ANNUAL REPORT.

The Managers of the House of Industry, in presenting their Report for 1876, have to observe, that although the drain upon their resources during that year was unusually heavy, they have, with the kind assistance of the public, been enabled to meet it, and also to provide thus far for the demands of the present season, which, they regret to say, has opened rather inauspiciously.

The great prostration which for some time past has pervaded almost every branch of industry, has not only increased the number of their legitimate dependents, but has induced many persons, who during the summer found employment in outlying municipalities, on the cessation of farm labour, or approach of winter, to flock for support into the city. Then again, owing to the unsettled state of affairs in the neighbouring Republic, the Province has been overrun with numbers of needy adventurers, whose presence cannot be considered an acquisition. All these, added to the poor previously existing, make a total of poverty to which the means at the disposal of the Managers may ultimately prove inadequate.

As a country advances in population poverty may be expected to increase in a corresponding ratio. To a moderate extent the rich and the poor may benefit each other,—the one by their charity, the other by their patience. But amongst the most progressive nations of modern times, such as England and the United States, poverty, notwithstanding all their material development, has alarmingly increased; and people may well ask, "What can be done with our poor?"

While the rich have become richer, the poor, as a rule, have become poorer. Of this truth a glance at the countries named will satisfy the most incredulous. Canada, holding intimate connection with both, must of course be more or less affected by their social condition. Hitherto, amongst our own people, poverty has existed rather in name than in fact; but the more closely we follow the steps of other nations, the more we must expect it will develop among us, and the sooner should efficient measures be taken for its mitigation,—its suppression can never be looked for: “The poor you have always with you.”

In dealing with poverty as it appears in this city, the Managers have endeavoured, according to their ability, to aid all, but more especially those who were willing and anxious to help themselves. The Managers believe that society will be benefited, rather by enabling the poor to keep their families together, and perhaps secure, in time, a small independence, than by cooping them in large establishments, where they lose, in some sense, their individuality, and become burdens upon the public, instead of contributing their due share toward the welfare of the country. A great and much desired boon would be, the providing of work for such people, and paying them for it. How can this be accomplished?

But if the question of the honest and deserving poor be difficult of solution, what shall be done with others, who, as a rule, it is to be feared, are neither honest nor deserving. The records of the Ward for Casuals attached to the House throw a glimpse of light upon some of these characters. That building, as its name indicates, was intended to afford a night's shelter, with supper and breakfast, to the homeless wanderer, who was then expected to speed on his way elsewhere: but when persons, familiarly called “tramps,” present themselves,

as often happens over and over again, not only day after day, but year after year, and bring "all their friends," thus converting the place into a permanent lodging-house, a state of things is created which the Managers never contemplated. It is well known how similar cases were disposed of in the days of "Good Queen Bess;" but modern refinement shrinks at the mere suggestion of the vigorous remedies prescribed and administered by that "most dread sovereign."

By its Act of Incorporation the House is authorized to hold property producing an annual income not exceeding £3,000 (\$12,000). The entire annual income of property now held in every shape is scarcely \$1,300. Money is never invested unless specially devised for that purpose: the whole amount received for investment last year was \$300. The interest accruing from investments is, with all donations received in the ordinary way, invariably applied to the current expenses of the Institution.

The Managers hope that this plain statement of facts will tend to remove any contrary impression that may chance to exist.

The Managers have much pleasure in again recording the expression of their entire satisfaction with the conduct of the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Duckett.

The usual statistics of the House will be found in the accompanying Reports from the Treasurer, Medical Officer, and Superintendent.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Nothing has occurred during the year to disturb the even tenor of our way; and I have nothing very startling or novel to report. I must, however, congratulate the Managers on the improved sanitary condition of the House since the introduction of the city water.

Formerly, zymotic diseases, often of severe character, were common; but during the last year, although they have not been entirely absent, yet the more dangerous have; and those which did occur were usually mild and easily controlled.

Only one death, resulting from erysipelas, can be attributed to the above causes.

The whole of the deaths, with that exception, were the result of old chronic affections, whose origin dated long prior to the time when the parties sought the friendly shelter of this place. An account of them would have no interest for the general public; but to the moralist or scientist they exhibit the inevitable penalty attached to the transgression of those laws which have been wisely ordained for the promotion of our present health and future happiness.

Of the thirteen who have died, two were between forty-three and fifty, and eleven were from sixty to eighty years of age.
