

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



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THE OUTLOOK.

The continuance of unfavorable weather is having its effect on building operations in the West. Reports from Winnipeg state that the building season is backward and after heavy snows and hard frosts last week, excavation work was almost impossible.

It is to be hoped that satisfactory arrangements will be made with the labor organizations, as any interference which may occur now is likely to prove disastrous to all con-

Montreal dealers in structural steel anticipate a good season and demand is becoming brisk. Beams weighing 55 lbs. per foot have sold for 3 cents per lb., partly worked 31/2 to 4 cents, and capped columns are bringing 4 cents.

- In Toronto, although the weather has been none too favorable, an enormous amount of building is contemplated this season. It is expected that the April building permits will amount to \$2,000,000. Structural steel and iron is in great demand and the supply houses have about all the orders they can handle at present. Bricks of all

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description are in brisk demand.

A building boom of no small proportions is also commencing in Hamilton. Permits issued to date are far in excess of those issued during the same period last year. Trouble is brewing between the master plumbers and the union men, who are demanding an increase of from 35 to 40 cents per hour. The employers are not unwilling to pay some of the men at the increased rate, but they object to paying the same wage to all the men irrespective of their value.
