Department of Justice Gives Opinion That Peace Must Be Proclaimed Not Only With Germany, But Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria, and Orders-in-Council Are Likely to Remain in Effect Balance of Year.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Ottawa. Sept. 12.-It is the opinion of the justice department that the war measures act remains valid until peace is proclaimed, | and it is the further opinion of the department that peace cannot be proclaimed until such time as a state of war has ceased to exist as between Canada and all the countries with which Canada in common with Great Britain has been at war. That will mean not only Germany and Austria but Turkey and Bulgaria.

If this theory is correct and is adhered to then all orders-incouncil, including the prohibition and race track orders passed under the war measures act shall have effect until such time as peace is ratified with all the nations, or peace is officially proclaimed by Great Britain and thereafter by the governor-generalin-council in Canada. It is scarcely probable that the present year will witness that consummation.

W. E. O'Connor of Board of Commerce, Makes This Announcement.

FAIR PRICE COMMITTEES

Special Bodies Will Fully Investigate Conditions in All Cities.

Toronto, Sept. 12.—W. E. O'Connor, vice-chairman of the board of commerce, announced this morning at the resumed inquiry into the cost of living, that following esseions in Hamilton by that following sessions in Hamilton he that following sessions in maintening will return here on Wednesday and Thursday next week, when cold storage proprietors will be examined.

The commissioner stated that the fair the commissioner stated that the fair the commissioner stated that the fair that the fair the commissioner stated that the fair tha price committees to be established Hamilton and this city will be ready to act by that time, and the methods adopted by them should serve as models for committees to be appointed in other communities. "There has got to be good faith," declared Mr. O'Connor, when explaining that manufacturers and dealers would sit with the committees dealers would sit with the committees when prices were being considered. "The cards are to be placed on the table. The actual figures are to be disclosed and if good faith is not being kept it must be remembered that the board of commerce has, in Ottawa, all data for years as to costs, etc."

PEACE TREATY AND LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT IS RATIFIED BY THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT

Motion for Approval of Pact Carried At 1:30 o'Clock This Morning-Sir Robert Borden Unable To Attend Owing to Illness-Hon. W. S. Fielding's Motion Is Defeated.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—The House of Commons has formally approved the terms of the treaty of peace between the Allied and associated powers and Germany, and of the league of nations covenant. The approval of both Houses of Parliament has thus now been given, and the Government is in a position to advise the King to ratify the pact in the name of the Dominion. Before the motion calling for approval of the treaty was reached the House rejected an amendment offered by Hon. W. S. Fielding, and calling for a declaration that indorsation of the treaty must not be regarded as assent to "any impairment of the existing autonomous authority of the Dominion." This amendment, based upon an opinion expressed by Mr. Fielding, that under the provisions of the league of ations covenant Canada might, without consent of her representatives in Parliament, be called upon to supply troops to quell aggression directed against another member of the league, was condemned by Hon. C. J. Doherty as unnecessary. Mr. Doherty contended that the league of nations council, exercising a purely advisory power, could not override the authority of the Canadian Payliament to decide whether or not troops should be provided or funds raised for warlike purposes. He also objected that acceptance of the amendment would be tantamount to a refusal to approve the treaty. The resolution was voted down on a strict party division by 102 to 70, a Government majority of 32. The metion for approval of the treaty was carried without a dissenting voice at 1:30 a.m. Sir Robert Borden, who had been confined to his house by indisposition, was unable to be present and vote for the indorsation of the treaty.

WATTERS DECLARES UNION GOVERNMENT UNFAIR TO LABOR

ITALIAN MURDERER **EXPIATES CRIME ON** MONTREAL GALLOWS

Man Who Murdered Former Stratford Citizen Is Executed.

NECK NOT BROKEN

Executed Man Was Too Light and Hangman's Fears Were Sustained.

Iontreal, Sept. 12.—Antonio Sprecage. an Italian, was executed this morning in Bordeaux jail for the murder of George Roberts, a foreman in the Grand Trunk shops here, and formerly of Stratford and London. Ellis was the executioner.

Sprecage was discharged by Roberts from the shops on March 11, and after quarrel shot the foreman. The Italian escaped, but was captured at Smith's Falls.

Ellis sprang the trap at 7:45 o'clock. Six minutes later the man was pro-Six minutes later the man was pronounced dead and at 7:55 the body was
cut down and carried to the fall
morgue. The fail doctor, Dr. Benoit,
refused to declare the man dead and
the jury empanelled for the occasion
could not act upon the final work of the
law until he did so. It was not until
9:02 that life was declared extinct.
The case is the most remarkable of
all the hangings that have taken place
in Montreal. The murderer was only
125 pounds in weight, having lost over
15 pounds since his sentence. When 125 pounds in weight, having lost over 15 pounds since his sentence. When the executioner saw the Italian he expressed a fear of trouble at the hanging as the murdered was so light he feared the fall through the trap would not fracture the neck. What happened was just what he feared.

Dr. Benoit declared that the heart ceased heating eight minutes after the ceased beating eight minutes after the hanging, but there was great muscular twitching until 9:02, when it ceased. He could not say the man was dead as long as this continued.

EXPLOSIVES SEIZED IN DERRY QUARTERS OF SINN FEINERS

Military and Police Activity Taken Against Organization.

Belfast, Sept. 12 .- Military and police activity was everywhere in evidence to-day against the Sinn Fein organization. Raids were carried out in Belfast, at Lisburn, Derry, Dundalk, Louth and Enniskillen.

A quantity of the high explosive, gelignite, was selzed at the Derry Sinn Fein headquarters. In the same town the occupants of a house which was being searched confronted the police with two revolvers, but was overpowered.

KOREAN CAPITAL IS IN STATE OF SEIGE

Bomb Thrown at Governor Believed to Have Been Made in Manchuria.

Tokio, Wednesday, Sept. 10.—Since the attempt to assassinate Baron Saito, governor of Korea, at Seoul, on Sleptember 2, every part of that city has been occupied by Japanese troops, and the place is virtually in a state of siege. The would-be assassin is still at large, although a number of persons suspected of being implicated in the plot are under arrest. The bomb thrown at Baron Saito exploded with terrific violence, and an inspection of the fragments has shown the missile was scientifically constructed. It is the opinion of the police that the bomb was not made in Korea, but was brought into the country, probably from Manchuria.

The attack followed days of agitation in Seoul, the demonstrations being marked by flag-raisings, public meetings and the closing of shops. An independent newspaper was issued on August 22, the ninth anniversary of the annexation of Korea by Japan, as an avowed expression of protest. The day was called "national disgrace day" in the publication.

HOG BUYERS TALK OF \$15 LEVEL SOON

Bradstreet's Reports Lower Prices - Merchants' Business Good.

London reports to Bradstreet's that the cattle and hog markets are more or less demoralized as compared with the heavy demands and high prices of July and August. Hog buyers are talking about a \$15 level to be brought about in course of another three or four weeks. At present they are offering around \$17 per hundredweight to the farmers. Cattle prices are also dropping considerably, though not as much as in the erably, though not as much as in the case of hogs. Apart from these declining prices, the farmers are better satisfied than they expected to be. Winter feeds are not anything like as scarce as expected. Retail trade is keeping up well and in a few cases is decidedly ahead of last year. Collections are in very good shape. Travelers returning from their first trips through the country since the holidays say that merchants are buying very freely.

NOT CLAIMED YET. Tuesday's or Wednesday's prizes have not yet been claimed at Thomas' opening up to the time of going to press. Tuesday, the lucky ticket was 1052, with 1.013 as second choice. Mr. Clark ordered a quantity of the bacon and when it was delivered to his store and the duty paid, he found that the total cost per pound only amounted to 44 cents.

MOVING PICTURES. MUSIC AND ARCHITECTURE

Very few people seem to realize the incalculable educational or deducational influence wielded by the motion picture industry; perhaps a more powpicture industry; perhaps a more powerful influence on the life and ideals of the people than either church or Sunday school. It is questionable to what extent the mind of a youth is affected by the story of King Eglon, or Joshua. Or Shadrach, Meshach or Abednego; but you have only to go to any moving picture show to realize what an effect the pictured heroes have on the minds of the audience. Fortunately for us, the moral standard of the movies is surprisingly high, all things considered. the moral standard of the hoves is surprisingly high, all things considered. Your future Frank McCulloughs are fed up on dime novels recording the glorious exploits of some gentlemanly highway-man, and they straightway go and do exploits or some gentlemany ingreasyman, and they straightway go and do likewise. But the glorious heroes of the movies always represent, on a higher or lower plane, the triumph of right over wrong, of generosity ever meanness and exaltation of love, devotion and duty. Even in the lowest class of pictures, which one sees only occasionally now, where the hero strides into a barroom with twelve men in it, and throws four out of the window, four down the cellar, and knocks the other four cold, the twelve men are always double-eyed villains and richly deserve their fate. The movie standard of manhood, however, is certainly not that of Isaliah, Chapter 53.

Then again, what an astonishingly high standard of character is represented by the favorite feminine stars. Grace, refinement, beauty, intelligence and virtue are here the rule; decidedly a tribute to the public taste. 

I would just like to remind all returned soldiers that the Canada we are living in today is the same place they

I would just like to remind all returned soldiers that the Canada we are living in today is the same place they volunteered to fight for during the war, and while I make no pretence at knowing just how many men actually joined the colors out of purely patriotic motives, the public will soon be inclined to doubt the patriotism of men who conduct themselves along such radical lines as were reported from the Toronto meeting.

I suggest to those who joined the colors out of pure patriotism that Canada needs your support just as much today as she did in the dark days of

the war.
To any others who may not come under the above group, please remember that the Dominion treasury is not an institution of infinite wealth, and that every dollar that is paid out of it has been obtained by a tax of some sort: and if the government pays out today, the taxpayer does the same to-

norrow.
