DEAR MISS DIX-Is there a law in this country prohibiting the mar-riage of a man to the sister of his deceased wife? LONESOME WIDOWER.

ANSWER: There is no law in this country against a man's marrying his deceased wife's sister, and I am under the impression that even in England the ban has been lifted against it. So far from there being any objection to a man marrying his dead wife's sister, or a widow marrying her brother-in-law, there is every reason why such marriages should be encouraged, and why it should bring greater happiness to the individuals concerned than if they married strangers.

The thing that imperils the marriage of every widow and widower who have children is the stepmother or stepfather complication. For it seems to require more nobility of soul than the average woman and man possess not to be jealous and revengeful toward the children that belong to their husbands' and wives' previous marriages, and to whom their hus-bands and wives give a father's and a mother's love. This is especially true of a woman who always wants to monopolize the man she loves, and who wants her husband to give all of his paternal affection and money to her children, and who feels defrauded of anything he does for his first wife's children.
