



DODDS GROUP OF BLIND SOLDER.S' An American girl, Miss Winifred Holt, is being halled in Paris as one of the most practical of the many bene-factors of mankind that have rises to prominence since the war started. Miss Holt has been instrumental in the establishment of the Hotel du Phare and the Phare, which are being used for the care of soldiers blinded in warfare. Blindness is one of the most terrible afflictions suffered by the soldiers, and the treatment accorded them, not only to furnish physical relief but to amellorate the attendant mental suffering, must necessarily be of a scientific natures and based on years of experience in dealing with such cases. In her reports to the Committee for Man Blinded in Battle, which has headquarters at No. 17 East Thirty-eighth street, New York city, Miss Holt tells of many pathetic incidents that mark her daily routine in the Prench capital, among them being the dramatic meeting between two offi-cers who had tost their sight. The victims are being instructed in virtous forms of employment, such as typewriting and office work, and from their occupations they gain much mental relief.
