

National Dictator May be Given Greater Powers, is Report.

(British United Press.) Berlin, Nov. 24 .- The German ship of state wallowed rudderless in a stormy political sea today as President Ebert resumed his deliberations with party leaders in the hope that some how he will be able to find a workable combination for support of a cabinet.

The expected coup d'etat last night, following resignation of the government of Chancellor that the new cabinet head would be announced before Monday and that the government would be entrusted to a right wing

Candidates for the Chancellorship included Dr. Johannes Von Hieber, State President of Wurtemberg, Democratic Party, and Dr. Heinrich Albert, remembered for exploits in the United States, where he was attached to the German embassy during the early years of the war.

It was anticipated that General Von Seeckt would retain his post as national dictator, possibly with stronger powers. Stresemann's resignation late yesterday came after he had failed to obtain support for his coalition cabinet in support for his coalition cabinet in the face of strong attacks, principally

by Socialists. The Chancellor demanded a "show down" on his policies, and a vote of misconfidence followed, 280 to 155. BOMB EXPLOSIONS

Two Terrific Blasts Rattle Many Buildings in Downtown District of Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Nov. 24—Two terrifosomb explosions in foreign consulates in the down-town district early today injured a score of people, damaged many houses and threw the southern section of the city into wild excitement. No one was seriously hurt, so far as the police could learn. The first explosion occurred at the Spanish consulate on Pine street, about 1 a. m., and the second at the Sons of Italy Bank, Broad and Tasker streets, an hour later. The Italian consulate is located in the bank building and the bomb was placed on the door leading to the consulate's offices.

Both blasts shattered windows and shook houses within a wide range. The force of the explosion at the Spanish consulate was so great that many persons were hurled from their beds, some being cut and bruised by flying glass. The bomb, concealed in a wooden box, was found on the doorstep by Emilio De Motta, the consul, when he returned from the theatre. He placed it inside the hallway, but after retiring, he told the police, he had concluded that a passerby had left the bomb on the doorstep temporarily and might return for it. Without a thought of the deadly bomb concealed within a box, he got out of bed and replaced the box on the doorstep. PLANS FOR ORPHANAGE FUND

hew building for the New Brunswick Protestant orphanage is being launched with much enthusiasm throughout all sections of the province at the present time and it is a significant fact that never has there been any campaign undertaken when there has been a more willing response of workers. It is estimated that only a little over \$1 is required from every Protestant in the community to bring in the complete total.



He admitted that he had been a member of the party of Russian noblemen who late in December 1916 slew Gregory Rasputin, Monk confessor of the late Czarina. He would relate no details of the killing beyond saying that Rasputin was lured to the Youssoupoff palace in Petrograd, slain and his body consigned to the icy waters of the Neva River.

S. to sell some ancient snuff boxes and visit some friends and that he might attempt to regain two Rembrandt paintings given Joseph Widener, Philadelphia, as collateral for a loan. The prince was accompanied by his wife the Princess Irene, a sister of the late Czar Nicholas.



Winkler Declares He was Trying Suicide and His Wife Interfered.

New York, Nov. 24.—While the coal barge, T. J. New York—Hendrik Van Loon's "The Story of the Bible" within a few weeks probably will be the most discussed book in America.

Indeed, Van Loon says his book is "a strange piece of work" and that he is "afraid of it."

"I have patiently read all of the 'modern Bibles," he says, "and the almost endless 'children's Bibles' of the last 30 years and none satisfied me for my own needs or for those of my sons."

Thus Van Loon sits down to write the story of the Bible as he has mem-orized it from many readings. He ad-dresses it "Dear Boys," and then pro-ceeds to tell the story as a patient parent would, seeking familiar words and phrases to bring the children into an intimate touch with Biblical char-acters.

WOMEN DOUBLE

City Voters.

The extension of the franchise to women by the Provincial Government has practically doubled the work of the revisors of the city of St. John and added about 100 p. c. to the number of those who are entitled to cast a vote for the local representatives at Fredericton. The new assessment law has also been responsible for the addition of a large number of ladies to the list of ratepayers in the city, as under it the women have to pay on income and receive only the same exemption as men. This exemption is \$400 on incomes from \$1,200 to \$1,500.

In 1918, the last year in which the old assessment act applied, the number of female ratepayers was 1,566, and this year the number has increased to \$,520, an increase of about 60 per cent. due to the operation of the new act.


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
