They refuse to do so, and sny that wages are too low, and fears are entertained that unless the harvest excursions change the situation the farmers will be unable to take care of their crops properly. Bicycle Club.

Three Thousand Spectators Enjoy the Sport.

Favoring Skies—Good Management—In teresting Contests-Hyslop and Man-ville Retain Their Ronors-Summary of the Various Events.

To over-estimate or misappraise the interest, enthusissm and success of the London Bloycle Club's first annual meet held yesterday afternoon on the Queen's Park track would tax a well-stocked vocabulary of superlative adjectives. The interest taken in the pastime was amply attested by the 3,000 persons who congregated to witness the various events. The enthusiasm possessed by the cyclists themselves rapidly permeated the whole assemblage, and the pecuniary success—substantial and encouraging—was commensurate with the patronage indicated. The race course was in prime condition. Rollers had been effectively used, and ease and celerity of motion was dependent but on personal effort. No pains, it may safely be said, were spared to minister to the wants of riders; and all these, judging from the numerous expressals of approval overheard, were gratified. Several asserted that this was the best meet they had ever participated in upon a horse race track. It was undoubtedly the finest ever witnessed in this section of Ontario. With a finely-constructed track, such as that now under consideration, London cannot but become the center of cycling race contests in Canada. Her facilities are unexampled, and the people are willing to extend a hearty support. Rarely has an affair of this kind been more efficiently managed than the one just concluded. No waits between events were experienced.

F. W. Young, a youthing rider benegary to the Wanderors, is deserving of prominent mention. The way in which he kept with the more experienced and seasoned ridors in the long distance test was truly marvel-ous. He is the most promising rider among the younger element of track racers, among the younger element of track racers, and his form of locomotion in the various events in which he tried issues with the best and speediest cyclists in Canada does not indicate him as rateable very much below. He will doubtless be in the foremost rank next season.

In their home was a lodger, one Edward Le Grande, a polished Frenchman, who called himself a professor of ianguages. He was 23. Mrs. Mansfield was 40. They became much attached to each other, and the wife gradually turned a cold shoulder to Mr. Mansfield. He upbraided her for her duplicity and threatened to kick the little Frenchman out. J. W. "At the time of the elopment G. T. Williams, an agent formerly in Mr. Mansfield's employ, was in Chicago. Mrs. Williams, who was in this city at the time, mailed to him Cleveland papers containing an account of the disappearance of Le Grande and Mrs. Mansfield. Stopping at the same boarding-house with Mr. Williams was a man from London, Ont., named J. B. Miles. Mr. and Mrs. Mansfield lived in London West before they located in Cleveland. Friends of Mrs. Miles mailed her the Cleveland newspapers, and she in turn forwarded them to her husband in Chicago. Mr. Miles knew that Mr. Williams lived in Cleveland, and asked him if he was acquainted with the Mansfields. He replied in the affirmative, and the two men discussed the elopement at some length. Several days afterward Mr. Miles told Williams that he had located Mrs. Mansfield. The Frenchman, he said, had returned to Paris and Mrs. Mansfield had been obliged to earn her own living as a cook in a Chicago restaurant. Mr. Mansfield now resides on Cedar avenue. He is well aware of his wife's present condition, but will never try to reclaim her. He has retained Col. Edgar Sowers to begin an action against Mrs. Mansfield or divorce. Prairie Fires in the Northwest.

Mr. M. H. King, a former resident of Downie, writes the Stratford Herald from Estevan, N. W. T., under date of Aug. S, as follows: "The weather here has been extremely hot and dry the last month. The hot winds from the south are like a blast from a furnace. Prairie fires are raging here on all sides, and thousands of tons of hay are being burnt up. Some men out haying have to take their haying implements and run for their lives. The fire travels very fast on a windy day. The Soo line of railway is being pushed rapidly now, and will be completed in about four weeks. It is a very substantially built road, heavier rails, ties and wider grade than the ordinary road. Proper Lung Development by Well Regulated Breathing of Great Value.

Proper Lung Development by Well Regulated Breathing or Great Value. I think it is evident, says Dr. T. J. Mays in the Century, that proper development and expansion of the lungs by means of woll-regulated breathing must be regarded as of the greatest value in the prevention and in the treatment of the inactive stages of pulmonary consumption. The more simple the method the more effective and practical will be the results which flow from it. Among the many exercises which are recommended for the purpose the following movements are very valuable. The arms, being used as levers, ere swung backward as far as possible on a level with the shoulders during each expiration. Or the hands are brought together in front on the same level during each expiration. Or the hands are brought together above the head while inspiring, and gradually brought down alongside the body while expiring. A deep breath must be taken with each inspiration and held until the arms are gradually moved forward or downward, or longer, in order to make both methods fully operative. A nother very serviceable chest exercise is to take a deep inspiration and, during expiration, in a loud voice count or sing as long as possible. A male person with a good chest capacity can count up to 60 or 80, while in a female, even with good lungs, this power is somewhat reduced. Practice of this sort will slowly develop the lungs, and the increased ability to count longer is a measure of the improvement going on within the chest, Or, again, the taking of six or eight full and deep breaths in succession every hour during wide jattention at the present time in connection with the prevention and the treatment of pulmonary consumption, and is another mode wherewith the ohest capacity can be decidedly improved. When air is breathed in this manner there is felt during each inspiration a gentle distension of the whole chest, while during expiration a feeling of emptiness is experienced.

THE POINTS DECIDED. The five points decided by the Bering ea arbitrators may be briefly summed up

1. The United States claimed jurisdiction over the Bering Sea, in accordance with an old cla m made by Russia when that empire owned Alasko. It is held by the arbitrators, however, that though Russia claimed jurisdiction in that sea, to the extent of 100 Italian miles from the coasts and islands belonging to her, in the treaty of 1824 with the United States and in the treaty of 1825 with Great Britain, Russis admitted that her jurisdiction should be a cannon shot, or three miles, from shore Russia did not again assert wide jurisdiction over the sea from that time till the cession of Alaska to the United States therefore the United States has no extended jurisdiction in Bering Sea.

2. Great Britain never recognized any laim upon the part of Russia of exclusive jurisdiction as to the seal fisheries in Bering Sea outside the ordinary territorial waters. Russia, therefore, could not hand ver any such jurisdiction to the United

3. The body of water now known as ering Sea was included in the phrase 'Pacific Ocean" as used in the treaty of 1825 between Britain and Russia.

4. All the rights of Russia to jurisdic tion and to the seal fisheries passed to the United States, limited by the cession.

5. The United States has no right to

the protection of or property in the seals requesting the islands of the United States in Bering Sea when found outside of the ordinary three-mile limit.

These are the findings as to the rights of parties. The regulations to be enforced prohibit the capturing or pursuing of seals within a zone of 60 miles around the Priby-loff Islands. They further establish a close senson for seals in Bering Sea from May 1 to July 31. They prohibit the use of firearms in sealing. They permit the capture of seals outside the Pribylofi zone after
