THE LICENSE COMMISSIONERS. The administration of the license laws through the license commissioners is anything but satisfactory. The restrictions in regard to the sale of liquor are plainly set out in the act, but the commissioners seem to think that the enforcement of the laws is a matter purely personal to themselves. Complaints are numerous of hotels in Toronto and the suburbs selling liquor on Sunday. The offence is committed every Sunday under the eyes of the inspectors, or with their knowledge, yet no attempt is made to stop the illegal practice. Whatever the law of the land may be in regard to the sale of spirituous liquors, the commissioners should see that it is obeyed, and the inspectors should be given to understand that they must enforce it. The greatest laxity prevails among these officials in the administration of the liquor law. They promote or not just as the humor strikes them. They seem to think that the license law was made for them and not for the public. An instance of the inefficient and slow way in which they attend to their public duties has just occurred in the town of Newmarket. According to the recent amendment to the License Act, it became the duty of the commissioners of North York to cancel two of the licenses that had been issued to hotelkeepers in that town. Instead of carrying out the requirements of the act, they cancelled only one license, and this one was for a hotel that supplied a want that cannot be filled by any of the others. This hotel afforded more accommodation for farmers visiting the town than the other five hotels put together. Its closure on Saturday last caused a great deal of inconvenience to the scores of farmers who came to town that day. The commissioners could easily have enforced the law without inconveniencing the public. As it is they have not carried out the law as directed, and they have inconvenienced the public. When the commissioners are directed to close up two hotels they should close them up, and when it becomes their duty to cancel a license they should study the public convenience and not their own prejudices. When a license has to be cancelled to bring the number within the law, the commissioners are not directed to close up the hotel that gives the public the best accommodation. As long, however, as the Hardy Government remains in authority, we need expect no improvement in the administration of the liquor laws. The Government has all it can do to maintain its own existence. As long as the Hardy Government remains in power its chief and only concern will be to keep its head above water. We will have no honest or effective administration of the law as long as the Hardy Government remains in power.

She hurriedly dressed herself and ran out for Dr. McPhedran of College-street, but before the physician arrived Cook was dead.

The deceased was a middle-aged man and an industrious laborer. The causes of death were no doubt natural.

Coroner Young was notified later, but he was unable to attend to the circumstances, decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

Those Funny Little Mice.
