Ruins of 3,000-Year-Old City Are Found In Honduran Jungle

Walpole, Mass., April 8-News of the discovery of the rulns of a great sity of the first Mayan Empire lying miles inland in the uninhabited jungle of British Honduras has been received by Lieutenant Colonel Walter M. Whitman, from his son, Edmund S. Whitman, stationed in Honduras. Colonel Whitman said that amid the ruins was one pyramid tow-

ering 300 feet. The huge stone structures, covering hundreds of acres, date back 3,000 years, according to estimates. The discovery was made by an expedition under Professor Mitchell Hedges and Dr. Gann, operating with Belize, capital of British Honduras, as a base. Colonel Whitman said the expedi-tion was under British auspices, backed by a London syndicate. A portion of his son's letter reads:

"An event has completely overshadowed the revolution. Professor Mitchell Hedges and Dr. Gann disappeared not long ago into the tracklese wilderness of British Honduras, and now from the depths of the Bosque comes authentic word that they have discovered a great city of the first Mayan Empire, covering hundreds of acres, comprising a wonderful monolithic period, and among other structures a single pyramid of sorts, towering over 300 feet in the air."

The ruins are covered with the Mayan hieroglyphics, which for many years archaeologists have been trying value to decipher, Colonel Whitman said. Most remarkable was the immensity of the blocks of stone used in

The great city lies miles inland and is almost inaccessible. The dis-The great city lies miles inland and is almost inaccessible. The dis-trict, covered with wild tropical jungle, is quite uninhabited by men. In reaching the ruins, according to the word received from the explorers, it was necessary to cut their way through miles of tangled underbrush and forests. Their supplies were transported on the backs of pack animals.

Club, Montreal. The case for the Maritime Provinces was ably placed before the Young Men's Canadian Club of Montreal yes-terday by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., M. P. of St. John. He said he wished to correct any impression that the maritimes wanted to break away from confederation. There was no more loyal part of the Dominion than the provinces by the sea, but they did want a square deal from the rest of the Dominion. Maritime ports, he said, were not trying to take business from Montreal, but they did feel that when Montreal was closed the freight should go through St. John and Halifax. The Canadian people owned 22,000 miles of railway and the maritime provinces wanted a just share of the service. They thought that grain carried by the national railway should come to Canadian ports rather than to a foreign port. In three months there had gone over the C. N. R. to a foreign port 7,000,000 bushels of grain and to St. John had some 500,000 bushels and to Halifax none, in the same period. 
