

The accepted scale of book prices is, in fact, too different to afford a satisfactory comparison, and

the only true criterion in the matter is the price of the 9th edition of thte Encyclopaedia Britannica. This was originally sold at 30s. (\$7.50) a volume, although each volume contained 100 pages less than do those of the new edition, which may now be purchased (in the same style) at little more than

To the former figure, however, of 30s. (\$7.50) (which may be regarded as the normal, the standard, charge) the price of the new edition will eventually be raised.
