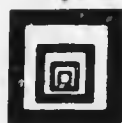


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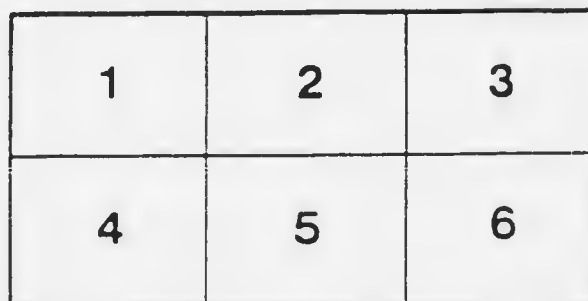
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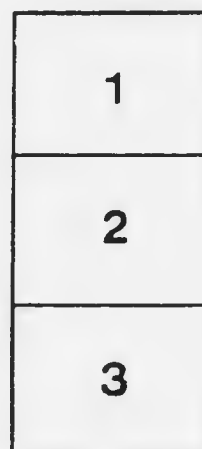
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The Sixth Annual Rossland Winter Carnival

Commences on Wednesday evening, February 11, 1903, with a grand Masquerade Carnival in the rink.

Thursday three Hockey matches will be played; one at 10 a. m., one at 4 p. m. and one at 8 p. m. The drawing for all games will take place Wednesday evening after the arrival of the C. P. R. train.

Interesting skating race takes place during the first hockey match.

Tobogganning will be indulged in all day and evening. A small charge will be made for toboggans which, with the slide, are in the hands of a special committee.

Friday morning the snowshoe races come off, and there are three more championship hockey matches this day; one at 10 a. m. the others at 4 and 9 p. m. respectively.

The snowshoe parade takes place at 7:30 p. m. Friday and at 9 o'clock the fort will be stormed.

Saturday the ski races and ski jumping take place, with the big chariot race at 2 p. m., a dog race and exhibition by the fire department, and other events; the Carnival ending with the final match in the championship hockey tournament, which comes off at 8 p. m. at the rink.

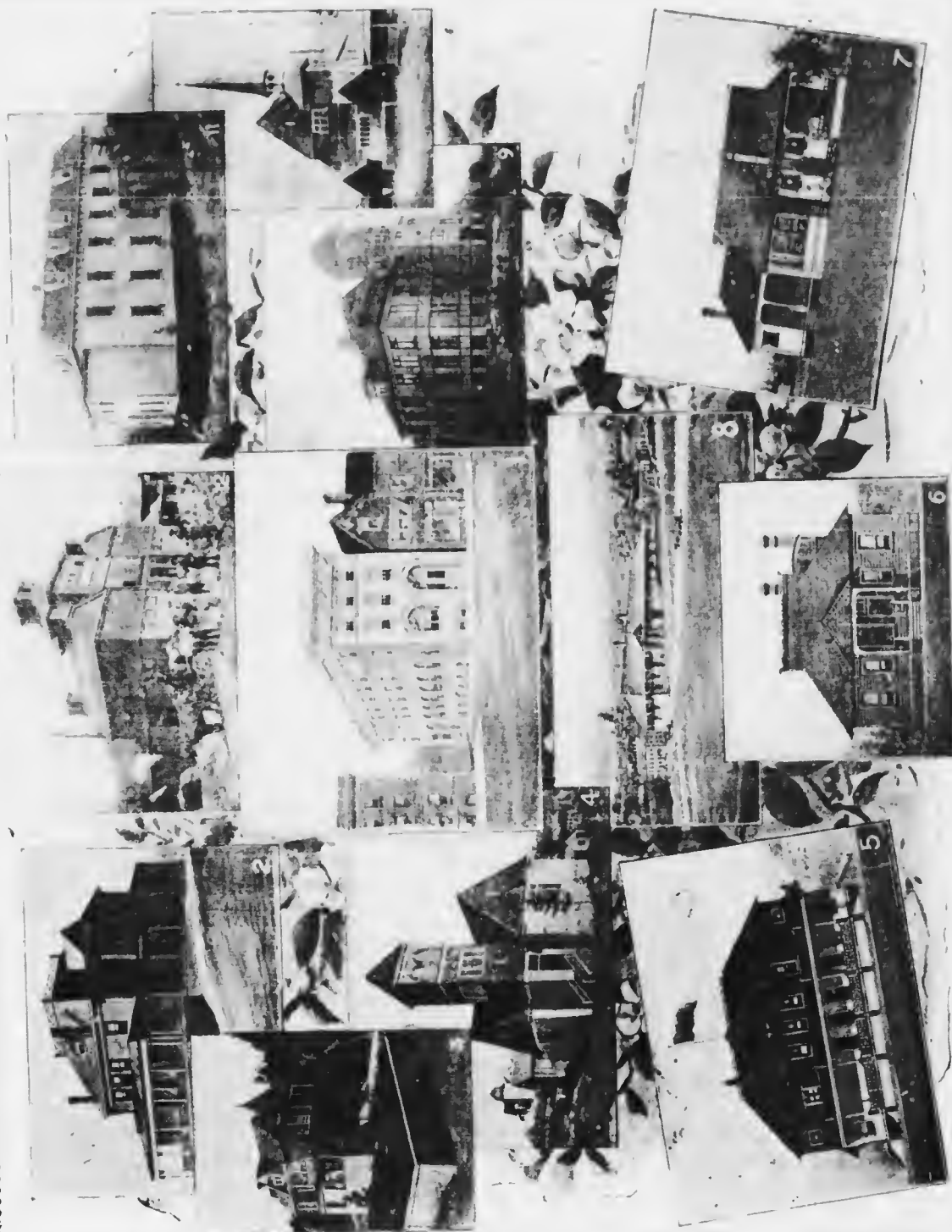

The prizes consist of Seven Gold Medals, valued at \$80, which become the property of the winning team. There is also a Silver Cup, presented by the Citizens of Rossland and emblematic of the Hockey Championship of British Columbia, to be competed for in this tournament.

The cup remains the property of the citizens of Rossland, but is to be held for one year by the best British Columbia team in the tournament.

The Referee for all Hockey matches will be chosen by the Hockey Committee, consisting of: N. A. Burritt, Harry McIntosh, D. Guthrie, A. E. Townsend and A. B. McKenzie, who have complete charge of all hockey games.

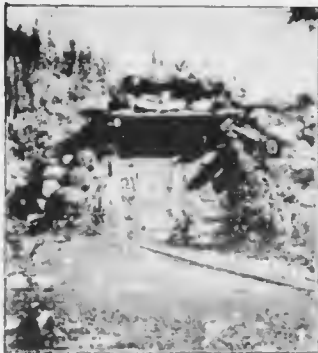
