London, Nov. 22—The rumors of last week that the Entente Allies had determined to compel Greece to repudiate all hints that she might interfere with the passage of allied troops across her territory have been substantiated by the inauguration of a pacific blockade. This message is expected to elicit an immediate declaration from the Greek government, defining its intentions clearly without further hesitation and ambiguity.

Some despatches from Athens go so far as to say this already has been attained as a result of Earl Kitchener's conference with King Constantine, and that the earl received assurances of a satisfactory nature. The British government, however, has not yet intimated that Greece has complied to the demands of the allies.



The official casualty list, of 9 o'clock last night, verifies the unofficial report received here on Saturday that Major John Allen MacKenie has been wounded. The list also contains the name of Walter Manning, Newton (N. B.), 26th battalion, wounded. The first appearance of the 55th battalion among the casualties announces that Ovid Lutz, Westmorland county, is seriously ill.

Sergt. James A. MacDonald, Glace Bay (N. S.), is reported killed in action with the 1st battalion. John Cann, Sydney Mines (N. S.), is reported to have died of wounds. He was rescued when the hospital ship Anglia went to the bottom, but has succumbed at Shorncliffe.

Conspicuous names in the list are: Lieut. G. G. Greenshields, Montreal, wounded with 24th; and Captain John L. Higginson, Loughead (Alta.), killed in action with the 15th battalion.

The midnight list has the name of Arthur Thompson, Truro (N. S.), wounded with the 25th Battalion.

In the 26th, G. E. Pinney, of East St. John, is reported wounded, Gordon Pinney is 22 years of age, a very popular young man about East St. John and the city, and his friends will hope that his wounds will not prove serious.

The Bulgarians, it is true, are being held up by unfavorable weather conditions, but they must be almost at the gates of the Macedonian capital by this time; while the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians are slowly but surely pressing back the northern army.

The Germans announce today the capture of Novipasar, and are therefore on the direct road to Mitrovitta, which has been the Serbian capital since Nish fold into the hands of the Bulgarians.

Other armies are pressing in from the north, the northwest the northeast and the east, and even the Montengrins, who held their positions for so long, are being forced back.

Of the French and British troops in the south no news was received. According to German reports, an effort will be made by the French and British to save the Serbians armies by sending troops through Montenegro and Albania, but, with poer roads, it will take a long time for them to reach the battlefield.





THE WAR NEWS.

The situation in Greece overshadows all else in the news from the seat of war. King Constantine has been brought to book. He must choose the course he will pursue without delay. The Allies have already watied a long time and the moment of decision has come. Behind the ultimatum stands the Allied fleet, and the blockade of Greek ports. It appears evident from today's cables that the Greek people are in sympathy with the Allies, and that the King is the stumbling block. The visit of Lord Kitchener has brought the matter to the point where an answer must be given. The purpose of his departure from London is now at least partially revealed. He will get an answer from King Constantine, and perhaps within the next forty-eight hours we shall find Greece giving more substantial aid to the Allies. The tensor of the despatches today is more hopeful, but the situation is still full of anxiety. An interesting statement made by Ex-Premier Vehizelos of Greece, on Nov. 8, is featured by the London press. He said:—





Recognized bond and stock brokers will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per tent on allotments made in respect of applications which bear their stamp.




