**Notice to Fishermen, Coasters**  
**and Pilots.**  
The following sections of an Act relating to  
the Coast Fisheries, &c., are published for the in-  
formation of Fishermen, Coasters and Pilots:  
Sec. XXI.—The owner of every vessel or boat  
under the burden of fifteen tons belonging to this  
Province, and employed in fishing, coasting,  
or piloting, shall furnish a written description of  
the same, together with his own name, place of  
abode, and occupation, to the chief officer of the  
Provincial Treasury of the district wherein the  
owner resides; such officer shall thereupon grant  
to the owner a certificate, that the requisite  
description has been filed with him, and that a cer-  
tain number has been fixed thereon; which num-  
ber shall thereafter be painted conspicuously on  
both bows in figures not less than nine inches in  
length, and on the mainmast of such vessel or boat  
in figures not less than three feet in length.  
XXII.—Vessels or boats belonging to owners  
residing within the Bay of Fundy, shall be dis-  
tinguished by numbers in red on the bows and  
mainmast.  
XXIII.—Every vessel or boat under the burden  
of fifteen tons, be on going to this Province, and  
found fishing, coasting or piloting near its shores,  
without bearing a distinguishing number on the  
bows and mainmast, as above provided, shall be  
seized and detained until properly numbered, and  
until the payment of a fine not exceeding five  
pounds.

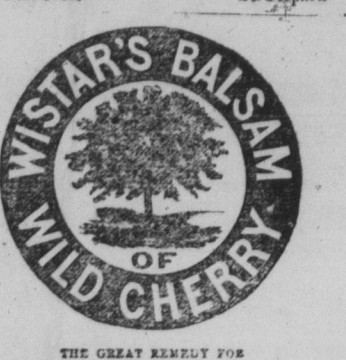
