



Fredericton, N.B., July 7.—The city souncil spent more than three hours this evening wrangling over the report, submitted by the newly-created police commission, asking that the appointment of achief and four patrolmen be ratified. Ald, Winslow started the ball in motion by moving an amendment to report that the council approve of the appointment of four policemen, one to be a sergeant at salaries of \$500 per year. This was declared to be out of order and with drawn.





ENGLAND AROUSED

OVER SUFFRAGETTES (Toronto News.)

For months London has been entertained and excited by the militant advectory of votes for women. Female agittors have gone about speaking on the doorsteps of Downing street, appealing members of parliament tea drinking of the terrace at Westminster, chaining themselves to ministerial front doors, an attempting to force a way into the lobbin of the House of Commons. These tactinave brought the women before the maistrates on charges of disorderly conductive. of the House of Commons. These tactics have brought the women before the magistrates on charges of disorderly conduct, and numbers of them have gone to jail. London has also witnessed a demonstration of another kind which has had an unquestioned effect. Ten thousand women marched in orderly and dignified procession from Horse Guards avenue, through Piccadilly Circus and Trafalgar Square to Albert Hall. In that procession, for instance, were women of title, physicians, actresses, musicians, painters, journalists, scientists, novelists, esseyists and nurses. Hundreds of them wore the semonastic cap and gown, and not a few displayed the doctor's hood. Lady Henry Somerset, Lady Frances Balfour, Miss Emily Davis, LL.D., and Mrs. Henry Fawcett, LL.D., headed the legions. Never has there been a more remarkable concrete demonstration of the place women have attained in the purely intellectual life of the nation.

Why it ever existed none can say, for the rons of educated mothers are the salt of the earth. It may be that before many years the franchise will be extended to women. But it is questionable whether public opinion is ripe for it at the moment.




