

He intends to poll the landlords of Ulster to ascertain on what terms they part with their holdings, in the hope that the tenants may purchase the land under the new act on a basis of uniformity.



According to statistics of the London County Council there are in London 2,334,450 females, of whom 719,331 are wage-earners. More then half a million are unmarried. The occupations followed by married. The occupations followed by these female workers are said to cover the whole range of employment. These statistics are remarkable as showing how large a proportion of the work done in the world's greatest city is carried on by women. The suggestion that the entrance of women into so many lines of work is to the detriment of the other sex, and of the industrial situation is plainly fallacious. The enlistment of the gentler sex in the ranks of wage-earners infallacious. The enfistment of the general sex in the ranks of wage-earners increases the aggregate production and adds greatly to the total wealth of the world. The drawbacks are not economic but social. 


