MONCTON WOMAN HELD UP BY REVOLVER

Was on her Way Home When
Man Halted Her on
Albert Side

SCREAMED FOR HELP

MONCTON, Dec. 20.—As she walked home from work on Saturday evening a well known Moncton woman was held up at the point of a revolver by a short, stocky man, who had a white handkerchief over his eyes. He asked the woman where she was going and she replied "home". He then commanded her not to cry out and caught her around the waist, throwing her to the ground. She screamed and the man became scared and ran away.

ATTORNEY SPEAKS

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Arraignment today of the two women held by the New York authorities in connection with the death of Oscar Sneed, while it created another public outburst upon the elderly policemen, was a necessary step in the process of bringing them until reports are returned by the grand jury in New Jersey. Presently a bill of Essex County will ask for and exact these indictments tomorrow.

The plea that Mrs. Caroline S. Martin is not mentally responsible for her acts will not deter him from asking her indictment for complicity in the killing of her daughter, the New Jersey prosecutor said. The indictment in the "suicide" case was no longer a plea in question either, the prosecutor said.

WHAT IT COSTS TO MAIL PARCELS

Information for Senders of
Christmas Gifts Through
The Mails.

PARCEL POST

At this time of year questions are continually being asked of the post office authorities. Practically everyone is sending parcels, and the number who have friends in foreign countries whom they wish to remember is remarkable.

There are the rates charged for parcels to some of the most important countries:

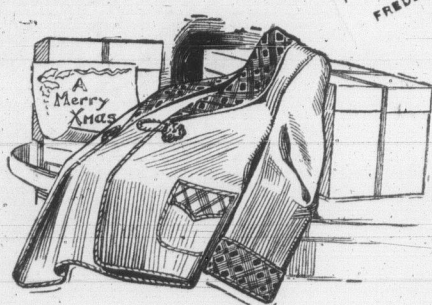
Australia, 24 cents for the first pound and a similar sum for every additional pound.
Bahamas, 12 cents a pound.
Bermudas, 10 cents for the first pound, and 12 cents for each succeeding pound to the limit of 11.
Cane Colony, 25 cents for the first pound, two pounds for 54 cents, three pounds for 80 cents and four pounds for \$1.00.
China, 16 cents for the first pound, and 12 cents for each additional pound.
Cuba, 38 cents for the first pound, 60 cents for a two pound parcel, three pounds for \$1.74.
France, 42 cents for the first pound, 8 cents additional for the next two pounds, and 76 cents for a 4 pound parcel.

Germany, first pound 34 cents, 8 cents additional for the second and third pounds, while the four pound parcel requires 70 cents postage.
Parcels within Canada carried at the rate of a cent an ounce, which reveals the peculiar fact that a five pound parcel can be sent from Toronto to Hong Kong for a cent, and to send the same package from here to St. John would cost 80 cents.

Small parcels weighing a few ounces are at the present time accepted in nearly all foreign countries except the United States, on the regular letter rates providing they do not contain anything coming on the prohibited list of the country to which they are addressed. Such parcels are subject to examination at the customs offices.

"Yes, oh, yes!" from both of the little girls.



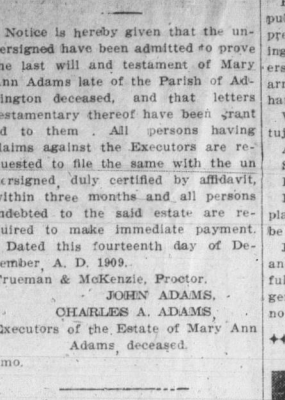

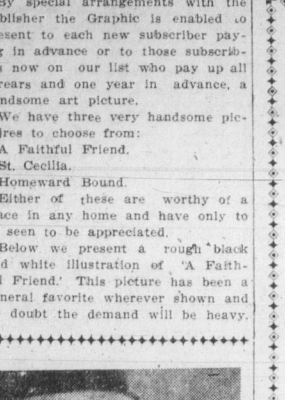
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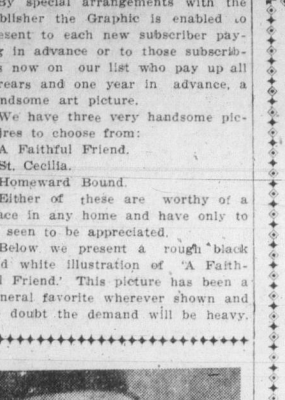
