It is a shame to compel men to camp in a swampy hole like that at Stratford while the excellent camping ground here is available, and the chief officers unanimously favor it.

We have received from President Mills copy of the 15th annual report of the On-tario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm at Guelph. It covers 204 pages, is mbellished with a cut of the main building and contains a very complete record of the work of the institution during 1889.

Details are given of the course of study, etc., and of all the field experimental work with grains, etc., carried on under the direction of Prof. Shaw and Mr. C. A. Zavitz. The chief points in reference to the grains were published in the ADVERTISER last fall. Farmers who desire the complete data should send to President Mills for a copy of this report. In the dairy, horticul-tural, chemical, botanical and other departments a great deal of important work was carried on. Under the heading, "Live Stock," President Mills says:

Stock," President Mills says:

We have not imported either sheep or cattle to take the place of those which were sold after the fire, but have endeavored to buy suitable animals. Professor Shaw and Mr. John I. Hosen heef breeds—Shorthorns, Herefords, Aberdeen-Angus Polls, Galloways and Devons. They completed their work some time since, and the animals selected are now in our stables for experimental and aducational work. In addition to these, Professor Shaw bought four Jerseys and two Ayrshires some meaths ago; and J. W. Robertson, our professor of the more Ayrshires and suitable samples of the Holstein breed.

the college during the year was the starting of a monthly paper, the "O. A. C. Re riew," a publication to which the president gives a word of favorable comment. The attendance of students in 1889 was a little larger than in 1888, the total number on the roll being 134, more than 70 per cent. being from this Province. Thirty-one counties of Ontario were represented and the largest representation was from Grey Leeds, Prince Edward, York and Middle sex. Not a few students came all the way from England, while Newfoundland and nearly all parts of Canada as far west as British Columbia were represented. That the fame of the institution is becoming world-wide may be seen in the fact that the class roll includes students from India,

France, Switzerland and Germany. Deducting the college revenue of \$6,570 45, he net cash expenditure of the college during the year was \$23,382 51, leaving an unexpended balance of \$3,552 49 over the sum voted by the Legislature. The total net expenditure for the maintenance of the farm proper in 1889 (less revenue \$1,659 62) was \$13,681 64; experiments, \$4,321 63; garden, lawn, etc., \$2,991 84; instruction \$1,214 73; or a grand total of \$45,592 35. The expenditure on capital account was \$2,236 93, also considerably less than the Legislature voted. This is a satisfactory
