportunity of meeting their Bishop, who, moving about freely among them, soon made it evident to all that he had learned the Gospel art of "condescending to men of low estate," and that, without patronizing; and a cordial hand-shake here, a pleasant word there, soon made all feel akin.

The class confirmed. I might mention, was one which had been early in hand, having been prepared in the time of our late Bishop. Confirmation being deferred on one occasion on account of sickness among the members of the class, and yet again through the illness and death of Bishop

Williams.

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In June our Bishop paid us another visit, spending Sunday in Bury. In the Village Church (St. Paul's) we had a thronged congregation of some three hundred people, of whom one hundred afterward participated in the Holy Communion. Twenty young people were Confirmed. The Service was bright and cheery, the Bishop afterward remarking upon the heartiness of the responding; while speaking of the Services elsewhere, he described it as being one at which it was good to have been present.

In August was held our usual Sunday School pic-nic, and, although called away myself, I learned from one and another that it proved a very great success, some even going so far as to tell me that it was the best they ever had.

In October was held our usual Harvest Home. After a beautiful Service in the Church, which was prettily decorated, we crossed to the Town Hall, where good things of all kinds awaited the hungry crowd, and many good things beyond in the way of recitations and sougs by some of our good Church people, who sacrificed themselves, as did the purveyors of the feast, not a little for the common good.

With the commencement of October began a new order of things, in the sending off of the new Mission of Scotstown under Mr. Brooke, comprising what were originally three outstations of this Mission, i. e. Scotstown, Lingwick and Canterbury, with adjacent parts. Since then I have felt on Sundays as if my occupation were gone, as in old time I had every other Sunday four Services, and a drive of forty miles, or some thirteen hundred miles of Sunday driving in the year; while more recently each other Sunday brought its Services together with Sunday School, and thirty miles of driving, with drives of eight and sixteen miles in the intervals. One great boon arising out of the change will be increase of time for reading and study, while the gain to the Parish from more perfect and thorough supervision should be no small one.

I have much to be thankful for in the past year, and not least for the hearty sympathy and co-operation of our Church people in Bury, being, as they always have been, helpful and kindly in all things. If there be failure at any point, it is rather from a backwardness on the past of the Parson to ask than of the people to render help either in Parish affairs or personal matters. Last year the good people of Bury Corner made up a purse of \$9.00, which was handed to me. In June a number of the people, of their own motive, turned out and cut and put in the larger portion of my Hay, while in October a considerable amount of work was done about the Parsonage and the grounds by a Bee gathered for that purpose.

It would be impossible to speak in too high terms of the kindness of my Church-Wardens, Messrs. Boydell & Wyatt, and their confrères, Messrs. J N. Martin and Hawley, who are ever ready to take in hand anything that promises to be of advantage to the congregations represented by them, or that would increase the comfort of the Clergyman and family. We all owe a great debt of gratitude also to the members of our Church Choir, and our Sunday School

Teachers at St. Paul's, and not a little do I feel myself under deep obligation to both one and other for the self-sacrificing manner in which they have given themselves to the work of the Church.

CACOUNA.

The Church-Warden reports :---

The Church of St. James the Apostle was opened for Divine Service on Sunday, 2nd July, and the regular Sunday and week-day Services were continued until 3rd

September.

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The Clergymen in charge were: for the month of July, the Rev. Canon Foster; and for the month of August, the Rev. A. H. Robertson. On the 3rd September, the Services were taken by the Rev. J. C. Davidson, Rector of Peterborough. Valued assistance was also given by the several Clergymen in residence at The Clergy House of Rest during the Summer.

CAPE COVE AND PERCÉ.

The Rev. W. G. Lyster reports:-

I regret my inability to send in a report containing any

intelligence of special interest.

I suppose it may always be taken for granted, that a Clergyman, so long as he continues in charge of a Mission, will endeavor to do his duty; and that, therefore, the usual routine of Services, Sunday Schools, &c., may be considered as accomplished.

As I have more than once explained, life in these Coast

Missions is very uneventful.

Occasionally, by removal, we lose a family; seldom or

never do we gain one.

Year after year, the same old familiar faces are to be seen in our Churches, with now and then an occasional break, when one who has accomplished "the days of the years of his pilgrimage" is removed.

During the past twenty years, the number of families in the Mission has varied very little; but the young men and women belonging to these families leave us only too

frequently, to seek a livelihood elsewhere.

Thus our congregations continue weak both as to numbers and means; and, although quite remarkable for their willingness to contribute towards every good work, only those who know the narrow circumstances of too many of them, are able to appreciate the sacrifices which they frequently make.

The visit of the Lord Bishop, in July, was an event which caused a very pleasant break in the mone of the place, and which I trust proved a blessing to us all.

At Cape Cove nineteen young people, and at Percé seventeen, renewed their Baptismal vows. These, with very few exceptions, have since become regular Communicants.

After the Confirmation Services, the Venerable Archdeacon of Quebec held meetings in both Churches, and explained the duty and necessity of increasing the amount of annual assessment paid to the Diocesan Board. As usual with us, no word of objection was heard; and I was enabled, some time after these meetings, which were productive of much good, to make, through the Archdeacon, an offer from the Church-Wardens to the Board, which was very kindly accepted.

Our sincere thanks are due to the Church Society for continued aid in the support of two of our Schools. A third School—at Percé—is kept open only at intervals, the

want of funds being severely felt.

Formerly the assessment paid by Messrs. Robin & Co., was equally divided between the Church-Schools and those of the Roman Catholics; now, owing to a change in the constitution of the company, the Roman Catholics being vastly in the majority, receive nearly the whole of this assessment.

I record with sorrow the death of Mr. James Lenfestey, Snr., at a ripe old age. He was a man quite remarkable for his loyal attachment to the Church, and for his cheerful and regular attendance at her Services. Until hindered by infirmity, his place was never vacant; and his example in this respect as well as in others, was productive of immense good in the congregation

Three children of Mr. C. Biard, of Percé, were, within a few days, carried off by cholera. This was a bereavement on a scale fortunately quite exceptional on the Coast. The parents, who bore their severe trial with wonderful

resignation to God's Holy will, met with very general

sympathy.

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Some much needed repairs were effected on the Parsonage in Spring. Their cost is included in our financial statement. In this statement, I have not entered the contributions to the Bishop Williams' Memorial Fund, these having appeared in last year's report.

I have only to repeat my obligations to the Lay-Readers, the Wardens and the Organists of both Churches, who have willingly and cheerfully contributed to the well-being

of the Mission.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. Canon Foster reports: -

The usual Services and parochial visiting at St. Stephen's and Christ Church have been kept up regularly during the current year. The congregations at St Stephen's are about the same as last year; that at Christ Church has somewhat increased in numbers.

I am very happy to be able to report a very decided improvement in the heartiness and devotional character of the

Services at Christ Church.

There is a marked increase in the number of pupils in attendance at the Sunday Schools in connection with both the Churches. At the Monthly Children's Service, in St. Stephen's Church, I cateehize the pupils for about twenty minutes. I look for good results from these catechisings, and I only wish I could find time to catechise every Sunday; but, with three Services, I find it impossible to do so.

The hour of holding the Sunday School at Christ Church has been changed from two o'clock, P.M., to ten A.M. The teachers report that the pupils attend in larger numbers and more regularly at that hour, than they used to do in the

afternoon.

Much needed improvements have been made in the interior of Christ Church, the funds for which have been pro-

vided by the Ladies' Guild.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese held a Confirmation in St. Stephen's Church on Sunday, the first of October last, when seventeen candidates were Confirmed and received their first Communion.

A branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been established in the Parish, for which I look for gratifying results.

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The Rev. G. H. Parker reports :-

There is very little to report from this Parish. The Bishop has paid us two visits, one in March, and one in June for Confirmation and closing of the College.

The Services have been carried on as usual during the

year, and without interruption.

I may mention that the response to the Bishop's circular for a special Offertory for the Ladies' College has been much more general than on any previous occasion. Thirty-three congregations have sent in their Offertories, amounting to \$164.47.

DANVILLE.

The Rev. Thomas Blaylock reports :--

A day or two after my last report was sent in, the Lord Bishop made his first visit to this Parish on his return from the Anniversary at Sherbrooke, and held Services in all four Churches, preaching twice in Danville, where he Confirmed nine candidates. Six candidates were also Confirmed in Troutbrooke.

At Kingsey Falls Services had been started for a few weeks through the efforts of Messrs. Waller and Carson, Church-Wardens, and I was very anxious that some plan should be adopted for their regular continuance. The Bishop visited the congregation with this end in view, and made arrangements for resuming regular worship there, on conditions which were gladly accepted by the Church-Wardens. The congregation promised \$120 per annum to meet a like sum, which his Lordship generously undertook to provide. In this way the expenses of a student from Lennoxville were nearly covered, and Mr. Almond took charge for the first six months of the year, doing good and acceptable work for the Church. During the vacation Mr. Donelly, another student, took his place.

By this time, however, it was felt that an arrangement merely for Sunday Services was not sufficient to meet the requirements of the case. The Bishop wrote me, kindly offering to provide me with a resident helper, and at the same time most generously renewing his offer of financial

aid for another year.

In accordance with this promise, Mr. Wayman, a young gentleman known to the Bishop in England, came to my assistance on October 1st, and has already made himself most acceptable to myself and people, and I look forward with much pleasure to our future work together. At the Falls, a Sunday School has been started by Mrs. Waller, with an attendance of about twenty. Miss Waller acts as organist, and Mr. Waller himself attends to the lighting and heating of the Church. My reader and myself are indebted to them for kind hospitality so freely given week by week.

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On the ninth of October, for the second time this year, the Bishop visited the Parish to take part in our Jubilee Service of Thanksgiving for the manifold blessings which have attended the work of the Church during the first fifty years of its existence here, on which occasion he preached a telling and appropriate sermon, and at the same time admitted Mr. Wayman to the office of Reader. The Revs. Messrs. Hepburn and Rudd, from Richmond, were also present. The Service was bright and stirring, the people joining heartily in praise and response. Half a century ago Services were held once a fortnight or once a month in the School-houses at Nicolet Falls, and later on at Danville and After ten years of more or less regular Services, the village Church was commenced by the first Incumbent, Rev. M. M. Fothergill, which Church was completed and consecrated just ten years ago last May; and it stands to-day one of the finest and most substantial country Churches in the diocese, having cost over \$6000. The next Incumbent was Rev. Dr. Magill, now of Rhode Island. After a short tenure of office he was succeeded by Rev. Mr. Petry, at present assistant Minister in Quebec Cathedral. Mr. Petry's incumbency was a long one, lasting nearly twenty years, and though ten years have elapsed since he left he is kindly remembered by many to-day. He built Churches at Troutbrooke and Lerne, the one nine miles and the other four from the village of Danville. Petry was succeeded by Rev. Isaac Thompson, who remained nearly five years, and extended the work by starting Services and building a Church in the village of Kingsey Falls, seven miles away. These four Churches are all consecrated and free from debt.

The present Incumbent was inducted into the Parish five years ago last "All Saints", and Services are now held

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every Sunday in all four Churches, and alternately at the Slate Quarries and Asbestos. Throughout the Summer six or seven Services were held every Sunday. The prospects of the newly started work seemed bright, and in consequence of it several adults have come forward for Baptism, whose example I trust will soon be followed by many others.

The interior of the village Church has been thoroughly renovated; the pews varnished, a new carpet laid down in the Choir, and also a new hardwood Altar placed in the Chancel, the necessary funds being provided by the Ladies' Guild. The outside wood-work has also been painted, and the steps leading up to the Church renewed.

The Archdeacon having visited the Parish on behalf of the Bishop Williams' Memorial Fund and explained its object, I appealed for voluntary offerings, and received subscriptions to the amount of \$413 from members of Danville congregation; the first instalment of \$140.34 having been paid. Messrs. Thurber and Cleveland, the Church-Wardens, are still devoted to the Church's interests.

The Troutbrooke Church has been beautifully tinted within and efficiently repaired. All arrears due to the Board have been collected and paid by the Church-Wardens. Messrs. David Thurber and Geo. Ewing, Jnr., spare no pains to place the finances of the congregation on a sound footing.

I am glad to be able to report continued progress in the amount of our gifts for extra parochial objects, our contributions for this purpose reaching the sum of \$260.93, being over one-sixth of our total incomings as compared with one seventh last year.

The attendance at Holy Communion, with the exception of Lorne, has been very satisfactory, and the Sunday Schools have about kept up their average.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. G. Scott reports:-

This has been a year of marked progress in this Parish, and we have much to encourage us for the future. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese has paid us three visits, each

productive of good. Two Confirmations have been held here, one in June and one in November. At the former, thirteen candidates were presented, at the latter nine. Of

the total number, nine were adults.

The number of regular Communicants has been steadily increasing, and now it is nearly double of what it was. A Communicants' Guild has been started, the object of which is to promote frequent Communions, devout Communions and fasting Communions. We have always now seven or eight persons at the early Eucharist every Sunday, and between twenty and thirty, sometimes more, at the late Celebration. On the first Sunday in the month, thirty-four persons Communicated at the early Celebration on Easter Day, and twenty at the late, making a total of fifty-four, that is to say, two-thirds of the possible maximum.

When it is remembered that almost all of these had to drive to Church from a considerable distance, and that in a great many cases, only one parent can leave home at a time, it will be seen that this a large proportion of the

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All the Day Schools in the Parish, four in number, are now practically Church Schools, the Catechism being taught in them by the teachers, who are Church-women, and by the Rector.

The Woman's Auxiliary has been started this year, and has sent off a well-filled barrel of goods to the North West. The Junior Branch is under the management of Miss

Kemp, and the interest in it is well sustained.

Lately we have made a great effort to pay up the Endowment Fund, in order that another \$200 a year might be available for the Rector's use. The Church Society, the Bishop and Mr. Hamilton, have, by generous assistance, encouraged us to proceed, and the sum needed is almost ready to send away, in fact we hope to have it invested before the second week of December.

Services are held at Carmel Hill and Mitchell, which are now looked upon as part of this Parish. Through the three Summer months Mattins and Evensong were said daily in the Church. There are the most encouraging signs everywhere in the Parish of a more earnest and religious life and a deeper appreciation of the Church and her Services.

DUDSWELL.

The Rev. Edwin Weary reports :-

As I have only been in charge of the Mission of Marbleton and Dudswell since 1st October, I am notable to give a full report of the work of the Church in this Mission for the

past year.

Rev. Mr. Colston, my predecessor, left Marbleton about the end of May, and during the Summer months the Mission was without regular Services. In consequence of the long interval between my predecessor leaving and my advent, I found Church matters at a very low ebb, but I am happy to say that affairs are looking brighter, and, for the future, I have hope and take courage. Since taking charge I have visited over ninety families belonging to our Church, and have received from all the utmost kindness.

The Services in St. Pauls' Church, Marbleton, have been very well attended. The average congregation in the morning eighty-five, in the evening one hundred and twenty-five. The Services are hearty and all appear willing to do what they can in all matters connected with the Church.

We have now a very good Choir of twenty voices, and a great improvement has been made in the musical portion

of the Service.

On Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 23rd, there was a celebration of the Holy Communion at 11 a.m. with an address by the Incumbent. In the evening a full Choral Service was well rendered by the Choir, assisted by the Choir of the Church of the Good Shepherd. The two anthems: "Sing unto God," and "Jerusalem my glorious home," were remarkably well sung, considering the short time given to practice. The Church on this occasion was filled with an attentive and appreciative congregation. A very appropriate Sermon was preached by the Rev. H. E. Wright, B.A., of Angus, on the 2nd of November. The Choirs of both Churches took part in a Choral Service held in Cookshire under the direction of Professor Dorey.

The Ladies of the Choir have formed themselves into a Chancel Guild for the purpose of beautifying the interior of the Church. Several improvements have already been made, new stairs have been erected, and the Chancel made larger by the erection of a platform in the Nave, with sufficient accommodation to seat the Choir. The Rev. Thos.

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ki pi Chapman, M.A., still takes a lively interest in the work he has had so much at heart for nearly forty-five years. He is now making a very handsome Lectern, which will add greatly to the appearance of the interior. A new carpet and Altar cloth has been promised by some of the Ladies of the congregation.

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Our Sunday School is now in good working order. When I came I found but fifteen scholars, now we have thirty-five attending regularly with a good staff of Teachers. I am preparing thirty-six Candidates for Confirmation, and hope to present the most of them when our good Bishop visits us on the 17th December.

The Ladies' Guild have worked well all the year under the management of the following ladies: Mrs. Côté, President; Mrs. Wayland, Vice-President; and Mrs. Heart, Secretary-Treasurer. They are now preparing for their Annual Sale of work, which will take place on the 14th December.

A Branch of the Ministering Children's League has been formed by Mrs. Heart, a most faithful and energetic Churchworker. There are now thirty-five members on the roll, these have worked hard all the Summer for the children of the Blackfeet Indian Reserve, and have now forwarded a most useful bale of warm clothing. A very interesting Lecture was given in the Church Hall last month, by Miss Brown, who has worked among the Indians there for the past seven years.

The Services at the Church of the Good Shepherd have also been very well attended. The singing is very hearty, and the people most attentive. The interior of the building has been repaired this Summer, and the Church now looks bright and comfortable. The members of the Ladies' Guild intend holding a Social in the Academy next month.

I have visited all the outlying settlements in connection with the Mission, viz:—South Ham, Stoke, East and South Dudswell. Last week I held a week-day Service in the School House at East Dudswell, we had a very large congregation. It is my intention to give them week-day Services throughout the Winter.

At this early date of my Incumbency, I must offer to all my people my hearty and sincere thanks for their extreme kindness to me and mine; every possible effort has been put forth by them all to make us happy and comfortable. I trust that this practical sympathy will for ever continue between pastor and flock, so that the work of God's Church in this portion of His vineyard may prosper and flourish.

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DURHAM.

The Rev. D. Horner reports:-

The Services of the Church have been duly conducted on Sundays and the Greater Festivals during the past year, (except on one Sunday in the Summer), and the Sunday Schools in each part of the Mission have latterly been in a more flourishing state, especially at South Durham, where the number of teachers has been increased since the visit of the Rev. Edwin Weary, in the month of June.

I have arranged the Sunday Services so as to devote one Sunday in the month to a "Children's Service," with an address specially adapted to the occasion. The parents have attended, and I have heard congratulatory remarks upon the change.

Holy Trinity Church, Kirkdale.—The Lord Bishop of the Diocese came amongst us at the beginning of the present year, to re-open the Church of the Holy Trinity, after its restoration. A Sub-deanery Meeting, and a Missionary Meeting was held on the same day. Owing to the boisterous weather, the attendance was comparatively small, but a most enjoyable day was spent. The Bishop and the Rev. C. H. Brooks gave each an Address in the evening in the School House, at Kirkdale.

The nature of the improvements of the Church at Kirk-dale was given in last year's report. There is still, I think, some dollars owing on the building, which we are hoping to wipe off in a few days.

The fence of the new grave-yard, situated between the Church and the School, was provided for, as follows: Mr. Wm. Henry Lyster gave and put up the posts and provided the wire netting, Mrs. Thos. Burrill, whose husband lies buried within the precincts, paid the sum of eight dollars required for the cost of the labour and the rest of material.

The last November gale destroyed two of the windows in Kirkdale Church; they are at present closed up with rough boards.

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ows vith The Lord Bishop held a Confirmation in Kirkdale Churh, and at L'Avenir on Sunday, October 18th, when twenty-three candidates in all were Confirmed. The next day, the new grave-yard at Kirkdale was consecrated.

The assessments at Kirkdale have been promptly paid owing to the indefatigable energy of our Church-Wardens, Messrs. Wm. Hall and Wm. Henry Lyster. But I must say, as regards other Church work, there is much to be desired and something to regret.

We have had the pleasure of special Sermons during the past year from the Rev. I. M. Thompson, of Levis, the Rev. M. G. Thompson, of New York, the Rev. H. Dickson, of Randboro', and the Venerable Archdeacon Roe.

A stone cistern has been placed in the cellar of the Parsonage, at a cost estimated at \$28. The stones required were brought, by various members of the congregation, free of charge.

The Parsonage grounds were also temporally fenced, by the members of the congregation, last Summer. I have likewise to thank Messrs Wm. Stevens, Wm. Hall, Albert Lyster, Wm. Henry Lyster and Thomas Burrill, for hauling and sawing my winter's wood. Also, Mr. Wm. Hall, for his present of seed potatoes. He ploughed the ground in which they were sown, which brought forth sufficient for my winter's need.

S. Paul's Church, L'Avenir.—The members of this congregation seem to be developing into a healthy condition. I am glad to report that the Church is built in a manner exceeding the most sanguine hopes of the congregation; that which was looked upon as a wild and hopeless scheme, by many outside the congregation, has been successfully carried out, and the Church was consecrated on Sunday, October the 8th, 1893.

The Treasurer of the Building Committee, Mr. Robert Skillen, told me with pleasure of the universal and untiring interest displayed by the subscribers, and their evident desire to pay their subscriptions promptly. One man, a poor man, whose wife is in the last stages of consumption, brought his subscription and remarked: "It was a hard struggle to get the cash, but I have it, and I am glad to give it; I wish it was more." Another man, a young man, finding that the payment of a certain debt was not forthcoming, undertook a business which brought him the

required sum. These are only two instances proving the worth of the interest now displayed, which I trust will last. I must mention also that the greater part of the week before the opening of the new Church was occupied in the improvement of the ground surrounding the building. All sorts and conditions of subscribers were there, busy; from the young man whose "best" was five dollars to the man whose "best" was a hundred; each and all took a brotherly interest in their work and labour of love, which it was very refreshing to see.

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This part of the Mission is beginning to realise in a most adequate sense the highest and noblest act of our religion, and they are endeavouring in every way to improve their services. More members have been added to the Choir, who take a hearty and intelligent interest in getting the congregation to join spiritedly in the responsive Service.

The new Church, a pretty steepled structure of wood, surmounted by an iron cross, standing on the side of the old building. The interior is beautified with a Rood Screen of brown ash, a stain glass window, the design: "the Good Shepherd"; an Altar cloth, presented by the Church Helpers' Association of Quebec, and a pretty marble-topped font presented by the Rev. A. H. and Mrs. Robertson, of Cookshire. The whole interior is finished with brown ash, diagonal in pattern. The exterior is painted white with grey coloured edging. The appearance of the Church is in marked contrast to the old one.

I have thought it necessary to make a slight change in the order of the Sunday Services in each part of the Mission; and as regards L'Avenir particularly, I am very

gratified with the immediate result.

We now have Matins at 9 A.M., and Holy Communion (with Sermon) at 10 o'clock. At L'Avenir every one stayed to the end of the office, and what is of more importance, there are four times as many Communicants.

The assessments to the Diocesan Board have been paid, though not always as promptly as should have been, owing perhaps to hard times.

South Durham.—There is nothing of importance to be recorded. The Services on Sundays and Greater Festivals were carried on through the year either by myself, the Rev. Edwin Weary, or Mr. A. H. Moore, of Bishop's College Brotherhood of Readers. The Sunday School still

continues. The Superintendent, Mr. Benjamin Dowd, has collected a few dollars for a Sunday School Library, and the money collected for the restoration of the Church is still in the Savings Bank. We are starting the Women's Aid again on Friday, December 1st. The Choir is slightly on the increase. The organists have been always at their post. The assessments have been paid more promptly than heretofore, and I think that the congregation of South Durham is slowly wheeling into line. I have given special Catechetical Addresses on week-days at some of the outlying stations during the year, viz: at the Montgomery School House, in the Dowd Settlement, and at the old red School House in Lisgar, to interested congregations. The Sunday Evening Services at South Durham are better attended since the arrival of the new branch lamps.

The Ven. Archdeacon Roe has visited us repeatedly and helped us materially to bring our ideas to this happy issue. Special thanks are due to him for his attention to our wants and difficulties; for the munificient grants from our great societies, the S. P. C. K., the Church Society, Mr. Robert Hamilton and the Hon. Senator Price, the aggregate subscriptions from these various sources amounting to \$446.67, a valuable aid to the Building Fund of L'Avenir Church. We must also thank the Archdeacon for his ideas regarding the structure. Special thanks are also due to the Rev. A. Jarvis, of Napanee, for his present of the plans.

EATON.

The Rev. A. H. Robertson reports:-

St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—The usual round of Services in this Church have been regularly kept up, viz.: Holy Communion on first and third Sundays of every month, with early Celebrations on Saints' Days and Festivals, with Morning and Evening Prayer every Sunday.

During the Sundays in Lent the Clergy from Bishop's College preached on alternate Sundays with the Rector.

On Monday, the 19th June, the Lord Bishop consecrated the public Cemetery of this town. In the afternoon a large number of the Parishioners met his Lordship at a Parish Lunch, and at 4.30 all adjourned to the Church, where his

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Lordship catechized the children and at the same time

gave sound Church teaching to their elders.

On Sunday, 19th November, the Lord Bishop spent Sunday in the Parish. As I wished his Lordship to visit all parts of the Parish, we arranged the Services as follows:—At St. Peter's Church, Cookshire, Early Celebration at 8 A.M.; Mattins, at 9.30 A.M.; Baptism and Confirmation, at 10.30 A.M.

These various Services were all well attended, and the lessons brought before us by the administration of the various Sacraments, was further impressed on our minds by the earnest words of the Bishop. At 2 P.M., he held Service at Eaton Corner, where the Bishop preached in the old Congregational Church at 4 P.M. We arrived at St Luke's Church, Sandhill, where nine Candidates were confirmed, and at 7 P.M., we held Service at Johnville, when two adults were Baptized. Altogether his Lordship preached to at least seven hundred people, many of whom had never before listened to a Bishop of the Church. I am sure that the good effects of our Bishop's Sunday will be lasting.

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On Monday, 20th November, the Clergy of all the neighboring Parishes met at Cookshire, for a conference with the

Rishon

Our thanks are due to Mr. Dorey, for his efforts in the interest of Church Music. He has visited our Choirs more than once, and has also conducted a Choir Festival Service in St. Peter's Church, in which the Clergy and Choirs of Cookshire and all the surrounding Parishes took part. Our Organists, Miss Sawyer and Miss C. Bailey, and the Choir, deserve our hearty thanks. Our Sunday School meets every Sunday Morning, and I am glad to say that the average attendance shows a marked increase over that of last year.

The Ladies' Guild and Woman's Auxiliary have met regularly during the year. Both the Guild and Auxiliary have gained largely in numbers during the past year, and

the Meetings are always well attended.

This year we have greatly improved the Church property by replacing the old shingle roof, on St. Peter's Church, by a new roof of galvanized steel shingles. We have also carried out some much needed repairs to the Rectory. The cost of roof and repairs, amounting to nearly \$400.00, has been met mostly by the Ladies' Guild, and a member of the congregation, who gave \$100.00 as a Memorial Gift.

A Junior Branch of the Womans' Auxiliary has been started this year. It meets fortnightly at the Rectory, and already twenty-eight young girls, from the ages of five to fifteen, belong to it. Miss Botterill also held a Girls' Communicants' Class at the Rectory during the past year.

Mrs. Robertson and the Ladies of the Guild presented, as their Easter Offering, a beautiful Brass Alms Basin with

two brass plates to match the Basin.

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St. Luke's Church, Sandhill.—Services at this Church are held fortnightly. By the kindness of Rev. Dr. Adams, who took the responsibility of finding supply, we had a weekly Service for over six months of this year. I hoped that the privilege of having a Service weekly instead of fortnightly would lead to an increase in Church attendance, but as it did not do so, and as the expense of these extra Services was paid entirely by the Rector, it was thought best to discontinue them. But we have now a weekly Sunday School, with Mr. Rufus Laboree as Superintendent, and the Ladies' Guild gave a sum of money, which was supplemented by a grant from the S. P. C. K., and has provided us with a small but excellent Church Library, which is eagerly read by both young and old. We must thank Mrs. R. Laboree for her services as Organist.

Johnville.—Fortnightly Service here, and always very well attended, from seventy-five to a hundred persons present at each Service. The Bishop visited Johnville for the first time in its history, and his earnest addresses were heard and enjoyed by all. A great deal of praise is due to our Choir, which, under the leadership of Mr. E. P. Smith, gives most valued and efficient help in the worship of the Church.

The Sunday School is held weekly under the charge of Mr. Oakes, and his son and daughter. Their devoted labours deserve all praise.

The Guild has given valuable help in getting a new

Organ and other furniture for the Hall.

Euton Corner.—This is a new Station opened up on 30th April. The original Parish of Eaton consisted of Churches at Cookshire and Eaton Corner, but when the Church at Eaton Corner was burned, the Service there was given up, and now, about seventy years after, the Church Service is resumed. The Bishop's visit there, on the 19th November, was the first visit of a Bishop to Eaton Corner since the

time of Bishop Stewart. The new Station has opened up well, we have an average attendance of about thirty-five. Have a weekly Sunday School and a Ladies' Guild, and a small band of earnest and efficient workers.

In conclusion I would say that it is a great source of anxiety to me, to have three sub-stations, in which I can only give a fortnightly Service. And besides it is not easy and may not be possible in the time of bad roads, to attend to four Services on Sunday, as I am now obliged to do. There is a most promising opening for Church extension in this District, and I can only hope, that for the good of the Church, some way may be found to give the needed weekly Services to those Missions.

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The Rev. W. A. Adcock reports:-

In writing out my report of this year, I desire to relate in brief something of what has been accomplished here since the Church was planted. The Church and her teaching was introduced here under very exceptional circumstances, far different from most of our new Missions. In consequence, therefore, the work has been of a difficult and varied character. Five years ago there was no Church, and apparently no Church material. The change that has taken place since then has surpassed my fondest hopes. A pretty and substantial Church and a very comfortable Parsonage joining have been built; and, best of all, there is no debt.

The question may sometimes be raised, and rightly too, what have the people done towards this healthy state of things? In this report I shall be happy to relate a little of what has been done on the spot.

In the Mission, which includes the two villages and the adjacent country parts, there are some two hundred and twenty families, out of which number seventy families look to the Church for ministrations.

During the year I have been enabled to make nine hundred and twenty-live visits among the people, and have endeavoured in every instance to deliver that message I had given me in trust. I am in a position to say that the country has been leavened with the teaching of the Church

and the future prospect appears to be bright and encour-

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The new Parsonage, purchased two years since, is now free of debt, and the congregation, as a free-will offering at Easter, purchased a sweet-toned bell for the Church, weigh ing five hundred and seventy-five pounds complete, the total cost of which was \$102. Towards this sum the congregation subscribed and paid the sum of \$84, the balance was made up by the kind ladies of C. H. A. Quebec. The congregation has since turned its attention to the windows, and six new ones are on order. These are to be of rolled Cathedral glass of different designs, while two more expensive ones for the North end are to be given by the Rider family.

While one of the congregation works for the Church as Sexton and does it all gratis, another furnishes all the wood for fires, and a third takes delight in keeping the Church property in good condition. Ready hands and generous

aid I have not found wanting to assist me.

It may seem a small matter to other congregations of better resources what has been done here. However, it should not be forgotten this is a new field of labour. Having almost every item on record of money raised for Church purposes, assessments not included, it amounts to no less a sum than \$1,165, money raised on the spot since the Church was planted. This year, our Church book shews one sixth part of our total incomings to have been given to objects outside of the Mission.

The Lord's Table is well attended. The Sunday School is progressing and is in a healthy condition under the guidance of earnest teachers. I extend my thanks to the kind ladies of Quebec, for their assistance, and for the lantern sent for the Church; also to Dr. Codd, for his services as lay reader, and kindly assistance in every good work.

Georgeville.—This end of the Mission is by far the strongest part of the whole Mission. The Church has undergone a thorough and complete restoration, which has cost more than \$1,000.00, which sum has been paid, and the Church property is now free of debt. Substantial help towards this work has been given from time to time, by the Summer visitors, who take a lively interest in Church work.

The Spiritual work has undergone little change apparently. The Church attendance has been good. There has

been a slight increase in the number of Communicants. In this particular there is much room for greater improvement. The Sunday School has been well attended, being the only one in the district. During the Summer months, Morning and Evening Services were held every Sunday for the benefit of the visitors. The Ladies held their Annual Sale in August last, and realized about \$120.00.

I extend my thanks to Mr. H. R. Mudge, of Montreal, for two handsome brass side lamps for the Chancel; also to the Organist, Sunday School Teachers and others, who have helped me in Church work.

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FRAMPTON.

The Rev. Felix Boyle reports:-

As the Incumbent of this Mission is at present, and has been for several weeks past, suffering from a severe attack of "La Grippe," he may be excused for writing a very short report this year. There has been no falling off in Church work. The Services have been duly maintained without, if my memory serves me, a single break. The congregations have been large and devout with a slight increase to the number of our Communicants.

This latter event is largely due to the pleasing fact, that we had a visit from our Bishop, in September last, who Confirmed forty-three Candidates, several of whom have continued regular Communicants since. His Lordship's stirring and encouraging words to us, not to slacken our energies in good works, will not soon be forgotten.

I may here mention that our Schools in this Mission, one at West Frampton, the other in the Tenth Range of East Frampton, are doing well. Many thanks to the Church Society for their continued grants, without which boon it would be hard struggle to keep the Schools in operation.

I am also pleased to state that the Woman's Auxiliary is doing well, and the members working cheerfully, under the careful superintendence of Mrs. M. D. Hodgson.

GASPE BASIN.

The Rev. J. Richmond reports:-

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St. Paut's Church.—The Services have been held regularly, and the Fi ly Communion administered monthly and on the greater Festivals, and to the sick and infirm as required. Services have also been held in L'Anse aux Cousins, a small settlement on the North-West Arm of Gaspé Bay, and about three miles from St. Paul's Church, for the benefit of the old and infirm, and also for the sake of a few families who are settled further up the Dartmouth River, and who find it a long distance to come to Church at Gaspé Village.

The Church-Wardens have been able, with some slight difficulty, to keep their engagement with the Diocesan Board; and, with the assistance of the Ladies' Guild, have put a good and substantial fence in front of the Church and Glebe properties. Through the same agency a commencement has been made to collect funds for the new Parsonage, for which the site has been chosen, and some work has been done towards preparing it for the foundation of the House.

We were favoured and cheered by the Bishop's visit during the Summer, and in having the ordination of Mr. Brooke in St. Paul's, he being the third person admitted to the Priesthood in this Church during my Incumbency.

This congregation has experienced a great loss by the removal of a family which supplied it with a good Organist, and the Guild with an admirable Secretary-Treasurer. The breaking up of this family, and the sale of their property to a non-resident, is likely to be followed by the sale of other properties for Summer residences, and will lead to the loss of regular settlers. This may prove a source of weakness to the Church at Gaspé Basin. The Village is already small and every family tells. If the resident families are replaced by Summer residents, then in the Winter months it will be almost a Deserted Village.

St. James' Church, Gaspé South.—The Church was used for the first Service on New Year's Day, and was consecrated in the Summer. The old Freehold Pew System has not cast its shadow upon the new building, the pews being absolutely free and unappropriated, and the congregations have increased. There is much to be done yet, to the inside of the building, but we have to move slowly accord-

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ing to our means. Through the assistance of the Society of Church Helpers we were able to obtain a silver set of Altar Vessels, instead of buying an inferior set. We have purchased, lately, seven large Rochester lamps for the Church, but we are still in need of a Stone Font to replace an old wooden one of local manufacture, and also a Lectern and matting and carpet for the Chancel.

York.—The settlement in the upper part of this Township is making fair progress with their new Church, considering the means at their disposal. The frame is boarded in, and therefore the building is safe from injury by the weather. This building is intended for the use at the present of twenty-five families, and is in a part of the Mission which alone is available to any extent for an extension of the settlement on the York River.

It is here that the Church Society assists the School, and I am thankful for the renewal of the grant, for it was by means of the grant that the people were able to open this School, and without it in the present, the School would lose much of its usefulness.

The Church-Wardens of St. James' Church have fulfilled their old engagement with the Diocesan Board, and have seen their way to comply with the increased demand made by the new bond of agreement.

HATLEY.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports:-

The Services have been kept up as usual in three Stations of this Mission during the past year and there is no great change in the size of the congregations. I have also given as much time as possible to Parochial visiting.

St. James' Church, Hatley, has been put in a thorough state of repair, the roof shingled, the ceiling sheathed with wood and the seats and wood-work painted. The Rectory has also been painted on the outside, the total cost being very nearly two hundred and seventy-five dollars.

We have also added two hundred and ten dollars to our Endowment Fund. Ninety dollars of this was a legacy left by our old friend and former parishioner, the late Mr. Hollis Shorey; one hundred dollars was a donation from Mr. M. J. Bachelder, (who had given us for the repairs fund fifty dollars a short time before) and the balance was contributed by several others.

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We have also to tender our warmest thanks to another former parishioner, Mr. Charles Connell, now of Chicago, for the gift of a solid silver Communion Service as a memorial of his mother, whose remains lie in the grave-yard beside the Church.

The Bishop of the Diocese has twice visited this Mission during the year; once in March, when he Baptized the Incumbent's young son, and preached in St. James' Church and at Massawippi, and on the following day addressed the members of the Woman's Auxiliary, and again in June, when he Confirmed eight young people in St. James' Church and preached at Ayer's Flat and Massawippi.

Our old friend, Bishop Niles, of New Hampshire, again this year gave up a portion of his vacation to visiting his native town. He preached for me on Sunday, at St. James' Church, and at Ayer's Flat, to large congregations.

The Woman's Auxiliary have sent two bales of clothing to the Rev. Mr. Hinchcliffe, for the children in the Home in the Piegan Reserve, and have undertaken to aid in supporting a girl in the Home next year.

The Ladies' Guild are preparing articles for a sale in the near future, the proceeds to assist in paying a small balance still due for painting the Rectory.

The congregation at Massawippi regret the loss of Miss Carter, for several years our faithful Organist, who after her marriage in June removed to Stanstead. On the eve of her marriage the congregation presented her with a beautiful clock as a memento of their good will. Her place has been acceptably filled by Miss Gertie Robinson.

During the year two of our little flock at Ayer's Flat have been called to the rest of Paradise. Mrs. Samuel Hetherington, who since her coming to Ayer's Flat, took the keenest interest in our work there, and Mr. Henry Ansell, who was very suddenly called away. While we greatly miss them we must remember that our loss is their gain.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:—

The usual Sunday and other Services of the Church have been regularly held in this Mission during the year. The attendance at the Churches has been fairly good. Holy Communion has been a liministered in both Churches once every month. Seventy-eight Communicants have partaken of the Sacred Rite at intervals during the year. The Sunday Schools in both Churches were well attended during the season; forty scholars in both Churches altogether. Miss Roe's Bible Class, at the Parsonage, during the Winter, is always well attended by the girls of the Church. A singing class, conducted by my daughters, is held once a week in the Church, at St. Stephen's, and is a great attraction.

The principal event in our Mission, during the year, was the first visit of our Bishop in September last. His Lordship held two Confirmation Services on the 6th September, one at St. Stephen's Church in the morning, where he Confirmed six young persons. In the afternoon, he drove to the Church of the Ascension, Campbell's Corners, and Confirmed seven young people there. His Lordship's Addresses to the Candidates were very touching, and the Sermon in both Churches were most engaging and affectionate, and made a marked impresion on the hearers. The attendance at the Churches was not so large as it would have been on a Sunday, and many of the members were absent at the Sherbrooke Fair.

The Bishop paid a visit to an old lady who has been bedridden for a long time, and spoke words of comfort and consolation to her.

The two Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary for Missions are well attended every month, at St. Stephen's Parsonage and Campbell's Corners. Under their auspices we had a visit from the Honbl. Miss Sugden, agent for the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society; she held several meetings in the Churches, and attracted a great many to hear her tell her story of the wretched state of the poor young girls of India. She told her story well and received large contributions in aid of the Society.

We had a visit from the Archdeacon on the 6th August, to stir us up on the subject of the assessments to the Diocesan Board. He addressed both congregations and

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went over the whole history of the Church Society for the past thirty years, and shewed the necessity of increased exertion, on the part of the members of the Church in the Diocese, in "bearing their own burdens," as the S. P. G. is about to withdraw their support, "at our own request."

We had our usual Sunday School pic-nic, but it was unfortunately a disagreable day and was not so well attended as usual.

A Christmas Tree, got up by Miss Watts, the teacher of the School, was a great success and was very well attended, there was music, singing and recitations, dialogues, &c.

There has been a good deal of sickness here, and we miss three of our old members, who have gone to their rest.

I have paid two hundred and lifty pastoral visits during the year, besides many visits to sick persons.

IRELAND AND SOUTH INVERNESS.

The Rev. W. G. Faulconer reports:-

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Holy Trinity Church, Upper Ireland.—At this Station things have gone on steadily as usual. The chief event was the visitation of our Chief Pastor throughout the Parish, with the Archdeacon of Quebec, which was most cordially appreciated through the length and breadth of the whole Parish, (an account of which was published in two or three Church Papers in June last.)

Our Services here on the average have been well attended, and our Communicants have increased twenty or more in number since the Confirmation in June.

The Sunday Schools are progressing, under the Superintendent, Mr. Wm. G. Stewart, who as usual has denied himself in this service for the Master.

Death has again carried off many of our oldest Parishioners and made gaps not easily filled. Mr. James Wilson, one of the oldest supporters of the Church Society, deceased in March last, and bequeathed to the Church Society eleven hundred dollars in gratitude for the past kindness of the Society in providing Missionaries to look after the welfare of their souls when the Mission was too poor to support a Clergyman.

Christ Church, Lower Ireland.—Things have gone on quietly here, and I trust some progress has been made. Our Services have been well attended, and the Communicants have increased since the Confirmation by our revered Bishop. Our Sunday School has been well attended and made progress under the care and teaching of Mrs. Wm. Johnson. The W. M. A. has done good work this year, and has sent out both money and a parcel to our Missionaries in the far West.

The Choir has also improved under the efforts of Miss

Mary Marshall, who is worthy of our best thanks.

Death has also carried off some of the first settlers in this part of the Parish, but I trust our loss has been their gain.

St. Luke's Church, Adderly.—Occasional Services are held here.

I much regret to state my faithful Church-Warden. Thomas Walker, died last September, while I was away on my vacation. He had just become a Communicant and always shewed much hospitality to his Pastor, and interest in his Church. Adderly is the poorer for his loss. I hope other young men may take warning from his sudden death, and give their Divine Master the early days of their youth.

St. Peter's Church, Black Lake.—Fortnightly Services are held here regularly. Our congregation has diminished owing to the work at the Mines ceasing, a few families only are left.

The Woman's Guild has done good work throughout the

year, though their numbers are few.

Our Organist, Mrs. Wilson, deserves our best thanks for her untiring efforts with the Choir and Organ

This Church was dedicated last June, when our Bishop

held his Confirmation, at which five were presented.

Our Services here are always very hearty, and I trust Black Lake will make progress when the Mines open next Spring.

St. John's Church, Thetford Mines.—Fortnightly Services through the Snmmer, and monthly Services during Winter, have been held here. The congregation is very small, owing to the closing of the Mines and there being no labour for workers in the Winter.

The Lord Bishop dedicated our little Church here last

June.

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I hope things will improve when the Asbestos Mines open again, as I trust they may next Summer.

When I survey the Parish as a whole, I see much to be thankful for, but at the same time much more might be done, if times were more prosperous.

KINGSEY.

The Rev. James S. Sykes reports :-

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In this Mission the year 1893 has been marked by many changes. By removals and deaths our numbers have been considerably reduced. Two families leaving St. Paul's, Sydenham, took from our subscriptions toward assessment \$28. Two from Spooner Pond \$25. From the same cause Denison's Mills loses about \$15. Add to these some smaller subscriptions, making the total loss over \$70, a large sum for a weak remainder to make up.

Our Sunday Schools have gone on as usual, that at Sydenham numbering thirty scholars, taught by Mrs. Sykes and the Misses Lodge. The one at Spooner Pond, taught by Mrs Lonsdell and the Misses Hall, has fifteen scholars. These latter have kindly paid for the papering of the Vestry—supplied it with a carpet, chair and stove-pipes—the stove being the gift of Mr. John Evans. I am thankful to the donors and fully appreciate their kindness on cold winter nights. The Sunday School at Denison's is still in operation, presided over by Mr. Wm. Denison, who is indefatigable in his efforts for its success.

In June, Mrs. Geo. Hall, a good, earnest, conscientious church-woman, departed this life, respected by all who knew her, and a warm personal friend, to whom I stand indebted for many kind and generous gifts.

Another, Mrs. Cleon Brock, a good wife and mother, died after only two weeks' illness, regretted by a large circle of friends. Still another, Mrs. Perkins, a kindly old lady of ninety-three, died. It was my privilege to minister to all these, and brighten their last days with words of hope and good cheer from God's Hely word.

A Bazaar in connection with Spooner Pond netted \$40, and a concert at Sydenham, got up to pay arrears of assessment, brought in \$45.

LAKE ST. JOHN INDIAN MISSION.

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The event of importance this year, was the consecration of the Church on July 12th, when sixty Indians communicated. The Bishop of New York kindly conducted one Sunday Service, and preached an eloquent sermon. A purse, containing \$31, was presented to the Missionary. A bell has been procured from Baltimore, and there is \$24 in the bank towards a stone foundation for the Church. This sum was raised through offertory collections.

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Rothera reports:-

In looking over the past year, it is with mingled feelings of joy and sorrow. There are many things to be thankful to Almighty God for; as signs of active life, and progress made in Church work. On the other hand the apathy and

indifference of many are causes of regret.

St. James' Church is near to the Parsonage and is the head-quarters of the Mission. The Services have been kept up regularly without omission, during the year, morning and evening alternately, besides the chief festivals of the Church. The attendance has been good during the Summer months. I had Services also at Nelson's Road and Wilson's Mills School-houses once a month, which have been very well attended. I am pleased to note that the attendance at Holy Communion, which has been administered once a month, has been better than last year; the average attendance has been over twenty. The Sunday School has done good work, and was carried on through the Summer months with the help of Mr. J. Prout and five teachers. I am sorry I can only be present every other Sunday, when I give object lessons on the Bible and Catechism.

The Sunday School Annual pic-nic took place on August 15th, when the scholars, teachers and friends met at the Church, and after a short Service, adjourned to the grounds adjoining the Parsonage until the rain came, which compelled them to take refuge in the Parsonage, where they took tea, and spent the rest of the evening in singing and games.

On October 29th, each Sunday scholar was presented with a book according to merit (during the Service), which gave satisfaction to all.

The Ladies' Aid have been steadily working and doing their little for God and His Church. They purchased and presented to St. James' Church, a plated set of Communion vessels, and put a hard-wood floor in the dining room at the

Parsonage, also bought paint to paint the Church.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Quebec paid us a visit on December 10th, and preached three times during the day: at St. James', 10.30 A.M.; St. Mark's, Kinnear's Mills, P.M.; St. Matthew's, Beattie's Settlement, 6.30 addressed the different congregations on behalf of the Diocesan Board, and explained the necessity of increasing their assessments, to help to make up the deficiency made by the withdrawal of the grant of the S. P. G. We were very fortunate, this year, in having two visits paid us by our esteered Bishop. The first visit was on June 6th, when His Loraship Confirmed six at St. Mark's, Kinnear's Mills, and three at St. James', Leeds; and on the 7th dedicated the new ('hurch at Beattie's Settlement and Confirmed sixteen. And on the second visit, December 14th, the Bishop came to Broughton, which is twenty miles from the Parsonage, where two Candidates were presented for Confirmation; and at a Missionary Meeting, the same evening, held at St. James' Church, the Bishop gave us a very interesting account of his work at South Acton, London, which was listened to with marked attention. On the next day, he consecrated St. Matthew's Church at Beattie's Settlement. These visits have proved very helpful, both to the Minister and the people. Such visits give much encouragement and impetus to the work going on.

I am sorry to state we have lost one of our best Churchworkers, by the death of Mr. Geo. Bayne, who has filled various offices: as Choir-master, Sunday School Teacher and Lay Delegate during thirty years at this Church. Our loss

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ey id During my absence, in the month of July, the Services were taken by Mr. N. Bayne, with acceptance and satisfaction to the people.

St. Matthew's, Beattie's Settlement.—I am pleased to state that the Church is finished, and the Bishop consecrated

it to the service of Almighty God on December 15th, which was a time for great joy and blessing, when one adult was Baptized and seven adults were Confirmed at the same time. I trust that the Church may be a centre for good, and that the people will make full use of the means of grace given to them by God, that they make progress in their spiritual life. There were no Communicants here until June the 7th, when the Bishop Confirmed sixteen and administered the Holy Communion to thirty for the first time. There are now thirty-four Communicants with an average attendance of twenty-three. I hope this is the beginning of better things to this congregation. I held a Sunday School here during the Summer months. On November 21st, a Service of song was given by the young people, which realized \$12.

Our thanks are due to "St. Matthew's Guild" for the beautiful Altar cloth they made us at about half cost. And to the "Church Helpers' Association," Quebec, for the fair linen and a set of plated Altar vessels which they let us

have for \$5.10.

There are many things required yet, especially a Font.

St. Mark's, Kinnear's Mills.—Divine Service is held here every Sunday morning and afternoon alternately, besides Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and Thanksgiving Day, also, a fortnightly week-day Service. The attendance at these Services might have been better. The Holy Communion is administered once a month. The average attendence has been over ten.

I hold monthly Services at Frizzel Hill and at the School House, in the first range of Leeds, which have been well

attended.

I endeavored to establish a Sunday School here; two young ladies promised to help, but could not get the parents to bring their children to School, because of the long distance most of them live from the Church.

St. Luke's, Broughton.—Divine Service is held here once in six weeks. The families here are now very few. The journey to get there and back makes it very hard. The Bishop visited this Church on December 14th; two Candidates were presented for Confirmation.

I have been collecting what was promised towards the Bishop Williams' Memorial Fund, but have not succeeded in getting it all in yet. Therefore too late to be inserted in

this year's accounts.

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tion and we on Let In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere and hearty thanks to the Wardens, Sunday School Teachers, the Organist and members of the Choir, the Rev. J. Kemp and Mr. J Prout, for their kind help. I pray that God's blessing may rest upon them and their work.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports:-

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On the 13th of February, the Lord Bishop dedicated a new and beautiful Altar, which had been presented to the Church by the members of the Guild. We are also indebted to the Guild for a new purple Altar cloth, and hangings for the Prayer Desk for use during Advert and Lent. We have had a brass Altar desk given by the Guild, aided by a donation from Mrs. Phillips, to whom we are indebted for costly gifts in the past. This lady has also, as a free gift to the Church, re-carpeted the whole of the Choir, which is a very great improvement.

Among the items included in the financial statement under the head of "other purposes," is the amount raised by the Guild during the past year, viz., \$146.73. There is also a sum of \$200, which has been collected in the Parish to replace the memorial window to the late Dr. Nicolls in the College Chapel. It also includes donations amounting to over \$40, and a sum of \$10 laid out on the Sunday School Library.

Our two Parochial organizations are still doing their quiet and useful work. I look upon our Woman's Auxiliary, both senior and junior branches, as a most important means of keeping bright and active among us the true spirit of the Church of Christ. The Guild, too, is most helpful. To the loving labors of its members we owe many things for the beautifying of the Sanctuary, which otherwise we should never have obtained.

Services have been held in the Church without interruption on every Sunday and Holy Day throughout the year, and since the dedication of our new Altar there has been a weekly celebration of the Holy Communion, and also one on "All Saints" Day and Festivals. During Advent and Lent we had special Services and courses of Sermons.

which were well attended. We have had the privilege of having our Bishop with us several times during the year, and of having both Canon Bullock and the Bishop of New Westminster address us in earnest, tender and solemn words. May all these opportunities and means of grace be abundantly blessed to the Glory of God and to the good of souls.

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LEVIS.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:-

I was inducted into this Parish, by his Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, on the 1st of January, 1893, and at once began to find out the people belonging to the Church. In doing this, I was greatly helped by the carefully prepared, and methodically arranged list of Parishioners

made by my predecessor, the Rev. G. G. Nicolls.

There are now in connection with Levis congregation, thirty-seven families, and twenty-two individuals not numbered in families. These are scattered over an area extending from Beaumont to the Etchemin River. Commencing with the 1st of January. 1893, Levis and New Liverpool were united and placed under my ministration, with the understanding that New Liverpool should have one Service every Sunday. One Service each month, to be held in the morning, with a Celebration of the Holy Communion, and the rest of the Services to be held in the afternoon.

This arrangement took from Levis one morning Service every month, which has been a great deprivation for a congregation that had always enjoyed two Services on Sunday. To supply this loss, the Rev. Mr. Larivière came over from Quebec, and gave a Service on the Sunday morning that I

was at New Liverpool.

Since the first of April, I have given Levis an early Celebration of Holy Communion, on the first Sunday in the month, after which I have driven to New Liverpool for morning Service and Holy Communion—returning to Levis for a Children's Service at three, and Evening Prayer at 7 P.M. On the other Sundays of the month there have been regular morning and evening Services every Sunday, with a mid-day Celebration of the Holy Communion on

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the third Sunday. There have been also, with a few interruptions, Service on Wednesday evenings, and on the principal Festivals of the Church's year. In addition to these Services, Cottage Readings have been held fortnightly during the Winter, and monthly during the Summer months, at the house of Mr. George Sample, Hadlow Cove, and at Mr. Craig's School-house. At all of these Services, the attendance was very encouraging.

The Sunday attendance, at Levis, has been fairly good, considering that so many of our people are engaged in employments which require them to work on Sunday There has been, however, a very perceptible improvement in the Sunday evening congregations, and in the number of regular Communicants, I wish I could say the same of the week evening Services. Of our growth in spiritual things, I cannot speak very confidently, for if there is spiritual life at all, it lies deep in the human heart, and is known only to God who seeth in secret, but I have reason to hope that in this most important matter we have made some progress.

The Ladies' Guild has worked faithfully during another year, and gathered by its devoted labours \$52.55, to be expended on some object connected with the Church or Rectory. During the past Summer the Guild expended, under the direction of Mr. Tofield and Mr. Joshua Thompson, the sum of \$145.40 in repairing and painting the outside of the Rectory, and has also given \$25 towards purchasing a new Carpet for the Chancel of the Church. In addition to this, the Church-Wardens expended upon the fences around the Church property, and upon repairs on the outside of the Church, the sum of \$157.00. The money for these much needed repairs was raised by two Concerts conducted by Miss N. Piton, our devoted Organist, assisted by other young friends in the Parish. There was also a Garden Party in the Rectory grounds under the management of the Ladies of the congregation. The sums realized from these efforts, and a few subscriptions from friends who had relations buried in the grave-yard, enabled the Wardens to pay for the work as it was done, so that we enter upon 1894 with all our property well fenced, and all our buildings in good repair and no debt upon the Parish. And what is more, we have on hand \$61, towards purchasing a Carpet for the Chancel of the Church, and matting for the Aisle. This amount has all been raised in the place, with the exception of \$10, which were given by the Church Helpers' Association of Quebec, for which I desire to express my sincere thanks. The Woman's Auxiliary has been quite active during the year, besides regular monthly meetings for work, two public Missionary Meetings were held, at the first of which able addresses were given by the Rev. Canon Thorneloe, of Sherbrooke, and the Rev. Messrs. Forsythe, of Stanstead and Washer, of Portneuf. With the second, was incorporated our Annual Intercessory Service for Missions, and was addressed by the Rev. Mr. Balfour, on the value and necessity of Prayer, and by the Rev. Mr. Parrock, on the obligation which rests upon all Christians to assist in Missionary work.

The Rev. Mr. Fyles followed these interesting addresses by a thoughtful review of the work done by the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the Dominion. The sum of \$24.72 was realized by the Auxiliary's labours and collections at

Missionary Meetings.

The Sunday School still goes on under the faithful superintendency of Mr. George Addie, who has associated with him five faithful and devoted teachers. I try to assist them by addressing or catechising the children once a month. Through the efforts of the Sunday School Teachers, aided by a liberal grant from the S. P. C. K., we have a very fine Library, which is very much appreciated by both parents and children. The sum of \$20.90 was contributed for Sunday School work during the year.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited this Parish on the 30th of March, and Confirmed eighteen persons, all of whom became Communicants at once, and have com-

municated with more or less regularity ever since.

I cannot close this report without expressing my sincere thanks to the Organist and Choir, the Church-Wardens and all others who have kindly assisted me by their faithful and devoted services, to advance the cause of Christ and His Church in this place.

What the future of this Parish will be, it is difficult to say, for deaths and removals are constantly reducing our numbers. Mr. William Tofield and family, all devoted and faithful members of the Church, have left us to take up their residence in the City of Quebec. Mr. Wilkinson and family have removed to the Western States. Mrs. DeTotus,

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Mrs. Simmons and Mrs. Simpson, old members of the congregation, and Ida Sample, Bertha Atkinson, lambs of the flock, have, during the year, been transplanted to the paradise of God.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. Josiah Ball reports :-

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The usual Missionary work has been regularly carried on at Grindstone and Entry Island, and my visits to Grosse Isle changed from monthly to once in three weeks. Next Summer. I purpose holding Services there every alternate week. The infectious disease which broke out at Grosse Isle, three Summers since, reappeared in June last, and in a very brief time, carried off three children. I am thankful to say there have been no cases since. But this occurrence so alarmed the parents that they were afraid to assemble in Church, not knowing whence the infection came, so that my work at that end of the Mission has been sadly interrupted. Three families left their houses for an indefinite period, two went to Bryon Island, and one to Old Harry Head, in order, if possible, to escape the contagion.

In August, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited this Mission, and held Services at Entry Island, Amherst and Grindstone. Seven young persons were Confirmed at Eutry, and six at the latter place. His Lordship did not visit Grosse Isle owing to the sad circumstances above mentioned. The Bishop, however, left a letter of condolence, which was read at East Cape at a Service held in a private house, and again at Grosse Isle, to the few persons whom the Missionary could persuade to assemble in the Church, in the month of September.

At the Bishop's request, I have commenced collecting funds for the purpose of building a small ('hurch on Entry Island, as the Services there are now held in a private dwelling. Nearly one half the estimated cost of the buildinghas been raised, and it is hoped that by next Spring there will be a sufficient sum on hand to enable us to proceed with the undertaking. In this matter, our thanks are due to the Honourable Senator Price, for his very liberal contribution.

I would take this opportunity to thank the Church

Helpers of Quebec for the travelling Communion Set presented by them for the use of this Mission; and also to Mrs. Heneker, of Sherbrooke, for the barrel of clothing for distribution among the poorer members of my flock.

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Financially. I am thankful to say that a more liberal spirit has men manifested by the Grindstone congregation in the matter of paying their assessments, but Grosse Isle is still deficient. The appeal towards the Bishop Williams' Monorial Mission Fund has also been fairly responded to.

MALBAIE.

The Rev. Geo. Radley Walters reports:-

I have but simply to report the ordinary routine of Coast Missionary work for another year, consisting of frequent

Services, Parish visiting, Church building, &c.

In the month of July, our good Bishop visited us, accompanied by his son and the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, when our two Churches, St. Peter's, Malbaie, and St. Luke's, Corner of the Beach, were consecrated. The Holy Communion was celebrated after each Consecration Service, Forty-three Candidates were Confirmed, three being adults and near their seventieth year, (there being a Confirmation in each Church). His Lordship also consecrated a piece of land, at the Corner of the Beach, for a Burial Ground.

Much interest was manifested in these Services, the Churches were full; every one being much impressed by the earnest, soul stirring and loving addresses delivered both at the Consecration and Confirmation Services, by the Bishop, and all here look forward with much pleasure to his Lordship's next visit.

In the afternoon of each day, the Archdeacon pleaded very earnestly the claims of the Diocesan Board for an increased amount of yearly assessment.

We have four Day Schools (Protestant) in the Mission, two of which are kept open the whole of the school year, viz: Malbaie and the New Line; at Barachois, school is kept part of the year; at Corner of the Beach, school is kept perhaps during the Winter, or may be the Summer only, this year, for lack of funds; and being joined to the Percé district, they have no teacher, consequently no school

is taught. The twelve families there, all members of our own Church, are feeling very dispirited to see their children grow up without any educational advantages, the assessment arising from their property is not adequate for the support of a Teacher, being but \$50 yearly. I have thought of applying to the "Education Fund" of the Diocesan Church Society for a small grant on behalf of Corner Beach; however small a recognition, it would be much appreciated by our Corner Beach people.

I am happy to report that the exterior of our third new Church, (the one now building at Barachois,) is quite completed. I am now endeavouring to obtain from the families there material for finishing the interior. I am most eager to complete this Church during the coming Sammer, if possible. I think, for its size, it promises to be the most

successful of the three.

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We are just now considering the work of staining and varnishing the interior of our Malbaie and Corner Beach Churches. The congregation of each of these Churches have procured nearly sufficient funds for the work from successful Tea and Fancy Sales held during the past year. Our greatest difficulty now is to procure the material from Montreal, which during the Winter months can only be brought as far as Carleton, thus necessitating, for some one, a drive of one hundred and forty miles each way to procure it. I must not forget to thank the families of Viberts and Mabes at Corner Beach for an immense amount of trouble undertaken in providing so good a Tea, and in every way helping to make the undertaking so successful in their Church's behalf.

During the Summer months, Miss LeGresley and Miss LeGros kindly assisted me as teachers in my Sunday School, the number of children attending being much as last year. The distance at which many live is the chief cause of irregularity. The Sunday Services during last year, at each of my three Stations, were better attended than they have been for quite a long time past. This I noticed especially in Malbaie. Our Sunday Offertory too has shown a decided increase.

Twice last Winter, in Malbaie and at Corner Beach, I held Lantern Services, the Churches being crowded. Of course these were week night Services, when I exhibited "Scones in the life of Our Lord."

On the evening of Good Friday, after the Litany, we had the Stations of the Cross, with suitable Hymns. Shown from the Lantern, these Services were very much appreciated, and impressed the story of Our Biessed Lord's life and death on the minds of these people much more forcibly than a Sermon.

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Our Harvest Services were very successful this year, both our Churches were nicely decorated. At Corner Beach the young people displayed much taste, and took pains to make their Church look very pretty. At Malbaie the Chancel was extremely well decorated, the Pulpit, Prayer Desk and Lectern, and the sills of the windows, were a mass of moss, fern, grain, leaves and crab apples. For all this work I must thank Mrs. Collas, Miss LeGresley, Miss LeGros and Mrs. Hocquard—Mrs Collas sending a number of flowers in pots, which were tastefully arranged along the Chancel steps.

I would thank Mr. Collas for largely helping the Church-

Wardens in collecting the year's assessment.

At Corner Beach, thanks to Mr. Mabe, our assessment was collected promptly. To the Wardens there, is due the credit of getting the congregation to place a neat new fence, as a free gift, around the Church property. I am also indebted, through Mrs. James Vibert, to the good people at the Corner, for the gift of a handsome black Marble Clock, as a Christmas gift, bearing a suitable inscription on a silver plate. For this I tender them my best thanks.

To my Wardens, Messrs. LeMarquand and John LeGros, Jnr., for their services during the year, is due the thanks

of the congregation.

I am just in receipt of a large number of the "Banner of Faith Almanacks," from the Lady Mabella Knox, of England, one of which I intend placing in every house in my Mission during the first week of the new year.

NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. Edgar B. Husband reports:—

New Carlisle.—On the whole there is much cause for thankfulness. The attendance at Church on Sundays has been better than in the previous year, although there is great room for improvement. The assessment has been

regularly paid, but not without much trouble to the Church-Wardens. I trust the day is not far distant when the congregation will realize their duty in this matter. Our Communicants, I regret to say, are few for the size of the congregation. May God stir up our hearts in this matter.

The Sunday School has been faithfully carried on during the past year. Once a month I catechised the children, and lately have held a special Service for them. I much regret the loss of three faithful teachers through removal to other places, but trust their successors will follow in their footsteps, and thus help in making the Sunday School the backbone of the Parish. I long to see the parents taking a greater interest in this most important work, by seeing that their children attend regularly.

I am glad to say considerable progress has been made with the new Church. The outside (tower excepted) is near completion. We hope to have the glass in, in the Spring. Then I hope the whole congregation will give a willing hand to pull down the old Church and fit up the new. One thing is quite certain, we cannot remain in the self Church aparther Winter.

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Miss E. Murison has collected on behalf of the new Church in all \$337.12.

In August, a very successful Concert was held in the Town Hall on behalf of a new Organ. Sixty-one dollars were realized.

In the Upper School House, I have held Thursday Evening Services, which have been well attended. During the Winter, I am holding one Sunday Evening Service, as well, with much success.

The Sunday School here also has been faithfully carried on, and occasionally catechised by me.

A united Sunday School Treat was held in the Temperance Hall in January, and one in which Paspebiac joined in the Rectory grounds, in September.

Paspebiac.—Steady work has been going on in this Parish, which is producing good fruit. The attendance at Church has been very regular. The Woman's Auxiliary and Guild have done good work. The Auxiliary has now fourteen members, all of whom take a deep interest in its work. A very substantial barrel of clothing has been sent to Fort Alexander. All have worked well,

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The members of the Guild have now completed their work in building the Church Hall. They held a Bazaar in November, which realized one hundred and fifty-seven dollars, thus enabling them to pay off the entire debt on the building, including the painting. They deserve great praise for bringing this self-imposed work to such a successful issue.

In January, a very pleasant Parish Tea and Social was held in the Church Hall.

The Sunday School also has been faithfully carried on during the past year.

Hopetown.—The new Church and Burial-Ground were consecrated on July 21st, when a very hearty Service was held, assisted by the Choir from Paspebiac. It was a day that will long be remembered, especially by those who have taken such a deep interest in its erection. There has been a regular attendance, though we hope before long to see more taking an interest in their Church. Through the exertions of Mrs. Charles Smith, we have been able to purchase a small Organ for the Church. Our thanks are due to the Church Helpers' Society, Quebec, for the Altar cloth and hanging they so generously gave.

I must not conclude without mention of the great event of the year, I mean his Lordship's first visit amongst us. His able and earnest addresses seem to have left a deep impression. I am glad many availed themselves of the opportunity of meeting his Lordship at the Rectory, notwithstanding the inclement weather.

I desire to thank the united Parishes for their loyal welcome to their Bishop, and for many kindnesses, substantial, and otherwise, to myself during the past year.

NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:--

I was inducted into the Incumbency of this Mission on Sunday, the 1st of January, 1893, by his I hip the Bishop of the Diocese, and at once entered upon the duties.

There are connected with New Liverpool congregation, eighteen families in Winter, and twenty-one in Summer, three families moving to Quebec for the Winter months.

In addition to these, there are six adults not counted in families. Of these families, three reside at Chaudière Curve, two at Chaudière Mills, two at Bélair, one at St. Henri, the others live in the vicinity of the Church.

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New Liverpool has had for the year a Sular Sunday Service and a monthly Celebration of the I Communion; also, during the Winter months, week-day Services on all the principal Festivals of the Church. In addition, there have been fortnightly Services for the Winter, and monthly for the Summer, at Chaudière Curve, where there are several Protestant families outside of those belonging to the Church, and occasional Cottage Readings at St. Henri, Bélair and Chaudière Mills. All of these Services have been well attended.

The attendance for the year, at New Liverpool, has been very good, and, considering the distance that many of our people live from the Church, very steady, so that when the roads are at all passable, our people are well represented at Church. The number of Communicants has also increased and they are very regular.

His Lordship the Bishop visited this Mission on the 30th of March, and Confirmed sixteen persons, all of whom are Communicants. Altogether I feel confident that some real progress in spiritual things has been accomplished here.


Through the kindness of our Church-Warden, at a cost of \$113.44, a very fine horse-shed has been erected, so that now our people have no excuse for not attending Church, for their horses are well protected whilst they are worshipping.

In closing this report, I must acknowledge the many kindnesses I have received from my people at New Liverpool, and especially from Henry Atkinson, Esq., our painstaking Church-Warden. I desire also to thank Miss Ethel Atkinson, our devoted Organist, for her faithful services, and all the members of the Choir, for their kind assistance.

NEWPORT.

The Rev. H. A. Dickson reports:-

Since sending in my last annual report of the Mission of Newport, no change worthy of notice has been made in my routine work, but the regular course of former years








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has been closely pursued amid both encouragements, and results that contrast strongly with what one would wish to see.

The average attendance during the year, at Clifton and Learned Plain, has been larger than that of last year, and at Island Brook, though the increase is not as marked, there has been more regularity on the part of individual members, while both here and at Randboro' the ('ommunicants' roll has received new names.

The Sunday Schools have been well attended with the exception of that at Randboro', which continued, owing to the fact that the children live at such a distance from the

Church, only for a short time during the Summer.

At Learned Plain, Mrs. Fred. Bowen superintended a well attended School, and the scholars seem to have taken an interest in their work; at Island Brook, Mrs. Lothrope took charge, but on her removal from the Mission, I found it necessary to take her place in the School, and have found the hours so spent both interesting and profitable. The Woman's Guild kindly raised \$8 for Sunday School supplies, while for the Learned Plain School \$10 was raised, and forwarded by the Archdeacon, who procured for them, from the S. P. C. K., a nice addition to their Library.

Until within the last two months we have been boarding with a private family in Randboro', but having rented a house we are now living in Sawyerville, which brings us more in contact with the people of the most thickly populated part of the Mission, and provides them with a Church Sunday School, which Mrs. Dickson has started in the house.

A Parsonage, though much needed, is still a thing to be hoped for, but we could not see our way clear to undertake it this year, as both Churches require extensive repairs, the estimated cost of which will be about \$300, which will be quite as much as the Mission will be able to raise in addition to its ordinary expenses; but the necessity of having one is so plainly seen by the people, that were they as well agreed as to where it should be built for the convenience of the whole Mission, we would look for good results when a seasonable time to undertake it arrives.

Messrs G. G. Hurd and Chas. Loveland have undertaken to sheath the Church in Randboro' with Ash, and for that purpose have already received \$67 on their subscription list, which has encouraged them to procure lumber specially

prepared for the work. At Island Brook the same work must be done, but must be delayed till the lumber is ready, they have however \$75 on hand, and Mr. Geo. French has given 1400 feet of seasoned Ash, and has kindly undertaken to saw free of charge the rest of the lumber required, which is to be given and drawn to the mill by members of the congregation. The Woman's Guild, which has had a flourishing year under the able direction of Mrs. Geo. French, is taking a special interest in this work, which, together with the willingness with which the people seem ready to undertake the repairing of their Church, leads me to hope that before our next annual report is due, this much needed work, as well as that on the Church in Randboro', can be reported as having been accomplished.

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On the 17th of June, we had a visit from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who Confirmed thirteen Candidates in Randboro' and eight at Island Brook, including men and women whose work and influence are felt and appreciated by those interested in the advancement of the Church in this Mission.

We were also visited by the Venerable Archdeacon, who arranged an exchange for Christmas Day, by which he took my duty while I went to Lake Megantic; by Dr. Adams, who, on November 19th, preached in behalf of Bishop's College, and by Mr. Robertson, of Cookshire, who preached our Harvest Thanksgiving Sermon at Randboro'. Among our visitors must be named Mr. A. Dorey, whose visit was much appreciated by those interested in the musical part of our Services.

PENINSULA AND LITTLE GASPÉ.

The Rev. N. M. Bayne reports:-

On the 5th of October last I succeeded the Rev. H. A. Brooke as assistant to the Rev. G. T. Harding, in this Mission. From that day to the present my work has been of a most happy nature. I have endeavored to carry it on almost entirely according to the orderly plan in which my predecessor left it.

Services have been held in St. Matthew's Church, Peninsula, alternately once and twice on Sunday, and every Wednesday evening as well. The attendance has been very good, notably so at the week-day Service, considering

the distance which many of our people have to come. Latterly I have substituted a class of instruction for the Wednesday evening Service, once a fortnight, which promises to be very helpful, particularly to the young.

Earnestness and devotion are very happily apparent in the Services, which is a matter of thankfulness to us all. The music is exceedingly good for a country congregation, thanks to the training in singing given the young people by the Rev. Mr. Harding, and the faithfulness and efficiency

of the Organist, Mrs. Louis Annet.

At Little Gaspé regular Sunday Service is held, the attendance being also very good. Our people here are not so numerous as in Peninsula, yet the Services are hearty in the very comfortable ('hurch which has for some time been quite completed. Here we have also a Choir over which Miss Gavey presides as Organist. Occasional week-day Services are held and well attended.

As soon as I am able to keep a horse, I hope to make extra Services and classes of instruction a more regular

thing.

At Ship Head the monthly Cottage Service is being continued and seems to be appreciated not only by the few belonging to the Church, but by others in the neighborhood as well.

The Sunday School at Little Gaspé is, with difficulty, carried on during the Fall and Winter months owing to the condition of the roads. Mr. Chas. Bartlett, the Superintendent, although living at a considerable distance from the Church, endeavors to keep up the work.

In St. Matthew's, Peninsula, Mr. Wm. Miller, the Superintendent, and four Teachers, continue a good work among the children.

Holy Communion is celebrated regularly once a month by the Rev. Mr. Harding, when the weather admits of crossing the Bay from Sandy Beach.

First steps have been taken towards the building of a Parsonage, which is much needed in the Mission. A site has been secured adjoining the Church in Peninsula, and timber for the frame is already being prepared. The house now in use as a Parsonage is a very old one, and almost a mile from the Church; however, it has been made tolerably comfortable for the Winter, through the untiring kindness of the congregation.

And here I wish to express my deep gratitude to all those who have been so kind to us since arriving in the Mission. Their concern for our physical welfare is only part of the proof of the truth and depth of the spiritual life here existing. True devotion to the work and service of God is, I feel sure, to be found all through the Mission; Church principles are fixed in hearts and lives to a happy degree. God has certainly blessed His work in days past, and if we in the present are but true, I trust He will still continue to bless it.

PORTNEUF.

The Rev. C. B. Washer writes:-

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My report for the past year is as follows: Routine work has been maintained without break. I took advantage of a month's leave of absence in the Summer, when my place was ably and with much acceptance taken by the Rev. G. A. Kuhring, of Toronto.

Portneuf.—The Church here has been improved in the interior. The walls have been coloured terra cotta, the benches revarnished, and the side windows filled with Cathedral glass. I noted last year the filling of the centre light of the west window with stained glass of well designed and executed subject, by Mr. Walter Greenough. This Summer the same gentleman has, with great kindness, added two side lights of beautifully harmonising antique glass. There has also been placed in the turret a bell (of Meneely founding), and the members of the congregation now delight to hear the sound of the Church-going bell. I am glad to record again that the congregations continue as good as ever. Our Father in God paid us a visit in May, and Confirmed seven persons, who have all become Communicants. The Communicants are now about one half of the Church population of this part of the Mission. We have monthly Communions and on the great Festivals; the attendance is good, but, of course, might be better, and I trust those who are now irregular will in due time become regular.

Halesboro'.—For many years one corner of the Church at this station was in a bad condition, owing to certain defects in construction and neglect. At last it was resolved to

take down the decayed part and rebuild it. As the people are in poor circumstances, money could not be looked for; but they willingly offered themselves, and the men of the place gave many days to the work; gave also hewn timber and shingles, and drew stone for the repair of the foundation. All the work is not finished, the most difficult, however, is done, and what remains will be completed next Spring.

The attendance at Church on the whole is not satisfactory, most of the people live over three miles from the Church; we may hope, notwithstanding, that increased love of worshipping God with the brethren, will soon make distance and unfavourable weather not worth considering. Five persons were Confirmed by the Bishop on his visit to this Mission, and are now Communicants. The proportion of Communicants to Church population of this section is

nearly the same as at Portneuf.

We have kept our Diocesan Mission Board Assessment paid up, thanks to the Church-Wardens, who, I am sure, find their work harder every year, not from any unwillingness on the part of the subscribers, but from small and continuous emigration. The total amount subscribed to the various funds of the Church Society shows a slight falling off compared with last year, owing. I imagine, to some whose names do not appear in the lists not being ready with their contributions by the time for transmitting to the Treasurer. It is pleasing to note that the village people, in addition to resolutely keeping up the amounts of their usual contributions, have shown a brotherly spirit in giving money towards necessary outlay on repairs of Halesboro' Church.

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I need add nothing about discouragements, they are as nothing when we remember the many evidences that the Lord is with us and blessing the efforts of pastor and flock. May we show our gratitude for help in the past by en-

deavouring more and more to grow in grace.

RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. James Hepburn reports:—

I am happy in reporting a year of good work. During the Winter the damages awarded us against the Architect came into the hands of the Warden, so that at Easter we were ready for operations. A committee was appointed to carry forward the work of repairs, viz.: T. Hart, sur., J. N. Harkom, F. Lyster, G.

Gymer and Dr. E. T. Cleveland.

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Failing to secure a contractor capable of being entrusted with the work, the committee bravely undertook it themselves, Mr. Hart kindly volunteering to superintend it. This meant the saving of many dollars, and was also a guarantee of excellent work. It was a noble thing for Mr. Hart, who had earned a time of leisure in his latter days, to devote it thus to his Church. And it was a beautiful sight to see him daily on the spot, from morning to night, watching every detail, and with a kind word and a ready smile for every one. And what the congregation owes to the engineering skill of Mr. Harkom can hardly be told. His plan for the correction of the weakness of the roof (from which so much trouble came) was a bold one; but success, perfect success was the justification of it. were the two leading spirits in the committee, but it would be very unjust to the other three not to speak of their readiness on all occasions to meet for consultation and to do any of a hundred things to help forward the work.

When we found that we had secured a solid and substantial building, and withal very pleasing to the eye without, we resolved to expend a reasonable sum upon ornamentation within. The committee invited the congregation on several occasions to give advice in some matters, and it secured help, besides strengthening good will. I owe more than I can tell to all members of the committee for doing their work so well, and for making my position so pleasant to me. They need no words of praise from me, seeing with their own eyes the result of their united efforts, and having within their own hearts the comfort of

I do not think the day (August 25th), when the Bishop was with us for the opening Service, will soon be forgotten. It was good to be there. Morning and evening the Church was filled to its utmost capacity; and in the morning few were present, but members of the Church gathered from the country parts and the neighboring townships. The Service was inspiring. There were one hundred Communicants. The Confirmation Service in the evening was most impressive. Nothing could be more helpful to the Church than the Bishop's clear exposition of the grounds

having tried to do their work.

of Confirmation as found in the Holy Bible, and in the continuous history of the Christian Church. A large attendance from the other Churches of the town were present at this Service, and they must have appreciated the address, which was so forcible and yet so charitable. The class was small, only fifteen; but during the season of preparation my assistant was at Grosse Isle, and so much of my time was given to the repairs of the Church that I was unable to do what I wished for many, so that I greatly preferred to present a small class and leave the others till more could be done for them. It is a false strength to the Church to present those who are unprepared.

With the assistance of several kind friends the grounds of the Church and Rectory have been much improved.

The great work done this Summer has not been a tax upon the congregation, the award being large enough to defray the expense. Not that we have not suffered from the bad work that compelled us to go to law for redress, for the suffering has been great and has showed itself in many ways; but having been taxed hitherto to get the award, it was enough to do the present work, seeing the committee did so much as a labour of love, and also partly to repay past expenses. We are all deeply thankful that we are safely through with the loss, as small as it is.

In reviewing the year, the observance of Christmas and Easter shine out clear and bright. Many loving hands beautified the building, and about one hundred Communicants on each occasion testified to the blessedness of the seasons. A well filled purse at Christmas was very gratifying, and aided me materially in fitting up the Rectory. And here I must mention the great kindness of Mrs. Carpenter and Mrs. Rainbach in assuming the responsibility of raising, through the assistance of the young people, the amount of \$81.85 spent on beautifying the Rectory. They deserve far more than thanks.

Reluctantly I have changed the hour of Sunday School from 10 A.M. to 3 P.M. It takes me out of the School three Sundays in the month, which I miss and deplore, but a decided gain is realized in obtaining the services of Mrs. Hepburn, Mrs. Harkom and Miss Fowler. We have now a flourishing School of more than eighty with a very decided gain in attendance and interest. I am still without a man as Teacher, and am obliged to be satisfied with a good young lad Confirmed last Summer.

We have been favoured with visits from the Archdeacon in the interests of the Memorial Fund and of increased Assessments. His Services were very acceptable and helpful.

The Parish has promised about \$500 for the Bishop Williams' Memorial Fund, but only less than a third has yet been paid. However there is no fear, but it will be given.

The monotony of work has also been relieved by Missionary meetings. The Rev. Chs. Brooks, of Barnston, delighted us with an address upon his work in Constantinople, Bishop Sillitoe, spoke to a large audience about his work in New Westminster, and Mrs. Sillitoe quite captured the Woman's Auxiliary. They received \$252. Miss Sugden also lectured twice, and made a deep impression upon many securing \$30.50.

It is a pleasure to me to be able to speak without reserve of the kindness and efficiency of all my officers and helpers in every department of work.

RIVIERE-DU-LOUP.

The Rev. Gustavus G. Nicolls writes:-

There is very little to report.

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I took charge of this Mission on October 1st, and for many weeks thereafter it remained undecided whether the work here could be continued, or the Mission would have to be closed.

The most pressing difficulties have now been arranged, and I am thankful to say that things will continue as before.

The last few weeks have been almost entirely lost through sickness in my family, and here in the Parsonage; but the Services have been kept up without interruption, and there is now promise for the future.

LAKE BEAUPORT.

I was appointed in November to give a monthly Service, for three months, in the Church here; and have twice held Service, with Celebration of the Holy Communion. A Confirmation class has been begun with, at present, seven or eight members.

SANDY PEACH.

The Rev. Geo. T. Harding reports :-

The Services here have been kept up as usual. That is, all the days for which the Church has appointed Collect, Epistle, and Gospel have been duly observed, with few exceptions. Daily Evening Prayer was said in Church during the Summer months. Special week-night Services were held in Lent and Advent, with occasional Cottage Services in different parts of the Mission and many private Celebrations of Holy Communion for the sick and aged.

Regarding the Lenten Services, I have to acknowledge kind help from the Rev. J. P. Richmond, who delivered an excellent course of lectures, here, on "The Baptismal Covenant," which seemed to be much appreciated by the

people.

It is with thankfulness I am able to report a marked improvement in the attendance at Holy Communion, especially during the latter part of the year. All who were Confirmed in the Summer have come to Communion, some frequently, besides which, not a few confirmed long ago, who had never at least in my time received the Sacrament, have lately made a beginning. At the Christmas Celebration there were fifty-two Communicants, which is the largest number I have yet had at any one time.

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During last Winter, I had Bible Classes for adults, as usual—one at the Parsonage, and another at the Barachois School-house. Both were well attended, but the latter, especially so, the interest seeming to increase towards the end. Sometimes, nearly all the seats were occupied, and the last few times of meeting the class, there were over

sixty—of nearly all ages—present.

I must not omit to mention, also, with thankfulness, that the Sunday Services, began a year ago at this School-house, have continued to be as successful as at first. We have been obliged to enlarge the room in which it is held, a corner of the vestibule being at the same boarded off to make a kind of vestry room. I understand, too, that through some private exertions—that is without the congregation being asked to become responsible—a harmonium has been purchased, and is soon to be presented to us for use at these Services, which will, of course, tend greatly to improve them and increase the interest.

We were very much cheered and benefited by a visit in July from the Lord Bishop, who Confirmed twenty-three persons. We took advantage of his being here to have a short Service for the blessing of our new Parsonage. This was held in the house—or rather at the door—after Evensong was said in Church. All the Parishioners were invited, with the neighbouring Clergy, and a tea was served in connection therewith.

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ese ove Work at the Parsonage has been going on steadily all Summer. It is now very comfortable and convenient, and looks well inside and out. But in order to carry out the plan adopted regarding the inside finishing work—which exceeds what is generally thought, sufficient—a good deal remains still to be done, and another year or two will hardly see all the details completed.

I am thankful to find that we are still advancing in the matter of contributions to outside objects. Towards the funds of the Church Society we have collected \$5 more this year than last, and for all extra parochial objects there is an increase of about \$30. The amounts collected by means of Missionary cards are:—

And yet the Sunday Collections for parochial purposes are again in excess of all previous years, aggregating \$106.83.

It is very worthy of notice also that, in addition to all other moneys raised for home purposes, and through the diligent exertions of a few young Ladies of the congregation, a sufficient sum was collected to purchase a good quality of matting for the aisles of the Church, which is a great improvement as regards looks and a benefit in other ways.

I beg again to acknowledge the kindness shown to myself and family by the people here. As usual, the year's wood was cut and hauled to the Parsonage, and the present of a handsome pair of portières for her rooms was received by Mrs. Harding.

SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Canon Thorneloe reports:-

The year now closing has been marked by a few events of importance to the Parish.

First must be mentioned the ten days Mission in Lent, conducted by Rev. Canon Bullock, of Leeds, England. We had had no experience of Parochial Missions, and it was not without misgivings that we decided to take advantage of the opportunity offered us. But the result fully justified our decision. The Missioner's quiet and churchly methods, his powerful and moving addresses, together with the outspoken character of his teaching in the after meetings, not only stirred the Parish deeply but left behind an unmistakable impress for good. This impress is still apparent. We trace it however not so much in remarkable cases of spiritual reformation. Though not a few were awakened to a wiser sense of the importance of religious things, as in a better hold of Church principles, a more earnest spirit, and a warmer interest in Church work throughout the Parish. It will certainly be long before the memory of the Missioner and his work will fade from the minds of our people.

Another event not to be passed over in silence is the removal of the Rev. R. J. Fothergill, who, on the 1st September last, after five years of zealous and faithful labour as Curate in Sherbrooke, left the Parish to take charge of the Mission of Shigawake. He had won the affection and esteem of our people, and there were many expressions of regret at his departure. His influence yet lives in the Parish. We have not yet succeeded in filling his place, consequently the work of the Parish has to some extent suffered. But I am constrained to acknowledge with gratitude that our laymen have rallied round me nobly in the hour of need, and to the extent of their power have aided me in every good word and work.

A third event calls for brief mention. On St. Luke's Day the second annual Parochial Conference of Church workers took place. Holy Communion was celebrated in the morning. In the afternoon, a meeting of workers was held, at which reports of various Associations of the Parish were read and discussed. In the evening, a second meeting of workers took place, which was very largely attended. Reports and papers on practical subjects were read and great interest in the work of the Church in our midst was manifested. This conference, bringing together workers in the various departments of Parochial activity, has already resulted in the quickening of several of our chief Parochial

organizations, notably, for example, the Ladies' Guild, the Sunday School of St. Peter's and the Girls' Friendly So-

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ly al The anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary of the District was held in this Parish, in October last, and proved to be an occasion of great interest. Mrs. Dunn and a large number of delegates were present. There was a Choral Celebration in St. Peter's at 10 o'clock. Various meetings took place during the day. And, in the evening, a Missionary Meeting was held in St. Peter's Church Hall, the Rev. C. H. Brooks and the Rev. A. Stevens being the speakers.

The Bishop of New Westminster visited us in Lent and gave an interesting account of the Church in British Columbia. On the same occasion, Mrs. Sillitoe gave a delight-

Full address to the Woman's Auxiliary.

Early in the Summer, a house to house canvass of the Parish was made in the interests of the Bishop Williams' Memorial Mission Fund. And though the result was not what we had hoped it would be, not a few of our people feeling unable to subscribe at that time, yet the contributions of the Parish to this good work were brought up to \$1,727.45 all told. It is hoped that they, who have not yet subscribed, will do so later on.

The Parish is much indebted to the Rev. Dr. Adams, who has taken duty fortnightly for the past three months at the Church of the Advent and occasionally at St. Peter's, and to other clergymen who have rendered assistance from time to time.

The Rector's thanks are due to many earnest workers of both sexes.

At St. Peter's the congregations have held their own throughout the year. The average attendance being a trifle larger than that of last year.

The Celebrations of Holy Communion on every Sunday and Holy Day, throughout the year, have been appreciated by many as a real blessing to the Parish. There is reason to believe that the daily Morning and Evening Prayers have also been prized by a few.

The various organizations before reported continue their useful labours. A Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, small but earnest, established early in the year, is in active operation.

The Choir, which is in a state of gratifying efficiency,

has contributed largely to the dignity and interest of our Services. At intervals during the Autumn and Winter, Services of Sacred Song have been rendered and have been greatly appreciated. The Parish is fortunate indeed to be able to retain the services of so excellent an Organist and Choir-master as Mr. Arthur Dorey.

The Church is indebted to the Ladies' Guild for a new

purple Altar Cover, Lectern Frontal and Stole.

In this Church, on February 12th, the Bishop of the Diocese held a Confirmation, a class of twenty-four being presented by the Rector. On the morning of September 29th (St. Michael and All Angels), the Rev. C. H. Brooks was advanced to the Priesthood; and in the evening of the same day thirty-seven Candidates were Confirmed. These were occasions of great interest and great benefit to the Parish.

The Bible Class at this Church, held on Sunday afternoons, and open to men and women, has increased greatly this year. The average attendance has been thirty-five.

The largest number on any Sunday fifty-four.

At The Church of the Advent, the congregations have kept up admirably during the year, and have been especially good at the evening Service during the past few months. Until a successor to Mr. Fothergill is appointed, the Sunday Morning Service has of necessity been discontinued; and the Celebrations of Holy Communion have been diminished in number.

The Sunday School is still managed by Mr. Elkins and is in efficient operation. The attendance, however, is not quite so large as that of last year.

A bell, weighing 422 lbs., has been purchased and is in position. The money for this object was raised chiefly by Mr. Nutter. Two beautiful Chairs have been provided for the Chancel by the exertions of Mrs. Johnston.

SHIGAWAKE.

The Rev. Gustavus G. Nicolls reports:-

I began work here on May 29th, 1892, and as the sixteen months have been to me months of great happiness, so I hope they may not have been without profit to the work of the Mission.

Shigawake.—The Services have been kept up regularly. The attendance at them on Sundays was never bad, and for the last six months has increased markedly, and been exceedingly good; and the responding is always most hearty. I wish I could say the same about the congregations at the week-day Services (especially in Advent and Lent); though even these have been as large as is usual in country places. The Woman's Guild has been made more devotional in character; and has also continued its material labours, and—by means of occasional sales, entertainments, &c.,—has rendered substantial pecuniary assistance.

The Sunday School has not been as well nor as regularly attended as could be wished. The fact that it is, from the nature of the work of the Mission, often impossible for the Clergyman to be present, is a great drawback; though it is not by this intended to cast the smallest slur upon the faithful labours of Mr. Frank Skene, the Superintendent, or upon that of some of the Teachers.

It would be ungrateful not to mention how much the congregation is indebted to the excellent services, wholly

gratuitous, of Miss Beatrice Travers, the organist.

Port Daniel.—Here also the Sunday and week-day Services have been regularly kept up. A fortnightly evening Service in the School-house above the mountain has been almost always excellently attended,—far better, I grieve to say, than the Services in the Church, which are as a rule very poorly attended, while the responding is almost nil, and there appears to be a general lack of interest—both in the Services, and in Church matters generally—which is painful and disappointing, and to me quite inexplicable in its contrast with the state of affairs existing in the other two congregations in the Mission.

There are two Sunday Schools,—one at the Church, which is small and fluctuating; the other, at the Schoolhouse above mentioned. The latter is conducted by Mr. Norman Dow, who deserves all possible credit for his faith-

fulness and perseverance.

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There is no regular "Guild," or working society, in this congregation; but certain ladies of the congregation have, from time to time, met together and worked, and then held sales, by which considerable sums have been raised.

Both here and at Shigawake a certain amount of white-

washing and shingling of Churches, parish buildings, &c., has been done: and, as I am leaving, the interior of the Church at Shigawake is about to be entirely re-painted and re-decorated; the expense being largely, or wholly, defrayed by the Guild.

I must not omit to mention here, either, the regular and satisfactory services of Miss Kerr, the organist: which,

like Miss Travers at Shigawake, are a free gift.

L'Anse aux Gascons.—This is by no means the least interesting and satisfactory part of the work of the Mission. The Services have taken place, during the sixteen months, quite regularly every fortnight with very few omissions indeed; and it is pleasant to say that the pretty, house-like little Church is invariably well filled, and the Service as hearty as it can be where so many of the congregation are unhappily not able to read. Week-day Services have been given in Advent and Lent, and have been quite as hearty and well attended as those on Sundays.

There is much difficulty in keeping up the Sunday School here, owing to the impossibility (for such it almost is) of finding a Superintendent and Teacher amongst the small handful of literates in the place. The School has been started and collapsed two or three times, and at this present writing cannot truthfully be described as

flourishing.

I am most happy to be able to say that, though the Church people of the place have at last been worked up to the pitch of providing a day School for their children, the building is completed and the School just in operation. This will doubtless exercise a favourable influence upon the Sunday School, although a grave mistake, in my opinion, has unfortunately been made at the outset by engaging a Teacher who, while in every way thoroughly efficient, I believe is not a member of the Church of England. This is much to be regretted, seeing that every single child attending the School is of Church of England parentage.

The Guild here was revived shortly after I came to the Mission, and, as at Shigawake, placed upon a somewhat more satisfactory basis devotionally. It has also done good work of a different sort; having provided a very handsome new Altar cloth for the Church, with hangings for the Prayer desk and Lectern, and there is, I believe, a balance in hand.

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Newport Point.—Though the few families, (only some three or four in number—but there is also a fair sprinkling of individuals—who live at this place, ten miles east of L'Anse aux Gascons, really form a part of the congregation of the latter place, they will probably shortly be a distinct congregation, as they hope to build a little Church of their own in the Spring. I visited them shortly after my arrival in the Mission, and was amazed to learn that—unless I was completely misled, though not of course intentionally they had never been visited before. From that time onwards I have of course visited them with the same regularity as the rest of the people in the Mission; and for the past year have held week-day evening Service there every two or three months, which have been excellently attended, and apparently greatly appreciated. These have taken place hitherto in a small building plainly fitted up for the purpose, and kindly lent by R Tardif, Esq., agent for Messrs. Chas. Robin, Collas & Co. This will now undoubtedly become a permanent feature of the work of the Mission.

With the beginning of Lent, Confirmation classes were started in connection with each congregation, and maintained weekly until the time of the Bishop's visit. Two classes were carried on in Port Daniel, while the class at L'Anse aux Gascons was held weekly, like the others. These were new features in the work, and I am confident were well worth whatever little additional labour they may have involved. Let me here say that never in my life have I been more thoroughly interested in, or more thoroughly enjoyed, any part of my work than these classes.

The Bishop's visitation of the Mission began on Tuesday, August 24th, when he spent the day at Newport, and held Service in the evening, with an address. Driving to L'Anse aux Gascons the following morning, he Confirmed twenty in the Church at eleven o'clock, of whom by far the greater proportion were adults. In the afternoon a reception, friendly and informal, was held at the house of Philip Acteson, Esq. On Wednesday morning, 26th, his Lordship Confirmed twenty-four persons in Port Daniel Church, of whom again a good proportion were adults. One woman Confirmed was sixty-six years of age, and there were several men between forty and sixty.

Proceeding to Shigawake about four o'clock, Evensong

was said in the Church at seven, with an address by his Lordship; a good congregation being present.

The Confirmation Service took place the next morning; and, although it rained pitilessly, the Church was crowded. The number of Confirmands was forty-seven, including again, I am thankful to say, a large proportion of adults. The age of the oldest Candidate was eighty-two, while

there were several of upwards of fifty and sixty.

Anything more beautiful, touching and helpful than his Lordship's addresses at all Services, (especially that at Port Daniel) it is in my opinion almost impossible to conceive of. A most hearty reception was accorded him at L'Anse aux Gascons (whence many of the people drove the whole way to Newport Point to escort him) and Shigawake; numbers of the houses, gates, &c., being adorned with flags and flowers, while the Churches in all three places were tastefully and prettily decorated with flowers and ferns. Here I am glad to say that, for once, Port Daniel, in my opinion, carried off the palm; the Altar, with its new white dossal, cross re-gilt and many flowers, looking beautiful and reverently cared for. I am quite sure that the Bishop's visit will form an episode in the Mission's history, and that its results for good will be great and lasting.

In conclusion, I am confident that there is urgent need of another Mission to be formed out of the Eastern portion of the Parish of New Carlisle and Paspebiac, with the Western portion of this Mission. The work as it is, is most interesting and promising, and no man could fail to find happiness in it. Even without division a great work can be done if a Priest can be found to devote eight or ten years (or, better still of course, a life-time to it; with division, I certainly know of no other place in the Diocese which

offers so promising a field.

I wish to thank all my dear people for much kindness received and for their hearty help and support, and kindly feeling towards me, unworthy though I be of it. Had my circumstances been different, I should willingly, nay gladly, have spent my life among them. It seems to me only right that I should give special thanks to Mr. Wm. Ross, (a Presbyterian) and Mrs. D. B. McGie, with Miss Lander, in Port Daniel, and to Messrs. Philip and Wm. Acteson, in L'Anse aux Gascons. During the whole period of my stay in the Mission their houses have been homes to me.

STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports :-

Not much of interest has occurred to break the quiet

routine of Parish work during the past year.

At Christ Church, Stanstead, the Services have continued the same as in former years. Holy Communion has been celebrated weekly. Mattins and Evensong have been held every Sunday. Service has been held every Wednesday evening, and the Fasts and Festivals observed by special Services. Lent and Holy Week were also specially observed. The Choir has benefited by several trainings by Professor Dorey. The Sunday School was held during the Winter months in the afternoon and the attendance shewed an advance on previous years. The congregations have maintained the same average as in past years with perhaps an increase at Evensong. The work of our Literary Society during last Winter had a good effect in binding together the members of the Church in social union. Various circumstances tended to make it advisable for a time at least. to discontinue our Church School. I have the privilege of visiting the District School and imparting religious instruction to the pupils. The Parish owes a deep debt of gratitude to the Church Society for the grant given to the School during so many years. Last Lent, by special voluntary offerings, we succeeded in reducing the debt, incurred by the repairs of the Church, by \$105.

We have had two visits from the Bishop during the year, at the latter of which nine Candidates were presented for

Confirmation.

At Beebe Plain our congregation shews an advance on past years. The work of the Church here is almost of a Missionary character. The majority of the families who, a few years ago, constituted the congregation here have removed from the village, and their place has been filled by new comers, most of whom are not Church people. A large proportion of the residents of this Village are not definitely committed to any religious body and fluctuate between the Church and Methodism. By the help of Students from Bishop's College I have been enabled to hold Services morning and evening every Sunday. Holy Communion has been celebrated monthly, and special Services held during Lent. During the Summer months

Mr. C. E. Bishop, of Bishop's College, boarded here, and by his energetic labours increased the numbers of our congregations and revived the Sunday School work. During his stay here Service was held every Thursday evening, followed by choir practice. During the earlier part of the year, our congregation was increased by a number of the employees at the newly opened Granite Shops, but the financial depression of the past few months has caused the dismissal of most of the men working at these shops. We however look for brighter times.

At Marlow School-house Services are held every alternate Sunday afternoon. Various circumstances have tended to make the work here discouraging, but lately a revival of interest has been shewn. At Libby's Mills, Services are also held on alternate Sunday afternoons. The work here has, on the whole, been encouraging, and the congregations fair. The Services have, up to the last fortnight, been held in the School-house, immediately succeeding one held by the Congregationalists body. The Congregationalists have just finished building a place of worship next to the school house, and their hour of Service overlaps ours, depriving us, at least for the present, of the presence of many of those of no definite religious views, who are attracted by the novelty of a pretty and attractive Church edifice, and prefer it to an unattractive School-house.

At Judd's Mills our Services were discontinued for some months, but resumed this Fall. They are held fortnightly on week-day evenings, and are attended by fair and very attentive congregations.

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I was invited during the past Summer to hold Services in the Moulton neighbourhood, a district mid-way between Stanstead and Libby's Mills. I have held them every fortnight since then. There have been fair congregations until the past few weeks, when an epidemic of sickness descended upon the neighbourhood, visiting almost every household and bringing our congregations to a small number. The people here have contributed the sum of \$15.50 to shew their appreciation of the Services.

I have not been able to resume our Services at Griffin's Corner, owing to my inability to occupy the Union Church at the hours when it is free.

There are several other points where Services might be held with advantage, but I cannot yet see my way clear to open these Stations. I must repeat my regret that I cannot visit the families in these outlying districts as it ought to be done to accomplish effective work, owing to the extent of country to be covered, and at the same time I fear that by my work in those districts I have crippled the Church's work in the centre when, if I could devote my time more constantly, many useful organizations in connection with the Church might be started and carried on. We sadly need another worker in this field. By this report it will be seen that there are six Stations where Services are regularly held.

The whole Parish has subscribed \$100 towards Bishop Williams' Memorial Fund, payable in three annual instalments. I have included the first instalment in the Stanstead

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ST. SYLVESTER.

The Rev. G. J. Sutherland reports:-

My work in this Mission dates from October, 1892. At that time, it was decided to give three successive Sundays at St. Sylvester and two at the distant Missions of St. George. This arrangement I have carried out fully.

At St. Sylvester, I have given one Sunday morning Service a month, with a celebration of the Holy Communion, and the two following Sundays in the evening. The morning congregations were small, as the Church people, here, are few; but the evening Services have been well attended; there being no other evening Service in the place, all have availed themselves of the opportunity of worshipping God.

I started a Sunday School early in the year, which was well attended until November, when the roads became too

bad.

The Woman's Auxiliary has met regularly and done very good work.

The Lord Bishop of Quebec visited us in June and Confirmed eleven Candidates.

By the kind assistance of the Association of Church Helpers, Quebec, who gave us fifteen dollars, we were enabled to get the outside of the Church painted.

I am much indebted to Mrs. Samuel Neill, for acting as President of the Woman's Auxiliary, and also for taking charge of the Sunday School in my absence.

St. Giles.—I have given the same number of Services here as at St. Sylvester. The few Church people here have

attended well and joined heartily in the Services.

About the time of my advent to the Mission, Mr. Jas. Lefebvre, who for many years had been Church-Warden and much respected in this place, was removed by death. However the family still remain and do all in their power to help on the welfare of the Church.

We are much indebted to St. Matthew's Guild for a set

of Altar linen. The gift was much appreciated.

St. Patrick's.—The congregation here is very small, there being only four families. I gave them one Service a month during the Winter, and two in the Summer.

St. George's.—I have given a Sunday morning Service once a month with a celebration of the Holy Communion, and an evening Service the same day when the roads were good, also an occasional week-day Service. The congregation here is not a large one but a growing one, and all are most willing to support the Church.

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I have held a Bible Class or Sunday School every Sunday

with few exceptions.

The Church grounds were improved somewhat by a new fence and other improvements.

The Lord Bishop visited this place in September, when six Candidates received the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation.

I am indebted to Mrs. William Pozer for acting as President of the Woman's Auxiliary, which has met, I think, regularly during the past year and done very good work; also, to Mrs. Ross, for her efficient services as Organist, and to others from whom I have received many kindnesses from time to time.

Cumberland Mills.—I have conducted the same number of Services here on Sundays as at St. George. I also held a Confirmation Class during the Spring and Summer, and thirteen Candidates were Confirmed at the Bishop's visit, in September. Miss Taylor very kindly conducted a Sunday School during the Summer months at the Manor House.

The long talked of School-house was completed in October, and my sister took charge of the day School and Sunday School until the present Christmas.

The Association of Church Helpers, Quebec, furnished material for an Altar cover, and the St. Matthew's Guild

made it, and also gave us a Credence table cover. I feel very grateful for their very kind and generous help.

Marlow.—This place is sixteen miles from St. George's, and contains seven families belonging to the Church. I made four visits during the year, holding Service each time in the School-house.

VALCARTIER.

The Rev. S. Riopel reports:—

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We have cause to be thankful to Almighty God for the comfort and satisfaction we have experienced in our Parish work this last year. My people have been very considerate in their endeavours to help me in the accomplishment of religious work as well as in the supplying of temporal wants.

In a quiet retired Parish like this, extraordinary occurrences are not to be expected. Our ministrations are very simple, consisting for the most part of mere routine work.

On Sundays we have our Sunday School, our morning Service at 11 A.M., and evening Service at 6.30 P.M. When I served Stoneham we had morning Service at Valcartier, afternoon Service at Stoneham, and occasionally evening Service at Valcartier, on my return. Week after week, and Sunday after Sunday, thus pass on in quiet and simple uniformity. A funeral now and then is the only notable break in the sameness. The changes, therefore, that take place in our religious condition, too, must be very gradual, and perceptible only by comparisons at long intervals. In spite of this our Church is, no doubt, making progress. Its temporalities have increased somewhat in value, and its spiritual interests are manifestly improving.

More work was spent upon the Church last Summer and it is expected that another week's labor will complete all that is necessary to make it a finished temple of worship.

Outbuildings to the Parsonage have been begun and it is purposed to complete them next Spring. Those that we had were unfortunately burned some years ago, and the cost of building a new Parsonage, as well as of repairing the Church, was as much as I then cared to impose on our people. Now that I am compelled by the Board to keep a

horse, these outbuildings are indispensable, and the ad-

ditional burden must somehow be shouldered.

Before attending to this need it had been my intention to get erected near the Church a horse-shed or stable for the convenience of Church-goers. At present horses have to be put up at neighbouring stables, and therefore their drivers run the chance of finding no room. Such a mishap in cold or stormy weather necessitates the return home of the horse with several of the would-be worshippers. More often, however, such a possibility is made an excuse for absence from the house of God.

To meet so urgent a want the young people of the place set themselves to furnish part of the expense. They had a strawberry festival last Summer on the Parsonage grounds and realized quite a handsome return, which, however, had

to be appropriated for the stable.

This Winter will be a very unfavorable season for making any fresh demands on our people. We may be well satisfied if present responsibilities are met. In the first place, there is a prospect that very little gain will be made from the woods, or the use of horses, for the snow is already too deep in the bush.

In the next place this municipality has this Winter a special tax to pay which more than doubles the usual

amount of assessments.

An iron bridge was built over the Jacques Cartier River at an enormous cost under the late administration, and now the farmers of the neighbourhood are made responsible for the payment. The bridge is certainly a very fine structure and will be a great benefit to those who have to cross the river, but all the same the tax is most burdensome.

*The constant exodus of many of our well to do people, whose places were filled for the most part by young men of small means, has resulted in the mortgaging of a large proportion of the farms of the District, and a consequent inability and unwillingness of the proprietors to contribute to any public objects, religious or secular, that could be avoided.

To taxation, mortgaged lands, the desire for emigration, lack of public spirit, add the poverty of the soil (whether natural, or exhausted through over-cropping by previous owners), the distance from market, the usual bad roads, the want of enterprise, the general apathy for everything that

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fails to yield an immediate money return, some conception may be had of the difficulties in the way of the Church's pecuniary success. Besides, when any sum has to be raised in the congregation, the chief burden falls on the poorer members. The same cunning and sagacity that enabled the better to do to get ahead of their neighbours in secular concerns, helps them to escape their fair share of responsibility in the Church's support. The same sophistry that quiets the conscience in the sharp dealings of ordinary life is allowed its influence also even in the affairs of the eternal life.

In spite of all these drawbacks the contributions for Church purpose have been increasing; not so much, however, in the agregate amount as in the individual offerings, for the deficit induced by the emigration of contributors must be made up by those who remain. From this cause, last Summer, nearly a whole quarter's assessment fell in arrears. The amount had to be supplied by special collection. The season was unfavorable, yet the appeal was answered most readily and successfully; another such collection will have to be made this Winter. An increase is therefore necessary to enable us to meet our engagements with the Board. Thus every two or three years a fresh list of subscriptions is requisite.

Our Church Services are very fairly attended, and the privileges of the Holy Communion more and more appreciated. The number at Church may not be large, but if we consider the inconveniences and difficulties encountered by coming to Church, the number is very creditable. Some families have ten and twelve miles to travel, sometimes on foot over rugged mountains. On favorable Sundays the Church is often filled.

Want of clothing is a frequent cause of absence; so is bodily fatigue.

The Services, besides being well attended, are devoutly and heartily joined in by the congregation; very free from any irreverent behaviour on the part of the young or thoughtless. Where so many cannot read, the responding is very fair indeed. The singing is constantly improving. Our organ is getting woefully dilapidated and calls loudly for a new one.

Our young people are evidencing a marked interest in Church work. They are ever ready to give a helping

hand, whether in preparations for special Services and other occasions, or in providing the means for raising money.

Our Sunday School is not as flourishing as we would wish. Our children are very few near the Church, the great majority live at a distance. Their only chance of coming is with their parents or friends who attend Church. On this account the School has to be held immediately before the Service. For their encouragement, the children who attend School are occasionally assembled on some weekday to receive prizes, partake of refreshments, and join in special amusements.

A Parochial Library is much needed. There is a general avidity for reading among both old and young, but all available money has to go to meet so many other calls more urgent, that books have to be deferred to the far future with better times. Even the cheapest periodicals find here few subscribers. We distribute all newspapers, tracts, and other suitable reading material we can get, but these come far short of supplying the want.

Stoneham has now the good fortune of being served by the Rev. Mr. Parrock. The road from Quebec to Stoneham is always in good condition, and, though longer, is incomparably preferable to that from Valcartier.

It was unfortunate that Stoneham had to be attached to .Valcartier parish. The distance is not great, but between the two parishes there lies a wild bush extending for several miles over a most uneven and rugged surface, consisting of marshes, deep gullies, mountains and precipices. It can be traversed only with difficulty and fatigue. It is an almost uninterrupted going up and down hill, often long and steep; either jarring against boulders or sinking in bog holes, with frequently a commingling of the two; if belated, with a chance of stepping on a bear, losing one's way in the woods, or being inextricably stuck fast in a morass. I found walking the safest and quickest mode of travelling on it. In wet weather, however, passing through the bush on foot was neither agreeable nor wholesome. case of sick-calls also, when neither the hour nor the weather can be chosen, such a journey is sometimes a serious undertaking.

I cannot omit to state, that on Thanksgiving Day and on Christmas Day the Church was decorated by our young people very tastefully and in splendid keeping with the general tone of the building.

Last Spring we had the pleasure and profit of a passing visit from his Lordship on a Confirmation tour.

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The Venerable Archdeacon Roe also favored us with a call on New Year's Day. His very commendable zeal and famed ability for raising money were eloquently exercised, but we fear the season was too unpropitions to bear fruit commensurate with the merits of the cause he was advocating. The envelope system which he recommended and introduced (he himself generously supplied us with a stock of envelopes) we trust will be a more successful method for collecting money than that hitherto practised.

WATERVILLE.

The Rev. Ernest A. Willoughby King reports:-

Appointed Jan. 1, period eleven months to Dec. 1, area, fifty-four square miles, well settled. Origin, mostly Anglo-Saxon, partly French Canadian. Sunday Services always three, very often four; occasional in four different Schoolhouses. Sunday, one hundred and seventy-one; week, fifty-three; total, two hundred and twenty-four in the period covered by this report. Holy Communion once a month in each of the three stations, and oftener, especially in North Hatley, in Summer. Sunday School and Bible class work, and catechising regularly at Waterville and for three months at North Hatley. Large Model School at Waterville, taught Scripture History once a week. Other Schools visited, calls and visits to sick, aged and well recorded by day and date, one thousand five hundred and sixty-eight, in the eleven months, making an average of more than seven a day. The unbaptized may be counted The average attendance at North Hatley for eight months was twenty-four, and for the three Summer months, ninety, and of Communicants correspondingly.

By regular count and record, the services, average attendance, &c., are shown by the following tables:

To reckon rightly by number of families is very difficult. The tabulated statements herewith made are briefer and more eloquent than words to all who will take note of them. Ladies' Guilds in three centres give great help in many ways. The Mission field is kept in view. Valuable public addresses were given by Revds. Canon Foster and G. Murray, on the history of the British Church up to the year 664, at a sub-deanery meeting in Waterville. Also a clever and instructive address to the Model School children and friends, on the training of the young in Turkey, by Rev. C. H. Brooks.

The Bishop's generous musical blessing, through Mr. Dorey, Organist, begins to return grateful echoes more worthy of worship. Sherbrooke Choir treated Waterville to a Cantata. Local Organists and Choirs deserve the best

thanks of people and clergy.

Adult Baptisms, three Confirmations, an infant Baptism, a a celebration of Holy Communion, seven addresses, a speech to the workers in Gales' factory, the inspection of two Church sites, receptions, &c., and all within thirty-six hours, marked the busy Bishop's visit. Our people join me in thanking brother Clergymen for much valued ministrations. No Parsonage in the Mission. Large and beautiful site for one in Waterville, and some money in bank. Mr. W. Wiggett, a still surviving warden of fifty years ago, promises \$25 more. Mr. Wiggett, with the wardens Hodgson and Flanders, collected for the fencing, towards which Rev. T. L. Ball gave \$29.

No endowment. A small legacy, likely to be available soon, was willed to St. John's Church by the late Mrs. Massey. She, with Mrs. Howse, Mrs. Osgood and Mrs. Gilkerson, all

good women in the various relations of life, entered into rest within a period of six months. They are much missed There have been, and still are, several cases of protracted illness at long distances apart. Serious losses have taken place by removal replaced by some important arrivals. There is a well settled field open and large enough for another man's work in about Minton, Suffield and Belvidere, bounded by Magog, North Hatley, Eustis and Sherbrooke.

The importance of its occupation seems beyond question. Waterville Church sorely needs sheathing inside and a furnace. Towards the latter something is being done. For fencing Church property, \$60 have just been paid.

North Hatley's pretty new Church, sixty by twenty-five feet, is almost ready for occupation in an unfinished state. Cost of large suitable site and structure about \$1,500. Paid nearly \$700. Much help from Summer visitors. Attendance for nine months, small but growing. Chief material need six or seven hundred dollars. The spiritual need here, as elsewhere in the Mission, is more interest in "the way of salvation." Messrs. Schenck, father and son, Carroll and Johnson, with lady Teachers, did valuable Sunday School work at North Hatley and its neighbourhood.

The Eustis congregation is regular, reverent, appreciative and encouraging. Now virtually in hand are \$250 for the much needed proposed Church. Fine central site selected and applied for, and to be granted, we hope, by the Eustis Mining Co., when its deferred meeting shall be held.

More than a third of the offertory, at Waterville, and more than a quarter, at Eustis, has gone to outside objects, and at North Hatley almost a fifth, even counting increased amounts from visitors, viz: twenty-seven out of seventy-eight, nineteen out of one hundred and five, and seventeen out of sixty-live dollars, respectively.

WINDSOR AND BROMPTON.

The Rev. J. C. Cox reports:-

St. George's Church. (Windsor Mills).—Services at this Church have been kept up regularly twice on each Sunday and on the greater Festivals, with week-night Services during Lent.

Through the instruction given by Mr. A. Dorey, Organist of St. Peter's, Sherbrooke, who came twice to the Mission, a very perceptible improvement has been effected in the Choir as well as in the responding of the congregation. During Lent, a Service was held on each Tuesday evening until Passion Week. By this means, I was the better able to take advantage of a few visits of the neighbouring Clergy. they being more likely to be at liberty on Tuesdays than on other days of the week.

Those who thus kindly came to assist me, were the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, Canon Thorneloe, the Rev. J. Hepburn and Rev. T. Rudd; all of whom are ever welcome F se R de th

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visitors at Windsor Mills.

We have also been favoured with two visits by the Lord Bishop: first, on March 10th, when his Lordship stopped off at Titus Station, was kindly entertained at dinner by Mr. Thos. Ward and his aged mother. In the afternoon, his Lordship preached to a most attentive congregation at Christ Church. Brompton, which is across the St. Francis River from Titus. The people of Brompton were highly pleased with the new Bishop, with his plain words and kindly manner.

His Lordship also preached at St. George's, Windsor Mills, at 8 P.M., when the Church was well filled with

those eager to see and hear him.

Again, on Tuesday, June 20th, we had the pleasure of seeing our most genial and ever active Chief Pastor, this time to administer the impressive, Apostolic Rite of Laying on of Hands to four adults. The Confirmation was held in St. George's Church, in the evening, at which a good number were present, many being from the other bodies of Christians in the village.

The next day, his Lordship was driven to the residence of Mr. G. Stevens, Lay Delegate, for a brief visit, thence to the residence of Mr. A. A. Briggs, my Lay Reader, with whom his Lordship dined, thus evincing a desire to become personally acquainted with as many as possible in the Parish.

Considerable repairs have been done to St. George's Church. The roof has been re-shingled, and its internal appearance much improved, the ceiling having been tinted, and the plastered walls, which had become badly cracked, covered with strong manilla paper. This gives a cheerful

effect to the building, while the cost of the work was consistent with our limited means.

For these repairs on the Church there is no debt remain-

ing.

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The Windsor branch of the Woman's Auxiliary continues its monthly meetings at the members' houses. I usually attend and open their meetings by using the Diocesan and Foreign Mission Society's "Litany of Intercession." The second annual bale of clothing, &c., has recently been sent to Rev. J. Hincheliffe. of the Piegan Reserve, Alberta. I doubt not but that its contents were highly appreciated by the Indian girl for whom it is specially designed.

During the month of October, while at Grosse Isle, my Sunday duty throughout the Mission was performed by Mr. D. W. Sutherland, of Bishop's College, his work being done

in a very satisfactory manner.

The Sunday School at St. George's Church, during the Summer and Autumn, has been under the sole care of my daughter. A good assortment of ('hildren's Periodicals has been supplied. Two little girls, living three or four miles distant, have attended quite regularly—driving themselves to and from the School.

Christ's Church, Brompton.—There is not much to note of importance, here, beyond the usual routine of weekly Services. The congregation has held its own and, at times, has been larger than heretofore, but it might be larger still, if all attended Divine Worship, who could attend.

It is much to be regretted that so many heads of families, in these parts, do not appreciate their spiritual privileges as they should. Little short of a Divine visitation is adequate to arouse some people from their state of careless indifference. Oh! that they were willing to "hear Moses and the Prophets," much more, Him of whom they testify.

The ladies of the Brompton Guild continue their fortnightly meetings, not forgetting to send in their "ten cent"

subscription when not present themselves.

To their efforts we are indebted for the substantial and ornate Bishop's Chair, which was placed in the Chancel just in time for his Lordship's first visit to this Church last March.

The Sunday School continues to prosper under the efficient superintendence of Mr. W. Addison, (who also per-

forms the duty of care-taker.) The other Teachers are Mrs. Geo. Ward and Miss Ethel Knapp, who now takes her mother's place. The Choir, here, has likewise felt the good influence of Mr. Dorey's wise instructions. In the responding, there is, however, still room for improvement.

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In September, a branch of the M. C. L. was formed in Brompton; its meetings being held on each alternate Tuesday evening, in the School-house. For whatever benefit may result from this institution, socially or otherwise, we are indebted to the Rev. R. C. Tambs, of Magog, through whom I was initiated into its harmless mysteries. Its chief object, to promote and encourage a kindly spirit in the home, is an excellent one; the main difficulty being to maintain an interest in the meetings, in a sparsely settled locality, which is the case in Brompton.

The same difficulty, of course, holds true with regard to the Bible Class, where there are few young people and

hindrances of various kinds to be overcome.

A grant of books, from the S. P. C. K., has just been received and will be divided between the three Sunday Schools in the Mission. This grant was obtained through the assistance of our Bishop, and the books will, I am sure, be highly prized by our people, both old and young.

Hymns A. and M. are about to be substituted in the place of Bickersteth's "Hymnal," at Christ Church, the latter books having been in use, in this Church, for a number of years. This change has been long contemplated, and it is, I think, a matter for congratulation that it is soon,

now, to be effected.

At Hardwood Hill, there is more ground for encouragement than heretofore. Quite a good class of boys (with a few girls) are becoming interested in the study of the Church Catechism, and in the Services held at Grace Church. Several of these lads are members of dissenting families, whose parents manifest no special love for our Church. It is, therefore, gratifying to find these youths carefully learning these self-imposed tasks, and presenting themselves here, so regularly, to be catechized, and afterward, to unite in the Litany Service, which is held fortnightly.

I hope, at no distant day, to present some of them to his

Lordship for Confirmation.

The Incumbent desires, here, to acknowledge his indebt-

edness to the "Church Helpers' Association of Quebec," for kind benefactions conferred on him, personally, on more than one occasion. These gifts, so modestly bestowed, have taken the form of useful books, and tasteful vestments, for which he cannot but express his sincere gratitude.

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REPORT OF THE VENERABLE ARCHDEACON ROE, GENERAL MISSIONARY AGENT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD.

Two new Missions have been added permanently, as we may hope, to the separate clerical charges of the Diocese by the Bishop licensing on the 1st October last, the Rev. H. A. Brooke, B.A., to the charge of Scotstown and parts adjacent, and the Rev. E. K. Wilson, B.A., to the charge of Hereford.

The history of the struggle of these two Missions into parochial life is full of interest. The Mission of St. Albans, Scotstown, had its beginning from the settlement there of several Church families from Cookshire at the time when the village sprang suddenly into vigorous life, owing to its large lumber and pulp mills. These faithful people sought and obtained from the Rev. A. H. Judge, then incumbent of Cookshire, such spiritual ministrations on week-days as his engagements would allow. Encouraged and helped by him, they built a Church, and, when it was finished, applied to the Archdeacon for Sunday Services. It was first arranged that they should be served fortnightly from Bury; but this arrangement soon fell through, the parochial work of the unwieldy parish of Bury being already quite too much for one man. Towards the end of 1890, Scotstown, together with the Canterbury settlement, became one of the Bishop's College Missions under the superintendence of the Archdeacon, with Sunday Services during Term time and a Reader residing during College Vacations. Towards the expenses of these Services, the Mission has from the first contributed \$50 a year, besides the Reader's board; the remainder of the outlay, \$120 a year, being paid by the Diocesan Board.

The Scotstown people, however, were not long satisfied with these ministrations, but applied to Bishop Williams to be supplied with a resident clergyman. To this application, the Bishop gave an encouraging answer, promising

them a clergyman so soon as funds to pay him could be found. As the Diocesan Board has been expending \$300 a year for the last three years in defraying the expenses of Readers for Scotstown and Lake Megantic, it is evident that if these two places could be united under the pastoral care of one man, the additional cost to the Board of a resident Minister would be little. But the distance between the two places seemed to render this union impossible. The difficulty, however, has been overcome, by our present Bishop taking upon himself the expenses of the Reader at the Lake and setting the \$300 a year free for Scotstown; and so the Mission of Scotstown was opened on the 1st October.

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The new Mission is made up of Scotstown, Canterbury and Lingwick, the two latter stations being detached from the parish of Bury. This re-arrangement affords a great relief to Bury, reducing it to reasonable dimensions, and rendering it capable of being thoroughly worked by one The three stations are to be served by Mr. Brooke every Sunday, involving a drive of twenty miles. He will also go to Lake Megantic at stated intervals to give the Holy Communion, and will be responsible for all other priestly functions which may be required there. The report of the work done at Scotstown during the year will be made by Mr. Brooke. Lake Megantic, though attached, as stated above, to the Mission of Scotstown, continues to be served ordinarily by a Reader, whose stipend the Bishop has undertaken to provide. The congregation of this station continues as devoted as ever to their Church. The Woman's Guild have purchased a bell, which was dedicated by Canon Thorneloe on the 28th November. The Sunday School continues efficient Mr. N. M. Bayne, after long and faithful service here as Reader, was ordained in September and appointed to the charge of a Gulf Mission. His cheerful, unselfish life and work during the three years he was here have won for him the esteem and love of every one.

The new Mission of Hereford is not as yet under the Diocesan Board. When, last July, the Bishop proposed planting a clergyman there, the Board could not see its way clear to providing the necessary funds. His Lordship, consequently, resolved to open the Mission on his own responsibility. At his request, towards its maintenance, the Board has placed \$100 a year at the Bishop's disposal.

The people pay \$150. The Bishop provides the rest. The Rev. E. K. Wilson, B.A., entered upon the charge on the 1st October.

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The Church has been working at Hereford off and on for the last fifty years. In the old days of Travelling Missionaries, Hereford was one of their stations. These visits, however, being few and far between, barely sufficed to keep alive in the hearts of our scattered people a tradition that the Church of England had some claim upon them. Later on. in 1870, it was proposed to make the two townships of Barford and Hereford, till then under the oversight of Canon Foster, into a separate Mission, and the Rev. T. L. Ball was sent to Hereford and resided there for one year. In his time, 1870, what is now the old Hereford Church, was completed and opened for Service. From 1871 to 1875 the two townships fell back again into Canon Foster's charge. In 1875, they were again made into a separate Mission, with the Rev. Albert Stevens as Missionary, and Dixville as head-quarters. Under this arrangement Hereford received a fortnightly Service. Finally, after the death of Mr. Aaron Workman, who was the mainstay of the Mission, the Church-Wardens failing to pay the small assessment imposed upon this congregation, the Services were suspended, and the Church remained closed for seven years. By the efforts of the Rev. Geo. Murray it was re-opened nearly three years ago, and the fortnightly Services re-established. Two years ago Mr. Murray handed on the charge to the Archdeacon, whose report upon the condition and prospects of Hereford as a Missionary field will be found in the Church Society's report for last year. From that time, the Services of a Reader were secured to give fortnightly Services during College term time, and to reside during vacations.

During these three years much missionary labour has been bestowed upon Hereford with very promising results. Services have been held regularly in the Hereford Church and at Hall's Stream, and occasionally at Wallis Pond. Twelve infants and lifteen adults have been baptized; five persons have been Confirmed and eight admitted to the Holy Communion. Eight more adults are now ready to be Confirmed at the Bishop's approaching visit. There is a very promising Sundáy School at the old Church. Altogether the Mission is now, at its inception, one of great encouragement.

The great material work of this Summer has been the erection of the new Church at Hall's Stream, some six miles to the north of the old Hereford Church. The need of a Church at this end of the Mission having made itself more and more felt, Mr. Edwin Bean not only offered a valuable site, sufficient for a Church and Parsonage, but also joined the Archdeacon in assuming the financial responsibility of pushing the work through at once. The Church is now finished and will, it is hoped, be consecrated on St. Thomas's Day. It has cost between fifteen and sixteen hundred dollars, of which sum Mr. Bean has undertaken to provide about three fifths and the Archdeacon two fifths. This Church and that of L'Avenir are built from the same plans and are both very satisfactory. For the plans we are indebted to the Rey. Arthur Jarvis, of Napanee.

I ought not to conclude this report without recording my own deep thankfulness that the arduous and important work of launching these two Missions has been so happily

accomplished.

In 1886, the clergy of this District brought before the Synod and the Diocesan Board a modest project of Church extension in which we ventured to propose the establishment of three new Missions. Who would have then believed that in seven short years we should see nearly three times that number of new Missions founded? Newport and Barnston, opened in 1887; Fitch Bay, in 1888; Waterville and St. John's, Melbourne, in 1889; Peninsula, in 1892; and now, Scotstown and Hereford, in 1893.

Bishop Williams, in his last letter to the S. P. G., written only a few days before his death, referred to this Church extension movement as one of the most hopeful features in the outlook of his Diocese. If this be so, as undoubtedly it is, then have we indeed solid grounds for thankfulness

and encouragement. To God be all the glory!

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Annual Report of the Clergy Trust Committee.

The full revenue from the Investments in charge of the Committee has been received. About one fourth of these Investments mature in 1894, their re-investment is likely to be a slow and difficult matter, and must result in a large and permanent reduction of revenue.

Reference to the printed accounts shew \$25,300 Investments paid off on account of the Clergy Trust Fund for which no re-investment has been found, and \$9,950 on account of the Bishopric Endowment Fund, of which \$8,200 has been re-invested.

\$1209 Montreal seven per cent stock,

1200 Perth Town seven per cent Bonds, held for Local Endowment Funds, have been paid off and investments made as follows:

84000 Richmond, B.C., Bonds, 5 per cent. 800 Montreal Mortgage, 5½ per cent. 2000 Toronto Mortgage, 6 per cent.

The Drummondville Endowment Fund now amounts to \$7,350, yielding a revenue of over \$400. Under the terms of the Trust Deed, the revenue, up to \$400, is now available for the support of the clergyman in charge of the Parish.

The Endowment Fund of St. Paul's, Gaspé, is now \$3,640, and the revenue, up to \$200, is payable from 1st January, 1894.





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

Dioceses, whose pressing claims and whose growing importance, already recognized, have been so evidently brought home to us by the recent happy union of the Church throughout the Dominion.

The Committee have pleasure in recording the success of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year ending May 1893, and they desire to draw attention to the report of part of this work which is appended. (page 261)

The Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary, for the year ending May 1893, contains the following information and record of its growth:—

Seven new Branches have been organized, making twenty-seven Senior Branches, two sub-divisions, and six

Junior Branches.

The education of the daughter of the Rev. A. Allman,

Diocese of Algoma, has been continued.

The sums of \$100 for the Lady Missionary at St. Paul's Industrial School for Indians, Diocese of Rupert's Land, and \$50 for the Piegan Reserve Home were paid, as promised.

Quebec's share in the expenses of Miss Sherlock, our Canadian Medical Missionary to Japan, which amounted to \$150, was also contributed.

The Rev. E. Wilson's Indian Homes received a fair share of assistance, and \$41.87 were sent to the Zenana Missions.

Money has been sent in varying sums to Algoma. Athabaska, Qu'Appelle, Moosonee, McKenzie River, Saskatche-

wan, Calgary and Rupert's Land.

The sum of \$351.36 was contributed to the Memorial of our beloved and revered Bishop. With this amount we were enabled to procure three sets of Altar Vessels, which were sent to the Bishop of McKenzie River for use in his Diocese.

\$157 were collected for the Bishop of Algoma's travelling

expenses; and \$75.50 for Algoma's Mission Debt.

The total sum raised was \$2,298.63.

Those parishes in this Diocese which have not formed a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary are earnestly invited to do so at an early date.

CAROLINE M. HALL, Secretary. THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATION OF CHURCH HELPERS,—JANUARY, 1894.

The work of this Association has gone on quietly and satisfactorily during the past year, and we sincerely trust its usefulness has been felt throughout the Diocese, from the different missions, of which appeals are constantly coming in, and also grateful letters are received by us. in acknowledgment of help which it is our privilege to give. We number 180 members, 70 of whom hold mite-boxes; with regard to the latter, we regret that the number of members who hold them is not larger, and there is also difficulty in collecting some of the boxes. These are called in three times a year, at one Annual and two General Meetings. As you are aware, our Association depends greatly upon this source for funds to carry on its work, and, however small the amount put into each box, still every little helps.

Two general meetings, one in May and one in October, ten Committees, and one special meeting have been held. We regret very much having no representative from Trinity Church at our Executive meetings. Two members of that congregation have been asked to fill the position, but have declined, and, therefore, this congregation has not been represented at our monthly Committee meetings.

The collection for the Church Society was again undertaken by our members, and, for this past year, it has fallen off slightly. We think this is chiefly owing to a special collection having been made during the year, for the Memorial Mission Fund; and also, through the death of some members of the Church Society, who have always contributed liberally to its funds.

It is with much sorrow we record the death of four of our members: — Mrs. E. A. Jones, one of our Vice-Presidents; Mrs. Charles E. Levey, Mrs. Barrow and Miss Harriet Stevenson, all of whom took a great interest in the work of our Association.

Our Annual Fair was held on the 20th September, Their Excellencies the Governor-General, and Countess of Aberdeen honored it with their patronage. The result of the sale was most satisfactory.

Parcels of clothing, gifts of money, house linen, cutlery and furniture have been sent to different clergymen, but applications have not been made so much for these, as for Church furnishings, altar cloths, fair linen, stoles, etc. We wish to take this opportunity of thanking the agents of different lines of steamboats for their kindness in delivering parcels free of charge, and also to the members of St. Matthew's Guild for the work done gratuitously by them.

FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and bequeath to "The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum for Shares of Stocks in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Mission Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen

of the Church of England, in the Dioce of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, called

the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,-Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the Church in the Mission of(or at) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and Church-Wardens of the Church in the said Mission (or at.....)

Or,—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday-Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebcc, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage-houses,—the setting apart of burial-grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. Λ Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.


I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and lifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (describe the real estate clearly) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as in No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say:—upon the trusts to hold the same for ever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.



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
