Steamer Almost Lost. Only through the prompt and heroic efforts of the officers and crew of the Manchester Liner Manchester Port, was the vessel brought from mid-Atlantic into port at Manchester on Feb. 21, according to word received here yesterday. The port had as cargo 156,000 bushels of grain and other general freight from this port. While in mid-Atlantic a great sea struck the ship sweeping her from stem to stern, smashing her bulwarks and carrying away everything in its path. The ventilators were torn away, hatch cover loosened, the engine room flooded and fire extinguished. The water, getting at the grain, swelled it and there was danger of it bursting the plates open. The sea swept so high as to dent the funnel and almost carried it away.

With difficulty the holds and engine-room were cleared of water and the steamer proceeded to port. Captain Scott and his men have been rewarded for their good work in saving the vessel.

NEW RULES PROVIDING FOR THE CARING FOR DISTRESSED SEAMEN

The Imperial Merchant Service Guild have received a pamphlet from the British Board of Trade containing statutory rules and orders with regard to distressed seamen under section 40 of the Merchant Shipping Act. The following amongst others have now become law—

Under Paragraph 2, Article 7, distressed seamen are to be relieved and maintained upon the most reasonable terms possible but only until employment can be found for them or arrangements made for their return to a proper return port. Article 8. Distressed seamen may, if necessary, be supplied with clothing and bedding but in no greater quantity or of better quality than is absolutely required. Officers are to be furnished with clothing of the same quality as that supplied to seamen, a point upon which the guild are communicating with the board of trade. Medical advice and medicine may be provided when necessary.

Paragraph 11 contains the following interesting announcement—"A proper return port may be either the port at which the seaman was shipped or a port in the country in which he belongs." Section 14. In cases in which it is found impossible to arrange for a seaman's return as prescribed in the two preceding regulations, the proper authority may provide for his maintenance during the journey, or provide him with means to pay those expenses. Article 17 contains the following important announcement—"On arrival at the port to which a seaman has been conveyed the master shall produce the conveyance order to the proper authority, and on satisfying him that the seaman has been so conveyed, maintained and provided for by him in excess of

For other members of a crew, three shillings a day. For a seaman, one shilling and sixpence a day. If conveyed in vessels the property of the same owners as those to which the seamen conveyed are belonged, only half the above rates should be paid.

As concerning officers the improvement in their case was the direct result of constant representation and agitation on the part of the guild. During the last year, several cases have been brought to the notice of the board of trade where officers and apprentices have been provided with the same accommodation as the crew, when being sent home from their ships. Very recently in a case brought before the guild one of their members, on being paid off from a sailing ship on the continent, was accommodated in the stowage of a cross-channel steamer with the remaining members of the crew.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Baked Beans. One pint beans soaked over night. Strain off water in morning. In the bottom of beanpot put small onion; put in beans, add one teaspoonful each of salt, sugar, mustard; cut in cubes half pound of lean pork, add three tablespoons of dark molasses and pour cold water over all. Bake at least eight hours and use cold water all through the baking. Do not parboil beans, for they are never as nice.

Southern Spoon Bread. One-half a cup of sifted cornmeal, one cup of boiling water, one dessertspoon of butter, half teaspoon of salt, half cup of sweet milk, one egg. Upon the meal pour the boiling water, stirring it well to make it smooth. Let cook rather briskly for five minutes, add the butter and salt, stir well. Take from the fire, add the milk and the egg well beaten. Pour into a well-buttered shallow baking dish and bake for twenty minutes in a moderate oven, letting brown carefully before removing. Serve from the dish in which it was baked with a tablespoon.





The chimney has a total height of eighty-five feet and is three feet in inside diameter. IMPERIAL NATURALIZATION

People in Canada, as well as in other overseas states of the Empire, are greatly interested in the Imperial naturalization bill, which is to come before the British parliament. At the present time a man naturalized in Canada or Australia or South Africa does not attain the full rank of a British subject throughout the Empire. The bill which was foreshadowed in the speech from the throne is based on the principle that the Empire as a whole rather than any particular portion of it should be the area for which a man must qualify by residence.

Despite the trade depression of last year the total mineral production of the province was nearly \$2,000,000 greater in value than in 1912.

There is a fight over the spoils among the Tories in Albert county. The fact is not surprising. Witness the recent circular issued by the president of the Borden Club.

The Canadian Courier says that the Borden government has not only failed to strengthen the Civil Service Commission, and extend its sphere of influence, but has actually fouted it. The reason, says the Courier, is the desire of cabinet ministers and members of parliament to get jobs for their friends, and to pension off their political supporters at the treasury's expense. This is a severe indictment of a government that went into power pledged to civil service reform.

The position of editor of a newspaper in Paris is at times perilous. The editor of the Figaro made an attack upon the French minister of finance. The minister's wife went to the office and shot the editor. She explained that she did not intend to kill him, but merely to teach him a lesson. The dying editor declared that he had done his duty. If now the French courts will do theirs the free use of pistols by women of high rank may be discouraged in Paris.

In parliament yesterday Mr. Carvell exposed the attempt that was made in Carleton county on the eve of the last New Brunswick elections to make political capital for Mr. Fleming by reading at a funeral a telegram, designed to influence the mourners and other by presenting Mr. Fleming in the light of a sympathetic friend who was working nobly to redress a wrong. If there is anything some Tories would not do in an election campaign, in the matter of pure deception, the public would be glad to hear about it.

The province of New Brunswick is still without accurate knowledge of the value of its crown lands. For years the need of a survey has been urged, but the work has not yet been accomplished. Premier Fleming has now proposed to make a partial survey by getting reports from sealers and from operators and limit holders. To do the work thoroughly and accurately would cost considerable money, and the Fleming government has other uses for the cash. Sooner or later, however, there must be a comprehensive and complete survey, in order that the province may know the real value of this great asset.

It now appears that Mr. G. Howard Ferguson, M.L.A. of Ontario, who submitted to the Borden government a report upon the Trent Valley Canal, charging all kinds of irregularities, is himself liable to have his seat in the Ontario legislature forfeited and to be compelled to pay a heavy penalty for having become a paid official of the Ottawa government while a member of the legislature. Mr. Borden is extremely unfortunate in his scandal hunting commissions. There was the Morine Commission, which was utterly discredited, the Gutelius Transcontinental Commission, and now the Trent Valley Canal Commission. The more Mr. Borden attempts to fasten guilt upon the late administration the more the evidence reveals the weaknesses of his own followers.

THIS COMPANY'S COAL BILL IS \$2,000,000 A YEAR (Coal Age)

A fuel agent and thirteen clerks are necessary to conduct the work of the fuel department of the Commonwealth Edison Company and some of the allied small companies. The Commonwealth Edison Company burns about 8,000 tons of coal daily and its coal bill is about \$2,000,000 a year. About 200,000 tons is kept in reserve in or near Chicago at all times. Nearly all of this is of egg or lump size, as the danger of fire from spontaneous combustion is much less with the larger sizes. Thermometers are placed in all coal piles and weekly records of temperatures are taken. It is frequently found necessary to move piles of screenings of mine-run coal to prevent or fight fires.



HALIFAX WOMAN TALKS OF TAXATION TO WOMEN'S COUNCIL

At the annual meeting of the Women's Council in Halifax last week, says the Chronicle, special attention was accorded Mrs. E. M. Murray, who spoke on that very ripe question of taxation as the basis of prosperity. Mrs. Murray showed a decidedly strong grasp of this vital question as affecting Halifax, and intrepidly urged the women to interest themselves in what was the most fundamental problem before the city at present. Mrs. Murray, in handling her subject, drew the analogy of the individual man, the head of a family, and the community. A prosperous man was considered to have an income sufficient to provide for his family, not only for the present, but to meet the expanding needs of the future. But when that test was applied to the community, it utterly failed. There were no prosperous communities. A community was nothing more than a collection of families. If a community could have good parents, but no good schools, good school buildings, but no good teachers, and if all things that ought to be done for the good of the people could not be done then it was not a prosperous community. Taxation was nothing more or less than the revenue to cover the expense of the community. Many considered it an uninteresting subject, but Mrs. Murray wished to hear of, yet it was the most important thing confronting the community today. At present the community did not take its own income but extorted it from its citizens, while leaving untouched the resources that belonged to it. That which properly belongs to the community, created by the community and was never under any circumstances, the product of the individual, was the value of the land increasing as population grew.

The island of Manhattan, bought from the Indians for a sum equivalent to 24¢, was now worth \$2,500,000. This was the result of the presence, the needs, the activities, and the life of the millions of people that now inhabit it. It was just as true of Halifax as it was of New York. The reason a community was not prosperous was that the fund which belongs to it was not made public use of. The Women's Council could find a great work to do to solve this most important problem facing Halifax today. Vancouver was cited as an example where the land tax was in vogue. Only sixty per cent of the value was assessed on that city, only 2-10 per cent of that was used to meet the needs of a city of 300,000 inhabitants, and those needs were on the extravagant western basis.

THE METROPOLE CAMPAIGN.

"Help the man to help himself" is the slogan that will be used in connection with the Metrople Campaign. There are no words that could be associated with this effort that would so concisely imply its purpose and the nature of its work. Not simply to house the homeless, or give temporary help to the "down and out," but to place him on his feet, to put him in the way of helping himself.

It is a matter of not dealing with the effect, but the cause. Here the class in whose interest the effort is made can deal with along the lines that experience has taught is the only way to accomplish permanent results. Here a man comes under good influence, is given the feeling that some one cares for and believes in his reclamation.

LOCAL EVENTS IN CELEBRATION OF ST. PATRICK'S DAY

The Shamrock Everywhere—A. O. H. and I. L. & B. Society Observances.

"Top of the mornin'" was the cheery greeting on all sides about the city today. It was in popular use only amongst the Irish residents of the city and their sons and daughters, but those who could lay no claim to ancestry from the Emerald Isle. The lapel of many a coat front was graced with shamrock—in fact there were few seen about the streets who did not honor the day by wearing a sprig in their lapel or in their hat-bands.

So far as the Irish societies are concerned the day was celebrated on Sunday and only in two cases, aside from the theatrical performances for the benefit of the orphan in the local institutions this evening, will there be further collective honoring of the feast of Patrick, Ireland's saint and apostle. The members of the A. O. H. will honor the day by holding a social in their rooms in Union street, while the members of the Irish Literary and Benevolent Society will celebrate with a banquet in the Park Hotel for which an interesting programme of musical and literary numbers, and an interesting toast-list have been prepared.

This morning in the Catholic churches large congregations attended. A collection was taken for the orphan in the Cathedral solemn high mass was celebrated by Rev. Wm. Duke with Rev. Father Hayes as sub-deacon, and Rev. Father McLaughlin, as sub-deacon, and Rev. Father O'Brien as master of ceremonies.

In St. Peter's church Rev. Simon Grogan, C. S. R., gave a forceful and able sermon upon St. Patrick which was listened to with rapt attention. Rev. E. J. Holland, C. S. R., was celebrant at the mass with Rev. Father Grogan, C. S. R. as sub-deacon; Rev. J. H. Borgmann, C. S. R. as sub-deacon. The Catholic churches pealed out Irish airs this morning and they were heard with pleasure throughout the city. The "Dear Little Shamrock," "Killarney," "The Harp that once thro' 'Tate's Hall'" all of which were given by the church organist, Arthur S. Godson.

THE KINDERGARTENS AND THE BOARD OF EDUCATION; SUPT. CARTER IN CITY

Dr. W. S. Carter, superintendent of education for New Brunswick, arrived in the city this morning from Fredericton to attend a conference at which the question of the attitude of the department towards the public kindergartens and their work will be considered. He said this morning he did not care to express his opinion on the subject before the meeting, in fact he preferred to hear what was to be said at the meeting concerning the work which had been done by those in charge of the kindergartens here.

The delegation which will confer with Dr. Carter will be composed of Mrs. F. E. Holman, Mrs. T. H. Bullock and Mrs. W. C. Matthews. There will also be present at the conference Mayor Frink, Commission Agar, W. F. Hatheway, T. H. Estabrooks and Dr. H. B. Bridges, superintendent of the city schools. The speakers from the association will endeavor to learn what view the department of education takes with regard to the drafting of the kindergartens into the regular school curriculum, and also whether or not there can be any financial relief.

C. A. CONLON GETS SAD NEWS; DEATH OF BROTHER

Friends in St. John will hear with regret the news contained in a telegram received today by Charles A. Conlon, photographer, of King street, from Lynn, Mass., telling of the death of his brother, George, which occurred there last evening after a lengthy illness. Mr. Conlon will leave for Boston this evening to attend the funeral.

His brother was well known about St. John several years ago. It is about twenty-five years since first he left this city, and he had from that time resided in Lynn, where he was engaged in his business as a shoe-cutter.

He is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Katherine Leahy, of this city; three sons and two daughters. Besides Charles A., two other brothers also survive—John of this city, and Frank of Lynn, Mass. Mr. Conlon had been in failing health for two or three years. There will be much sympathy for the bereaved family.

HENRY NOAKES

'IS FOUND DEAD

Evidently Fell Down Stairs in His Home

FELLOW TENANT FINDS HIM

Life Then Extinct For Two Hours—Active in English Societies in St. John—Latterly Engaged With C. P. R.

The death of Henry Noakes, a well-known citizen, occurred last night, apparently by accident, and was learned of only this morning when his lifeless body was discovered in the hallway of his house. He resided at 68 Wall street. This morning when John Jamieson, one of the other occupants of the house, found the body at the foot of the stairs in front of the entrance door, lying face downwards with a long gash in his head. Dr. F. T. Dunlop was summoned and said that life had been extinct for about two hours. The police and Coroner Roberts were notified and the body and the effects of the dead man were taken in charge pending an inquiry.

Mr. Noakes last night attended the annual dinner of the J. S. Edwards Lodge, Manchester Unity, in the Park Hotel and returned to his home about one o'clock. From the position of his body and the fact that some of his personal belongings were found on the stairway it appears that he had mislaid his footing and fallen down the stairs, thus meeting his death. There is no room for suspicion of foul play, as a considerable sum of money remained undisturbed in his pocket, and the position of his body would have prevented anyone from escaping by the front door.

Mr. Noakes lost his wife by death only three weeks ago, and since then some of the neighbors have kept him company at night until last night, which was to have been his first night alone. A native of the west of London, Eng., Mr. Noakes came to this country something more than twenty years ago, and was first engaged with Dunn & Company at Musquash. Afterwards he was in charge of the Alderbrook dairy, and lately had been in the employ of the C. P. R. as checker in the Mill street warehouse. His wife, formerly Miss McKenna, of Silver Falls, died only three weeks ago, and he is survived by two sons, Harry and Stanley, at Sea Dog Cove on the St. John River, and one brother, Laurence, a bandman in the Royal Canadian regiment at Halifax.

He was the fifty-fifth year of his age. Mr. Noakes returned to England for a visit to his former home this winter, and spent about three months of the country, returning about six weeks ago. During his stay in St. John, Mr. Noakes proved popular among a large circle of friends, and his gift as a singer and an entertainer made him known to many. He had sung in several church choirs, and was a member of the St. John's (Stone) church choir at the time of his death. He was one of the organizers of J. S. Edwards lodge, Manchester Unity, the English branch of the Odd Fellows, was an active member of the St. George's Society, and was prominent in the Sons of England. Owing to the absence of his relatives, the arrangements for Mr. Noakes' funeral are being made by Marlborough lodges, S. G., and announcement of the time and place will be made later.

BIGGEST AFLOAT MAY BE OUTDONE BY A NEW GIANT BRITANNIC

Berlin, March 17—Gossip among the delegates to the shipping pool conference indicates that there may be some truth in a recent British rumor that the White Star Line intends to build another and larger Britannic to offset the Hamburg-American third Imperator, which would supplant the Vaterland as the biggest ship afloat. The tonnage of the new Britannic, according to the reports, is still uncertain but apparently it is to be from 4,000 to 5,000 tons greater than that of the Vaterland.

WIG FROM CHINA WORN AT MASQUERADE BROUGHT HER GERMS OF LEPROSY

Berlin, March 17—The wife of a government official at Danzig, has been certified as leprosy and has been sent to a leprosy hospital. The infection has been traced to a wig made of hair recently imported from China, which she wore at a recent carnival masquerade.

DRESSMAKERS OF NEW YORK PLAN STRIKE

New York, March 17—At a meeting of the Women Dressmakers Association last night, a vote was taken in favor of a general strike effective today. Saul Elstein, manager of the association, said that 5,000 dressmakers would walk out and would demand a fifty-hour week and a 10 per cent. increase in wages.
