

THE SALARY INCREASES.

Doubtless few citizens will be disposed to quarrel with the proposal of No. 1 committee of the board of education to make an all-round increase in teachers' salaries. It cannot be said, however, that such a general advance is any more justified at the present time than it was at the beginning of the year. Then, the cost of living was as high as it is now, and there was the same disparity between the pay of London teachers and of those in other six inches and I should ha' been a dead cities as is complained of today.

There is reason to suspect that in making the present proposal the trustees are prompted by reasons other than justice to the teachers. The trustees, in fact, appear to be in a state of panic. They see some of the best qualified teachers in their employ leaving for other cities or to engage in other pursuits; they are constantly hearing of other contemplated resignations, and they are finding it difficult, If not impossible, to fill vacancies. To prevent a possible stampede of teachers and to encourage others to come to fill the gaps, they resolve to throw but the bait of higher salaries.

London teachers have long complained of inadequate pay; yet they have been obliged to grin and bear with conditions as they existed. "We were aware that we would find ourselves embarrassed by the existence of the treaties that are commonly called favored-nation treaties. Many of these treaties were made in the olden time, when it was not necessary to consult the colonies. But the time is past when the mother country makes a treaty without going to the Canadians and asking them if they desire to have such a treaty.

Few Favored Nations. "There are only a few countries with whom we have favored-nation treaties. One of these countries is France. There was one with Germany, but Germany wanted the same preference which we extended to the mother country, and we protested against that treaty. The existence of such a treaty would be a bar to the development of imperial unity. This treaty was, therefore, denounced."

Mr. Fielding continued: "I have said these favored_nation treaties included the one with France, but the treaty with France was not one of the old ones, made in bygone days, but made in recent years with the approval of the Parliament of Canada. It was ne gotiated in 1892, by Lord Dufferin and Sir Charles Tupper. I have no doubt the treaty was the best that could be obtained at the time. But as you look back now in the light of the present day, we are forced to the conclusion that it was a lopsided one. It contained this unjust principle: It provided that a limited number of articles should be admitted into France on the terms of a minimum tariff and a limited list of articles into Canada at the rates provided in the treaty. It was also provided in that treaty that if France granted to any foreign nation any other concessions on that limited list of articles, such grant must be extended to Canada.

French Receive Benefits.

"Now, turn to the other side. France received all the benefits of a favorednation treaty and not only as regards the limited list of articles mentioned in the treaty. 



The third brother, a former minis ter of commerce, later arrived at the prison, and fainted on seeing the corpses of his relatives.

The doctors who made a post-mor tem examination of the remains of the two men, state that the wounds which caused death were not self-inflicted. After the autopsy the bodies were immediately buried, only the nearest relatives of the deceased being allowed

to attend. Milan Novakovics' widow was refused permission to inter her husband in the family vault, and a commo grave was assigned him. The popu lace, which throughout had shown its sympathy with the victim, but has been overawed by troops, surrounded the cemetery, shouting "Murderers!" at the police and officials.

M. Novakovics was connected with some of the best Servian families, and the latter have instructed their lawyer to bring charges of willful murher against the perfect of police, upon whose orders, they allege, the gendarmes began firing.

Powder Mill Explosion

FIFTY PERSONS REPORTED DEAD

And More Than Six Hundred Injured-Shock Was relt 200 Miles

Fontanet, Ind., Oct. 16 .- The residents of this village of 1,000 persons wnen they awoke this morning encountered a much different situation tnan tney had been accustomed to in the past. Instead of a quiet country town and pleasant scenery to greet their eyes desolation was at hand. Soldiers of the Indiana State militia were on hand and had stood guard all

through the night. Details as to what caused the terrible catastrophe of yesterday, when the Dupont powder milis biew up, killing propably 50, and injuring some 600 persons, were lacking. No one connected with the powder comapny could ascribe any reason for the explosion. Several rumors were circulated, one of the most probable that the machinery in the glazing mill became overheated from friction, and set fire to some loose powder, one glazing mill was the first to blow up, the other sections of the plant followed in rapid succession.

A number of the residents were able by patching up their houses to pass a fairly comfortable night. The remainder were accommodated with sleeping room on cots placed in tents


