

## HEAVY INDEMNITY PRICE OF DEFEAT

What Conquered Nations Have Had to Pay-France Gave. Germany \$1,000,000,000.

London, Aug. 2.—Baron Suyematsu, writing to the Outlook, declares that his country will never enter into a peace agreement with Russia the terms of which do not stipulate the payment by the conquered of an indemnity. He 'thinks' this should amount to at

east \$500,000,000. When, in 1896, the Graeco-Turkish war ended the Sultan demanded an indemnity of \$50,000,000. The powers promptly interposed; said that the sum was excessive, and Abdul Hamid II. cut it down four-fifths. In the nine years that have since intervened he has received something more than of his \$10,000,000.

The same amount - \$10,000,000 - was the payment which China made England at the close of the Taiping rebellion (1850-1864), but this was nominal merely, and insisted upon more because of the effect it would have upon the Orientals than for the actual repayment of Britain's fighting expenses for she had paid out fully \$25,000,000 to

Earlier than this (1840-1842), when he red-coated warriors of "The Widow of Windsor" had won that briefer struggle with the Chinese, called the opium war, the Emperor agreed to pay \$25,000,000. A goodly portion of this indemnity, however, went to British merchants as compensation for the destruction of their property by the natives, and as the war had cost the home government all of \$10,000,000, the victors

made no money. In 1866 Prussia closed a war with Austria much more advantageously. All told, the fighting had not lasted two months, nor was warfare then the expensive thing it has come to be today. Yet Austria, with her five lesser alies, was forced to agree to an indemnity of \$32,500,000.





Such is the reason, in the opinion of Insurance Commissioner Frederick L Cutting, of Massachusetts, one of th greatest insurance experts in the United States, why the officers of the Portal Arganum have found it neces-Royal Arcanum have found it necessary to put in force the new and higher rates which have been so severely criticised by Royal Arcanum members throughout the country.

In the second part of his annual re port to the Legislature, just issued, Commissioner Cutting devotes three pages to the Royal Arcanum. Not only does the commissioner show that in his belief the new high rates were a necessity, but he emphasizes the point that the new rates are a little lower than those treated as necessary by the national fraternity congress mortality tables, the standard fixed by law in 1900 for any new company desiring to incorporate in Massa chusetts and for any company seeking

#### Ontario's New Weath.

There is a solid basis of fact in the tales of the wonderful mineral wealth discovered in a section of New Ontario traversed by the new Temiskaming Railroad, about 100 miles north of North Bay. A mining camp of 700 men has sprung up in the wilderness within the past few months, and a village of 75 houses is in existence before the site has been surveyed. The village and the camp have been named Cobalt. cobalt being one of the metals in which the district abounds, but the main reliance is upon the silver deposits, which are believed to be among the richest in the world.

The Toronto Globe has shown enterprise in placing the facts fully before the public, by sending a special commissioner, Mr. Wallace Maclean, over the field. Mr. Maclean reports upon each of the thirteen producing mines in detail, showing that to date their production has been \$2,237,500, nearly half of it within the past three months. The first actual work dates less than a year back. Eighty-one veins have been opened by these thirteen mines, containing silver, cobalt and arsenic of the camp will depend upon silver, the market for arsenic and cobalt being limited, or yielding no great profits. The manager of one company would not be surprised if his mine produced \$50,000,000 or \$100,000,000. Prospectors are pouring in and new mines will begin operation before long.

The creation of a great silver mining industry in that section of Ontario will bring serious social and administrative problems. Many disputes over property rights are already in the courts. A difficulty that has already presented itself is the exclusion of mining prospectors from timber limits under lease by lumbermen. The question arises whether timber licensees are to be allowed to prospect on their limits for minerals, and pre-empt valuable claims. 




