MINUTES OF THE TWELFTH SESSION OF THE MONTREAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

HELD IN THE SMITH'S FALLS METHODIST CHURCH, COMMENCING
MAY 30TH, 1895.

The TWELFTH SESSION of the MONTREAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church assembled, according to appointment, in the Methodist Church, Smith's Falls, Ont., Thursday, May 30th, 1895, at 9 o'clock a.m.

Rev. E. B. RYCKMAN, M.A., D.D., President of the Conference, occupied the chair.

After singing Hymn 753, the Secretary of the Conference, Rev. W.M. PHILP, B.A., B.D., read a Scripture lesson from the 107th Psalm, and Revs. J. W. CLIPSHAM and F. CHISHOLM offered prayer.

Hymn 93 was sung, the Secretary of the Conference read the second Scripture lesson from Col. iii., and Revs. R. EASON and A. M. PHILLIPS, B.D., led in prayer.

The Conference prayer-meeting continued until 10 o'clock.

The President called for the names of the laymen elected by the district meetings. The Secretary then called the roll, and 162 ministers and 51 laymen responded to the call.

The Conference then proceeded to elect a President. The second ballot resulted in the election of Rev. JOHN ARMSTRONG.

The new President was introduced by the ex-President in felicitous terms, and took the chair.

The President then called upon the Conference to elect a Secretary.

The ballot resulted in the election of Rev. F. G. LETT.

It was resolved that the Rules of Order, as found in our Book of Discipline, govern this Conference in so far as they apply.

The President then called upon the Conference to elect a Chairman for the Kingston District, the chairmanship being vacant through the resignation of Rev. A. C. COURTICE, B.A., B.D., Editor of *Christian Guardian*.

The ballot resulted in the election of the Rev. F. C. REYNOLDS.

The Rev. F. CHISHOLM was elected Financial Secretary.

On nomination of the Secretary, the following were elected Assistant Secretaries: Rev. W. PHILP, B.A., B.D., Rev. A. A. RADLEY, and Mr. A. J. CROSS; and Rev. C. D. BALDWIN, Journal Secretary.

Rev. JAMES LAWSON was appointed reporter for the *Christian Guardian*, and Rev. P. H. ALLIN, B.A., to sign railway certificates and have charge of the Conference register.

The Special Session of the Twelfth Montreal Annual Conference was opened in the Smith's Falls Methodist Church, on May 28th, 1895, at 9 o'clock a.m., the Rev. E. B. RYCKMAN, D.D., President of Conference, in the Chair.

Hymn No. 1 was sung, 2 Tim. ii. was read by the Secretary, and Revs. H. CAIRNS and D. WINTER offered prayer.

The roll was then called, and 97 ministers answered the call.

OBITUARIES.

HENRY SHALER.

Born in 1799, in Haddon, State of Connecticut, the subject of this sketch was the patriarch of this Conference, and by reason of his venerable age and godly character, he has long been known among his brethren as Father Shaler.

He entered the ministry in 1828, the same decade in which Anson Green, Matthew Whiting, the Ryersons, and other eminent worthies—long since passed to their reward—also joined the ministerial ranks. He endured his full share of the hardships which fell to the lot of those glorious men who laid the foundations of our Church in this country, and was not one whit behind the chiefest of them in flaming zeal and abundant labors.

He was a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and preached the gospel with soul-converting power. Aged men of to-day who knew him in his manhood's strength, tell of the powerfully awakening sermons and exhortations he delivered at camp-meetings and revival services, and of the great ingatherings constantly attending his ministry. An accident which nearly cost him his life so impaired his health that he took a superannuated relation in 1854, and from that date till his death he resided at Kemptville, where he maintained the liveliest interest in his Master's work, and the most loving relations with his brethren. The Gospel he had preached to others sustained him in his declining years. He finished his useful and honorable course of ninety-five years, and a ministry of sixty-six, by a triumphant death, entering into rest on the 13th day of October, 1894.

WILLIAM HALL, M.A.

William Hall was born in the city of Montreal on the 22nd day of November, in the year 1837. He was third son of the late Joseph Newman Hall, in his lifetime hardware merchant in that city. William entered the High School, Montreal, in 1844, leaving it in 1852, to become a junior clerk in the then well-known house of Maitland, Tylee & Co. In 1854, the seventeenth year of his age, that great spiritual revolution known as conversion occurred, and from that hour the whole course of his life was changed. He felt impressed that his life-work must be that of the Christian ministry, and with the purpose of preparing himself thoroughly for the duties of his office, he entered the McGill College in 1861, and in 1867 received the degree of M.A. therefrom. His

first efforts at public work for Christ were as exhorter and local preacher at St. Laurent and St. Leonard's. In 1858, as a probationer, he was sent to St. John's and Chambly. His first appointment, subsequent to his ordination in 1862, was Toronto (Berkeley Street), where he had already labored one year. In 1864, while junior pastor in Belleville, he married Miss Paul, of Portadown, Ireland, now his sorrowing widow, of whose many virtues and graces of character, were this the fitting occasion and place, it would be a delight to speak. After leaving Belleville he was stationed at Sherbrooke, Prescott, Ottawa, Cornwall and Montreal (Douglas and West End). In 1882, on account of ill-health, he was compelled to withdraw for a while from the work of the ministry. After two years' rest in Ireland, he returned to Canada and was appointed to the pastorate of Gananoque. From there he removed to Montreal (East End), and in 1889 became Principal of the French Methodist Institute, where he continued to render efficient service for Christ and the Church until his death on the 7th day of May, 1895. Brother Hall's life was a beautiful illustration of the New Testament ideal of a Christian gentleman. It was impossible to know him without admiring him; it was equally impossible to continue long in his presence without being impressed with the conviction that he was one who walked in close and intimate fellowship with God. His prayers were characterized by the simplicity of a child holding loving, familiar intercourse with a well-known father. He was wise in winning souls. His skill as a soul-winner was largely due to the winsomeness of his character. He exercised rare tact in personal appeal to sinners to accept the Lord Jesus. Unselfishness was his marked characteristic. All unworthy ambition was foreign to his life. Few men have passed from us leaving behind them more friends or a more fragrant memory. His life was a benediction and inspiration to countless hearts, his death was a personal sorrow to multitudes.

The following beautiful tribute was paid to our brother's worth by a writer in a local and secular paper: "The Rev. Wm. Hall, whose sad death was chronicled in the local press last week, had one of the sweetest natures it was ever my good fortune to meet with. He realized more completely than I have ever seen it in man or woman, the Christ-like character. He had an almost infinite patience, a profound pity and love for the erring, an equability, a sweetness of spirit which we associate with some rare and saintly woman. No spirit of anger ever found lodgement in his breast. All his ideas were high and noble; his pulpit message was uniformly one of love; his voice and smile, his hand-clasp was like a cordial. Dearly did he love the young; infinite was his solicitude for their happiness. As husband and father he was a model; all who knew him loved him. That so rare, so lovable, so valuable a personality should be lost to the community in that sad way, is inexplicable."

WILLIAM H. GRAHAM.

Seldom has a voice been hushed among us, or a well-known presence been removed that has been more sensibly and sadly missed than the manly form and ringing voice of the late honored ex-President of the Montreal Conference, the Rev. William Henry Graham.

It has been well said that "to attempt anything like a full sketch of his life would be to write a history of later Methodism in this part of the country." Bro. Graham was the youngest son of the late Andrew Graham, who came from the north of Ireland in 1831, and with his family settled in the township of Osnabruck, Stormont County, where William Henry was born in November of the following year. The family soon removed to Percy Township, Northumberland County, where the subject of this notice spent most of his boyhood.

Early in life he felt himself called to preach the Gospel. In this he was encouraged by his father, who was a local preacher. He began his life-work with marked fervor and effectiveness in the vicinity of Odessa, in the year 1855. On June 7th, 1857, he was ordained by the late Bishop Smith, and became a member of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in which he labored till the Union of 1883, when he became a member of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church, in which he continued his earnest and faithful labors to the end of his earthly life.

While in the M. E. Church our late brother was so highly esteemed for his abilities and faithfulness that he rapidly rose to eminence, and for many years continued to hold the position of Presiding Elder of the Ottawa District. In pioneer work he labored hard in the Ottawa valley, and was familiarly known and beloved in hundred of homes on missions which he founded. But though he was strongly attached to the Church of his early choice, he was among the very foremost of those who inaugurated the scheme for the organic unification of Methodism in this country, and brought it to so successful a consummation.

Just here it may be remarked that unselfishness was one of our beloved brother's chief characteristics. Many of his surviving brethren, especially those who have labored with him on the Stationing Committee, will be ready to bear cheerful testimony to this statement. He was a genuine friend, had a most genial disposition, and made a most interesting companion. In improving the educational advantages he had he was studious and diligent exceedingly.

Bro. Graham was more than ordinarily active, and never spared himself in serving the cause he loved, laboring most assiduously on his own charges, besides doing a large amount of work for his brethren. Truly it may be well said of him, "He rests from his labors." But notwithstanding his arduous labors he found time to read, and his mind was well stored in things pertaining to his work as a Christian minister.

Bro. Graham made an excellent chairman, and was beloved generally by the brethren in his districts. He was true to the Discipline and doctrines of the Methodist Church. He was able in debate and true in friendship, and those who knew him best loved him most. He was

beloved in the home, and his buoyancy of spirit brought cheerfulness into every circle. He was one of the kindest of husbands and most affectionate of fathers, and he left to mourn their loss and cherish his memory the wife of his youth, a daughter of the late James Stephenson, of Percy, and three children, namely, Mrs. D. G. Bruce, of Hot Springs, South Dakota, Mrs. J. W. Conklin, of Iroquois, and George P. Graham, of the Brockville *Recorder*.

Bro. Graham spent the first three years after the Union at Lennoxville, Que.; the next three at Carleton Place, Ont.; he then spent three years at Waterloo, Que., during which time he was not only Chairman of the District, but was, in 1892, at Pembroke, elected President of the Montreal Conference. From Waterloo he removed to Kemptville two years ago, which proved to be his last field of labor. Here his strong constitution suddenly gave way, and after a few months of gradually failing health he peacefully passed away to his everlasting rest on March 22nd, 1895, in the sixty-third year of his age and fortieth of his ministry. He spoke calmly of his death during his last days, and with much assurance of the future. To a friend he alluded to the difficulties of his forty years of ministerial service; but of his coming change he spoke joyously, describing it as an "abundant entrance," an "everlasting joy." May that joy be shared with him by us all.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

REPORT OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

CONSTITUTION OF THE FUND.

1. The name of this Fund shall be, "The Sustentation Fund of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church."

2. The one object of this Fund shall be to supply those fields in our Home Work which are now, and shall hereafter be, known as "Domestic Missions," or "Dependent Circuits or Stations," so that ministers and preachers duly appointed to those fields shall be regular claimants on the Fund, and shall be entitled to supplemental grants therefrom, whenever their "total income" from other sources shall actually fall below the following scale of minimum allowances, viz. :

For a single preacher on probation, \$300 per annum; for a single ordained minister, \$400 per annum; for a married minister in full connection, \$500 per annum, with \$25 for each subsequent year, until his allowance reaches \$600 per annum.

N.B.—The term "allowance" or "allowances" shall be understood as including only the items of ministerial support, viz., salary, board and fuel, exclusive of, and in addition to, any necessary charges for house rent, horse-keeping, travelling, removals and circuit incidentals.

Note.—That in regard to the distribution of the money contributed to this Fund, the Committee shall have discretionary power to make grants to ministers with families, even when the minimum allowance \$600, is exceeded.

3. The income of this Fund shall consist of moneys raised within the bounds of our Conference, by collections and subscriptions on all the various Circuits and Missions, excepting the Indian and the French.

4. The general management of the Fund shall be entrusted to a Sustentation Fund Committee, composed of one minister and one layman, elected by each annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Conference on the nomination of the Committee; and this Committee shall transact the necessary business thereof at each Annual Conference, in accordance with the following regulations :

(a) With a view to raising the income needed, the Committee shall annually make a careful estimate of the prospective aggregate deficiencies on dependent fields, and suggest the amount desired from each District, in order to meet such deficiencies.

(b) In making grants from the Fund, the Committee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned "Scale of minimum allowances." No claim shall be entertained which has not been recommended by the annual District Meeting; and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims for recommendation, shall declare their inability to meet their "net deficiencies."

(c) Should the income of the Fund in any year prove insufficient to meet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to make up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to the aforementioned "scale," but should there be a surplus over the claims, as per said "scale," it shall be carried forward, and included in the income of the year next following.

(d) A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference annually, while in session, including a summary of business transacted, an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary to the interests of the Fund, said report, as adopted by the Conference, to be published in the Minutes.

5. That no application from any Circuit or Mission be entertained by the Committee, unless that Circuit or Mission has made the most earnest efforts to secure, at least, ten cents per member.

In order to obtain greater support for this important Fund, the Financial District Meetings are requested to arrange for the holding of platform meetings, and the appointment of deputations to advocate the claims of the Fund on all the Circuits and Missions.

The Committee regrets that the income of the Fund has fallen off during the year so that we are able to grant only sixteen per cent. of the constitutional claims; and in view of the pressing necessities we earnestly urge the ministers to put forth vigorous efforts to raise at least ten cents per member this year which will secure more than double the amount raised the past year.

That the Secretary-Treasurer be Rev. J. T. Pitcher, for the coming year.

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our Ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each candidate as to his studies and general reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of candidates shall be held in each district, under the supervision of the Chairman, and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year, and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman in sealed envelopes, not later than the first Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairmen to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each district the name of any candidate or probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the candidate or probationer has completed it; and further, the standard qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the preliminary course of study in the aggregate, and thirty-three and one-third per cent. in each subject. Also a standing of thirty-three and one-third per cent. shall be required in order to pass in each subject of the subsequent course, and the Conference directs that existing regulations relating to the time and manner of examinations be imperatively observed, and more especially that it be deemed absolutely peremptory that the examinations be held on the same day throughout the whole Conference, and that all the young men in any district writing on any given subject write at the same hour. The maximum time for each paper shall be two hours. No supplementary examination shall be allowed between the regular time of examinations and the close of Conference. Each examiner is expected to send at least one copy of each examination paper to the chairmen of districts.

The probationers of this Conference shall have their standing given them year by year in our Minutes, jointly, according to their years travelled and studies passed.

It is further recommended that in future each paper sent to the Examiners shall be endorsed by the Chairman of the District or his deputy. In case of a paper failing to reach a chairman, some other examiner shall set a paper if practicable.

Candidates and probationers shall be known only by figures or letters to the Examiners.

In the adjustment of work of probationers passing from the former course of study to the new, the following principles will be observed:

1. Probationers hitherto responsible for the 1st, 2nd or 3rd year of the former course shall be required to complete the same.
2. Work done in the 4th year of the old course shall be credited, when identical or in kindred subjects, for corresponding subjects in the 4th or 5th year.
3. In cases where probationers have completed the former course of study, nothing further shall be required of them.
4. The Secretary of the Examining Board shall take each case in his register and enter in each the items to debit under above principles, consulting, when any special case of complication arises, with the Principal of Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal.
5. The said officers shall have final authority under above provisions to make adjustment in each case subject to appeal to the Board of Examiners at its next annual meeting.
6. The Secretary shall notify each probationer of his obligations under the above provisions.
7. The Examining Board of 1894 shall furnish whatever papers are necessary in passing from the old to the new curriculum.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO MAKE A
DELIVERANCE IN REGARD TO THE MATTER
OF MR. HORNER.

For several years past what has become known as the Horner Movement has been a source of grave solicitude to the Church. We have deemed it prudent to exercise the greatest forbearance towards those who have been unhappily involved in it, in the earnest hope that they would see the falseness and unscripturalness of some of the practices into which they have fallen.

With much prayer and great patience the Church has borne with these, using every means which could be devised to save to the Church and to Christ those who had been thus misled. But in the case of some we regret to say that all these means have failed, and, to preserve the Church from disintegration and reproach, as well as to enable it to perform with as little hindrance as possible its God-given mission to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land, we have found it necessary to depose from the ministry of the Church the chief mover in the said disruption.

It is the most painful duty that the Church has had to perform for many years, but almost without exception the ministry agree that this step has become essential to the Church's purity and prosperity.

It may be well to give a brief *résumé* of the steps the Church has taken in this matter.

Mr. Horner, in 1882, entered our work in the regular way, and gave promise of being one of our most earnest workers. He developed great aptitude in revival work, and felt that he was especially called to this department of Christian work. The Church recognized his gifts, and to a large extent he was employed in such work. At his ordination he urged that he should be devoted to revival work, but was shown that we have but one order of ministers and one form of ordination, which the Church has always held to be strictly apostolic and scriptural. After much conversation with him, he was ordained in the regular way.

EXTRACTS FROM JOURNAL OF MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

“ Kingston, Ont., May 25th, 1887.

“ Journal, page 199.—‘ What probationers for the ministry are now received into full connection with the Conference and ordained?’

“ The case of R. C. Horner was referred back to the Pembroke District for the purpose of amending the minute in the case.’

“ *Minute of Pembroke District.*—‘ Bro. Horner having travelled three years and attended college two years, completing the prescribed course of study, having finished his probation, answered all the disciplinary questions, moved by Bro. Allum, seconded by Bro. Shortt, that Bro. Horner having finished his probation, he be recommended to be ordained to the ministry of our Church, and in view of his marked ability and usefulness in the evangelistic work, this District, in its judgment, believes that he should be permitted to labor in that work.’

“ May 26th, 1887.

“ Journal, page 201.—‘ The case of R. C. Horner was again taken up, and he was recommended to the Conference to be received into full connection with Conference and ordained, which recommendation was adopted by the Conference.’

R. C. Horner, C. D. Baldwin *et alii* were ordained on May 29th, 1887.—Journal, page 219.

According to his earnest request, he was employed in such labors; but soon he manifested a reluctance to be guided by the judgment of his brethren in his work and plans, preferring to select his own fields, and often interfering with the arrangements of the ministers, thereby provoking trouble on their circuits.

Soon he and those who wrought with him began to countenance such practices as prostrations, the simultaneous praying aloud of large numbers, so that the decency and reverence of worship were largely destroyed.

The Scriptures were wrested by unlearned and unstable men and women, to the misleading of the hearers and the subverting of the truth.

It was found necessary, after great patience and care had been exercised, to cease appointing Mr. Horner to a work for which he had shown in the end such unfitness.

Controversy, disquiet, and insubordination to the rules of the Church were engendered in almost every place where he labored; and nothing was left to the Church but to appoint him to a circuit as all the other ministers are appointed. He, however, refused to take such work, and be guided by the judgment of his brethren. After repeated attempts had been made to induce him to comply with his ordination vows, and save the Church from unrest and reproach, it was found necessary to bring him to trial in the usual way.

The committee who sat at the trial unanimously found him guilty of failing to take the appointment assigned him by the Conference, and violating the Discipline in laboring on the fields of other ministers without permission, and suspended him from the work of the ministry until the ensuing Annual Conference in the meantime.

The President of the Conference, accompanied by the members of the Committee, waited on Mr. Horner, and the President, in the presence of the Committee, asked Mr. Horner the following questions:

"Why did you not take the appointment given you by the Conference?" He answered, "Did you expect me to go to Combermere?"

The President asked, "Did you refuse to go because it was Combermere?" His answer was, "No, I would not take the best city circuit in Montreal Conference?"

The President then asked, "Will you, as a member of the Conference, observe the rules of the Conference?" He said, "I will not."

The President then asked, "Will you not then resign your position as a member of Conference?" He answered, "I will not resign."

The President then asked, "Mr. Horner, do you then wish to compel the Conference to expel you, that you may gain the sympathy of the people and prestige as a persecuted man?" After a considerable pause he answered, "I am not thinking of that."

He also persisted in his former actions, and even went so far as to form another society, and send out laborers into the fields occupied by our ministers, who solicited members to leave the Methodist Church and unite with his organization.

When the Conference met, it was found imperative to not only sustain the Committee of Trial in their finding, but also to depose Mr. Horner from the office of the ministry. With the deepest sorrow this step was taken; but the interests of truth and righteousness, as well the peace and prosperity of the Church, left no alternative.

We earnestly hope that the Official Boards and membership of the Church throughout the bounds of the Montreal Conference will see with us the necessity of this step, and will in the name of Him whose we are, and whom we serve, loyally stand by our action, when we feel assured that not only will quietness reign in the Church itself, but rich baptisms of divine power will be more abundant, the work of revival be accelerated, and the cause of righteousness and true holiness be promoted amongst us.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF STANSTEAD COLLEGE.

In presenting to the Conference the annual report of Stanstead Wesleyan College, the trustees gratefully acknowledge the continued blessing of the Lord on the Institution. Through the great efforts of Rev. A. Lee Holmes, M.A., the generosity of many friends, and the goodness of Almighty God, we are happy to state that the College is now, for the first time in its history, free from debt. The Conference may rest assured that every effort will be made by the trustees to prevent the creation of new debt.

The large building, so generously donated by Dr. and Mrs. Bugbee for a commercial college, has been removed to the college grounds, and is now being fitted up and will be ready for use at the opening of next session.

We acknowledge the ability and faithfulness of Principal Flanders, who, with Mrs. Flanders as Lady Principal and a most efficient staff of teachers, is carrying forward the work of the College with success.

PRINCIPAL FLANDERS' REPORT.

To the Trustees of Stanstead Wesleyan College :

DEAR BRETHREN,—The number of students who have registered with us during this year is 147. Young gentlemen and boys, 69 ; young ladies and girls, 78. Of this number 48 have been residential students, the average attendance being greater this year than last. The total number of students in attendance this year, however, is less than last year, owing probably to the financial stringency of the times, and possibly to the inability of the Principal through sickness during the summer vacation to canvass in the interests of the College.

The year has been marked by a total exemption from sickness and accidents, a fact which, added to that of the lusty health of our students, demonstrates the remarkable healthfulness of Stanstead, as well as the superior sanitary conditions of the college building.

We have had five students pursuing the Arts Course, all of whom passed at the recent examinations of McGill University.

For the approaching Government Examinations we are sending up the following candidates, the majority of whom will doubtless do themselves and the College credit : Third Grade, Academy, 5 ; Second, 18 ; First, 8. Second, Model, 9 ; First, Model, 12. Total, 50.

In addition to these we have prepared three candidates for the June matriculation of McGill College, and twelve applicants for the Teachers' Examination in July.

The total number of students in the Musical and Fine Art Department has been fifty-five. The growing popularity of our Musical Department is due, to a very great extent, to the ability and enterprise of Professor Arthur Dorey, to whose exceptional talent and attainments is united the refined character of the cultured Christian gentleman.

We regret to report a decrease in the attendance upon our Commercial Department. This is doubtless due in some degree to an effort which is being made to raise the standard of the Commercial Diploma of the College. Hitherto little or no attention has been paid to the previous training of the candidates, the diploma being granted simply on the merits of the work done in the prescribed course. As a consequence the diploma has not had that value in the minds of the business community desired by the management. It is, however, confidently expected that this Department in the new Bugbee Commercial Building, under the supervision of Mr. Malcolm MacCormick, the present well-known Principal of Guelph Commercial College, who has been engaged for this work, will quickly spring into more than its former prosperity.

It is a pleasure to speak in strong terms of commendation of the members of our staff, whose ability and devotion are for the most part worthy of all praise. In the few changes which are being made for next year, every effort is being made to secure the best talent available.

No report of the year's work would be complete were mention not made of the important improvements in the college grounds. Through the very commendable enterprise of the young men of the community, and at the outlay of a considerable amount of labor and money, the campus has been greatly beautified and rendered more pleasurable to the students by the addition of an athletic field, a cinder tennis court, a fountain, and many beautiful trees.

While acknowledging the goodness of God with gratitude, and recognizing the fact that no true success can come to any cause without His smile, special stress should be laid upon one important consideration, the prosperity of Stanstead College rests largely with the ministers of the Montreal Conference. With their co-operation, especially in bringing the claims of the Institution before their congregations, and with their prayerful sympathy, this College, projected by the wisdom and thus far sustained by the noble generosity of the Church, will surely become all that the most ardent might desire.

VISITORS' REPORT.

Having on December 13th, 1894, made an official visit to Stanstead Wesleyan College, at present under the principalship of C. R. Flanders, B.A., we are pleased to express our satisfaction with the general efficiency and healthful tone apparent throughout the working of the Institution.

Several important changes appear in the teaching staff of this year; among these a noteworthy one is the absence of the pupil teachers of former years, and the employment of only duly qualified teachers in all branches of the Model work. The increased expense thus resulting has its offset in the greater efficiency of the work done.

We were exceedingly pleased with the system and cheerful good order evident everywhere from the dining-room to the remotest class room. The college building itself is a large and roomy structure. In general the class rooms are well laid out and equipped. The dormitories deserve special notice, being well lighted, high and airy. The temperature throughout is well regulated by a combination system of both hot air and hot water.

The sanitary conditions appear to be good. No sickness is reported among the students this year.

The attendance so far this year has been about 140 in all departments, ranging from the primary up to second year Arts, including also students in music, painting, drawing, etc. A new feature of the Institution is a large and commodious gymnasium for the boys, lately fitted up and partially equipped. A large and beautiful building donated by a friend, and recently moved to within a few yards of the College, is now being fitted up for the Commercial Department of the college work.

Situated as it is in one of the most beautiful as well as healthful spots of our Dominion, this decidedly progressive institution, under its present able management, scholarly and energetic principal, efficient staff of professors and teachers and general equipment, should rapidly become one of the most popular and best patronized educational institutions of our country. Especially should the ministers of the Montreal Conference regard it a duty and a pleasure to keep constantly before their people the superior educational advantages (now greater than ever before) afforded to their children and young people, at a comparatively low cost, and in a healthful, moral and religious atmosphere.

After liquidating the long-standing debt of the College, the "College Debt Fund" has to its credit about \$1,700 in cash and \$500 in interest-bearing notes. The disposition made of this balance is as follows:

1. \$500 is credited to "College Endowment Fund," to recoup the latter for the loss of like amount on stock in the Bishop Engraving Co.
2. \$726 is credited to the "College Improvement Fund."
3. The balance of the "College Debt Fund" is to be invested.

There are two points to which we most urgently direct the attention of the ministers and laity of the Church. Firstly, that the College was never in as good a position to do thorough and efficient work, and therefore with great confidence they can commend it to the patronage of all their friends. If all will make it a point to do this, the attendance, we feel assured, will be greatly increased, and we are confident that the College will fully meet their most sanguine expressions of approval and commendation.

Secondly, we beg again to remind the ministers of the special reductions to the children of their homes which this College offers, and the ample provision to assist in preparing young men for entrance upon studies required by our Conference curricula for the work of the ministry.

A pleasant and timely word from our ministers especially will cost but little, and will wonderfully help this deserving Institution.

REPORT OF REV. A. LEE HOLMES.

To the President and Members of the Montreal Conference:

HONORED BRETHREN,—A year ago the debt on the College at Stanstead was nearly \$18,000. Four months before a plan had been approved by the Conference Special Committee for the early liquidation of this

debt, its essential conditions being that at least one-half should be raised locally, and that the entire amount should be pledged by July 1st, 1894. It was estimated that \$20,000 in pledges would be sufficient to extinguish the debt, thus providing a margin of 10 per cent. to cover shrinkage, interest and expenses of canvass and collection. Before Conference met about \$18,000 had been subscribed (including renewals of promises previously obtained by the Rev. J. T. Pitcher and others), and during the session additional pledges, aggregating \$2,100, were received from four Districts. Subscribers were at once notified that the conditions had been fulfilled, and notwithstanding the great financial stringency which has prevailed during the past year, payments have been made with gratifying promptness.

The financial results may be thus summarized :

- (1) The College debt has been liquidated at cost of about \$18,000.
- (2) Stanstead Circuit has contributed over \$11,000, or more than 60 per cent., and Stanstead District \$12,000, or more than two-thirds of the debt.
- (3) The shrinkage on the subscription list has been inconsiderable. Since July 1st, 1894, interest on deposits and subscriptions has more than met the interest on the debt. The expense of canvass and collection is less than 1 per cent. of amounts subscribed and paid, or less than 2 per cent. of the collections only.

(4) After liquidating the debt undertaken, there remains at the disposal of the Board of Trustees a surplus of about \$1,700 in cash, and \$500 in bills receivable, which are regarded as perfectly good, not to mention sundry small balances of indeterminate value.

I trust that these results may prove satisfactory to the Conference, to the Trustees of the College, and to all contributors to the College debt fund, and it is with profound thankfulness to God, with sincere gratitude

to all who have aided in this effort, and with fervent prayers for the enduring and enlarging success of Stanstead Wesleyan College that I submit this report, and request the Conference to relieve me of the responsibility imposed last year in respect to the College debt.

THE STATE OF THE WORK.

We are glad to note that after providing for all losses, we are able to report an increase of membership of over 300 during the past year.

We are of the opinion that our work could be very rapidly and more permanently established by a larger co-operation of ministers on the various districts in evangelistic work.

The Conference will be pleased to notice the increase in the circulation of the *Guardian*, that weekly Christian visitor and pastor's colleague. We urge the necessity of a personal canvass on the part of ministers, or duly appointed persons, to bring the circulation to a paying basis and secure the possibility of continuing the increase at the reduced rate.

Your Committee would bring to notice the embarrassing debts on churches reported in the last Minutes, and urge a more strict adherence to Discipline, as these debts tend to a depression in all the funds of the Church.

In order that a greater stability may attend our work your Committee respectfully urge the continuing of ministers on circuits the full limit of three years, and it is to be hoped that the further legislation respecting four and five year terms will not become a dead letter.

The organization of children into Catechumen classes is much neglected.

It is the opinion of the Committee that the Wesleyan idea of small classes with efficient leaders should not be supplanted by the larger open fellowship meetings.

We recommend the giving of more earnest attention to the distinctive and definite preaching of our doctrine of Christian perfection, and that an increased effort be made to lead our people into its experience.

We regret to note the decrease in missionary givings this year. The Disciplinary date for meetings and early collections, it is hoped, will result in more money and less interference with other matters. Let Women's Missionary Societies, Circles for the young people, Bands for the children, and Epworth leagues emphasizing the Missionary Society, be organized where possible.

The Educational work of the Church, we strongly recommend, should receive the special attention of ministers in arranging for public meetings and annual subscriptions.

We urge the visiting of Sunday Schools by the ministers according to Discipline (page 147, section 295), which provides for this "if necessary at the time of the regular preaching service."

It is a pleasing feature to notice the growing interest in the person, life and work of our Lord and Saviour as the highest standard of living. To aid in reaching this end we strongly recommend that a part at least of the morning consecration meeting of next Conference be devoted to Bible study and exposition, and methods of Bible study.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Introductorily your Committee would express its desire to reach Sabbath School workers as well as this Conference, and would accordingly request that this report be read in every Sabbath School throughout the Conference.

In accordance with this purpose your Committee would remind our people that the Sabbath School ought to mean the whole Church studying the Word. We deplore at the same time that the Sabbath School in some places is made a substitute for the church service, and we urge that even the youngest scholars should be required to attend the church at least once a day. We believe that it would be helpful to this end to devote a brief portion of one of the services especially to the young.

Your Committee would also remind parents that Sabbath School teachers are not foster-parents, and that the Sabbath School is no substitute for that home-teaching, continuous, tender, intimate, missing which the child misses the most precious element in his moral education.

In regard to methods your Committee would emphasize the imperative necessity of higher qualifications for the teacher's work; that teachers' meetings for the study of the lessons should be everywhere held, and that the chief business of the District Sabbath School conventions held at the Financial District meetings be the teaching of teachers how to teach. We also suggest the usefulness of one class studying the lesson a Sunday in advance so as to furnish supplies in case of absentees who have been unable or have neglected to provide substitutes.

Your Committee recommends that the devotional exercises be brief, in order that as much time may be reserved for the study of the lesson as is consistent with retaining the vivid interest of the classes. We conceive it, however, to be of great importance that these exercises be conducted with special regard to reverence, the kneeling attitude being observed wherever not impracticable, and likewise the pause after the benediction.

Your Committee would call attention to the abuse of lesson helps, and would urge that, outside of the Primary classes, nothing but the Bible be in the hands of teachers and scholars during the study of the lesson. Of the black-board and wall-pictures and charts your Committee believes it is impossible to make too large a use.

It is to be regretted that out of 32,854 scholars in this Conference only 3,101 are reported as learning the catechism. We would suggest that at least one question of the catechism be taught every Sunday and required of the school by the Superintendent on the following Sunday during the opening and closing exercises.

It is also to be regretted that only 9,226 out of the 32,854 scholars are reported to have signed the temperance pledge, and we would recommend that the triple pledge against intoxicants, tobacco, and profane or impure speech be circulated on at least one Sunday quarterly. In connection with this we would express our strong feelings on the inconsistency of any teacher being addicted to the wasteful and injurious tobacco habit.

A large number of schools are reported as open during only a part of the year. Your Committee believes that by earnest effort many, if not all, of these schools might be kept open throughout the year.

Your Committee finds also with regret that the Educational collection

has been taken up by but a small fraction of the schools. Unceasing effort, we feel, should be paid to training in systematic and proportionate giving from the earliest age. Two new suggestions your Committee would commend to consideration :

First, the *Home Department* of the Sabbath School, by which Bible study is greatly extended and parents are brought into closer sympathy with their children in the study of the lesson ;

Second, the advisability of drilling the schools little by little in the names, authors, arrangement, etc., of the books of the Bible as given so admirably in Dr. Hurlbut's Normal School lessons.

Finally your Committee would emphasize beyond everything the direct soul-saving work of the Sabbath School. We record, with thankfulness, 1,407 conversions during the year, yet we find but 7,874 out of 32,854 are members of the Church, and we would earnestly exhort our Sabbath School workers, by monthly evangelistic prayer-meetings and direct heart-talks in class and out of it, to seek incessantly as the crowning success of Sabbath School work the surrender of the young to Christ and their enrolment in the Church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report :

We rejoice in the continued growth of temperance sentiment throughout the bounds of the Conference, and we are convinced that the country is now ripe for Prohibition. We would strongly urge upon all Christian people the absolute necessity of voting for such political candidates only as are avowed opponents of the drink traffic.

While the question of legislative responsibility is before the courts, we would call the attention of our people to the necessity of keeping the public mind aroused to the importance of this question by the use of platform, pulpit and press.

We would urge upon the ministry the desirability of preaching at least once a year upon the subject of temperance. We would suggest the Sabbath before the Christmas holidays as an opportune time in which to bring this subject before the minds of our people.

We heartily concur in the resolution of the Waterloo District urging us to endorse and co-operate with the Women's Christian Temperance Union and other temperance organizations in their strenuous efforts to suppress the drink traffic.

Your Committee would urge the necessity of continued educational effort amongst the young of our Church by enrolling them in Bands of Hope, by submitting pledge cards, and other methods that will tend to create a healthy temperance sentiment amongst our young people.

We thoroughly endorse the action of the editor of our Sabbath School publications in giving so much prominence to the subject of temperance in *Onward* and *Pleasant Hours*.

We believe our Church recognizes more clearly than ever the necessity of severing their political ties, when these ties would, in any way, interfere with their duty to this great temperance reform.

We acknowledge the receipt of the greetings of the Dominion Alliance for the suppression of the liquor traffic, and express our warm appreciation of the good work accomplished through that agency. In compliance with the request of the Alliance we would nominate as our representatives to the Alliance Council: Revs. J. B. Saunders, M.D., and Wm. Timberlake, and Messrs. G. F. McKimm and C. B. Taggart.

In conclusion, your Committee would pray that the day may soon dawn on our fair land when the banner of temperance shall float over every Province.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

We, the members of the Epworth League Committee, beg leave to report that we recognize in the Epworth League movement the promise, guarantee and hope of Methodism's future. Developing, as it does, systematically, symmetrically and harmoniously the complete nature and talents of the youth of our Church, it cannot but produce the highest type of Christian men and women. Informing the mind in all church doctrine and enterprise, it must awake and develop the truest church loyalty.

We rejoice in the fact that 108 Senior Epworth Leagues have been reported within the bounds of our Conference. These have a membership of 5,014. Eighty-six of the Senior Leagues have taken the local name of Epworth League of Christian Endeavor. There are 12 other young people's societies reported. We have 33 Junior Leagues, with a membership of 1,452, making a total League membership of 6,466. This is an increase of 1,529. The total membership of all our young people's societies is 6,862. These societies have raised for local purposes, \$2,207; for the General Epworth League Board, \$29; for missions, \$543; for other purposes, \$1,584; grand total, \$4,219.

As a means towards further development of this branch of our work we would strongly recommend the carrying out of our General Conference regulations concerning Conference and District Conventions. This need not prevent our young people from mingling with other young people's societies in convention, as our Church has removed, so far as we are concerned, every legal barrier in the way of interdenominational fellowship.

We are hopeful that the General Epworth League Secretary will visit as many of our Conference District Conventions as possible, and we would remind our societies of the obligation of an annual offering to assist in defraying expenses incurred in our behalf by the General Epworth League Board. Societies which have not contributed should do so at the earliest convenience. We are especially hopeful with regard to what may be accomplished by the young people's societies in behalf of our connexional interests, and would remind them that the best use of missionary and other funds, not needed for local purposes, may be made through the constituted authorities of our Church.

We consider it almost impossible to overestimate the need and value of

our Junior League work. Recognizing in the child-life the greatest spiritual possibilities, and believing that the development of that life to the highest attainment depends very largely on the attitude of the Church toward the children, we recommend that very special attention be given to informing them spiritually, and to the matter of inspiring by example and precept the children committed to our care.

While we recognize that intellectual and social culture are complementary to spiritual development, and that the highest spiritual development cannot be reached in their absence, we are nevertheless convinced that they serve their purposes only when they are the handmaids of piety. We therefore recommend that spiritual development have in all our Leagues a first place.

We would strongly recommend the youth of our Church to make themselves familiar with the *Christian Guardian* and our other publications, believing that they will be adapted in an eminent degree to the needs of our societies. We therefore beg leave to suggest that, for the sake of utility and general satisfaction, there be expositions of the Epworth League Bible study topics, and of the Christian Endeavor prayer-meeting topics in the *Guardian* and *Onward*.

We recommend the reading of this report in all our young people's societies.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Inasmuch as the printed schedules provide columns which have not in the past been filled up, viz., those which call for return of salaries of General Conference Officers, Ministerial Professors in Colleges, etc., we recommend that a distinct instruction from this Conference, to have these columns properly filled, be printed in our Minutes, for the guidance of superintendents of circuits and secretaries of districts in future years.

Whereas, the incompleteness of returns from circuits shows an increasing neglect, on the part of superintendents of circuits and chairmen of districts, to comply with the provisions of the Discipline in relation to statistical returns; and inasmuch as the publication of incomplete statistics is both misleading and unfair, we therefore recommend the Conference to require that chairmen of districts shall insist upon complete returns being made at the district meetings, duly certified and audited according to the Discipline, and that in the event of incomplete returns the district secretaries shall be required to make their reports from the schedules as audited and certified, making no alteration or addition.

Received on trial during the year, 3,539. Present membership, 37,940, being an increase of 372.

The returns for the Missionary Society are incomplete. According to present returns there is a decrease of \$3,169, a falling-off which is very much to be deplored.

There is also a decrease of \$542 in contributions towards the Woman's Missionary Society.

The Educational Fund shows an increase of \$33.

The rite of baptism has been administered to 2,584 children and 279

adults; marriages solemnized during the year, 985; burials attended, 1,490; copies of the *Guardian* taken, 3,364.

WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church :

The undersigned respectfully submit the following brief report of the last year's work and of the present position of the Institution.

Number of students in Arts, McGill University, full course, 6 (others as Partial Students take more or less work in the University); in Divinity leading to the Licentiate's Degree, 21; for the degree of B.D., 21; for the Conference Course, 20. Total enrolled, 68.

As to the *personnel* of the staff, Rev. W. I. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., has succeeded to the position of Principal, and lectures in Systematic Theology, Greek Testament and Church Polity. Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A. (Edin), D.D., lectures in Apologetics, Hebrew and Homiletics; Rev. Professor Richardson, B.A., B.D., Registrar, in Greek and Latin, and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, will lecture in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., is still pursuing a post-graduate course in Semitic Literature, in Heidelberg, Germany.

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Conference Preliminary requirements either by matriculation, the equivalent of matriculation, or the special course for non-matriculants, also to give them lectures in the new course for probationers or the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in Divinity leading to the degree of B.D.

The Endowment Fund is now \$70,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$3,000. The Boarding Department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000.

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the Institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee on Church Property beg leave to recommend as follows :

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

First French Methodist Church, Montreal.—That permission be granted the Trustees to sell at such time as the General Missionary Board may determine, the proceeds to be handed over to the said Missionary Board.

New Glasgow.—That permission be given to the Trustees to sell the church property at New Glasgow and to apply the proceeds to church in Mascouche.

Rawdon.—That permission be given the Trustees to sell the parsonage at Rawdon and to apply the proceeds to the purchase of another parsonage in the village.

KINGSTON DISTRICT.

Pittsburg.—That the request of the Trustees of Zion Church, Pittsburg Circuit, to transfer the parsonage property to a separate Board of Trustees, be granted.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

Wall Street, Brockville.—That the request of the Trustees of certain lots in Brockville, in connection with Wall Street Church, to sell lot 59 in block 45 and lot 18 in block 43, in Town of Brockville, according to compiled plan of said Town Register, and to apply the proceeds to pay for improvements on the Park Street Church, and balance, if any, to Wall Street Building Fund, be granted.

NIPISSING DISTRICT.

Lake Talon Mission.—That permission be granted the Trustees of Church's Church to sell said property and apply proceeds towards the erection of a more central one at Rutherglen.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

Lansdowne.—That the request of the Trustees of the parsonage at Lansdowne, to sell said property and apply proceeds to the erection of a new and better parsonage, be granted.

STANSTEAD DISTRICT.

Mansonville.—That the request of the Trustees of the Church of Mansonville, to sell a roadway twelve feet wide across north side of the church lot, proceeds to be applied on church debt, be granted.

WATERLOO DISTRICT.

Pigeon Hill.—That the request of the Trustees of the Methodist Church at Pigeon Hill, to sell the said church and to invest \$100 of proceeds for benefit of the burial ground owned by the Methodist Church at Pigeon Hill, and \$35 to be given for benefit of the Methodist parsonage at Bedford, be granted.

Farnham.—Your Committee recommend that in the case of the Farnham church property indebtedness, the Conference commend the same to the favorable consideration of our people throughout this Conference for subscriptions towards the liquidation of said debt.

In reporting the work of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Montreal Conference Branch, we would express our gratitude to God for His goodness during the year, also to the brethren who have aided us in the formation of Auxiliaries on their circuits. Our aim is to have a Woman's Missionary Society wherever the Word of God is preached, so that we may not only co-operate with Christ in the bringing in of His kingdom, but that through this work we may be developed and enriched intellectually, and spiritually prepared for every good work. We have a membership of 1,944, an increase over the previous year of 118; the receipts for the year being \$5,564.44, an increase of \$849.27. The total received from all the Conference Branches during the year is \$39,808.33, and total since organization in 1881, \$259,118.29.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

Having considered two memorials from the Matilda District, we recommend :

1. That on each Circuit and Mission within the bounds of this Conference in Ontario, a register be kept by the minister in charge for the registration of baptisms, marriages and burials, such register to be furnished by the Circuit or Mission.

2. That in so far as practicable we carry out the policy recommended by the General Conference of 1894, regarding the rearrangement of our domestic mission fields where two or more evangelical denominations are laboring, sustained largely by Mission Funds.

Having considered the memorial from the Nipissing District, we recommend :

That in view of the great advantages offered to settlers on the Free Grant Lands of Eastern Nipissing and Temiscamingue, the Superintendent of the Mattawa Mission be authorized to act as a colonization agent, to give all necessary information to intending settlers and otherwise assist in the settlement of these lands.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE FRENCH WORK.

To the President and Members of the Montreal Conference :

Your Committee beg to submit the following report on the work assigned them :

A brief synopsis of expenditure made and results attained, so far as tabulated figures can express them, will naturally be expected.

The amount expended on the Educational Department by our General Society last year was \$3,106.79 ; the Evangelistic, including \$600 for colportage, \$4,753.65 ; making a total of \$7,860.44. There were 79 pupils in attendance at the French Institute. The Society employs 7 missionaries and 2 colporteurs. There are 283 members, being an increase of 23 over last year.

The usual emigration resulting from persecution and other causes still continues, and renders large numerical returns an impossibility. Other churches are enriched in many instances by our impoverishment.

A memorial was presented by the Montreal District Meeting. This was based on the report of a committee appointed by the Financial District Meeting.

With reference to the uniting of the Central and West End French Missions, your Committee recommend that the prayer of the memorial be not granted.

Your Committee recommend the Conference to appoint a small commission to examine fully into the French work and report to the next Conference.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE SUPERANNUATION FUND OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Your Treasurer is pleased to submit the following report for the Conference year ending May 30th, 1895 :

The Circuits and Missions of the Conference were taxed \$10,680. Of this amount \$741.95 was paid previous to the meeting of Conference, and \$9,938.15 during the sessions of Conference, making a total of \$10,680.10. This leaves a balance of ten cents in favor of the Conference. Two hundred and thirty-five ministers and probationers paid \$772 previous to Conference, and \$2,482 during the sessions of Conference, making a total of \$3,254, personal subscriptions. The total paid by Circuits for the year is \$10,680.10 ; the total of \$3,254 paid by ministers and probationers added to this makes \$13,934.10, the grand total paid by the Conference to the Fund this year. This is \$747.16 more than any previous year. Your Treasurer is pleased to say that so far as he is aware the Conference stands clear, both as to Circuits and ministers.

The younger brethren and some of the older should please remember that the half of their personal subscriptions should be paid at the Financial District Meeting, and that the Financial Secretary is the proper channel through which to remit to the Conference Treasurer. By remitting through the proper channels convenience and accuracy are likely to be secured.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee beg leave to say that there is very great cause for alarm on the part of the Christian Church at the growing tendency in many places to lay aside the restraints and sanctions of the Sabbath, and make the day a season of social visitations and personal self-indulgences. The evils are so many and of such an insinuating character, that your Committee feel compelled to urge the Conference to give very special attention to the matter during the present session. There is no subject demanding more serious attention and action at this time than this.

Your Committee desire therefore to make the following recommendations :

1. That the Conference publish a strong and emphatic protest against

all unnecessary labor upon the Lord's Day, and against the opening of any place of amusement on that day; also, declare that these things are a violation of the law of God.

2. That the Conference enjoin all pastors within its bounds to emphasize the duty of parents in promoting the proper observance of the Lord's Day in their households, and by the members of their families elsewhere, and to preach a sermon on the subject at their earliest convenience after Conference.

3. That we particularly enjoin upon the members of our Church to see that they do nothing by example to increase the frightful desecration of the Lord's Day, and that they remember this when camping, or at the seaside, as at other times.

4. That we commend all legislation which is designed to protect the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and of worship, and that we pledge ourselves to use all proper means to secure such further legislation as will make it illegal to operate cheese factories, boat liveries and livery stables, and to conduct Sunday excursions by rail or boat, to participate in fishing, boating, bicycling or hunting, to ride in public conveyances, such as hacks, buggies, or sleighs for purposes of pleasure on the Sabbath, or to patronize Sunday street cars.

5. That the pastors of churches use their influence against funerals and parades on the Sabbath day.

6. That the Districts within the Conference at the Fall and Spring meetings give special attention to the subject of Sabbath observance, and where possible, arrange for the organization of branches of the Lord's Day Alliance in affiliation with the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance of Toronto.

Resolved,—That this Conference, in harmony with paragraph 181, page 101. Book of Discipline, provides as follows :

1. That a central committee be appointed by the Conference, on nomination of the President, to prepare a uniform method of examining evangelists who seek work within the bounds of our Conference, especially as touching three matters—character, doctrine, and methods of work—the first and second to be similar to the requirements for the standing of a Local Preacher, and the third to be determined by the report of the committee on evangelistic work presented to this Conference. The Chairman and Financial Secretary are authorized to give effect to the provisions of the central committee for their respective Districts, and report each case that comes before them to the central committee for their final action in accrediting such evangelists.

2. That evangelists licensed by the committee be required to communicate with this committee for a renewal of their licenses within one month prior to the expiration of the year, dating from the granting of the license, thus harmonizing this method with the Discipline relating to the ministers and local preachers in our Church.

3. That no evangelist of the Methodist Church shall conduct evangelistic services on any circuit or mission in the Montreal Conference without an invitation or the expressed concurrence of the superintendent of such charge ; and we desire in the clearest way to affirm our conviction that all evangelists in our Church must be subject to the authorities of the Church and conform to our usual customs.

The central committee for the current year is : Revs. W. H. Emsley, S. P. Rose, D.D., and A. M. Phillips, B.D.

BILLETING ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1896.

Resolved,—That each member of Conference, ministerial and lay, be required to pay a billeting fee of \$2.00 as heretofore.

Resolved,—That it shall be the duty of the Financial Secretaries to collect the billeting fee from delegates who attend the Annual Conference from their respective Districts, and pay the same over to the Secretary of the Billeting Committee, and that each minister purposing attendance shall notify the said Secretary not later than three weeks before the meeting of Stationing Committee.

PRAYER FOR BRO. A. E. PATES.

The ex-President, Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., called the attention of the Conference to the critical condition of Bro. A. E. Pates, one of our probationers, who is lying ill in the town, and requested prayers for his recovery. The Rev. Dr. Shaw led the Conference in prayer.

Bell, That the members of the Montreal Conference, ministerial and lay, assembled at Smith's Falls, desire to place upon record their earnest disapproval of any interference on the part of the Dominion Government, by remedial legislation or otherwise, in the Manitoba school laws as embodied in the Act of 1890 and subsequent legislation.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

DISTRICT JOURNALS, ETC., TO BE DEPOSITED IN LIBRARY OF WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

It was *Resolved*,—That the following resolution, passed at a former Conference session, be retained in the printed Minutes as a standing resolution: "That the Librarian of the Wesleyan Theological College be requested to take the custody of completed District Journals and other Church documents of valuable historical interest, to be deposited in the Library of said institution, and to be accessible at all times to members of this Conference.

MINISTERS CHANGING CIRCUITS.

It was on motion, *Resolved*,—That ministers changing circuits be responsible for the supply of circuits they are leaving for two Sundays after the rising of Conference.

Re DEGREES.

In relation to the recognition of Academic Titles, the Board of Examiners recommends:

1. That all degrees from Canadian universities and theological colleges be recognized in the Conference records.
2. That continued recognition be given to all degrees recognized in the Minutes of 1891.
3. That in the case of foreign degrees, on the same being reported to the Board of Examiners, recognition shall be given by not less than a two-thirds vote of the Examiners present at the Annual Meeting. Action may be delayed by the Board calling for further information, or for production of the calendars of the colleges concerned, or of the diplomas, and the Board shall have discretionary power to deal with each case on its merits.
4. Diplomas shall in no case be recognized from so-called "Correspondence Colleges," which have no provision for lectures and for instruction of resident students.

CONFERENCE ANNIVERSARIES, ETC.

EDUCATIONAL MEETING.

The Conference Educational Meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Smith's Falls, on Wednesday, May 29th, beginning at 8 p.m.

The Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., President of the Conference, occupied the chair.

Hymn 97 was sung, and Rev. Dr. Hunter led in prayer.

A few introductory remarks were made by the President, and the Rev. Dr. Shaw gave a financial statement of the Wesleyan Theological College, read the report and explained the disbursements of the Educational Fund.

A brilliant address was then delivered by Rev. S. G. Bland, B.A.

The Rev. F. H. Wallace, D.D., followed with an address, both interesting and practical.

While the choir sang "O come, let us Worship," the collection was taken up.

The meeting closed with doxology and benediction.

MISSIONARY.

The Conference Missionary Anniversary was held in the Methodist Church, Smith's Falls, Ont., on Thursday evening, May 30th, beginning at 8 o'clock.

Rev. John Armstrong, President, in the chair. The 111th hymn was sung, and Rev. Dr. Benson offered prayer.

The Rev. F. G. Lett, Secretary of Conference, delivered an address.

The old missionary hymn, "From Greenland's Icy Mountains," was sung, when Mr. G. F. Johnston addressed the audience, earnestly and eloquently, on the social aspect of missions.

After singing Hymn 743, the Rev. F. A. Cassidy, B.A., of Japan, gave a most interesting account of the work in Japan, emphasizing the necessity of training native missionaries, and pointing out the difficulties connected therewith.

After a few introductory remarks by the chairman, Rev. George Stafford delivered a forcible address. Rev. G. H. Porter, M.A., B.D., was then introduced, and also gave a very able address. Mr. J. Ritchie Bell sang a solo.

Rev. A. C. Crews, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, was introduced, and addressed the meeting mainly in the interest of the work among the young people of our Church.

The meeting closed with Hymn 460 and the benediction.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The Sunday School and Epworth League Anniversary was opened on Monday evening, June 3rd, at 8 o'clock, Rev. Dr. Shaw presiding.

Hymn 782 was sung, and Rev. L. M. England, B.A., led in prayer.

After a few introductory remarks by the Chairman, Rev. Isaac Hall delivered an eloquent address.

A solo was sung by Mrs. Dulmage.

The Chairman then introduced Rev. W. Howitt, B.A., B.D., who delivered a very practical address.

Brief addresses were then delivered by Rev. G. S. Clendennin, S.T.L., A. M. Phillips, B.D., and J. Ritchie Bell, who also sang a solo, "Best of All."

The meeting was closed by singing part of Hymn 741, the benediction being pronounced by Rev. R. Whiting.

JUBILEE SERMON OF REV. R. WHITING.

The service was opened at 3 p.m., Friday, May 31st, by the Rev. Geo. McRitchie announcing Hymn 92 and leading in prayer.

Hymn 91 was then sung.

The venerable Rev. Richard Whiting, basing his remarks on Deut. viii. 2, gave a most interesting, instructive and inspiring account of his life. The power of the Holy Spirit was manifestly present while he told of his early conversion and entrance upon the work of the Church as a local preacher in England, and afterward in the work of the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada. At the close a member of the Conference started to sing "In the Sweet By-and-by," in which the audience most heartily joined.

CORRESPONDENCE.

Communications were read from the Prisoners' Aid Association; F. S. Spence, Secretary of Dominion Alliance; and from Ontario Ladies' College.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

The Memorial Service was held on Saturday, June 1st.

The question, "What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?" was asked. The various districts being called, it was reported that Rev. Wm. Hall, M.A., Rev. W. H. Graham, and Rev. Henry Shaler had passed away.

Hymn 641 was sung, and the Rev. Silas Huntington and Rev. R. Whiting led in prayer.

Obituary notices were read and approved, and tributes of esteem and respect were offered to the memory of the departed by several of the brethren.

VISITORS.

Rev. Mr. Boon, of Smith's Falls Baptist Church; Rev. Dr. Crombie and Rev. Mr. Nixon, of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Smith's Falls; Rev. Mr. Cook, of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Smith's Falls.

CLOSING OF CONFERENCE.

The Minutes were read and confirmed, and at 3.40 o'clock p.m., on the 5th day of June, 1895, the Conference Sessions closed by the singing of Hymn 419, Rev. Dr. Jackson leading in prayer and the President pronouncing the benediction.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

BRETHREN BELOVED IN THE LORD,—Assembled in our twelfth Conference in the pleasant and hospitable town of Smith's Falls, we extend to you our cordial greetings. "Grace be to you and peace from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, who gave himself for our sins that he might deliver us from this present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father." "God is our record how greatly we longed after you in the tender mercies of Jesus Christ, and this we pray that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all wisdom, to the end he may establish your hearts unblamable in holiness before God, even our Father, and that ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness which are by Jesus Christ unto the glory and praise of God." "The Lord God of your fathers make you a thousand times so many more as ye are, and bless you, as he hath promised you. He is faithful who hath promised. The Lord thy God hath been with thee. Thou hast lacked no good thing."

You will rejoice with us that, after the heavy losses of the year, by death and removals, we are able to report an increase of 372 in the membership of our Church. This represents a large number received on profession of faith during the year. The present total membership in the Montreal Conference is 37,940. This does not include the large number of children in training in our Catechumen classes. Let us ever bear in mind that the Sabbath School is an important part of the trust of the Church, and should be maintained in thorough efficiency. We are pleased to find that there is encouraging growth in all departments of our Sabbath School work. We should aim more and more at immediate spiritual results among our children and young people. The need of godly, cultured Sabbath School teachers is much felt. We would ask that more be done in the way of normal-class training for our teachers. The future of our Church under the Holy Spirit depends largely upon the character of our Sabbath School work. We must still remember that the Sabbath School is not to take the place of the home. The home life and influence are of first importance. There is a dangerous tendency to neglect home training. Many parents are depending upon the Sabbath School for the moral and religious training of their children. This is not the divine plan, and is injurious to home life. The home is the first form of the Church, and has a most important influence upon the children, the Church and the nation. We would earnestly exhort you to maintain cheerfulness, purity and piety in home life. "Provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." We are alive to the importance of the various organizations of young people within the Church, and would seek to encourage the spirit of loyalty and devotion so generally manifested. We would exhort all our people to be increasingly careful to maintain the

sanctity of the Christian Sabbath. We deprecate Sunday excursions and parades. May we also hope that, as far as possible, Sunday funerals will be avoided, so that the Sabbath School and regular preaching of the Word may not be interrupted. We have marked with sorrow the tendency to arrange for large society funerals on the Lord's Day, leading to the running of boats and special trains, causing much confusion and seriously interfering with the work of the Church. Notwithstanding the dulness of trade, and the low market during the past year for the products of our rural districts, we are thankful to note the increasing liberality of our people, as shown in the erection of beautiful and commodious houses of worship, and in the reduction of debts upon our connexional property, as well as in sustaining our various connexional funds.

We would call your attention to the advantages and needs of our educational institutions. Victoria University, in its new home, is keeping up its old reputation for the thoroughness of its work and its healthy religious influence. The Wesleyan Theological College continues its important work as a "school of the prophets." We bespeak for it a larger endowment, that it may still more adequately provide for the needs of our rising ministry. The Stanstead Wesleyan College has had a prosperous year. The debt amounting to \$18,000 has been paid during the past year. The endowment of \$18,000 and the increased patronage place the College on a basis that, with Heaven's benediction, will ensure a still higher degree of efficiency and success.

Again, we would direct your attention to our Book and Publishing House in the city of Toronto, and to the Montreal branch within the bounds of this Conference. In providing literature for the Church and Sabbath School, as well as for your home reading, you cannot do better than to loyally sustain our own publishing interests.

We especially call your attention to the *Christian Guardian*, which, at the low price of \$1 per year, should at once reach a circulation of at least forty thousand. See to it that this superior paper is found in the homes of all our people. The *Christian Guardian* will wonderfully aid pastors and people in building up Christian character.

We were glad to notice that at the meeting of our General Conference, held during the year, but few important changes affecting our Church Polity were found to be necessary.

The connexional principle in Methodism is of great importance. We will do well to guard it with thoughtful care.

Some of our brethren in the ministry have fallen during the year. We miss their presence in our annual gathering. It is still true that "God buries His workmen, but carries on His work." And now, brethren, "as workers together with him, we beseech you that ye receive not the grace of God in vain." "Let all your things be done with charity. "Walk in love as Christ also hath loved us. Abstain from all appearance of evil. And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly: and we pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."
