Bernhardi And The Militarists This Is No. 3 of a Series of Ten Articles Written For The Times

Again, he lauds the merchant: "German trading-houses are established all over the world; German merchants traverse every quarter of the globe; a part, indeed, of English wholesale trade is in the hands of Germans who are, of course, mostly lost to their own country. Under these conditions our national wealth has increased with rapid strides." This wealth, he fears, is undermining the valorous instincts of the people. For this he prescribes war. ### Lloyd George On Irish Problem





Lettuce, radishes and other crops that mature quickly may be grown between tomatoes, peppers and eggplants. Extra sowings of cucumbers should be made at this time to help you out with your pickle supply. The plants and fruits develop very quickly at this season. Clothed In Paper She Left Germany

Miss Olga Würzberg, Returning To America, Says Teutons Suffer Severely
—People Abandoning Hope

An Atlantic Port, June 26—Among the passengers arriving here on a Norwegian-American liner was Frederick William Wurzburg, eighty-four years old, proprietor of a department store at Grand Rapids, Mich., with his wife Theresa and his three daughters. Olga, oid, proprietor of a department store at Grand Rapids, Mich., with his wife Theresa and his three daughters, Olga, Elsie and Dorothy. The daughters went to Germany six years ago to be educated, and were caught by the war.

Mr. and Mrs. Wurzberg were born in Westphalia and came to America when they were children. The daughters were born in Grand Rapids. They made several attempts to get back after the war began, but were unable to obtain the necessary papers until May 9, Mrs. Wurzberg said. The family were living at Godesberg, near Bonn, on the Rhine, and left for home by Berlin and Copenhagen, where they were detained two weeks until their passports arrived.

Olga Wurzberg, the eldest daughter, who spoke for the party, said that they had been forced to leave Germany because the food was so bad.

"You should have seen us when we reached Norway in our paper clothes before we were fattened up with human food," she said. "We looked very different then. The clothes were sent to be dry cleaned and all fell apart, so we had to buy a new outfit in Norway. The only souvenir we have of the hard times in Germany is a pair of wooden shoes which we had to wear because reather ones could not be obtained. Mother lost lifty-eight pounds in weight. I was reduced twenty-four pounds, and my sister, Elsie, suffered so from malnutrition that her face became partly paralyzed. Germans' Morale Low.

"The morale of the German people is very low on account of their suffering through the long war, and they are becoming hopeless regarding the victories they have been promised so repeatedly by the war party. In my opinion they are nearly in a state of revolt, and something will happen if the people do not get better food before long.

"When I was ill in a hospital at Godesberg a number of wounded soldiers were there, who took me for a German woman because I speak the language so well, and they talked to me freely of their grievances. They said the food

their grievances. They said the food given to the men in the hospital was of the poorest quality, without any nutriment in it, while the officers were fed on the fat of the land. The men's food prevents them from recovering quickly, and reacts on their systems to such an extent that many of the soldiers never recover their health.


"One soldier said to me shortly before we left Godesberg: "Some day we are going to lay down our arms. Why should we fight? Our officers used to lead us into battle, but now they follow in the rear because the government wishes to preserve them from danger."

"A Major, who was sitting in an armchair on the porch of the hospital said to me: 'You see that I wear the coat of the Kaiser. I only wish that you could know the feeling that lies beneath it. We are not going to stand this terrible war forever.' I have seen soldiers leave the hospitals to return to the trenches with only one arm.

"Now that the German people have learned that America has sent more than half a million troops to France they are beginning to worry about the war and express their regret that this country should have been forced into the struggle?"



### HILYARD WANTS A BOND ISSUE

Interim Report on Water and Sewerage Shows Shortage of Funds for Work

A report on the activities of the water and sewerage department has just been prepared by Commissioner Hilyard and will be presented to the council at an early date. The report was compiled with a view to the settlement of finanwith a view to the settlement of financial matters with respect to this department. The report is in part as follows:

The water assessment for 1918 is now nearly ready for filing and amounts to \$155,600 which with arrears and receipts from other sources will give us an income of not more than \$280,000 provided no cash discount is allowed. If ten percent is allowed it will probably reduce the revenue about \$10,000; if five percent the reduction will be about \$5,000.

The estimate for expenditure at the The estimate for expenditure at the first of the year was placed at \$230,000 for water purposes. Without making any provision for increased revenue the appropriations at \$17,000 for sewerage maintenance and \$10,000 for fire hydrants were made charges on the water main-

This the report points out leaves a deficit of \$27,000 provided no discount is allowed, \$37,000, if ten per cent, and \$32,000 if five per cent is allowed. The increase in prices and the enhanced price of all supplies will amount to between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Last year the water assessment was reduced about \$17,000 and at the time

of filing, a cash discount of ten per cent was allowed, which amounted to about \$13,000, a total of \$30,000.

The commissioner then makes the following recommendations in his report:

"That the expenditures on account of the commissioner than the commissioner water maintenance, sewerage mainte-nance and fire hydrants be limited to the income of the water department by

the income of the water department by reducing the renewal of water mains, main sewers and hydrants.

"That bonds be issued to the amount of \$80,000 for the payment of excavating, providing and laying lock joint cement water main at Lake Fitzgerald.

"That a reduction of five per centum be allowed on all water rates assessed in the present year under schedules B and C and paid in at the office of the receiver of taxes on or before the first day of October next.

"That a similar reduction be made

each year hereafter paid in on or before a date to be set when rates are fixed, not later than the first day of October in each year.

"That hereafter all unexpended balances of water revenue be set aside at the close of each year and placed in an account to be known as water reserve to be used for the renewal of water







### REV. W. F. PARKER WRITES OF ATTACK ON HOSPITAL AREA

How St. John Chaplain Was Wounded - Lay for Hour on Floor of Hut While Missles of Death Rained Around

Rev. Mr. Colpitts of the Maritime Baptist publishes in this week's issue a letter he has received from Rev. W. F. Parker, chaplain, recently wounded in a German air attack in an hospital area. He was in his tent at the time, preparing to retire. "It was fortunate," he writes, "that I instantly prostrated myself upon the floor of my canvas hut, as immediate by it was pierced by flying shrapnel that would have caught me had I been standing or sitting. Several succeding attempts to rise and dress had to be abandoned for the same reason. About twenty minutes after the bombardment began, I was pipped in the right knee by a low-flying piece of shrapnel, the only one, so far as I know, of the many that shattered my hut that struck so low. Had I been sitting at my table writing you, as I had intended, an account of the wonderful work of grace going on at the "S. C. A." hut, my head and chest would have been riddled with bits of the shells that burst around me. For over an hour I lay helpless on the floor with the missiles of death raining around me.

"How any of us in the whole area escaped death or wounds is remarkable, for Fritz did his best, under the most favorable circumstances for his purpose, to exterminate us, and only left us when

"After the raid I was taken by our faithful stretcher-bearers to the operating theatre of our hospital and skillfully attended to.
