The fire in its consequences is confined to the burnt area. Some city fires disorganize portions not flame swept. When power stations, gas supply, banks, newspapers, telephone centres, hotels are in the burnt section, a whole city may be inconvenienced. This fire of ours was a warehouse fire in a defined district.

It hit the dry goods trade hard; the paper and stationery business still harder; and a whole host of agents for manufactured articles that we import. Toronto had built up a great manufacturing industry in all kinds of ready-wear clothing and many hundreds of artisans found employment in it; this business is probably the worst hit of all. But even this industry will recover in a rapid way.

In making a General Report to you upon the Company's properties in Sao Paulo, I may say, as to the future, I see no reason why we should not show considerably better results this year. The general condition of the country is improving. Brazil controls the coffee and rubber trade of the world, producing 75 or 80 per cent. of the world's supply of both, and must continue to do so. It is also a large producer of sugar, cotton and tobacco. Each year of late, the output of national factories has been increasing and new industries.

The National Government is faithfully keeping up all its obligations, and its credit in London is so good that it recently floated a loan there of some eight millions sterling for the new port works in Rio, which was many times over-subscribed. What applies to the National Government applies with greater force to the Government of this State, which is the hackbone of the country, and has always taken the leading part in National affairs.

Brazil is taking great interest in the St. Louis Exposition, having apprepriated \$600,000 toward expenses of its exhibit. This State will have its own separate exhibit. At the request of the Government we are having large photographs taken of our Plant at Parnahyba, which will be sent there.

Political conditions are stable, and whatever may be heard about revolutions in republics like Uruguay, Paraguay and Bolivia, Brazil must not be confounded with such countries. Any one of the least important of the twenty States of Brazil is of at least equal importance with these other republics.

The Earnings of the Company have been most satisfactory, showing gross income amounting to \$1,303,175.15, as compared with \$1,123,285.17 for the previous year, an increase of \$179,889.99, or 16.1 per cent.

Architects Point Out Desirable Regu lations That Should Govern the New Buildings.

Another suggestion was that the city should regulate the construction of all corner buildings, making it imperative, by concession or otherwise, that they be of concession or otherwise, that they be of MRS. What the Fire Has Shown.

Beaumont Jarvis, the architect, who has twice visited the scene of the Baltimore fire, stated that building methods are still in an experimental stage, and that present systems must practically be revolutioized to render buildings fireproof. He mentiqued the following as some of the lessons of Tucsday night's blaze:

1. Brick stood the flames best of all.

2. Bricks should not be laid in lime mortar. But in cement.

3. The walls should be heavier.

4. Little or no wood should be used in construction.

construction.

5. Stone will not stand fire.

6. Steel, Iron and wood in construction should not be used unless they are properly protected with fireproofing materials.

7. Floors and partitions should be in concrete, armored with metal.

8. The Baltimore fire proved that concrete stood the fire test best of all.

9. The so-called fire shutters, projecting windows, are of little use, and automatic concrete shutters are the only device that fire will not affect.

VALUE OF WIRED GLASS.

Concrete and wired glass, in the estimation of Professor Charles L. Norton of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, demonstrated their great worth in the Baltimore conflagration. Professor Norton, who is engineer in charge of the insurance engineering experiment station, gave an address in the Walker Building last night before the Society of Arts of the institute. He has spent several weeks investigating the effects of teon the various buildings, according to their construction, and as a result has obtained some information that will be of interest to those connected with office and other buildings in the business sections of great cities. The lecture was flustrated by numerous pictures of buildings partially destroyed.

Some of his conclusions are that the possibility of conflagration should be obviated by laws against storing explosive merchandise and cere in installing ventilation systems and thermostat systems, resulting in less dauger of fire spreading by explosion; by protection by means of non-inflammable roof materials, shutters, and wired glass and roof bydrants, and by the use of materials freproof more than in name. The modern steel-frame "fireproof" building came in for some consideration. As to the steel itself, Professor Norton found it generally in god condition, and not affected noticeably either by the fire or corrosion provious to it.

As to the buildings, he found that red brick walls stood the test well, while much more damage was noticed in those of lighter brick, with terra cotta ornamentation. Stone, whether granite, marble, sandstone or limestone, fared badly. WHERE FLOOR ARCHES AND STEEL COVER. INGS WERE OF CONCRETE THEY STOOD THE TEST MUCH BETTER THAN TERRA COTTA. This was due probably to the fact that concrete and steel expand at the same rate, while terra cotta expands 2½ times as fast as steel, and so the partitions or floor arches buckle or break.
