Mr. Murray (Kings) inquired, as to the mode of procedure to be followed with respect to the McQueen report. Hon. Mr. Speaker replied by quoting the rules of the house to show that an honorable member, when accused of a wrongful act had the right to make a statement, and he would then be ex-pected to retire while the house took ac-tion upon the matter. Murray began his speech by condemning Commissioner McQueen and describing his report as bitter, par-tizan, and unjust, and casting reflections on his (Murray's) character, not justified by the facts. He charged that the object of the investigation was political. He said that Mr. McQueen was removed from office as police magistrate of Shediac by the Hazen government in 1908, and had written a letter to the Moncton Tran-script in which he expressed his intention of getting even with the local Conserva-tive party. Mr. Murray referred to his own public career saying that in all his iffe he had never had one dollar of public money to which he was not entitled. While not wishing to parade his patriot-ism or sacrifices over the country he wished to say that his only boy for the last three and one-half years had been charged in the defence of the empire, and he wished that boy to find on his return that his father's character was unsulid as it was before he went to war. Mr. Murray sketched the history of

After the house had adjourned Hon. Mr. Murray, leader if the opposition, said to the Telegraph's staff correspondent hat he did not care to make any statement about the attitude f the members censured.

When asked if they would be in their seats in the house tomorrow afternoon, he said: "Yes, of course we will."

When the house met this afternoon, after routine business had been dis-posed of, Premier Foster took up the matter of Commissioner Friel's report and moved that, in view of the serious illness of Hon. William Currie, which pre-vented his attendance in the house, and in view of Rule 22, which required that a member should be given an opportunity to make a statement when charges were made against him, that it would be unfair and inexpedient to deal with the Friel report at present.

The house then proceeded to consideration of the McQueen report dealing with the connection of Messrs. Murray (Kings), Baxter, Jones and Smith (Carleton), with the patriotic potato transaction. The report was taken as read, and after the leader of the opposition had asked for information regarding procedure, and the Speaker had read Rule 22, Mr. Murray arose to present his statement in his own defence. Practically every member of the house was in his place and the galleries were filled when the opposition leader took the floor.

instead of the usual opposition applause, he was greeted with a deathly nce. With very evident nervousness he proceeded to read a carefully prepared address. The others followed.

The defences having been entered, it was then the duty of the members named to retire, but Premier Foster with thoughtful courtesy spared them this humiliation, asking the speaker to declare the recess until 8 o'clock.

When the house resumed in the evening, Premier Foster took the floor. In a perfectly fair manner, without any attempt to make political capital out of the situation, he reviewed the transactions from start to finish. It was an impartial statement of facts, but the facts as he marshalled them were more ciless than mere arguments could have been. He stripped the opposition embers of their defences as he laid bare the sordid story of incompetence, irregarities, concealment and corruption. When he had finished the evasions of the embers named in the report stood out in glaring clearness and their attempts justify their conduct held up to public gaze in their true light. He conded with a reference marked by deep appreciation of the responsibility of his sition to the widespread desire of the citizens of the province that these men ho had been faithless to their trust should be retired to private life. Not beared a resolution in accordance with his views of what the house could and hould do.

The premier then moved a resolution reciting the chief features of the comnissioner's findings, expressing the censure of the house and stating that the nembers mentioned should resign their seats in the legislature. In doing so he aid he was discharging a painful duty, and if he had known that his entry into public life would have led to this he would have hesitated before taking that step which led him to take action against gentlemen, two of whom at least had been his personal friends.

Hon. Mr. Byrne, who seconded the resolution, said it was a disagreeable duty which devolved upon the members, but it was a responsibility which could not be evaded. The members must decide whether the conduct of the gentlemen named in the report was reprehensible, and if so they must deal accordingly with men who had by their actions tended to lower the standards of public life. He reviewed the findings of the commissioner and compared with them the statements presented in defence and in a keenly logical manner showed the weakness of the latter.

Dr. Campbell, of St. John, then announced that he had an amendment to present but wished time to prepare it, and asked for a recess which was promptly granted. Dr. Campbell and some other opposition members then retired to the opposition committee room where the members named in the report were awaiting them.

When he returned to the house, Dr. Campbell moved in amendment to the esolution that the house records its regret that greater care had not been taken in the purchase of potatoes and deprecates the effort made to suppress the acts surrounding the matter instead of making a full and candid statement. Sorting of Stock. It was desirous to send a cargo that would not only stand up and arrive in good condition, but also a cargo that would be in every way creditable to the province. A standard of size and form was set for the inspector. All rough, mishapen potatoes or stock that was not of a good bright color was sorted out. The stock which showed signs of decay was taken out and held for the account of the shipper and was deducted from their invoices. Stock that was not up to the standard in size, shape and color was held for account of the government. Much of this stock was sound and ac-counts for a fair percentage of surplus. held for account of the government. Much of this stock was sound and ac-counts for a fair percentage of surplus. I have referred to the fact that it has been stated that I was constantly in-formed of the details of this transaction from day to day. Let me say, however, Mr. Speaker, that I knew nothing of an unusual surplus of potatoes until after the Belgium shipment was made. I was told by the officials of my department and by our agents at St. John that when the Belgium shipment was completed we would be practically cleaned up of all the stock we had bought. This, I be-lieve to have been an error on their part, but nevertheless it came as a great sur-prise to me to find that after the Bel-guim shipment was made, we had an enormous quantity on hand, which has been shown. Everybody knows, who knows anything of handling potatoes, that it would be impossible to prepare a cargo such as this and buy only the exact number of barrels required. It was absolutely necessary to overbuy and to have a surplus on hand. What Mr. Dag-gett states is that by an unfortunate mis-understanding with some shippers a number of cars more than were required nderstanding with some shippers a umber of cars more than were required

Came in. After the cargo was complete the ques-tion was, what would we do with the surplus. After seeking the advice of buyers all over the province we found that they were practically unanimous in their opinion that the market, which was very much depressed, would rally and by the new year the surplus could easily be disposed of. It was also reported that there was a good demand for pota-toes in Great Britain, and as the secre-tary for agriculture was to accompany the cargo, he was instructed to endeavor to sell as many potatoes as possible in the Old Land, not only to dispose of the surplus we had on hand but to re-lieve conditions then prevailing in the province by reason of the enormous crop and the unusually low prices. The judgment of the potato men was found to be in error, the market went steadily lower until, as everybody will recall, the price went down to nothing, and tens of thousands of barrels of potatoes both here and in the United States were shov-elled into the dump.
