## ANNUAL REPORTS BEFORE TOWN COUNCIL

Granolithic Sidewalks cost town of Newcastle Only \$300.

### DAY POLICEMAN NOW

Council Decides on Having its own Scott Act Inspector

(The annual reports of the committee mentioned below will appear in rotation form in the Town Report.)

The regular meeting of the Town Council took place last Thursday evening. Ald. Armstrong was appointed in place of Ald. Ritchie on the committee to interview D. Pottinger, manager of the I. C. R. with respect to securing additional water supply from the I. C. R. reservoir in case of emergency. Ald. Armstrong and Ald. Morrison will interview Mr. Pottinger at the first opportunity. If the additional supply is secured it will obviate the necessity of increasing the town reservoir supply as demanded by the board of underwriters.

Ald. Morrison moved that the Town Clerk give notice of a bill raising the town bonds from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent.

Carried. Ald. Morrison submitted the annual report of the Water and Light committee. In the course of his observations Ald. Morrison stated that Newcastle had collected almost every dollar due it for 1904 while Chatham had about \$2,000 coming to it.

Ald. Armstrong submitted the annual report of the Board of Works. It was shown in the report that the granolithic sidewalks laid here last summer cost the town only about \$300.

County Scott Act Inspector Menzies submitted an account of \$50 for Scott Act prosecutions in the town and a smaller one for expenses in connection therewith.

The account passed after some discussion. Ald. Lawlor submitted the annual report of the Police Committee. In it was a recommendation for a day policeman.

It was pointed out that such an official could act as Town Scott Act Inspector, dog tax collector, hog reeve, etc.

The report was adopted. It was ascertained that only \$1 had been collected in dog taxes during the past year.

The incoherence of Johnson's remarks led the dignified Chairman at length to ask him to what item he addressed his remarks. Stung with the sarcasm Johnson exclaimed: "To a very small (his) item indeed. Mr. Chairman, (his) am (his) addressing myself to you, Sir."

## ESTIMATE OF CUT ON MIRAMICHI THIS YEAR.

Prominent Lumberman Has Made up the Figures of Total Cut on the River.

### WHAT OPERATORS WILL DO

Total on Northwest 13,500,000 and 31,000,000 on the Other.

A prominent lumberman has made up the figures for the total cut on the Miramichi this winter. On the South West branch it is figured that there will be some 25,000,000 to come down a through the boom. In 1903 the cut was 45,000,000.

On the North West branch the amount to come out has been put at 13,500,000. The different operators are to cut as shown below:

## WILL MEET HERE.

Newcastle Has The Next Annual Sabbath School Workers Summer School.

At the last meeting of the Presbytery of Miramichi it was decided to hold the next Annual Sabbath School Workers Summer School for the Province in Newcastle.

The committee have now decided that the school which is to last for five days shall be held from the 10th to the 14th of July.

The prospects for a profitable and interesting school are as the committee have secured the services of the Rev. In. Falconer, Principal of Pine Hill College, Halifax.

Dr. Falconer not only brings profound and up-to-date scholarship to bear upon the problems of Sabbath School work but he is something of an expert on Sabbath School and Bible Class method of teaching.

Dr. Falconer is to deliver a series of lectures on the New Testament while Rev. J. B. Robertson, one of our ablest and most scholarly young ministers is to give a course of lectures on the Old Testament.

These courses are to be supplemented by a series of lectures on Juvenile Psychology and the principles of teaching by one of our University Professors.

From the above it will be obvious that the school is likely to be by no means the least popular and successful of the schools of recent years.

It is expected that the railway companies will, as in former years, grant reduced rates and the natural beauty of the Miramichi combined with the cordial hospitality already promised to students from a distance by all the Protestant churches in Newcastle will ensure a large attendance at the school.

Although the school is being held under the auspices of the Presbyterian church it is expected that the Sabbath School workers of all the Protestant denominations in town and the district will avail themselves of the opportunity to profit by this system of instruction designed to render us more effective in our religious work among the young.

## BOARD'S COMPLEXION MAY NOT CHANGE VERY MUCH.

Members of Present Town Council Not Likely to be Seriously Opposed.

### MAY BE FEW CHANGES.

Two or Three Names Mentioned for the May Election.

People are already speculating on the complexion of the next Town Council. A number of names have been mentioned as candidates for the May election. Among these is that of Mr. R. T. D. Atken. Mr. Hickson has been emphatically mentioned as a candidate for mayor or alderman. Another name mentioned is that of a young merchant and still another is that of a well known steamboat captain. It is believed to be in the hands of the present aldermen's committee for the mayor's chair. It is said that there are a number of new aspirants for aldermanic honors. Some members of the present board have expressed a desire to seek re-election. The general opinion, however, is that the complexion of the next Council will be much the same as it is at present.

"I see no necessity for a change" said one prominent citizen in a recent report for the Advocate. The present board is energetic and progressive and I think generally satisfactory. This seems to be the consensus of opinion throughout the town.

## BIG SHOW OPEN.

Madison Square Garden Now The Centre of Attraction For Sportsmen.

The big Sportsman's Show of the year opened at Madison Square Garden, New York, yesterday. It will continue until March 7th. Among the features of the show is one by the I. C. R. and includes among other things a number of live trout. The fish are in charge of Mr. H. G. Smith of Chatham, and are trout of the best quality and Miramichi waters. They are some 35 to 50 in number and are of various specimens, having been taken by Mr. Smith.

In the opinion of Capt. J. H. P. Press, manager of the show, the event at Madison Square Garden this year will be the greatest Sportsman's show ever held. In the first place the floor space is according to the exhibition is larger than ever before and more airy. This space has already been engaged by the various firms who desire to exhibit. Besides the great exhibition area on the floor of the garden, there will be two galleries for the use of exhibitors.

In the centre of the floor space is a great tank with a capacity of 100,000 gallons of water and this will furnish one of the most interesting phases of the big show. The exhibiting spaces all about this artificial pond have taken by the manufacturers of motor boats, launches, canoes, and the other water craft. The tank is oval in form and will offer an excellent opportunity for the displaying of the power and speed of the boats, offering an uninterrupted course with two straightaways of 100 feet and eighty foot turns. The water will have a depth of nearly four feet, which will be enough for motor boats of the deeper draught.

Mr. John Connell of Baribogue is assisting Mr. Smith in his work. A number of Miramichi people will likely attend the show.

## NEWCASTLE WON

Local Hockey Team Defeats Miller-ton and is now After Chatham

Although Newcastle is without a rink a hockey team has been formed here which has already played one match. The Newcastle team went to Millerton last Thursday evening and played a match there with the Millerton team. At the end of the second half the score stood 8-5 in favor of the Newcastle aggregation. This is a very good showing considering that the shire-town boys have no chance to practice. Another match will be played at Millerton tomorrow evening and if the Newcastle team is again victorious an effort will be made to get a game on with Chatham. There are some speedy skaters and good stick hands on the local team and undoubtedly they could make it pretty interesting for Chatham.

It is altogether likely that a covered rink will be erected here before next winter.

## A BIT DISCOURAGING TO SHORT RUN PROPOSAL

Mr. Emmerson Says It Would Involve Too Much Additional Expense.

## BUT SAYS NO MORE

Does Not Deny It Would Facilitate The Handling Of Traffic.

Secretary Andrew of the Board of Trade has received a reply to the petition sent to Minister of Railways, Emmerson, with respect to making Newcastle a divisional point on the I. C. R. M. Mr. Emmerson's reply is somewhat discouraging. He declares that the opinion of officials of the road that the shorter run would entail considerable additional expense and just now every effort was being made to curtail expense. This is Mr. Emmerson's only excuse for not adopting the shorter run. He does not deny, however, that it would facilitate the handling of traffic and improve the service and that the road was owned by a corporation, the shorter run would have been adopted long ago.

The people of Newcastle do not intend to drop the matter by any means and will continue to make every effort to secure fair play for their town.

The Motion Board of Trade has forwarded its memorial on the subject to the Minister of Railways.

It is stated that the memorial comes out the opposition by the Motion Board of Trade and claims that the change would cause serious loss to the city of Moncton by transferring to Newcastle many business houses, who have established themselves in this city and that it would considerably increase the cost of operating the I. C. R. without any commensurate advantage. The memorial discusses the comparative lengths of the proposed two sections of the division, makes a comparison of the wages which will be earned by a man on each section of the division and contends that it means an increased cost to the railway and decreased earnings to the men running the train. Estimates are also given which embody the cost of establishing a round-house yard extension, etc., at Newcastle and of the cost of the official and operating staff. Senator McSweeney was requested to present the memorial and support the cause.

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## Assassination of Grand Duke Sergius.

MOSCOW, Feb. 18.—Within the walls of the far-famed Kremlin Palace, and almost underneath the historical tower from which Ivan the Terrible watched the heads of his enemies falling beneath the axe on the famous Red Square, and within a stone's throw of the great bell of Moscow, Grand Duke Sergius, uncle and brother-in-law of Emperor Nicholas, and the chief of the reactionaries, met a terrible death shortly before three o'clock yesterday afternoon. The deed was committed by a single terrorist, who threw beneath the carriage of the Grand Duke a bomb charged with the same high-powder explosive which wrought Minister Von Plehve's death. The missile was packed with nails and fragments of iron, and its explosion tore the imperial victim's body to ghastly fragments, which strewn the snow for yards around. Every window in the great lofty facade of the Palace of

Justice was shattered, and bits of iron were scattered deeply in the walls of the palace, a hundred yards away.

The assassin belongs to the noted "fighting group" of the socialist-revolutionary party which has removed other prominent officials and long since passed sentence of death upon Grand Duke Sergius. The Grand Duke knew that he stood in the shadow of death. He was the recipient of repeated warnings, and elaborate precautions were taken to insure his safety, but all the resources of gendarmerie and soldiers proved unavailable against an attempt almost duplicating the procedure that caused the death of Minister of Interior Von Plehve in July of last year. It was the irony of fate that Sergius, after taking refuge in his country villa during the strike troubles of a month ago, and later seeking a more secure shelter in the palace within the Kremlin walls, and which

he had abandoned to enable the police to better protect him.

Grand Duchess Elizabeth, who has been engaged daily in the task of preparing comforts for the sick and wounded Russian soldiers in Manchuria, was about to drive to the palace to join her husband. When she heard of what had befallen the grand duke she was driven in haste to the scene of the tragedy and knelt, hatless and coatless on the blood stained snow and murmured prayers for the welfare of the soul of her slain consort.

The assassin was thrown to the ground and stunned by the force of the explosion; he quickly rose and ran toward the gate, attempting to escape. His haste and the blood streaming from his face, where he had been wounded by fragments of the bomb, attracted the attention of a sergeant of police, who seized him before he could draw his revolver. The man did not deny his crime, but on the contrary, gloried in his success. He expressed satisfaction that he had been able to kill the Grand Duke without involving the latter's innocent wife. He avowed his membership in the socialist-revolutionary organization, but refused to give his name, and at the jail his papers were found to be forged.
