RESOLUTION 14.—That the Report of the Editor be received; and that our hearty thanks be given him for his valuable services as Editorand manager of the Printing Establishment, and that the thanks of the Conference be presented to those friends who so liberally responded to their call towards establishing a Connexional Printing Press, as to raise the sum of \$2416 for that object; but as the outlay has exceeded that amount by \$1426, we agree that \$1000 be devoted towards that deficiency from the Jubilee Fund.

UNITED STATES RATE OF EXCHANGE.

RES. 18. That as the Conference of 1868 offered the friends in the United States financial independence if they desired it, we are pleased to find that they wisb to remain in the same relation to Canada as at present; but as we deem it desirable that all difficulties in regard to the rate of Exchange should be removed, we comply with the request of the friends on the Wisconsin District, and fix the rate of Discount for the year at 35 cents.

PREMISES ON THREE RIVERS' MISSION.

RES. 21. That the Chairman of P. E. I., instruct the Trustees to sell the house and premises on the Three Rivers' Mission forthwith; the proceeds of the sale to be handed over to the Missionary Treasurer.

TEMPERANCE.

RES. 23. Whereas the importance of the Temperance reform is indicated, as well by the evils arising from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks, as by the fact that the bulk of professing Christians and philanthropists still exert their influence and energies for the suppression of these evils:

—Therefore, resolved: that this Conference re-affirm as its platform upon this question, Total Abstinence; and we urge upon our ministers the duty of bringing every member of the Church up to this standard, and especially so of such as shall hereafter give in their names for membership in our Societies. Furthermore, that with the view of increasing the efficiency of the Bands of Hope in connection with our Sabbath schools, the Connexional committee are hereby instructed to consider the propriety of publishing a monthly periodical for circulation among them.

2. That this Conference rejoices in the institution of the Canada Temperance Union, the receipt of whose official Circular we hereby acknowledge, and we assure that Body of our hearty sympathy and support; that their recognition of our holy Christianity and its influence on this great question, we appreciate; that the asserted desirability that Evangelical Ministers should preach Temperance Sermons, we assent to; and that, as requested, we appoint two members of this Conference to attend the Convention of the Canada Temperance Union, proposed to be held in the city of Toronto in the month of September next.

3. That the brethren E. Roberts, and J. J. Rice, be the Delegates to the Convention.

PREACHERS, NOT MEMBERS OF THE PREACHERS' FUND.

RES. 26. That as we could not honorably dismiss a needy brother in the ministry without any financial assistance, when he has become unable to perform ministerial duty; and as some of the brethren are not able to meet such charges as would entitle them to assistance from the Preachers' Fund when superannuated; we resolve, That preachers, not members of the Preachers' Fund, shall subscribe annually a sum equal to the annual payment of those preachers who are members of that Fund, to assist them when superannuated, according to such regulations as may be determined by the Conference:—said subscriptions to bear interest, and be held sacred for the purpose intended: and that Bros. E. Roberts, and P. Robins, be appointed to prepare Rules for said Yund, to be laid before the Connexional committee, and the next Conference for their approval.

TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

RES. 27. That any brother having a claim for travelling expenses, either on the Missionary or Contingent Fund, shall send the particulars of such expenses to the Financial Secretary at or before the time of the second meeting of the Connexional committee: and in case such claims be not so presented, they shall not be allowed.

PREACHERS' FUND SUBSCRIPTIONS, AND BOOK ROOM

ACCOUNTS.

RES. 28. That in future, the Superintendents of Districts forward the Preachers' Fund, and Book accounts for their several districts direct to brother Robins, the Treasurer and Book Steward, instead of to the Financial Secretary as at present.

BES. 31. That the report of the Book Steward be adopted; and the thanks of this Conference be given him for his efficient, and economical management of the concern.

SPIRITUAL STATE.

Res. 35. That after having thoughtfully examined the Reports of the several Districts, on the state of Religion in our various fields of labor, we are pleased to find that on some Stations there has been a steady advancement in the divine life, and earnest efforts continuously put forch to secure the extension and consolidation of the Redeemer's Kingdom, which has resulted in the salvation of hundreds of sinners, and the spiritual growth of believers. Among these, we rejoice to find that many of the children taught in our Sabbath schools, have given evidence of a genuine change of heart. And we cherish the hope that from our schools the Church will be largely replenished with faithful members and laborers: And therefore urgs on all concerned, the necessity and importance of laboring with increasing earnestness to secure the conversion of the children belonging to our

POWLE'S CHAPEL.

Res. 42. That \$50 be granted to the Trustees of Powle's Chapel in the Fenelon Mission, on condition that it be properly deeded to the Connexion.

STATISTICS.

Res. 43. That on carefully reviewing the Statistics of our Connexion, we feel glad to be able to report, that, after allowing for 53 Deatha, 251 Removals, and a number whose names have been dropped for unfaith-nlness, we have an increase of 4 Churches, 80 on trial, 127 members—total 207. There have been also several Sunday schools organized, with an increase of 40 Teachers, and 381 scholars. In this, we greatly rejoice.

CHRISTIAN EXPERIENCE.

RES. 44. That a very delightful Lovefeast was held, amidst a thronged house of friends from various parts, closing with the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The limited time of the Lovefeast prevented many from speaking; but those who did speak bore testimony to the fact, that their sense of the Divine favor was clear, and their prospects of future blessedness bright. Some declared the past year to have been the Sestin their Christian life; while others spoke of victories over powerful temptations, and of sapctified afflictions and conflicts. May we all grow more and more in grace, and increase in usefulness! Amen.

CHILDREN.

RES. 45. That as, upon enquiry it is found that the important Resolutions of the last Conference respecting the relationship children should sustain to the Church, have not, owing to what has appeared to be insuperable difficulties, been acted upon. This Conference affectionately and earnestly calls upon our friends to endeavor to give effect to said Resolutions: and we further urge upon all the ministers the necessity of calling attention to this important subject from the pulpit, and in their pastoral visitations. And to assist them in these efforts, we re-print the resolutions passed by the last Conference.

RES. 38. That with the view of bringing the children of our members and friends into closer relationship to the church, we resolve:

1.—That where practicable, such of our Sabbath School and other children as shall accept an invitation to receive special religious instruction, be formed into catechumen classes, under the care of suitable persons, to be appointed by the Elders' Meetings; and that they be made the subjects of displine, religious instruction, and encouragement suited to their age and capacity.

2.—That the names and attendance of said children be recorded in a book to be provided for that purpose, and that the returns be made annually, through the Quarterly and District Meetings to the Conference.

3.—That they be continued in this relation until the Elders' Meeting shall judge them fit to be received on trial for church membership, or they be otherwise removed from such relation by action of the Elders' meeting.

4.—In order that parents in the church, and our friends generally, may have these matters properly laid before them and explained, and that they may be induced to co-operate with the ministers in these attempts to train up their children in the Lord, we further resolve, that every paster shall, as soon as possible call a general church meeting, to which he shall read these resolutions, offer what remarks he may think necessary, and take steps to carry into effect the directions herein contained.

OWEN SOUND.

RES. 49. That brother Hoidge be, and is hereby appointed a Deputation to visit Owen Sound and vicinity, and report to the Missionary Committee for their guidance.

MINISTERIAL SALARY.

(REPORT OF A SPECIAL COMMITTEE.)

That having considered the matters of Preachers' Salary, Children's proportion, and Missionary Receipts. We do not feel prepared to present to the Conference any scheme which we would deem satisfactory; but we recommend that a Committee composed of the President, and Secretary, and

the Brethren Robins, and Barker, be appointed to prepare a plan, and submit it to the second Meeting of the Connexional Committee for their consideration, and from them to the third Quarterly Meeting in each Station, and that the view of the Quarterly Meetings be forwarded to their respective District Meetings, and thence to the next Conference for final decision. On motion the report was received, and adopted.

MISSIONARY PRAYER MEETINGS.

RES. 53. That we request our friends on all our Circuits to hold Monthly Missionary Prayer Meetings in each of our places of worship, and unitelly to pray to Almighty God, for a much greater outpouring of His Holy Spirit in His Church, and to make bare His arm in the conversion of sinners, and in the sanctification of believers.

COMMITTEES.

Q. 8. Who are the Connexional and Missionary Committees?

A. The President, and Secretary of Conference, Superintendents of Districts, the Missionary Secretary and Treasurer, General Financial Secretary, Editor, Book Steward, J. Whitlock, T. Gillbard, T. 

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Address to the English Conference.

DEAR FATHERS, AND BRETHREN,-Although the wide ocean rolls between you and ourselves, and to many of us, you are personally unknown, as also are some of us to you,-it gives us very great pleasure to remember that we are one with you in your high aims, your successful endeavors in the spread of scripture truth, and in your hopes, and fears, and joys. We rejoice at your zeal in the cause of our common Master, and sympathize with your solicitude for an increase in the spirituality of mind of the members who form the Societies throughout our beloved Denomination. We are devoutly thankful for the gracious outpourings of the Holy Spirit, spoken of by you, in your address to this Conference, and we share your regrets, that notwithstanding the admission of so many persons on trial for membership by you, a permanently larger increase of members has not ensued. With yourselves, too, we are strongly convinced that what is required now and always on the part of the Church on earth is, that its members in a greater degree, possess the "mind of Christ," be less and less conformed to the spirit and practices of the world, and manifest a constant zeal for the glory of God, and the salvation of souls, so as steadily, untiringly, and personally, to endeavor for that end.

It is our earnest prayer that both ministers and members throughout the entire connexion, may more fully realize the will of God as made known in His promises, by experiencing the highest influences, and submitting fully to the sanctifying operations of that Holy Spirit, who has said, "I will be as the dew unto Israel; he shall grow as the lily, and cast forth his roots as Lebanon. His branches shall spread, his beauty shall be as the olive tree, and his smell as Lebanon. They that dwell under his shadow shall return, they shall revive as the corn, and grow as the vine; the scent thereof shall be as the wine of Lebanon." And why may not this be? He who has promised "fainteth not neither is weary." He still lives, and reigns, and operates for the good of His people; and none of them need say to Him, "Where is thy zeal and thy strength, the sounding of thy bowels, and mercies toward me? are they restrained?"

We feel that we have occasion to rejoice, in that from time to time God gives signal evidence that He is in our midst. During the year now closed, He has graciously revived His work on several of our stations. In answer to prayer, many backsliders have been reclaimed; many others, who, in respect to the spiritual life, appeared ready to die, have been refreshed and strengthened; while many more have been "born of the incorruptible word, which liveth and abideth forever." 475 persons have been admitted on trial for membership; 53 have, as we fondly trust, passed away to God in peace; 251 have removed from our

midst into other neighborhoods; and alas! not a few have "for-saken God that made them. and lightly esteemed the Rock of their salvation;" leaving us a net increase to the Societies of 207 persons.

Our Sabbath Schools still continue prosperous as to numbers and finances, although they do not realize in so large a degree as we desire, the highest form of prosperity in the conversion of the children to God. It is very possible that the great end of Sabbath school teaching is not sufficiently regarded and pursued by some who are engaged in it, and that too many of the members of our churches keep aloof from the schools, where their presence, counsels, prayers, and labors might abundantly be blessed. Still we are not without cause of joy in respect to this department of the work, for in not a few instances, "out of the mouth of babes and sucklings God hath perfected praise."

In another respect the good hand of our God has been upon us, in that no breach has been made in our ministerial ranks. The fathers, toil-worn, and somewhat broken by time and infirmities, are with us still, their hearts as strong, and hopes as bright as in the days when they pioneered among the woods of this great land; and now in a green old age, they dwell among their own people, loved and honored for their "works' sake," joyously awaiting the time when the great Master, whom they have so long served, shall bid them "go up higher." While this is so, however, several of the brethren, through age or affliction, are for the present laid aside. The brethren Edwards and Gale, have felt it to be necessary to apply for superannuation; Bro. J. Hoidge, who since last Conference, has been nigh unto death, although now in a good degree restored, still needs rest for his more perfect restoration to health; Bro. H. J. Nott, has been obliged, through broken health, to retire from the work, although we trust his retirement will be only temporary; and Bro. R. Hicks, whose health is somewhat improved, needs a longer cessation from ministerial toil; Bro. Ashley, also becomes a supernumerary from a similar cause.

Towards supplying for lack of service of these beloved brethren, two young men have been received on probation for the ministry, while four, who have satisfactorily passed through their probation, have been admitted into full connexion with this Conference.

Although the effort made to establish a Connexional Printing Office was not so generally supported as we had hoped, we are glad to be able to say, that this important aim has been achieved, and there is every prospect that under the judicious management of our Editor, it will become a financial success. Our connexional organ, the OBSERVER, has been enlarged, its circulation has considerably increased, and it is viewed with increasing

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ional Printing hoped, we are s been achievidicious mansuccess. Our ged, its circurith increasing favor by many outside of our own denomination. It avowedly ranks with the best religious and family newspapers published in the Dominion, and we believe it destined to be of very great, and essential service to our cause in this land.

Notwithstanding, the heavy liabilities of the Missionary Society, new ground has been broken during the year, by the opening of too new Stations, viz; -One at Portage Lake, in Michigan, U. S., which Bro. Harris, the Missionary there, reports of, as a promising field of labor; the other in the neighborhood, of Owen Sound, in this Province, in which neighborhood, several of our friends from the older Stations have settled with their families. We feel it to be important to follow our people into those new locations, whither in the order of Providence they may be led from time to time, and should do more in this direction, had we the men, and the means. We venture here, to express the hope that, while our English brethren are naturally, chiefly, interested in those colonial Missions which are under the control of their own Conference, they will not be backward in coming here to reinforce our ranks when solicted to do so. Very soon the great North-West territory will be open for emigration and settlement; other and more powerful denominations are already endeavoring to anticipate the wants of the future inhabitants of that fertile and almost boundless region, by sending Missionaries there. 'As it is by no means unlikely that many of our own members will find their way into the new country, we shall prove recreant to our high trust, if we are not careful to supply them with the bread of life. In this matter dear brethren, you must be one with us.

We rejoice at the constantly occurring proofs that God is working out His purposes among the nations of the earth, by providentially removing, one after another, long established abuses which have derogated from His glory, by obstructing His mighty work among men. Providence, and grace never conflict with each other. All God's works beautifully harmonize, however discordant men may deem them to appear. Not the least among the signs of the times, are those events which lead to liberty of thought, and the freedom of the human conscience in matters of religion. We view with great and interested attention the course of the British Government, in its purpose to disestablish and disendow the Irish Church, believing that we see in it, the good beginning of a better end—a large stride, indeed, towards the period when the unholy and harmful alliance of Church, and State shall cease throughout every part of the British Empire, and the world, and with it the various disabilities which non-conformist Christians of every name and in every age have had to endure. When we recollect, that even priest-ridden and bigotted Spain, has so far awakened

from the lethargy into which for ages she was sunk, as to assert that every form of Christianity shall be legally protected within her bounds, surely no obstacles, which increasing parties may create, or the worshippers of the dead past may throw in its way, shall suffice effectually to hinder the passage of the great measure now before the British Parliament, or prevent the still further application of the just principles upon which it is based.

In our last annual address to you, we referred to a kindred matter, although a local one, viz;—the avowed determination of the Government of Ontario, to disallow, in future; any grant of public monies to Denominational Colleges. We then expressed the apprehension that "more than a little bitterness might be manifested before the question would be finally settled." In this we were not deceived, and accordingly, earnest attempts were made by influential persons to force the Provincial Government to recede from its determination, but with the general sense of the people in its favor it remained firm to

its purpose. The right has prevailed.

Our Conference has been on the whole a pleasant one. Old fellow-laborers have had a happy re-union, and felt the ties of a sacred friendship established long years ago grow stronger. Others of us have met for the first time, and here commenced an acquaintance and a friendship that will outlive time. Heart has grown to heart. The Master has been in our midst, and we are happy in His favor, safe in His protection, and honored in His service. Since we have been together we have had "times of refreshing coming from the presence of the Lord," and in separating for our fields of labor, we have the high hope, that if a longer separation shall take place, by any of our number being summoned to rest, we shall meet again at home:—

"Than farewell night! of darkness then no more : Joy breaks; shines; 'tis eternal day."

With full hearts, dear Fathers and Brethren we greet you; and especially do we greet and sympathize with the dear Brethren who are in affliction and bereavement among you, and earnestly pray that they may be mercifully sustained and comforted, and more, that they may feel assured that their "light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for them a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory," We desire to assure you of our undying attachment to you all, and of our purpose, through grace, so to prosecute our pilgrimage on earth as to meet you in our Father's house above; for we "know that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance, for ye serve the Lord Christ."

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Address to the Societies.

DEARLY BELOVED,—We avail ourselves of this medium, to call your attention to, the very important subject of Family A little reflection will serve to convince you, that, Religion. from the beginning, Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, deemed the religious culture of children, a subject of first importance, (and infinite wisdom cannot err.) Hence, when He had commanded: "Hear O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord: and thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might: and these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart." It was added: "And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and thou shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up, and thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes; and thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates." "But teach them to thy sons, and thy sons, sons; specially the day that thou standest before the Lord thy God in Horeb * they may teach their children." "For He established a testimony in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which He commanded our Fathers, that they should make them known to their Children: that the generations to come might know them, even the children which should be born; who would arise and declare them to their children: that they might set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep His commandments: and might not be as their Fathers, a stubborn and rebellious generation, a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit was not stedfast with God." In the New Testament we read: "Fathers provoke not your children to anger, lest they be discouraged." Ye Fathers provoke not your Children to wrath, but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

And of Abraham, as a father, and a master, this honorable testimoney is given by the pen of Inspiration. "I know him that he will command his children, and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment."

After reading the above quotations, we think there can be no doubt upon your minds respecting your duty as parents.

Family worship, is at once your duty, and your privilege: nor can it be neglected with impunity, for it is written, "Pour out thy fury upon the heathen that know thee not, and upon the families that call not upon thy name." The absence of, in many instances, the mere semblance of family government, and

the irreligiousness of many, so called, Christian families, are to us, subjects of painful interest. "Many complain that their children are unruly, and why? Because they never subjected them to rule and government, when they had it in their power. They complain that they embitter their old age, and why? Because they never taught them to reverence their parents when they were young. Alas! how pitiable is the condition of him who has the affliction to be the father of a wicked offspring! Poor unhappy man! Thy sorrow admits of no alleviation. Disease and death are blessings when compared with the anguish of thy heart, when thou seest thy children run heedlessly to ruin, and towards which by thy fond and criminal indulgence, thou hast led them." To this must be added the humiliating fact, that in very many cases, there is no attempt to Educate the children in the most important of all subjects. "A religious education is the most essential preparative, and successful precursor to a religious life. If the plant be not kept straight at first, the tree will probably be crooked at the last." The principles imbibed in youth, are commonly carried to the grave. You cannot expect your children to receive a religious education in the common or district schools; nor yet at the institutions were "superior" education is imparted; it does not come within their legitimate sphere, excepting such as are denominational.

Nor must you expect this work to be done for you at the Sabbath Schools, whither your children resort for about two hours on the Sabbath day. The religious education of your children must be carried on at home: God holds you responsible for the doing of it; and while you live in the habitual neglect thereof, whatever may be your frames and feelings, and however great your supposed religious joy, and however zealous your efforts to ameliorate the condition of others, outside of your own family circle, rest assured, there will be a blank in your religious life which, in its consequences, may not only bring down your gray hairs with sorrow to the grave, but entail upon society a blasting, withering, damning influence; and the Eternal will not hold you guiltless.

We submit the following for your serious consideration and prayerful adoption.

I. That it is your duty to attend to the religious education of your children, and that such education can only be properly imparted at your own homes.

II. That in order to the proper discharge of this God-imposed duty, you should so arrange your affairs as to allow of, at least, two or three evenings in every week being devoted thereto.

III. That in od supply of l, always on nily as can r IV. Where p ated, and in ctive

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III. That in addition, to oral instruction you should keep a od supply of religious literature, both standard and periodl, always on hand, always accessible to such members of the nily as can read it.

V. Where practicable the science of singing should be culated, and in every possible way, home should be made at-

V. It may be objected that your engagements in connection th temperance, and other philanthropic Associations will allow of so much time being devoted to the religious cule of your families. Our reply is, that, any engagements, fulfilling of which leads to the habitual neglect of home ties, are radically wrong; and you should seek to be released refrom at your earliest convenience.

t may also be objected that, the expense necessary to be inred in giving effect to the above suggestions would be too vy a tax upon your financial resources. To this, we reply t, in hundreds of cases, if the money expended in the purchase tobacco, artificial flowers, and useless ribbons were applied the purchase of Religious Literature, there would not only ample means for that purpose, but a large margin left to be

ropriated, as in your judgment, might seem best.

n a word, let your homes be made cheerful, as home should let the relative duties of the individual members of the ally be promptly and lovingly discharged—Let religiousness meate the whole carriage of the parents, and happy homes multiply on every hand. In addition to the discharge of ne duties, as commonly understood, we strongly advise that ents and children go to the House of God in company, that y sit together in the House of prayer; and that they return ne again in company. We cannot too strongly reprobate practice obtained in some places, of allowing the children to ain in the streets or roads, on their way to or from public ship. There are proper times for out-door exercises—for thful recreations; but surely the Lord's Day is not one of se times.

e earnestly call your attention to the resolutions of the ent Conference, relative to the relationship your children ald sustain to the Church; and affectionately ask your co-ration in our endeavor to give effect thereto. Our prayer That your sons may be as plants grown up in their youth, your daughters be polished after the similitude of a palace," that in the judgment of the great day, you may be pred to say, "Here we are Lord, and the children thou hast

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, in all wisdom teaching one another, and admonishing one another in psalms, and hymns, and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts, unto the Lord. And whatsoever ye do, in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him."
