XIII. PRIVATES WENT ON STRIKE OFFICERS ONLY INVITED FRIENDS

But the Reception to Daughters of the Empire Was a Success, Nevertheless—New and Necessary Sewers, May Be Laid—Macklem Investigation Finished and Judgment Reserved.

Hamilton, Oct. 25.—The 13th Regiment held a reception for the Daughters of the Empire, who presented new colors to the regiment at the Armouries this evening. The new colors were trooped by the regiment, under command of Major Stone- man. Company, under Capt. Fernman, acted as escort.

After the ceremony the officers of the regiment tendered a formal reception to the Daughters of the Empire. Refreshments were served by Edwards, the caterer, and songs were sung by E. G. Payne, William Spratt and Lieut. Meakin.

The turnout of the regiment was not as large as was expected, in view of the order issued yesterday that officers only would be allowed to take friends into the regiment. A good many of the privates went on strike.

Sewers Committee Meeting.
There was an informal discussion at the committee meeting this evening of the important question of raising money to build new and necessary sewers, particularly one on North Catherine-street, at an estimated cost of about \$25,000. Chairman Biggar introduced the matter and suggested an effort be made to get the money by means of a by-law to be submitted to the property owners at the municipal elections.

The aldermen were not over impressed with that method of raising the needed money, but they decided they would discuss the proposal most seriously at the next meeting of the committee.

A number of claims for damages for flooding, caused by the Mountain Drive, are unsettled, and Ald. Biggar, Kerr and Wallace were appointed a sub-committee to look into them and report.

The committee decided to again recommend to the Council that for sewers over 12 inches the citizens be asked to pay for 12-inch sewers at the rate of 34 cents, and 10-inch sewers at 24 cents.

Macklem Investigation.
On the investigation into the Macklem charges being resumed at Stony Creek church yesterday that was agreed to by the committee of the church, the committee, cross-examination of Inspector Macklem, cross-examination of Major Howard this evening that his cross-examination at night last for two hours. Rev. Mr. Deacon said he had no idea of what Mr. Washington intended to get at, but he protested at great length against any aspersion being cast on the character of any witnesses in the case.

Mr. Washington contended that it was his duty to his client to show whether Lade was a credible witness, and Inspector Stewart agreed with him.

Resuming his examination, Mr. Washington asked: "Did you devote any of the Foresters' money to your own use?" A. "Yes."

"And you never paid it back?" A. "No."

"Is it a fact that Smyth lent you money to pay your Foresters' dues?" A. "No."

"Did he lend you any money?" A. "No."

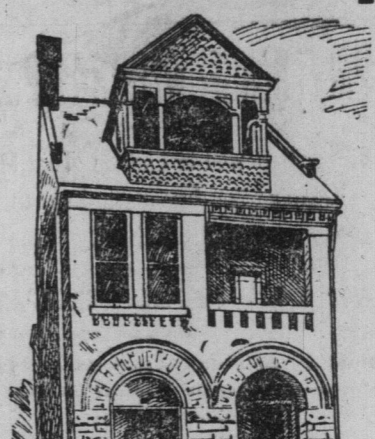

which should be legitimized upon by a joint council representing Great Britain and the colonies. Immigration was one of the most important of these subjects, to which he thought a Cabinet Minister should be specially assigned.

The public mind was one of the greatest difficulties he had to contend with, and he had to be patient in the face of the difficulties of the royal court. It had been deeply interested in the subject of the Empire. But such outbursts of patriotism were not sufficient. The Empire required some machinery for its development, not other than personal loyalty, valued as it was.

Practical Remarks.

Hon. G. W. Ross was next introduced by way of moving a resolution in Sir Frederick Young. He believed the period of apathy in British opinion should be remedied. There were many reasons why this matter should be kept in the front. Going to England, he said, one felt himself to be some extent at a disadvantage. They were anxious to get a feeling of unity and to transmit the Empire into understandable terms. There was the puzzling system of weights and measures. These were matters upon which he would like to see a union of interest throughout the Empire. (Applause.) Such union would give one a present feeling. Then there were difficulties in regard to the various laws, which were very injurious to trade with Canada. A British merchant, when in the colonies, had no assurance that he would receive the same banking facilities in the Empire as he would at home. It was in this regard that he would like to see a union of interest throughout the Empire.

A circular just issued by the Butter and Cheese Association of Montreal to the dairymen of Canada asks them to discontinue the manufacture of cheese entirely for the present. It is for the reason that the product of November is not up to the standard required. The manufacture of butter exclusively after that date is recommended, and it is pointed out that the price of butter is higher on an average the year round than cheese, and that cheese is more profitable, not only in the comparative price, but in that the farm stock and the land are better sustained.

THE CENTRALIZED TOWNSHIP SCHOOL.
The latest thing is the centralized township school. It is working in different parts of the United States, and the system is well worth looking into by the people of this country. The centralized township school involves the closing up of the little red-side-line school houses, and the building of one large school in the centre of the township. The children are conveyed to and from the school in wagons at the public expense. Among the advantages of the system are these: Pupils from every part of the township enjoy a graded school education; with the grading of the school and the larger number of pupils come teachers of a more highly educated class; higher branches of study are taught; the salaries of the teachers are higher; the pupils are not compelled to walk to school in slash and rain, or to sit with wet feet in ill-ventilated buildings; the attendance is larger and truantism is unknown.

THE CANADIAN TEACHER.
The Canadian Teacher gives particulars of the working of the system in the United States, where it has been found to be a complete success. In Gustavus Township, Trumble County, Ohio, it has been working since 1898, and has now secured such a hold upon the people that even those at first opposed now frankly admit the superiority of the central school. Gustavus Township is located in the centre of the township. It is a four-room school, having a principal and three assistants. The children of the township are brought to this central school in nine wagons. The wagons are provided with curtains, lap-robes, soapstones, etc., for severe weather. The contract for the school is let out to the lowest responsible bidder, who is under bond to fill his obligations. The drivers are required to have the children on the school grounds at 8.45 a.m., which does away with tardiness, and to leave for home at 3.45 p.m. The wagons call at every farm house where there are school children, the children being dragged into the wagon on the roadside and are set down upon the school grounds. There is no tramping thru the snow and mud, and the attendance is much increased and far more regular.

Colin MacDougall, K.C., Dead.

Passed Away Just as He Rose From Bed, After a Rest.

St. Thomas, Oct. 25.—Colin MacDougall, K.C., one of the oldest and best known citizens of St. Thomas, dropped dead at his residence, Wellington-street, this afternoon, just as he rose from his bed, where he had been resting. Deceased was born in Elgin County on March 9, 1834, his father a Scotchman, coming to the United States in 1798 and to Chippewa, Ont., in 1810. Shortly afterwards removing to Elgin. Colin MacDougall took a course of law for two years at Ann Arbor, Mich., before entering the law office of the late Judge McKee, Toronto, and afterwards the office of Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., Toronto, where he graduated in 1861. Robertson entered into partnership under the firm name of MacDougall & Robertson. In 1874 he was chosen to represent Elgin in the House of Commons. He has been a member of Knox Presbyterian Church since 1877 and was widely known and highly respected all thru Western Ontario. A widow and two children survived him.

In the report of the Board of Endowment and Finance presented to the corporation of Trinity yesterday it was stated:

1. To make an appeal for \$500,000, naming one-half of this sum as the first stage to be aimed at.

2. Subscriptions to be conditional upon not less than \$250,000 being subscribed by Dec. 31, 1903.

3. Subscriptions to bear interest at 4 per cent. up to the end of 1903, or until such earlier time as the \$250,000 may be subscribed, when the capital shall become payable in instalments.

The following subscriptions on the conditions named have already been secured: Rev. T. C. S. Macklem, \$5,000; James Henderson, D.L.C., \$10,000; W. L. Brock, M.P., \$10,000; E. R. Oakes, M.P., \$10,000; Lieut.-Col. H. M. Pellatt, \$25,000.

Of this total of \$80,000, the sum of \$45,000 was made payable towards the first quarter million, and \$35,000 towards the second quarter million. The subscriptions had already yielded interest amounting to \$15,000, and the total had received besides a subscription for income of \$500 from Mrs. Becker, Kossel, and two smaller subscriptions amounting to \$35.

The entire management, investment and control of the fund will remain in the hands of the board of trustees, which is composed of six members, namely, E. B. Oaker, W. R. Brock, Joseph S. Macnamara, James Henderson, T. C. S. Macklem and H. M. Pellatt. Mr. Macklem being secretary of the board and Col. Pellatt, treasurer.

MILLIONS IN INSURANCE. Annual Government Report Contains Some Interesting Figures.

The report of the Inspector of Insurance and Friendly Societies was issued yesterday. It states that there are only four joint stock fire insurance companies registered, and their total assets are \$53,325,386, and are liable for \$97,304, besides \$170,295 paid up capital stock. Those fire insurance companies doing business on the mutual plan have \$168,840,687 at risk, and the surplus of their general assets over and above \$3,823,721. In the year 1900 these companies did \$57,830,352 new business.

The 23 organizations known as "Life Insurance or benefit in the nature thereof" have a total membership of 222,206, and a surplus of insurance they have in force is \$1,226,451,971.

The sick and funeral benefit societies during the past year paid out \$42,850 for funerals and \$277,788 for sick benefits. Their total membership is 61,244. The report also gives a detailed account of the affairs of every company, as well as the names of officers and directors.

WHEAT LITTLE DAMAGED. Government Report Shows Yield to Be 24 Bushels to the Acre.

Winnipeg, Oct. 25.—The government harvest report to be issued shortly will show that there has been but little damage to the quality of the crop outside of the Red River Valley. Wheat has lost its bright red color, and will not, as a rule, grade higher than No. 1 Northern. The yield is estimated to average 24 bushels to the acre.

ARBITRATION AT OTTAWA. Ottawa, Oct. 25.—The sittings of the arbitration in the case of the English Lloyds against the Sturgeon Falls Paper Company, Limited, were resumed to-day in the office of the Supreme Court registrar, Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, an arbitrator. The dispute is as to the value of spruce lands which the Sturgeon Falls Paper Company sold Lloyds. Hon. S. H. Blake represents Lloyds, and Hon. Charles Russell, London, England, and Leighton McCarthy, K.C., M.P., represent the Sturgeon Falls company. There are to be a large number of witnesses, such as bush-rangers, to be examined.

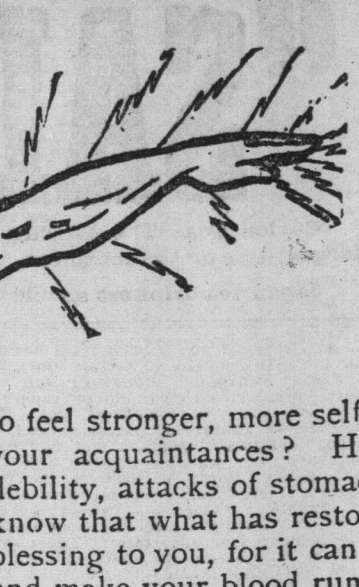

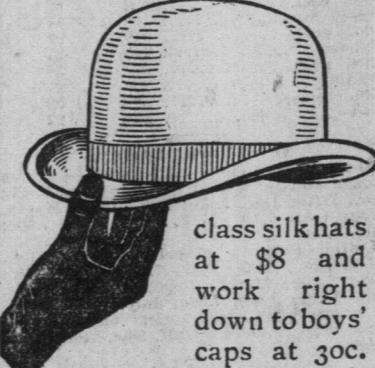
